HIV screening could be part of routine check-ups

Screening for the Human Immunode-ficiency Virus could soon become a part of routine physical exams, based on a rec-ommendation from the Center for Disease Control.

ommendation from the Center for Disease Control.

Last month, the CDC updated its recommendation that health care facilities discuss the option of including HIV screening in routine physical exams.

"This is a recommendation, not a mandate for the health care system or for people," said Glyn Caldwell, assistant professor and vice chairman in the department of epidemiology at UK's College of Public Health, adding that the thinks most health care facilities will gradually adopt the recommendation.

The recommendation is being discussed at UK, but it has not been implemented, said Richard Greenberg, a UK infectious dissease doctor.

According to the CDC's website; patients should be informed that the test will take place, but have the choice to opt out. Routine screening for HIV, as suggested by the CDC, could result in many benefits, Caldwell said.

"(Routine HIV screening) could increase early detection and treatment, decrease early detection and teath care system in general," said Glyn Caldwell.

Caldwell said it is especially important for students to get tested.

Almost half of adolescents and young adults are sexually active, and a large percentage of those have unprotected sex,

putting them at a higher risk to contract HIV, Caldwell said.

"The only safe sex is no sex," Caldwell said. "The next stage is a mutually monogamous relationship, but a lot of people don't follow those rules.

"Students should be tested."
Greenberg said he is in favor of the CDC's recommendation for all patients in the health care setting.

"Treatment is a benefit," Greenberg said, "This disease is no longer a death sentence."

Greenberg said people might object to HIV screening because of the stigma of how the disease is caught.

"This is a disease of heterosexual transmission," Greenberg said, "There are a lot of countries where more women See HIV on page 3





Caldwell is also in favor of routine screening, but said be knew of a few reasons some people might choose to opt out of it.

QUESTIONS FOR THE CANDIDATES

Teresa Isaac

In the wake of last month's drowning deaths of 2 UK students, how can the city and UK work together to improve drainage around campus?

A What we've asked UK to do is to very carefully study what the water runoff will be when they add impervious surface. We have a special surface that actually absorbs the water more, and we have trees and grass in between it.

I actually asked UK students what they would like, and one of the things they said is Wi-fi downtown, so we added Wi-fi-fi downtown, they also told me they would like me to extend the bar hours, which I did. They said they would like for me to help them promote their businesses when they start them, so I used my radio show to help promote those businesses. We have participated for the last four years with the Fusion project so that when new students come in they actually get out and work in the community, and the community sees the good side of students. We try to make sure that we have internship opportunities available for students so they can see the different kinds of jobs that they can have here. And we try to make sure that we have the kind of employers who can hire students.

Regarding campus safety, what are some improvements you've seen UK make, and what can UK do better?

My commissioner of public safety works very closely with your police or changing the environment so that it's safer for students. We also have our detective bureau work closely with your police. We're working on a couple of cases now where students were sexually assault ed. We actually train your police. We try to make sure we keep those lines of communication open.

What can your administration do to make downtown more attractive for recreation and for living?

What we've done is try to work with the live music venues and the restaurants to make it easy for them to open worked to to stay in business. We also have worked to stay in business. We also have downtown. Since I've been mayor, we've created 200 residential units and there are 800 more under construction. We also have a grocery store that will be going in at the corner of Pine and Broadway.

How do you see UK fitting in with the Lexington community as a whole?

When you have 35,000 young people, that adds a vibrancy to the community.

I have a 20-year-old and a 23-year-old myself, so I know that enthusiasm that they have. I see it in UK students,

and you want to make sure that your

creative buzz about it and that feel that there is life to it – that's what college students bring to the town. You also have to take advantage of the brain power of the faculty. I think you have to nurture the individual professors who have ideas and work with them and show that the city wants to partner on those kinds of things.

The best thing we can do is help you with infrastructure as you build new dorms, as we've done. Dr. Todd thinks increasing the student body is a part of that, and he also wants to increase the amount of research that UK does. So I worked very closely with Wendy Baldwin when she was here. We would partner on a lot of things involving the College of Pharmacy. We lobbied a lot for pharmaceutical money at Coldstream, and that was one of our top priorities both at the state legislature and the federal legislature.

Are you concerned with UK's expansion disrupting traffic patterns, specifically with the closing of Rose Street?

A: UK's plan on Rose Street was reviewed both by my traffic division of police and by traffic engineers. Mainly we were worried about access by emergency vehicles to the hospital itself.

Has your position changed on any of the issues that irked the student population, such as the smoking ban, keg tagging ordinance and the Lexington Area Party Plan?

ington Area Party Plan?

I don't think the smoking ban irked the student population. A lot of young people have asthma, and said they couldn't go into restaurants or bars because it was impossible for them to breathe. Some of those bars where the bands, play, they said they could not even see their audience. The Party Plan was implemented before I was there. When new people are penalized for something they didn't do, that, I think we could look into. As for the people who actually did it, and were the problem. I don't see any reason why they shouldn't be tagged. The keg ordinance was recommended by a UK committee. We participated in that committee, but that was a recommendation that came from UK.

How do you balance a growing popu lation and economy with trying to preserve Lexington's horse farms?

A That is a very fine balancing act that you have to do. It's important to drive development inward, and that's what where to make the very fine last four years. You have to make the very in the last four years. You come and take an old tobacco warehouse and make it into Newtown Crossing. We worked very closely with that developer, and so there are a lot of opportunities to provide student housing, but you have to make it easy for the developers to do that. That's what we've done with all these downtown projects

when you make your choice for mayor, you have to look at the person who is most accessible to college students, a person who actually puts themselves on a college campus to teach just to have interaction with college students, a person who frequents the same places that college students go to on a regular basis just so college students can come up and discuss things in a non-threatening way, and a person who has children that are the same age who understand where you are in your life right now, what you want to do and what helps you. I'm much better able to relate to where you are because of that.

As you know, the US Environmental Protection Agency has been involved in a pretty intensive investigation of Lexington's sanitary and storm water sewers. A * Obviously the provision of basic services is always a part of it because you need the police and fire protection to make it work, those types of things. We need to work with UK to accommodate changes that need to be made as we go through the transition from where we are to that top-20 status.

Are you concerned with UK's expansion disrupting traffic patterns, specifically with the closing of Rose Street?




