

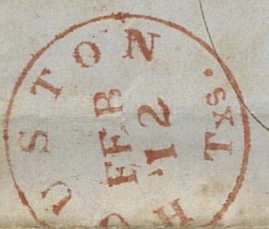
Harrisburg Feb 9th 1852

My Dear Len

I have waited patiently for an answer to my letter, but am now forced to believe that you do not intend to write again by your long silence. as you do not write yourself, we have reason to think that our letters would not be very agreeable but I will set it down that business, and not indifference is to be imputed to your silence.

I have been in Harrisburg some four weeks, awaiting the expected addition to Sister's family. she has a fine son one week old to day, he is a noble looking boy, and Granny says he has hair like his Uncle Len. Sister is doing remarkably well and very proud of her son, as a matter of course, all Mothers are, when they have a fine one, and you have two that didn't have. I shall leave in a day or two for new Washington.
