## Kentucky Wildcats Return With Tickets to Olympics in England

### Crockett, Jones Win ACP's Get Two Seats

The Constitutionalist party swept the Student Government Association elections Thursday, taking all offices and all but two of the seats in the assembly.

John Crockett of the Constitutionalist party won the SGA presidency, 1932 to 1931, over James Morrissey. All-Campus party candidate from the Engineering College, James Jones, (C), led the ticket with 1430 votes to beat William Young, (ACP), with 722, for SGA vice-president.

A proposal to amend the SGA constitution to make it comply with the semester system changed, 1171 to 243.

### Home Ec Club To Be Host For Workshop

Representatives from 40 college home economics clubs in four states are attending an annual province workshop on the campus today and Saturday. The University club is host with clubs from Ashby, Eastern and Georgetown colleges.

### Departments Get Quarters

Three departments of the College of Arts and Sciences will move to new quarters in about three weeks.

The Sociology, Anthropology, Geography and Political Science departments will take over the temporary building between library and the stadium soon as classrooms are completed. Offices of these departments moved into the building this week.

### Nichols, Deiss Named Editors

Fred E. Nichols, junior, and Helen Deiss, sophomore, have been elected co-editors of the 1948-49 Freshman Handbook, an informational publication distributed to all new students at the time of their first enrollment. It was announced Monday.

Selection of the two students to head the handbook staff was made by a faculty-student advisory board representing administrative officers and various student organizations. The co-editors will make a staff to start work on the publication at an early date.

### Sigma Chi To Award 'Best Dressed' Titles

Collegiate fashion will be emphasized on the campus during the week ends as coeds and men students vie for the right to participate in the third annual "Best Dressed Contest" on April 11.

Sponsored by Sigma Chi fraternity, the contest will feature representatives of fraternities, societies, and other campus organizations in competition for the titles of "Best Dressed Man" and "Best Dressed Woman" on the University campus.

### Four Trees Planted Along Phalanx Walk

Four trees were added to the Phalanx Walk, which extends from the Administration Building to the library, at a special ceremony Tuesday.

Guest speakers for the service were Dr. Leo Chamberlain, Vice President of the University, and Prof. Norris Elliott of the College of Agriculture.

### No Rent Increase, University Says

The University has good news for veterans living in Cooperstown and Shawneetown.

There will be no rent increase for veterans living there, even though the increased veterans' subsistence payments make a \$2 to \$3 hike mandatory under the Federal Public Housing Authority's regulations. Rents there are based on income.

### UK Registration Closes At 7:034

The record high enrollment figure for the Spring quarter now stands at 7094 students, Miss Maple Moores, registrar, reported after Saturday's deadline for late entry into classes.

The enrollment surpasses the previous record for a third term by more than 600 students. Normal pre-war Spring term enrollment was 3600, statistics show.

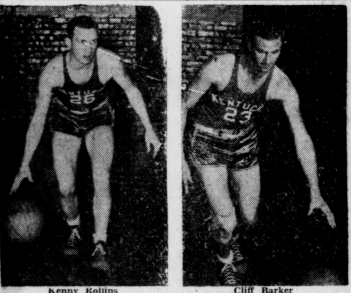
### Kernel Remodeling

### Rush Draft Action, Dr. Donovan Urges

University President H. L. Donovan wants the selective service system revived immediately because of the Russian aggression in Europe.

"The draft should be put into effect at once. It should not be delayed a single day," he wrote Mrs. Donovan from Germany where he is making a survey of education for the Office of Military Government.

### Convinced Training Needed

Dr. Donovan said that since he had arrived in Germany he is convinced that Universal Military Training is necessary.

"The Russians never to take over all Europe, make no mistake about it. It is only a matter of time. They probably have D-day already set," he wrote from Berlin in a letter dated Mar. 26.

### To Return May 1

The University educator left for Germany on Mar. 1 and is expected to return about May 1.

Dr. Donovan expressed an opinion that "if we are strong we can keep the peace." But he warned that "when the Russians see the character of our armed forces they get the idea we will be a pushover target; it is only a matter of time" until they attempt to take over all of Europe.

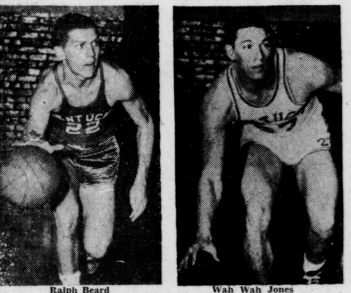
### Dilly-Dallying

"Why do we have to dilly-dally and wait until some country makes war on us when possibly if we were strong it would not dare to move?" he asked.

"If I see any message to you who are back home it is that we should arm now, not next summer or 'year hence," he said.

### UK Stadium Capacity Will Be Doubled

To a number of the Assembly, there appears to be a depressing low interest in the Student Government on the part of the student body.

Those active in behalf of the party include all groups of students, veterans and non-veterans, independent students and a few Greeks, strong conservatives, and equally strong liberals. Any student on the campus can be a member of our party.

Our point of agreement is on one thing, that the Student Government of this University is failing to take its place in campus life, and that it will compare with similar bodies in other universities. The average student remains unaware of its very existence.

We do not believe in a smear campaign, but we would like to know why SGA, with over \$2,000 per year to spend, does not use a few cents of this to put out complete balance sheets and income statements on these funds, to be placed on bulletin boards over the campus.

We would like to know why SGA does not use the efficient purchasing system of the Comptroller's Department for its buying, and thereby get better results at a cheaper price. There are many things wrong on this campus which the administration would be glad to correct—if they were brought into attention.

At present, however, no channels exist for the individual student to effectively submit his complaint or suggestion to those able to do something about it. And now, "Interested Student" we have put before you why we are running for office. If you agree with what we have said, and you believe that we can do the job, we would like to see you join us in fighting for an SGA for all the students.

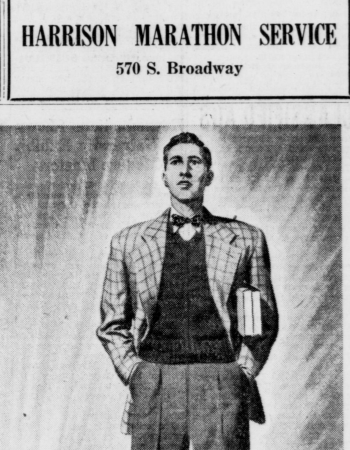

A discussion of the tuition rates charged veterans will highlight the first Spring quarter meeting of the Veterans Club scheduled for 7:30 Monday night in the SUB.

Club officials said the agreement between state universities and the Veterans Administration whereby veterans are charged \$4 per quarter hours has caused a few students to exceed the \$500 tuition allowed for the nine-month school year.

Proposals that the University has made to the VA to refund the overpayments will be discussed and the veterans are expected to draft resolutions to Congress seeking to prevent similar situations.

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### Wildcats Return

(Continued from Page One)

The Cats were ahead or almost equal with the Oilers all the way with the exception of the first part of the second half when the Oilers went ahead 37 to 27. But Rupp's fielders erased that margin and went ahead 47 to 45 when Beard took an out-of-bounds pass from Rollins and sank a bucket and free throw awarded when fouled on the shot. Bob Kurland, the Oilers' seven-foot center, hit a crisp 10 to tie the score and Gerald Tucker a free throw to give the Oklahoma outfit a lead and held the remaining five minutes of the game.

A 56-foot shot by Rollins knotted the count for the fifth time to deadlock the game 26 to 26 as the first half ended. The Oilers came back to outscore Kentucky 11 to 1 in the first five minutes of the second half to command a 37 to 27 lead. Then everybody's all-American Beard took over and scored six field goals and a free throw to send Kentucky ahead 47 to 45 in the next ten minutes. Kurland knotted the count at 47 and Tucker's free throw sent the Oilers ahead for keeps.

Kentucky led by seven points midway in the first half with Beard the sparkplug of a scoring spree that sent the Wildcats ahead after the score had been tied at 8. In this five-minute spurge that saw Kentucky go ahead 20 to 13. Beard got three field goals, Barker one, and Jones two free throws and a tip in.

The score was tied at 4, 5, 8, 24, 28 and 47, and the Wildcats broke ahead 5 to 4 and 10 to 8. The lead changed hands nine times with Kentucky going ahead at 3 to 2 on Grom's tips, 5 to 4 on Rollins' free throw, 10 to 8 on a bucket by Jones, and 46 to 45 on an out-of-bounds play pay-off by Beard. The Oilers went ahead 2 to 0 at the start, and at 4 to 3, 7 to 5, 21 to 20, 26 to 24 and 49 to 47.

Beard led the scoring for both teams with 23 points. Rollins was next for Kentucky with six. Kurland's 20 led the Oilers.

After the game, Coach Rupp praised his team, saying he had no illibits. But, he added, the early loss of Barker who went out with a broken nose hurt Kentucky's scoring power. And the loss of Jones with ten minutes to go and Holland's few minutes later via the five-foul rule slowed the Cats' rebounding game.

The Olympic squad which sails for England on July 14 will be five players from Kentucky, five from the Oilers, and two collegiate and two amateur players who will be selected by the Olympic committee.

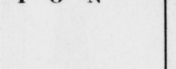

 Led by Alexander The Great Groza, Kentucky won its second victory over Baylor University within the span of six days. After trimming the cagers from Waco, Texas, 58-52, last Tuesday a week, in the NCAA finals, UK's racing Zip Kids came back to win again over Baylor last Monday, this time by a 77-59 margin.

As a result of this conquest, the mighty Wildcats can lay undisputed claim to being the nation's No. 1 collegiate basketball aggregation for the 1947-48 campaign.

For the Lexington Lynxmen, it was win No. 36. The defeat gave Baylor a final mark of the season.

## Track Team Whitewashed At Purdue

 Finally realizing what first-class competition is like, Kentucky's trackmen are backing down to strenuous exercises and hard work as a result of UK's pointless showing in the Purdue Relays at Lafayette, Indiana, last Saturday.

Only one of the six Wildcat entries passed the qualifying tests to enter the finals of one of the meet's 15 events. Don (Dopey) Phelps, of UK football fame, came the closest to entering the scoring column for the Kentuckians by placing sixth in the finals of the 40-yard dash. Points were given only for the first five finishers.

Results of the qualifying heats show that Kentucky had four barriers who just missed a chance for the finals as all came in third in their heat, when it took a first or second place showing to earn another try.

Johnny Melhus, Ralph Gentry, and Dennis Rice—all 60-yard dashmen—were three of UK's near-missers when each crossed the finish line third in his respective heat. The fourth Kentuckian, high and low hurdler Tony Dallas, also fell short as he closed in third place of the low hurdles semi-finals.

Of the 26 schools sending representatives to the meet only seven entered teams for the 440- and Kentucky's team, made up of Phelps, Melhus, Dallas, and George Kirchner, finished seventh.

Biggest disappointment so far is not with UK's showing in the Purdue Relays but with the small number, approximately 75, of students that signed up for track, with only one out of every four signers showing up for the daily workouts which start at 2 p.m. and run until 4:30 p.m.

The freshmen, whose interest for sprinting glory is practically nil, are very few in numbers and, sadly enough, the freshman squad opens its competition Monday, April 5 when the varsity squad of Military-Burg Military Institute, Millersburg, Ky., travels to Lexington for a clash on the University cinders.

Next on the schedule for the varsity team is a meeting on April 10 with Marshall College of Huntington, W. Va., and on April 17 with Vanderbilt University of Nashville, Tenn.

In an effort to find what men work best at what positions, Bryant made several other changes during the week, most notable of which was that of "traveling man" Nick Odiliva, who was moved to left end. Right tackle received a shot in the arm with the reappearance of Frank Sothermaster from a southern hospital.

Since no shining new stars have emerged from spring practice, probably the most noteworthy accomplishment lies in the fact that all the boys have learned a great deal of football. At present most of them are having a little trouble applying what they have learned, but throughout there has existed a spirit of competition, an eagerness to fight for a starting berth or even a second string berth, that has been refreshing. And if anyone is optimistic concerning prospects for the 1948 Kentucky gridiron machine, they only have to look at the hard-working, ambitious crew to have their faith justified.
