Campaign posters torn down

SGA presidential candidate Cyndi Weaver's campaign became a target of vandalism early yesterday morning when more than 500 of her campaign posters were forn down. Weaver discovered the damage when she and four of her campaign workers arrived on campus at about 7 a.m. after hanging posters until about 3:30 that same morning.

Posters were ripped from non-painted surfaces and strewn across the ground, torn in half,

said.

Weaver, who has already hung about 400 of her campaign posters, estimated the monetary loss

ers, estimated the monetary loss at about \$80.

What Weaver cannot replace, though she said, is the time she lost yesterday that would have been used to meet students.

"I planned to hit bus stops and talk to students, but instead I had to spend time putting up posters where posters used to be," she said.

Because Weaver is \$75 away from the \$300 expenditure limit established by the election rules, Arington asked SGA elections' board chairman Ken Walker to the suspend the rules to allow Weaver to replace the posters. Walker agreed.

Tearing down the posters "was very unfortunate and I feel very bad about it," 'Arington said.

The presidential candidate said he is particularly disturbed by not knowing who is responsible for the vandalism.

Reagan calls for stricter Moscow embassy safety

WASHINGTON — President Rea-gan promised quick action yester-day to prevent 'further damage to our national security' from a sex-and-spy scandal in Moscow and sug-gested that the unfinished, \$191 mil-jion U.S. Embassy there will be torn down if it cannot be protected from eavesdroppins.

Reagan said the Soviets will not be allowed to move into their new embassy on a Washington hilltop until Americans occupy a new embassy in Moscow.

UK's prestigious Gaines Fellowships in the humanities for the 1987-88 school year were awarded last week. Raymond F. Betts, director of UK's Gaines Center for the Humanities, said the fellowships are given each year to 10 students at the University.

The program, which will begin its fourth year next fall, was created with the funding of \$500,000 from well-known Lexington horseman John R. Gaines and his wife, Joan. Betts said the money was placed in an endowment and the fellowships are funded through the interest drawn from the fund. Betts said the fellowships are grants of \$2,000 during a student's junior year and \$3,000 during the se-nior year.

The program's purpose is "to extend and enrich humanities education at the University of Kentucky," he said.

Nancy Howard, administrative assistant for the Gaines Center, said students chosen to be Gaines fellow must fulfill the progaram's various requirements in humanities studies. Students must complete a two-semester, six-hour seminar during the junior year that involves a concentrated study in the humanities, Howard said.

Commentator Rooney won't return to work; CBS may withhold pay

NEW YORK — CBS News said Monday the network won't pay "60 Minutes" commentator Andy Rooney unless he returns to work. Rooney has refused to appear on the top-rated news show until the network settles a five-week-old strike by the Writers Guild.

strike by the Writers Guild.
Rooney, who has a contract at CBS News until February 1988 for an estimated \$400,000 annually, has not appeared on "50 Minutes" for three weeks. He delivers a commentary at the end of the show.

"Andy Rooney has been asked to report to work under the terms of his contract with CBS News. He has refused to do so," said a statement issued by the news division. "While we respect Andy's desire to support the Writers Guild in its strike, we will not continue to pay him his salary while he refuses to work."

Rooney could not be reached for comment Monday. On Friday he said he would not return to work until the striking writers did and

produce.

Last week, he sent a letter to that effect to GBs chief executive officer Laurence A. Tisch. Rooney also tried to get admitted to the contract negotiations as a reporter, but was not allowed in.

Frank Carlucci, the president's national security adviser, said Shultz will have a secure room in the embassy from which to work.



Pope makes call in Argentina, asks for distribution of wealth

VIEDMA, Argentina — Pope John Paul II yesterday called for fairer distribution of Argentina's natural bounty, advised gauchos and farm-workers not to migrate to the cities and told Indians to defend their heri-

workers not to migrate to the cities and told Indians to defend their heritage.

He also heard an outspoken local bishop imply this country's Roman Catholic establishment did not do enough to defend human rights during a 1976-1983 military regime that tortured and killed thousands of suspected opponents. In Iviedma, on the northern edge of the vast Patagonian scrubland, the pontiff encouraged development of the nearly empty region.

"Take advantage of the natural resources of this region ... so as to achieve ever more human living conditions and populate more and more this extensive area," he said from an outdoor platform surrounded by sagebrush near the airpunt of the control of the con



"That really got us going," Madison said. "When Terry did that, I could sense it changed our frame of mind. That's what a leadoff man is supposed to do."


After Shumpert circled the bases, left fielder Mark Blyths shot a single up the middle.



You've seen the posters, articles and debates and now it's time to vote your conscience for the person who you think will best serve the student body in what has been billed the most important election in Student Government Association history.

Notice, we say person because without a doubt the two presidential candidates — Cyndi Weaver and Kenny Arington — have been pulling their respective running mates'

In choosing the voice for the students, the decision comes down to a matter of style vs. substance. Both candidates can be commended for their quality. For the first time in many years, students have the opportunity to choose from two qualified, committed candidates.

Weaver, without a doubt, would bring more vocality to the role of student government president. But voice isn't enough; strong words must have strong ideas backing

Arington offers the substance students will need when facing a new president and new vice chancellor for student

affairs.

His platform offers a more comprehensive plan for his year as president than his opponent's. His plans for a student credit union, a cold clinic and a student-run radio station obviously show his insight into student needs and interests. Also, he plans to return emphasis to matters of ongoing importance — such as campus safety — that tend to be overlooked.

Arington's success with Radio Free Lexington can't be denied. Virtually single-handedly, he has managed to raise more than \$100,000 for the proposed campus station. And he has done this with thoughtfulness and perserverance instead of hype and fanfare.

Through his work with RFL, he has shown that he can work well with the University system. He is respected by administrators and students and can use that respect to further student interests.

further student interests.

Arington could never be called anything but laid-back. But this style allows him to easily work with students and administrators. His concern for students makes him a voice for his constituencies, not as loud a voice as Weaver, but a committed voice nonetheless.

Contrasted against the quality of the two presidential candidates are the candidates for senior and executive vice president. This choice comes down more to a choice be-



tween two — or more correctly — four evils. Evils is probably too strong a word —unqualified would be better.

Keith Clary's abrasiveness and personal biases and his desire to play an overly active role in the politics of the senate — an idea that exceeds the bounds of the senior vice presidency —would divide the senate.

Because of her laissez-faire attitude toward the senate, Bridges offers the best available excuse for a senior vice president. Although obviously a puppet of Weaver, her presidential running mate, Bridges' plans for traveling senate meetings and workshops for senators are needed to help change the image of SGA.

The Weaver ticket proposes bringing in new blood to re-

The Weaver ticket proposes bringing in new blood to re-vitalize the ailing SGA. But if you're going to get a blood transfusion, at least get good blood. Executive vice presi-dential candidate Karl Crase does not provide that needed transfusion. His main purpose for being on the ticket is to help win Weaver greek support. Crase is a member of Sigma Nu fraternity.

Crase's solution is creating more and more committees—essentially more and more bureaucracy. The University already suffers from that problem. Why add to the dis-

ease?

New blood is fine, but in the top positions, experience can't be replaced. Brad Dixon provides that experience. His three terms in the senate show his commitment to his constituency and his determination to represent them.

We know that there are a lot of arguments against a split ticket, but in this case, the need is obvious. It will add variety and keep the vice presidents from being solely pawns of the president.

During the debates, all candidates for the two vice presidential slots appeared well-coached on the presidential platforms and issues—too coached.

To have an effective and active SGA next year, we need thinking neonle not "ves" people.

To have an enceute and account thinking people, not "yes" people.

We urge the student body to vote for Arington, Bridges and Dixon for the future of the SGA.

Lawmakers divided on higher speed limit

FRANKFORT — The chairmen of the Transportation Committees in the state House and Senate said yesterday they support an increase in the speed limit to 65 mph on interstate highways and selected parkways in Kentucky. But the top lawmaker in the Senate said he is undecided on the issue and predicted opposition when it goes before the 1988 General Assembly.

"We would mever have lowered the speed limit in the first place if it hadn't been for federal blackmail," said Rep. Clayton Little, D-Virgie, the chairman of the House Transportation Committee.

"It's just legalizing what people are already basically ng," agreed Sen. Woody May, D-West Liberty, the doing. mittee chairman.

Senate President Pro Tem John "Eck" Rose, D-Win-chester, said lawmakers and his constituents have mixed feelings on the subject.
"Some areas of the state, I would be in favor of it,"

Hinckley wants to live with asylum friend

WASHINGTON — John C. Hinckley says he wants to live with a woman who once killed her sleeping daughter and is now "the biggest influence in my life," according to court papers filed yesterday.

Hinckley, acquitted by reason of insanity of attempted murder charges stemming from the 1981 shooting of President Reagan, recently told a psychiatrist he hopes to eventually gain release from St. Elizabeths Hospital in Washington to live with Leslie DeVeau.

DeVeau a one-time Washington socialize was found.

DeVeau, a one-time Washington socialite, was found guilty by reason of insanity of charges she murdered her child in 1982.

She met Hinckley at St. Elizabeths and there were published reports in 1985 that the two were engaged to be mar-

ried.

DeVeau has since been released from the governmentrun mental hospital where Hinckley was committed after
his 1982 acquittal.

Congressmen blast embassy's security

MOSCOW — Two members of congress looking into the U.S. Em-bassy security scandal blasted top officials yesterday for resisting ighter protection measures, and aid the mission might never be de-

clared spy-free.

Their report called for a world-wide overhaul of measures taken to protect U.S. diplomatic missions

protect U.S. diplomatic missions from espionage.
They said a new \$191 million embassy complex being built in Mostave of the mission would take at least five more years to make secure. They did not rule out that it might have to be destroyed because it was riddled with KGB bugging devices.
Embassy security in Moscow anow stands is "fundamentally flawed both in physical and personel areas," said Dan Mica, D-Fla, and Olympia Snowe, R-Maine, from the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

Mica and Snowe came to Moscow
to inspect the new embassy and
gauge damage done by a spyring
scandai that led to two former U.S.
Marine embassy guards being arrested. They spoke to reporters after
two days of inspecting the buildings
and talking with embassy officials.

he said the Kremlin could not use its new office tower in Washington until Americans occupy their new Moscow embassy.

'We are not going to be run out of wn' by spying, Reagan said.

U.S. Ambassador Jack Matlock delivered a formal protest yesterday over purported infiltration of the old and new buildings, embassy spokes-

man Jarossav Verener said yester-day.

"We should operate on the basis that the facility has been fully com-promised," Mica said of the building that the facility has been fully complex of 183.

On the new red-brick complex, Mica said, "We have five years of problems there, at least."

"We might recommend that it be demoished," Snowe said.

The two reserved their strongest criticism for the attitude taken by top embassy personnel on security matters, and what they said was the failure to devise back-up systems that would prevent Soviet penetration.

The two arrested Marines were said to have been seduced by Soviet women into allowing KGB agents to enter the embassy at night, where the agents got into top-secret areas after automatic alarms were switched off.

"It all came down to a point where only two people could override the entire system — all the electronics equipment, all the physical security and all the clearances and training." Mica said.

Snowe said her talks with embassy personnel revealed a "negative attitude" toward the Marine guards, adding," this lax attitude and the lack of leadership in the security area by the serior staff in the embassy may have contributed to the preteration of the embassy."

He said Marine guards registered 137 security violations at the embas-sy in 1986, including safes left open overnight, and classified documents left exposed. The Marines had the sense "nothing was being done" about the violations, Mica said.
