



INSIDER'S VIEW

The most controversial issue in intercollegiate athletics today is "gender equity." At the heart of the issue is the question "Do women deserve the same opportunities to participate in intercollegiate athletics as men?"

At the University of Kentucky, the answer is "yes." Our difficulties, however, begin with the definition of "opportunities," the practical implications of "same," and the concomitant effects on our budget, established programs, staff and facilities.

C.M. Newton defines gender equity for us as "fairness," meaning that all athletes at Kentucky will be treated in an honest and even-handed manner. To implement that definition, we are faced with several challenges. He has asked us to examine our assumptions, pro-actively tackle our problems and make some very difficult decisions.

The passage of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 began the process of defining equal opportunity in the area of athletics. Title IX states that institutions must effectively accommodate "the interests and abilities" of their female undergraduate population. As Title IX is a federal statute, enforcement is the responsibility of the Office of Civil Rights.

When making judgements on institutional compliance, federal investigators have applied a three-part test. The first part of the test is proportionality, the second is a demonstrated history of and plan for program expansion for women and the third is evidence that the athletic interests and abilities of the women's undergraduate population are being satisfied. Investigators will start with the proportionality test, which if passed, is prima facia evidence (first sight) of Title IX compliance.

The proportionality test poses the following question, "Does the percentage of women in the undergraduate population match the percentage of women in the athletic program?" If the answer is "yes," the institution has passed the quantity test, and the investigator will move to an analysis of the quality of that participation.

If this test is not passed, the investigation will default to the second part of the test. At Kentucky, 52 percent of the undergraduate student population is female, and 30 percent of our athletes are female. In other words, we do not pass the proportionality test. Our participation ratio, however, is fairly typical for a Division I program which sponsors football.

At this point in time, institutions are moving in two distinct directions in order to meet the proportionality test. The first is to increase significantly the opportunities for women students to participate in intercollegiate athletics. The operative word here is "significantly." UK has more men playing football than total women involved in athletics, even though we sponsor 10 women's sports, more than any other school in the Southeastern Conference. Playing football successfully at the NCAA Division I level has required more than 100 players. Since football has no comparable women's sport in terms of numbers, reaching proportionality in participation would require the addition of four or five women's sports, a significant increase.

At UK, women's soccer was upgraded to the varsity level in 1992. Our plan is to add fast-pitch softball in 1994 or 1995. The addition of programs, while it is the right thing to do, involves significant costs. Coaches must be hired, scholarships funded and facilities built.

For this reason many institutions are

trying to reach proportionality by decreasing the number of participation opportunities for men. Men's swimming was dropped by UCLA and Illinois. Baseball has been dropped by Wisconsin and Colorado State. Men's indoor track is being scrutinized at several SEC institutions. In these cases, the choice has been to use the money saved to fund expansion to women's programs.

The dropping of men's sports to achieve proportionality does not fit within C.M. Newton's definition of fairness. He is determined that, through the aggressive pursuit of new sources of revenue and the careful cutting of costs in our current programs, we can serve the athletics interests and abilities of both our men and women undergraduates.

The third part of the Title IX compliance test is that the institution must show that it is effectively accommodating the interests and abilities of its women undergraduates. This parameter has served to protect existing women's programs from being dropped due to budget cuts. That is, the existence of a women's team has been taken by the courts to be prima facia evidence of interest and ability.

Brown University and the University of California at Fullerton were ordered to reinstate their women's volleyball programs after they cut them for budgetary reasons. Colorado State and the University of South Carolina were ordered to reinstate softball after they tried to replace that women's sport with another. Oklahoma and William and Mary were not allowed to cut women's basketball. None of these athletics departments passed the proportionality test when they made their decisions to cut these women's programs, so the courts found the departments in violation of Title IX.

In 1992, C.M. Newton appointed retired Colonel Micki King, a former Olympic diver and experienced athletics administrator, to do a comprehensive study of our athletics department in relation to Title IX. The study is on-going. However, it will have, as a direct result, some pioneer work in the area of athletics interests and abilities assessment.

Proportionality, program expansion, and interest and abilities assessment are the three components of Title IX compliance. However, gender equity, defined by "Newtonian" fairness, goes well beyond the number crunching of participation ratios.

The Wildcats' second possession went five plays and 20 yards. And the third possession looked to be just as lifeless.

Following four plays which produced two yards and two penalties, the Wildcats faced a third down and 18 and an almost certain third consecutive punting situation. But Pookie Jones hit Tim Calvert over the middle for 20 yards and a first down, finally giving the fans something to cheer about. Then, before the applause had completely died down, from out of nowhere, BANG! Jones found Alfonzo Browning over the middle and the receiver was off to the races. Fifty-six yards later, Kentucky held a 7-0 lead.

Early in the fourth quarter, Kentucky held a 14-0 lead. Victory was an almost certainty because of the stellar performance of the defense; however, the game had once again taken a ho-hum look to it.

But then, on its initial three possessions of the final stanza, UK scored to put the final nails in the coffin. The final:





Tonight the mighty Gators come to town for the first time since 1990, when they defeated Kentucky 47-15. Florida has left victorious six of its past seven visits to Lexington. However, the Wildcats have gone to Gainesville the past two seasons and given the Gators a run for their money, coming up short in each upset bid.

Last week Florida pounded Arkansas State, 44-6, amassing 513 yards in total offense. Quarterback Terry Dean took over ning dis the controls from three-year starter and twoplazing time SEC Player of the Year Shane Matthews ek versu and didn't miss a beat. Dean completed 16-56-yard of-22 passes for 237 yards. Workhorse Errict eception Rhett appeared to be in mid-season form, gaining 108 yards on 16 rushes. And the in Bi Gator defense yielded only 89 yards.

"They've always s which had great players, but now they have a nmer wor sense of purpose that seems like it's heightened ... They were champions of our division last year when they were supposed to be rebuilding. They're through with the rebuilding and now they have 19 starters back and they've got a great team."

> But a win tonight may just be the biggest night in the Curry era of Kentucky football. A win over top-10 Florida would be sweet, as in Sugar. Well, maybe that would be jumping the gun a bit, however, it's not unrealistic to say the

Wildcats would be on their way to a winning season, and possibly more. 👋



HIS TIME TO SHINE


Fullback Damon Hood feels it's time to become a leader and reach his "potential"

potential. The dreaded "P" word. It is defined as an individual's capacity for growth, development or progress. Often, an athlete is stuck with the tag of having unlimited "potential," then spends his career trying to live up to it. But how can something which is unlimited be reached?

Damon Hood came to the University of Kentucky with tons of "potential." And for good reason. He was the reigning Mr. Football from the state of Kentucky. As a senior for Warren Central High School in Bowling Green, Hood racked up 2,515 yards on 485 carries and scored 43 touchdowns. And Warren Central won the 4-A state title, literally on Hood's broad shoulders.

With those high school credentials, schools from around the country would have loved to have Hood and his unlimited potential. Most notably, Penn State's head coach Joe Paterno sought Hood's services. Paterno wanted Hood to become a Nittany Lion so badly, he made an 11th-hour visit to his home as one last



effort to persuade the 18-year-old, something he does only for the student-athletes he wants the most.

But it was too late. Hood was sold on Kentucky.

"I think it was the players here when I came on my visit and the coaching staff," said Hood of his decision to attend UK. "With our new facilities, and the fact we graduate all our players, you're going to get a quality education here and you're going to have fun playing football, so I think that's an attractive thing."

So Hood headed to Lexington with tons of "potential" and expectations. He would be more powerful than George Adams. He would be flashier than Mark Higgs. Sonny Collins had best look out, his career rushing record would be in jeopardy.

And most importantly, Hood

would help turn around the UK program. But it hasn't turned out as "experted" thus far.

"I came in with a lot of hype and really haven't done anything," admitt Hood. "I've been like a no-show."

Well, not a complete no-show. As true-freshman, Hood started the first s games at tailback. He struggled initial but then displayed the power and quid ness that earned him the status of being highly-touted recruit. It seemed just matter of time before he would become

comfortable on the collegiate level and explode. That occurred in the sixth game against LSU. Hood gained 87 yards on 15 carries and scored a touchdown. But then, he suffered a sprained ankle that would sideline him for the rest of the game and the remaining five games of the season.

Last season, Hood hit pay-dirt five times, including the go-ahead score in UK's big victory at LSU. But with numerous running backs getting equal opportunity to carry the ball, he never got settled in, switching from tailback to fullback by season's end. He never gained his rhythm. Hood tallied 321 yards on 84 carries to place second on the team in rushing, but there was still a feeling of unfulfillment.

This season, Terry Samuels has been moved to tight end, clearing the fullback position for Hood.

"One thing we want to do with Damon is give him a position and let Damon work," said UK offensive coordinator Daryl Dickey. "Last year he played fullback and he played tailback and the same the year before, and Damon has really never had a place to call home. The fullback position is his."

The move was made in an attempt to get the best 11 players on the field at the same time. Samuels (6-2, 253) is a natural

tight end. He has great hands which will allow him to be used as a weapon on short pass routes. And he is a tremendous blocker. Hood (6-2, 230) is a natural full-

The move also sent Hood

"That tells me they have a lot of confidence in me," said Hood. "Plus it does put a little pressure on me. With Terry, there was a lot of experience playing between me and him both at fullback. But since I'm the only one experienced now, I kind of have to teach the younger guys about the system and it puts a burden on me as far as being a leader. I haven't been a leader but this

spring I became very vocal because I had to for our young fullbacks."

Comfortable with the position change

and his new role as a leader, Hood knows he must begin to reach his "potential."

"This year I just want to produce in some way or somehow. I really just want to step my game up. I've played kind of lackadaisically in the past, but now I want to do something and contribute so much. I really want to make some things happen — big plays."

But Hood understands football is more than an individual sport. He will need help from his teammates.

"I'm very confident I'll be able to get the job done," said Hood. "But I've got a whole group and a lot of great players behind me. They're going to push me and I'm going to push them, but I'm ready."

For the UK program to succeed, it is crucial for players like Hood, the best in the state of Kentucky, to

stay home and attend Kentucky. Hood was the second Mr. Football from Kentucky to select UK. The first was Pookie Jones. And last year's top player from the state, Billy Jack Haskins, chose the Wildcats as well. Why is UK able to land the best of the home grown talent now? Hood lends his insight:


"I think Pookie set it off when he first signed here and then I signed here. It (top players attending UK) gives players confidence that something is going on in Kentucky because most of the time we lose the Mr. Football (from Kentucky) that goes somewhere else. That tells kids around here that something is going on here at Kentucky and they ought to come check it out."


Even with all the hype Hood received before coming to UK, he thinks of himself as just another Wildcat.

"I'm just plain Damon Hood, UK football player. I don't feel any pressure being a former Mr. Football from Kentucky."

The clock is ticking. Time is running out for Hood to reach his unlimited "potential" and make his mark at UK. It is his time to shine:

"This is my third year. I have two more years to play football in my life and I'm going to make it the best two years it can be."







COMMITTED TO EXCELLENCE

Defensive end Zane Beehn strives to be the best he can be, on and off the field

ife is full of obstacles for everyone. For a defensive end, obstacles are usually burly offensive linemen whom they butt heads with on Saturday afternoons.

Zane Beehn, a UK senior defensive end, has faced and conquered an obstacle that is even bigger than a 6-6, 275-pound adversary in the trenches. Beehn stared the learning disability dyslexia in the face and came away victorious.

"When he was five I was told he would never learn," said Beehn's mother, Kay Curcio. "I told the doctors 'never' is not in our vocabulary."

And it wasn't.

Beehn is on schedule to graduate from UK in May with a degree in Communications, in which he currently sports a grade point average of better than 3.0.

"He really had to work hard," she said.
"In high school he would come home and study after football games until one or two o'clock in the morning. Then he would get up early the next morning and go at it again. He was very dedicated."

Curcio, who is not a bad athlete in her own right, winning an Olympic medal winner in the long jump for Great Britain in 1952, said her son was a born football player.

"He was an 11-pound baby and the doctor kiddingly said that he was going to be a seven-footer," she said. "The day he came back from the hospital we set him down in front of the television and he watched the Pittsburgh Steelers. His favorite player was Mean Joe Greene. He was about nine when Joe Greene retired and I remember he cried."

Now Beehn wants to make the opposition cry.

He will have experience on his side this year with 32 games under his belt, 10 as a defensive end.

"I try to be a leader on the field since I am a

fourth-year player," said the 6-4, 260-pound Owensboro native. "I could see a big difference in my game this spring so I'm looking forward to this season." He played well enough to earn UK's defensive Make A Difference Award during the 1993 spring drills.

Beehn, who also played baseball and basketball at Owensboro Apollo H.S., hopes to improve a defense that has statistically finished last in the Southeastern Conference the past two seasons. He feels this is the year that UK elevates from the cellar.

"We have a lot of seniors on defense, so this is the year," he said. "We will be much more aggressive going for the ball but at the same time we won't gamble nearly as much."

Beehn arrived at UK in the fall of 1990 as a consensus first-team all-state selection. He was good enough that he wasn't redshirted and got to play in all 11 games as a strike linebacker. He got his first start in the season-finale against Tennessee.

Beehn started four games during his sophomore season, amassing 46 tackles, six of which were for losses, and recording three sacks.

Injuries hampered Beehn throughout the 1992 season. He was unable to com-

rotator cuff surgery on his right shoulder. The injury bug continued to hamper Beehn last fall, his inition year at the defensive end position, limiting him to 25 tackles and zero sacks. However, Beehn is happy to report a clean bill of health entering this season.

Beehn is also excited to have not defensive coordinator Mike Archer on the sidelines instructing the UK defense.


"Confidence is one thing Arche brings back to our defense," Beehn said "We go out there and have a lot of fur He loves coaching us and he never go down."

istorically, the Kentucky gameplan when facing the University of Florida in Lexington was to try to catch the warmweather Gators hibernating on a late November day. Welcome to September and welcome to reality: If the Wildcats are to tame this mighty team, they'll have to do it on even terms. There'll be no snow or harsh winter winds to help them along.

Kentucky holds a 10-8 series edge at home, but the Gators are bringing a potent squad to town with an eye on narrowing that gap and galloping off to a good start in the Southeastern Conference race.

Florida is fresh off a powerful 44-6 victory over Division I-A doormat Arkansas State in Gainesville last weekend. That contest marked the debut of junior quarterback Terry Dean as a starter - significant because he's now the man at the only offensive position left open entering the 1993 season. The 10 other spots are ably filled by returning starters.

But there is a fair amount of pressure on Dean to produce at the same clip as his predecessor - SEC career passing leader and two-time SEC player of the year Shane Matthews.

"We believe Terry

> All that bulk provides a solid wall for senior running back Errict Rhett, who will be attempting to break Emmitt Smith's Florida career rushing record this season. Rhett entered the season needing 1,054 yards to catch Smith.

> Some suggest Rhett had an off-year in 1992 when he rushed for "only" 903 yards, but the bruising 5-11, 214pound back also hauled in 55 passes for 400 yards to more than compensate.

The defensive line is probably Florida strong suit, where there are at least eigh players competing for the four starting spots. Kevin Carter and Mark Campbe will probably start at the ends while Ell Johnson and 6-5, 293-pound William Gaines likely will man the tackle spots.







WILDCATS **GETTING** DEFENSIVE

The UK coaches are adamant about improving the Wildcat defense

efore we look at the present, let's B take a quick look at the not-so-distant past and to Jerry Claiborne's football teams at the University of Kentucky during the better part of the 1980s. It won't be remembered as the greatest era of Kentucky football, but it was memorable

During Claiborne's eight seasons as Kentucky coach (1982-89), the Wildcats compiled a 41-46-3 record and made back-to-back Hall of Fame Bowl appearances in 1983 and 1984.

But the Ol' Iffin' Gang, named after that ol' iffin' game that Claiborne always referred to, always had the knack of building your hopes, apparently being on the threshold of an upset victory, only to lose in the games' closing seconds and break your heart once again.

You remember the ol' iffin' game. What if two Wildcat defenders hadn't collided in the end zone, preventing an interception and an upset over a powerful Florida team in Gainesville in 1985. What

if Kentucky running back Mark Higgs could have broken the plane of the end zone in one of his four runs up the middle, trailing archrival Tennessee 24-20 with less than two minutes remaining in the 1987 Battle for the Beer Barrel. What if Kentucky could have stopped an Alabama touchdown in the final seconds of a 31-27 loss to a Bill Currycoached Crimson Tide in 1988, a game UK led 20-7 during the fourth quarter. You get the picture, it goes on and on.

Along with the heartbreaks, the Ol' Iffin' Gang forged another lasting memory - a tenacious, hard-hitting defense.

Men like Oliver Barnett, Chris Chenault, Tony

Massey, David Johnson, Tony Mayes, Ron Robinson, Brian Williams, Jerry Reese and Jay Dortch played on an often undersized and what some thought to be an out-of-date defense, the wide-tackle six. But they earned the respect of fans and opponents with their brand of defensive football.

A man that can testify about the determination of the Ol' Iffin' Gang is Mike Archer. He faced Kentucky as head coach at LSU from 1987-90.

"We used to dread playing Kentucky because I always thought they were one of the more physical defenses in the Southeastern Conference. They blitzed a lot and every year we played them we always played poorly the next week because we were so physically beat up."

Now Archer, 39, finds himself on the Kentucky sidelines as the Wildcat defensive coordinator. His task will be turning around a defense that has been anything but stingy during the Bill Curry era. Last season, Kentucky finished last in the SEC in total defense, allowing 381.9 yards per game and last in scoring defense, yielding

25.4 points per game.

For Archer, a return to the playing style of the Ol' Iffin' Gang is in order. "They ran to the football and had a lot of pride," Archer said. "That's the thing we're trying to get back."

Confidence is another thing that Archer



is trying to get back. "The biggest thing we've been working on since the first day we got here is build-





University History


UK was founded in 1865 as a landgrant institution, and the present name dates to 1916. The Lexington campus has 673 acres. Dr. Charles T. Wethington, Jr., is UK's 10th president.

Students

The University of Kentucky now has more than 72,000 students with 24,000 on the Lexington campus and 48,000 at the 14 community colleges across the state. UK now educates 40 percent of all students in Kentucky attending a public or private college or university. There are 5,100 students enrolled in graduate school with 95 master's and 59 doctoral programs offered.

Faculty

There are 1,643 full-time faculty on the Lexington campus and the Medical Center and another 1,096 faculty in the community colleges. Faculty brought in more than \$95 million in grants, contracts and gifts to the University during the last academic year.



Academic Programs

Currently, there are 17 academic colleges and a graduate school on the Lexington campus. Students have a choice of more than 100 majors. The University is recommended in seven books or publications for its value in providing higher education.

Research

UK ranks among the Top 100 research institutions in the nation and is one of only 45 public universities in the United States — the only one in Kentucky — to be classified as a Research University of the First Class.

Library

The UK Library System contains more than two million volumes and is inter-connected by computer with each of the 14

Medical Center

The Albert B. Chandler Medical Coter, including a 461-bed hospital, is lowed on the campus in Lexington. Methan 3,500 students are enrolled in its colleges — medicine, dentistry, nursipharmacy and allied health professions.

Sports

The current number of UK sports the varsity level is 21 — 10 men's sports 10 women's sports and one coed sport. harles T. Wethington, Jr. was elected the 10th president of the University of Kentucky on September 18, 1990.

Wethington began his career in higher education in 1965 as an educational psychology instructor on the Lexington campus of the University and two years later was named chief administrator of Maysville Community College. In 1971 he moved to Lexington as assistant vice president, becoming vice president of the Community College System in 1981.

In the University reorganization of 1982, he was named chancellor of the UK Community College System, one of the three major sectors of UK. In 1987, he was given university-wide responsibilities for public and governmental relations in addition to his community college role, and his title was changed to Chancellor for the Community College

erseverance. Persistence. Tenacity. Steadfastness.

Those four words best describe the characteristics which must be engendered in the tireless efforts of program building. And when speaking of "program building" in Division I-A colle-

giate football, no one better understands the true meaning of those four terms than Bill Curry.

Program building has different meanings in different arenas. To some, program building is a fixed number of victories in season one, two, five or 50. Not with Bill Curry. It goes much deeper. The process enters the very souls of young people and touches their every angle.

"I'd like to say that I'm a person that really likes to serve young people," said Curry. "It is my wish to have every single one of them be the best they can be in every aspect of their lives, and that certainly includes a championship football program."

Curry's football pedigree weighs heavily in his expectations of championship performance. After all, he did play and work under three of the most successful coaches the game of football has ever known — Bobby Dodd, Vince Lombardi and Don Shula.

Curry, 50, lettered three years (1962-64) as a collegian at Georgia Tech under Dodd and served as team captain his senior campaign. Dodd compiled an impressive 22-year record of 165-64-8, including Southeastern Conference titles in 1951 and '52, at Georgia Tech.

After earning his bachelor's degree in industrial management from Georgia Tech in 1965, Curry began his professional career under Lombardi with the Green Bay Packers. He played on two Packer teams which won the National Football League title (1965-66), including the first Super Bowl, Jan. 15, 1967. The legendary Lombardi guided Green Bay to five NFL championships in seven years during the 1960s.


Following the 1967 season, Curry was traded to the Baltimore Colts and became All-Pro in 1971 and '72. His mentor for two seasons at Baltimore was Don Shula, who today is the winningest active coach in the NFL and has appeared in more Super Bowls (six) than any other coach.


Those qualities opened the eyes of UK Athletics Director C.M. Newton when he began his search in December 1989 to replace Jerry Claiborne, who stepped down after eight seasons with the Wildcats. But Newton took an interest in another side of Curry.

"William A. (Bill) Curry is recognized by many to be at the very top of his profession," said Newton during his introduction of Curry to the media. "He has been credited for dignity, class and integrity with which he conducts his football programs, both on and off the playing field."

Curry has that rare mix of both worlds.

He came to Kentucky from the University of Alabama. His overall record of 26-10 at 'Bama was the Crimson Tide's most successful three-year total since Paul "Bear" Bryant compiled a 27-8-3 record in his final three campaigns (1980-82). In his last season, Curry led Alabama to a 10-1 regular-season mark and a share of the SEC title. He took three Crimson Tide teams to bowls — the 1987 Hall of Fame





Bowl, the 1988 Sun Bowl and the 1990 USF&G Sugar Bowl. The Currys: (L-R) Kristin, Bill, Billy and Carolyn.

In all, Curry owns a 68-75-4 record in 13

seasons as a collegiate head coach.

Curry, a native of College Park, Ga., signed a scholarship with the Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets after a fine prep career at College Park High School. At Georgia Tech, Curry helped lead the Yellow Jackets to a 21-9-1 record and a Bluebonnet Bowl berth during his final three seasons.

Before his professional career was over 10 seasons later, Curry played at Green Bay (1965-66), Baltimore (1967-72), Houston (1973) and with the Los Angeles Rams (1974). Curry was a member of three Super Bowl teams and two National Football League Championship teams. A knee injury forced him to retire in 1975.

A year later, Curry was back at his alma mater as an assistant coach under Pepper Rodgers. Then in 1977, Curry returned to the pro ranks as an offensive line coach with the Green Bay Packers under former teammate Bart Starr. Curry answered Georgia Tech's call once again in 1980, this time as head football coach.

Facing a pair of daunting schedules, Curry and Tech turned in 1-9-1 and 1-10 records in 1980 and '81, before things began to change in 1982. During his final five years at Tech, Curry produced a 29-24-3 ledger which included a sparkling 9-2-1 season in 1985. The successful '85 campaign earned Tech an All-American Bowl bid and victory over Michigan State, 17-14. It was Georgia Tech's first bowl appearance since 1978.

Curry was named the 1985 Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and ACC sportswriters, the 1987 SEC Coach of the Year by United Press International and the 1989 SEC Coach of the Year by AP and the *Nashville Banner*. Curry received a special honor after the 1989 season when he was named the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year, in honor of his former collegiate mentor.

Curry is a member of the NFL Former Players Advisory Committee and is serving his second term on the AFCA Ethics Committee. In 1992, he was inducted into the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame.

Curry is married to the former Carolyn Newton of College Park, Ga. Carolyn has a Ph.D. in history and teaches at UK. They have two children — Kristin, 26, and Billy, 22.



ike Archer is in his first season as defensive coordinator at Kentucky, 18th coaching the college game. He also coaches field goal/block teams and linebackers.

Archer came to UK following a two-year stint as linebackers coach at Virginia.

He lettered three seasons (1973-75) at Miami (Fla.) as a free safety and punter. As a senior, he was named Miami's Football Scholar Athlete of the Year.

Archer began coaching at Miami as a graduate assistant in 1976. He was promoted to a full-time position in 1979 and spent five seasons as defensive backs coach (1979-83) under Howard Schnellenberger.

He joined the Louisiana State coaching staff, headed by Bill Arnsparger, in 1984 as the Tigers' defensive backfield coach and served two seasons as the LSU defensive coordinator (1985 -86).

Archer, 39, served four seasons as head football coach at Louisiana State (1987-90). He led the Tigers to a 27-18-1 record and two bowl appearances in addition to the Southeastern Conference title in 1988.

aryl Dickey is in his first season as offensive coordinator and his fourth year at Kentucky. He also serves as UK quarterback coach.

Dickey, 32, is in his fifth year as a collegiate assistant coach.

Most Kentuckians remember Dickey from his collegiate days as quarterback of the Tennessee Volunteers. In 1985, Dickey helped lead the Vols to a 9-1-2 record and the Southeastern Conference title. He was named most valuable player in the 1986 USF&G Sugar Bowl after engineering Tennessee's 35-7 victory over Miami (Fla.).

Following a brief stint with the San Diego Chargers of the National Football League, Dickey returned to his alma mater as a graduate assistant coach for two years (1987-88).

He then moved to Florida State, where he coached quarterback Peter Tom Willis during the 1989 season. Dickey helped Willis earn a No. 7 ranking nationally in total offense and passing efficiency while Florida State went 10-2.

Under Dickey, Kentucky has thrown for more than 2,000 yards in two of the last three seasons. The Wildcats threw for 2,151 yards in 1990 and 2,017 yards in 1991, second and third, respectively, on the Kentucky season charts.

ay Dorr is in his first season as an assistant football coach at UK and 27th in collegiate coaching. His responsibilities will include coaching the UK runningbacks and punters and coordinating film exchange with opponents.

The 1965 graduate of West Virginia Wesleyan comes to Kentucky from Southern California, where he served five years as an assistant coach.

Dorr began his coaching career in 1965 at Wadsworth High School in Akron, Ohio. He spent two season's at Wadsworth before taking a position as graduate assistant coach at the University of Akron in 1967. He became a full-time assistant at Akron the following year.

Dorr began a 13-year stint as an assistant under Don James in 1971 when he accepted the position of quarterbacks coach at Kent State. He moved to Washington with James in 1975. The Huskies appeared in six bowl games during that span, including three Rose Bowls.

In 1984, Dorr took over the helm at Southern Illinois, where he posted a 17-27 record in four years.

ill Glaser is in his 17th son as an assistant fool coach at the University of K tucky and his 18th as a colleg coach. His responsibilities clude coaching defensive tad coordinating special teams, coordinating the annual Curry Football Camp dureach summer.

Glaser, 50, came to Kentin 1977 from Morehead State has worked for three head coa at UK — Fran Curci, Jerry borne and Curry. Glaser was only full-time UK assist retained by both Claiborne Curry.

Tommy Limbaugh is serving in his third season as assistant head football coach and his fourth campaign as football recruiting coordinator at UK. On the field, Limbaugh will serve as full-time assistant coach in charge of the tight ends.

Overall, Limbaugh enters his 19th year in intercollegiate athletics and his 11th season as a college assistant coach. He was the first member to be named to Curry's staff at UK.

The Wildcats' recruiting under Limbaugh has gained national attention. In fact, the 1991 UK signee class rated 13th in the country by *National High School Football Magazine* (Max Emfinger). The 1992 class was rated 19th by the same publication, and the 1993 class ranked 13th.

Limbaugh comes to UK from Alabama, where he had been associate athletics director since 1988, after being named assistant AD the previous year.

The 1967 Alabama graduate got his start in the college football coaching ranks as an assistant to Steve Sloan at Texas Tech (1975-77). He then served as administrative assistant and recruiting coordinator during Sloan's next two stops — Ole Miss (1978-82) and Duke (1983-86).

Joker Phillips begins his third season as an assistant coach at Kentucky. His responsibilities include coaching flankers and split ends, along with the kickoff return team.

Phillips, a 1986 graduate of Kentucky, was a four-year letterman as a wide receiver. During his career (1981-84), Kentucky appeared in the 1983 and '84 Hall of Fame Bowls. Phillips' best season was 1984, when he grabbed 28 receptions for 305 yards and five touchdowns. Currently, Phillips ranks sixth on the UK career reception list with 75 catches for 935 yards and nine touchdowns.

He played briefly in the National Football League and the Canadian Football League and was a member of the 1987 Washington Redskins team which won Super Bowl XXII.

Phillips began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at Kentucky (1988-89) under Jerry Claiborne and was responsible for the receivers. In 1990, he was named assistant recruiting coordinator under Bill Curry. He also worked with UK recruiting coordinator Tommy Limbaugh and coordinated the Wildcats' walk-on program.

on Riley begins his second season as an assistant football coach at UK and 29th season in college football. In addition to directing the offensive line, Riley also coordinates the field goal/PAT teams

The 1956 graduate of East Tennessee State came to Kentucky from his alma mater, where he spent four years as head football coach.

Riley began his coaching career in 1956 as head football coach at his prep alma mater, Lynch High School. After three years, Riley moved to East Tennessee State for one year as a graduate assistant coach. After five more years in the high school ranks, Riley took an assistant spot at Vanderbilt in 1966. He accepted another assistant coaching job in 1972 at Oklahoma State.

In 1976, Riley began a 12-year stint as the offensive line coach at UCLA under Terry Donahue. He was part of the Bruin program which posted a 98-36-7 record during that span, including a 6-2-1 record in nine bowl appearances. When he left for East Tennessee State, Riley was the only assistant to remain from the original 1976 Donahue staff.

ick Smith is in his fourth season at UK, his 14th overall as a collegiate assistant coach. He is responsible for coaching the defensive backs and kick coverage teams.


He comes to Kentucky from Baylor, where he was defensive backfield coach for three years.

avid Turner begins his first season at UK, his eighth as a collegiate assistant coach. In addition to coaching defensive ends, he also coordinates the punt return unit.

Turner, 30, a 1985 Davidson graduate, comes to UK following a two-year stint as outside linebackers coach at James Madison. He helped lead the Dukes to a 9-4 record in 1991 and a berth in the NCAA I-AA playoffs.

He began his coaching career at his alma mater, Davidson, in 1986. After two years, Turner joined coach Dick Sheridan as a graduate assistant at North Carolina State.

In 1990, Turner was named assistant coach at Division II powerhouse Indiana (Pa.) University. He served as defensive line coach as the Indians posted a 12-2 record before losing to North Dakota State in the Division II championship.

Turner, a native of Goldston, N.C., earned three letters as a running back at Davidson. He led the Wildcats in rushing and receiving as a senior and was a three sport standout (football, basketball, baseball) at Chatham Central High School in Bear Creek, N.C.

ack Fligg is in his third year as assistant athletics director for football operations after serving one year as the UK Football administrative assistant. His primary responsibilities include coordinating football operations and the major administrative duties of Coach Bill Curry.


Fligg begins his 28th year in intercollegiate athletics. He came to Kentucky from Alabama where he spent three years as an administrative assistant. He officially became a member of the UK staff in January of 1990.



C.M. NEWTON

Director of Athletics



hen Charles Martin (C.M.) Newton became the University of Kentucky's seventh director of athletics April 1, 1989, he hit the ground running.

After a little more than four years on the job, Newton has become one of the most popular public figures in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In addition to a lengthy, impressive list of credentials, Newton brought to Kentucky a sparkling reputation of integrity at a crucial time in the history of UK athletics. In accepting the position at his alma mater, Newton summarized his goals and objectives by saying, "I have a resolve to try very hard to continue that great tradition, and at the same time, to totally do it within the NCAA and SEC rules and not sacrifice the academic integrity of this University."

He capped an illustrious basketball coaching career by leading his 1988-89 Vanderbilt University squad to a 19-14 record, a second-place SEC finish and its second consecutive NCAA tournament appearance. He was named SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and received the Kodak NABC District IV Coach of the Year award.

Newton served as head basketball coach and associate athletics director at Vanderbilt (1982-89), compiling a 129-115 overall record. In 32 years of coaching at Transylvania, Alabama and Vandy, Newton compiled a 509-375 overall record, ranking him among the top 10 active coaches in the game in terms of total victories at the close of the 1988-89 season. Newton's Alabama teams won three consecutive Southeastern Conference championships.

Perhaps more impressive, however, was Newton's ability to produce winning teams that also possessed exceptional academic credentials. During Newton's tenure at Vanderbilt, 18 Commodores were named to the Academic All-SEC team - over 50 percent more than any other league school. And including his last graduating class, all 21 seniors received their diplomas.

Newton is highly regarded on the national level. He has served on the board of directors of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. He worked six years on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee, serving as chairman for five years. He currently serves as president of USA Basketball, the nation's governing body for international basketball, and as chairman of of its Games Committee, which is responsible for all international competition, including the Olympic Games. He is also a member of the prestigious NCAA Division I Basketball Committee, and is chair on a NCAA committee on basketball issues.

Newton has literally circled the globe to promote basketball. He served as team manager — a combination coaching and administrative position — on the 1984 U.S. Olympic team that won the gold

In 1983 and 1987, Newton took his Vanderbilt squads to the Republic of China (Taiwan) to represent the United States in the R. William Jones Cup International Tournament, winning the gold medal in 1983 and the silver in 1987. He has conducted coaching clinics in numer-

After playing on the 1951 national champion Wildcat squad and pitching in

In 1969, with the backing of Adol Rupp, Newton took on the challenge building the downtrodden Alabama ba ketball program. During his 12-ve tenure, Newton orchestrated a turnarou in the Crimson Tide's basketball fortun compiling a 211-123 record.

With few horizons left to conquer Alabama, Newton resigned at the end the 1980 season to accept a job as assi tant commissioner of the Southeaste Conference. A year later, when Vande bilt athletics director Roy Kramer w searching for a coach of national statu to head the Commodore basketball pr gram, Newton was the man for the job.

Newton was born in Rockwood Tenn. He grew up in Fort Lauderda Fla., where he was eventually named charter member of that city's Sports H of Fame, along with Chris Evert, Juli Boros and the late Brian Piccolo.

COMMONWEALTH STANIII Home of the Kentucky Wildcats



hen it comes to football, Kentuckystyle, there is certainly no better place than home — Commonwealth Stadium.

The stadium was built in 1973 at a cost of \$12 million by the firm of Huber, Hunt and Nichols, Inc. Commonwealth, including parking areas, rests on an 86acre plot of what was once the UK Experimental Station Farm grounds.

The stadium took on a new look in 1990 with the addition of a \$600,000 scoreboard and message center located in the north end zone. The scoreboard is 19 by 78 feet in size, almost 3.5 times the size of the original scoreboard which had been in place since 1973.

The stadium was officially opened September 15, 1973. The Wildcats moved into their new home after spending 48 years at Stoll Field/McLean Stadium across from Memorial Coliseum. Kentucky defeated Virginia Tech in the stadiumopener, 31-26, behind three touchdowns by quarterback Ernie Lewis.

Since its opening, Kentucky has fashioned a 71-50-4 record and .584 winning percentage. The Wildcats have averaged 55,133 spectators for contests at Commonwealth since its inception. In total, 6,891,664 spectators have witnessed Kentucky football at Commonwealth Stadium - that's about 1.8 times the population of Kentucky.

Commonwealth Stadium can officially seat 57,800 fans, though standing-room only crowds exceed that figure. Most sat but many of the stadium-record 58,450 spectators stood to watch the Wildcats defeat rival Indiana, 37-25, Sept. 19, 1992.

UK plans to eventually enclose the south end of Commonwealth Stadium to bring its capacity to 72,000. The addition of luxury suites and boxes is also in the plans. 😤

UK INDOOR FIELDHOUSE

niversity of Kentucky Athletics Director C.M. Newton has called this \$8.5 million facility the final piece of the puzzle. Finally, the University of Kentucky Athletics Association has an indoor field-house which can accommodate the year 'round needs of 11 Wildcat sports — football, baseball, gymnastics, men's indoor/outdoor track, women's indoor/outdoor track, men's and women's golf and men's and women's soccer.

"In my opinion, we already have in place the finest coaches in the country," Newton said. "The addition of this indoor facility, which I consider the final piece of the puzzle, means we have the ability to attract the finest student-athletes.

"The facility is a multi-purpose building, something which will be a tremendous boost to all of our programs."

The indoor facility, constructed by Ce.Pennington General Contractors, encompasses more than 132,000 square feet and is located adjacent to Commonwealth Stadium behind the south end zone in the game-day Yellow Lot. For size comparison, UK's E.J. Nutter Football Training facility is only 48,000 square feet.

"This facility was very crucial in the expansion of our facilities base," UK head football coach Bill Curry said. "I consider this indoor practice facility to be the finest

of its kind in the world. With our weather and being the northern-most state in the Southeastern Conference, we have needed a facility of this magnitude.

"We have also needed the indoor facility to allow our skill-position players to work on their respective skills, so we can measure up to the rest of our league. The one thing our staff understands about our skilled athletes today is the importance of practicing every day. Our young men will now be able to do that."

The finest indoor practice facility in the nation rests on the campus of the University of Kentucky.

The indoor facility features an actual playing field area of 108,000 square feet, including a full-size artificial turf football field. The football field is surrounded by a six-lane, 290-meter track which expands to nine lanes down the straight-aways. Areas for the pole vault, high jump and long jump also are included. A 9,000-square foot gymnastics room is located in the front of the building and will serve as

the UK GymCats home.

One of the most unique features this multi-million dollar fieldhouse is the computerized netting system. This system will allow for different combinations of sports to practice safely, all at the same time, by dividing the playing field. The nets can be lowered to separate the entiplaying field from the track, or form for batting cages for baseball or driving ranges for golf. The playing field can be divided in halves to create two footbal soccer or baseball practice areas.

"This type of facility is also important for the togetherness of our athletics program," Curry said. "It allows us the opportunity to have everyone participating under one roof."

UK President Dr. Charles Wethington says this facility can also be utilized for faculty, staff and students in general.

"This facility is very significant no only to UK Athletics, but to the entir University of Kentucky community, Wethington said.

The height of the indoor facility is 7. feet at its apex. Inside, the netting clear ance is approximately 65 feet. This height will allow punting (into the net system and PAT/field goals during football practices. The playing field of the indoor facility runs perpendicular to the playing field of Commonwealth Stadium.

Also included in the facility is 3,000 square feet of office and lobby space for the facility manager, receptionist and coaches.

The University of Kentucky will again package one of the most comprehensive radio and television networks among Division I-A institutions.

Sports Communications, Inc., which owns the radio rights to UK football and basketball, has constructed a massive network. WVLK-AM/FM of Lexington will once again serve as the flagship station for the UK Football Radio Network. The feature attractions of the network are 50,000-watt radio stations WHAS (840 AM) of Louisville and WCKY (1560 AM) of Cincinnati. WHAS blankets over two-thirds of the United States and can be heard in 40 states. WCKY can be heard from numerous states as well.

The UK Football Television Network features full-game, tape-delay action of all Wildcat home football games which are not televised by a network affiliated with the CFA Package. The Network is also one of the nation's largest. Sports Communications, Inc., administers the network with WKYT-TV of Lexington as the telecast's producer.

This fall, Ralph Hacker will be behind the microphone once again to serve as the play-by-play announcer on the UK Radio Network. The president and general manager of Lexington radio station WVLK-AM/FM is joined by veteran broadcaster Charlie McAlexander, who served as Vanderbilt's play-by-play announcer for 14 years prior to joining the UK network last year, WKYT-TV's Dave Baker and WKYT-TV sports manager Dick Gabriel, who doubles as sideline reporter for both radio and television networks.

On television, McAlexander serves as play-by-play man with WKYT-TV sports anchor Rob Bromley providing color commentary and Gabriel reporting.

CENTER FOR ACADEMIC AND TUTORIAL SERVICES

The University of Kentucky keeps the term "student-athlete" in the proper perspective — student first, athlete second.

For that reason, the University of Kentucky Athletics Association opened the nation's first academic center for student-athletes in–1981. The academic-center is simply known as CATS — Center for Academic & Tutorial Services.

CATS is located inside Memorial Coliseum. The center, designed with the student-athlete in mind, contains a large general study area, along with several smaller rooms used for tutoring.

CATS expanded during the past academic year and added a language library, additional tutoring rooms, a media center and a new computer facility.

"Our CATS is one of the best academic services in the land and that's based on results," UK coach Bill Curry said. "For Kentucky to be up there with Duke and Virginia and Notre Dame is a real tribute to first, the student-athletes, but also to our academic support staff headed by Bob Bradley."

Kentucky is in the same league with the aforementioned schools in winning the College Football Association Academic Achievement Award, given to the CFA school whose program has achieved the highest graduation rate in the nation. Kentucky won the honor in 1989 after graduating 90 percent of its 1983 freshman class. Kentucky is the only Southeastern Conference school to have won the award.

"We get more response from parents who visit us on the CATS program than any other part of our program," Curry said. "Parents are really excited about it."

Curry is also excited about the combined effort former UK coach Jerry Clai-



borne and his staff put forth during their tenure. Since 1980, Kentucky has placed 110 players on the All-Southeastern Conference Honor Roll — more than any league school in that period. In 1989, the Wildcats set a conference record with 17 players named to the SEC Honor Roll. And during the 1993 spring semester, UK football had 28 players achieve a 3.0 grade point average or higher.

"With winning the CFA award and leading the SEC in Honor Roll picks, it certainly let everyone know we were serious, and still are serious, about making

sure our athletes receive their degree," Claiborne said. "A lot of the credit goes to our CATS Center staff. They do an excellent job in monitoring our student-athletes' academic progress from day one."

Bob Bradley, assistant athletics director for academics, supervises the CATS program. Bradley is assisted by Barbara Deniston, director of student-athlete

development, her assistant, Sheila Breeding, and academic counselor Mike Haley. CATS

also employs six graduate assistants and numerous tutors, both from the University and surrounding community. Currently, the UKAA budgets close to \$500,000 per year for CATS.

"We are extremely proud of what we have accomplished in the academic arena," Bradley said. "The CATS program is focused on winning in the classroom. We look at each student-athlete's individual needs, set goals and develop strategies to attain those goals. Our center (CATS) provides our student-athletes with a definite advantage over student-athletes at many other institutions."

Bradley also says it helps to have head coaches like Claiborne and Curry who place such a strong emphasis on academics.

"Many support systems across the nation do an excellent job at helping their student-athletes," Bradley said. "I have been blessed at Kentucky in having Jerry Claiborne. He really believed in the student-athlete concept. The same holds true for Bill Curry. We are in total sync in the business of educating our student-athletes."

The philosophy at the University of Kentucky is this: Colleges should be able to afford the student-athlete every oppor-






This squad's ability to help bring the Wildcat crowd into the games and its precision stunts have become a trademark and a source of pride for the University.





FOOTBALL TRADITIONS

Pride of Kentucky

Blue and White

The University of Kentucky adopted blue and white as its official colors in 1892. UK students had first decided on blue and light yellow before the Kentucky-Centre football game Dec. 19, 1891. The yellow was soon dropped from the combination and replaced by white.

The particular Kentucky shade of blue, close to royal blue, was determined without ceremony. After settling on the base colors, a student posed the logical question, "What color blue?" Letterman Richard Stoll looked down at his necktie and raised it to the air. The vote was unanimous.

And so Kentucky Blue is really Stoll necktie blue.

Nickname

The official nickname of University of Kentucky athletic teams is "Wildcats."

The name became synonymous with UK shortly after a 6-2 victory over Illinois



on October 9, 1909. Commandant Carbusier, then head of the military department of old State University, told a group of students in a chapel service following the game that the Kentucky football team had "fought like wildcats."

The moniker "Wild-cats" became increasingly popular among UK followers and the media. The University has since adopted it as its official nickname.

Wildcat Mascot

The Wildcat mascot originated during the 1976-77 academic year at the University of

Kentucky. Gary Tanner was the first Wildcat to dance and entertain crowds at Commonwealth Stadium and Rupp Arena during athletic events. Today the Wildcat mascot also attends academic functions and serves as a friendly ambassador for the University.

In the early 1980s, Wildcat mascot Terry Barney began the tradition of doing a one-armed pushup for each of Kentucky's points in front of the student section after every Wildcat score.

Battle for the Beer Barrel

The Beer Barrel, painted blue, orange and white, is the prize awarded each year to the winner of the Kentucky-Tennessee football game. The first barrel was awarded in 1925. Two Wildcat supporters, Guy Hugelet and Rollie M. Guthrie, wanted to produce something to symbolize the fierce rivalry between the two schools.

The Wildcat has been UK's friendly ambassador since 1976. A whiskey barrel was to be the original trophy, until the Women's Christian Temper-



ance Union ruled it out. A beer barrel was more acceptable to the ladies. UK and Tennessee have battled for the Beer Barrel since 1925.

But there was still the problem of Prohibition and the Anti-saloon League, which voiced displeasure at such a trophy. But the resourceful Hugelet and Guthrie appeased all parties by painting "Ice Water" on the barrel.

Kentucky has won the barrel 23 times in the 88-game series.

Battle for the Bourbon Barrel

The Bourbon Barrel is awarded to the winner of the Kentucky-Indiana football game. The series, which was renewed in 1967 after a 40-year break, began in 1893. No one is certain of the origin of this unusual trophy. Some think the blue and red-striped barrel represents the distillery industry in Kentucky and southern Indiana. Indiana leads the series, 14-8-1, but Kentucky has won five of the last eight outings. Both schools have signed a contract to meet each year through 2000.
