HARRODSBURG, Ky — The best kept secret in the state wasn't all that secret to Detrick Johnson.

Detrick, a redshirt freshman on UK's football team, said he knew all along.



Dennis Johnson, USA Today's National Player of the Year and Derrick's younger brother, signed a national letter of intent with UK yesterday shortly after 10 a.m. in the gym of Harrodsburg High School.

Johnson chose UK after limiting his choices to the Wildcats and Notre Dame. Depending on who you spoke to during the past few weeks, either the Irish or the Cats had him signed, sealed and delivered.

Saturday night was the turning point, Dennis said.
UK recruiting coordinator Claude Bassett visited the Johnson
household on a last minute, three-hour pitch of UK football.
Dennis, a life-long Notre Dame fan, was leaning toward the Irish
prior to Bassett's visit. The rest is history.
"We talked about UK and the program, and I think this is where I
need to be," Dennis said. "After the conversation, I was sure I was
going to UK."
"It's a monkey off my back, I guess," Dennis said. "People want to
know, and you just want to give it out so everyone will have a final
decision.
"I was happy, and I hope everyone else is happy too."

His list of attributes reads like a storybook. Along with USA
Today, he was named National Player of the Year by seven other
groups, including Sports Illustrated.

The 6-foot-7, 256-pound lineman runs the 40-yard dash in 4.7
seconds, benches 275 pounds and squats 501.
In 1993-94, He was the first eighth-grader in Kentucky football history to be named to the first team All-Class State Football
Team.

## Two storms blanket, shut down campus

Big blue got more white than it bargained for yesterday.

A foot of snow blanketed the campus, prompting University officials to cancel classes from 10 a.m. on and Physical Plant workers to break out the plows.

Closing classes is part of Plan B, which means UK is essentially shut down, except for a few necessary services, said Ben Cart, assistant to the president for administrative affairs.

Barely any students dined in the Student Center cafeteria. Although campus recreation facilities and the Dean of Students Office closed around 2 p.m., Food Services kept open the dining halls in the Complex Commons, Blazer Hall, K-Lair and the Margaret I. King Library Deli.

To determine whether or not the University will cancel school, officials rely on UK Police to look at the current weather conditions, check with Lexington police to find out road conditions, and make a recommendation to UK administrators. Up until about 5:30 a.m. yesterday, Carr said, all systems were go. But two unpredicted storms changed the forceast from the original 4-6 inches of snow to 6-12, giving enough reason for administrators to call off school for the

first time since January 1994.
While students whooped and hollered in delight; one employee didn't have the luxury of a day off. Dr. Steve Stapczynski, director of the emergency department at UK Hospital.

tor of the emergency department at UK Hospital.
For the most part, his department has been moving at the speed of snail.
"Nothing's moving. Hardly anything's been able to get around town," said Stapezynski, who rolled into work at 6:45 this morning. Even though you may have spin-outs and collisions, it's not enough speed to do much damage."

UK Police used three Chevy Blazers and
a Ford Bronco to transport doctors and
aurses back and forth to the hospital, and
the Chandler Medical Center sent out six
four-wheel drive vehicles to bring
in patients needing medical attention and sup-

plies.
"We're at full operation," said Mary
Margaret Colliver, head of Med Center
Public Relations. "All the supplies have
arrived but we're asking staff to conserve,
because you don't know what might happen."

## **Unprepared state** faces snow's wrath

weather forecasters dumped heavy
snow yesterday on the eastern half
of Kentucky, closing schools,
snarling traffic and cutting off
power to thousands.
The storm dumped a foot of
snow on parts of central and eastern Kentucky while producing
smaller amounts across a wide
swath of the state. National
guardsmen were dispatched to
assist people in the hardest-hit
areas.

The snow chilled business and closed schools in more than 50

closed schools in more than 50 counties.

Numerous stores also closed, including Fayette Mall in Lexington, while those that stayed open endured hardships from the year's first snowstorm.

"It's basically paralyzed us," said Sheila Yates of Yates Trucking in Stanford in south-central Kentucky.

Adjutant General Russ Groves and Gov. Paul Patton said the state was not caught off guard, as happened with the horrendous ice and snow storm and subzero cold

of January 1994.

A winter storm warning remained in effect Wednesday as the National Weather Service predicted seeveral more inches of snow overnight.

By Thusday morning, total snowfall should range from 6 to 12 inches in central Kentucky, 10 to 18 inches in northern and eastern Kentucky and 3 to 6 inches in southwest and south-central Kentucky, the weather service said.

The snowstorm slipped in by darkness. Many Kentuckians went to bed Tuesday night expecting light snow but awoke Wednesday to drifts as the storm stretched hundreds of miles farther west than originally predicted.

"When I got up this morning, I didn't expect to see anything like this," said Norm Reitmeyer, a meteorologist in Louisville.

Twenty-two counties and a dozen cities requested assistance from the National Guard as snow covered roads and snapped tree limbs that became entangled in utility lines. Utility crews struggled to restore the power.

Patton urged people to stay off the roads whenever possible.

"If I decide to try basketball, and it doesn't work out, then I will focus on track and football." Dennis said. "But if basketball and frootball both happen, then I will do those two."


A lot has been made of UK coach Hal Mumme's deadlines for recruits. That didn't seem to affect Dennis' decision at all.



# City, University reach Rupp agreeme

The ongoing sags between UK, the City of Lexington and the Lexington Center Corporation came to an end Tuesday night with the announcement that UK will have a renegotiated lease of Rupp set to begin on July 1, 1998.

The new sit-year agreement calls for UK to pay a reduced leasing fee that will save the University 2526,000 a year. In addition to the lower rate, UK will receive \$22,000 a year from revenues generated by UK basketball games. The proposal could also have up to a \$200,000 impact on the city's budget.

UK will have the opportunity to purchase Rupp Arena after July 1, 2000 for a price that would be determined through appraisals by representatives from both UK and the Lexington Center. The buying of Rupp would require the approval of the Assembly and the Carter of the Community, Miller said. "When UK, the City of Lexington and the Lexington Center Corp. can come together and reach an agreement, it is great for the community, Miller said. also said the negotiations and subsequent agreement serve everyone's best interests. "We are very pleased we have reached an agreement to continue to play basketball downtown at Rupp Arena with a favorable lease and the option to purchase," Wethington said. "Juill strongly encourage the proposal be adopted and approved. It truly is a win-win situation for all parties concerned." Wethington, who said a tentative pact was reached late last week, said despite the new agreement, UK would not rule out the possibility of an on-campus arena in the future, or if negotiations fall through. "The interest of the University is in

in the future, or if negotiations fall through.

"The interest of the University is in determining the future of our program's facilities," Wethington said. "So far as I'm concerned, no decision has been made about the option of new facilities. The on-campus arena possibility continues to be alive."

Putring off the decision on whether or not to purchase Rupp Arena for two years will allow UK to better research its options before committing to such a deal.

"There wasn't any need to rush this,"

Wethington said. "Remember, it's a major decision for all of us, we both feel appraisals must be done before taking further action. We need to prepare to move ahead in the year 2000."

In the meantime, UK will benefit from a more lucrative financial agreement, Wethington said.

Dunn said keeping UK downtown was a must for the Lexington community.

"It needed to he done. I have been pushing to keep the University of Kentucky down here all along."

Lost in the negotiations over a better financial rental agreement were talks of renovating Rupp to bring it up to modern standards. Both Dunn and Wethington said there are no plans for retto-fitting Rupp at this time.

"As we stand, plans to retro-fit Rupp are not in this deal," Dunn said. "I can't say what will happen in a year or so, so I wouldn't rule out anything in the future. It's just not on the table right now."

Appraisals from both parties on the value of Rupp will take some time, but will begin immediately, Dunn said.

"The appraisals will start very soon, as soon as we can get an actual legal document drawn," Dunn said. "Facilities like this aren't sold everyday, so it'll take some time."

The UK faculty and staff opposition to a new arena or renovation of Rupp did not play a role in the agreement announced vesterday, Wethington said.

"Anytime there is an issue, the University community wants to make their feelings known," Wethington said. "I hear from everyone, but I expect that. In this case, I have been listening to people express opinions for over a year."

Wethington said UK will continue to place academics as a priority for UK.

"We will continue, saw e always have, to place academics," he said. "However, the University also has a responsibility to plan for the future of our athletic programs. We have done that here."


