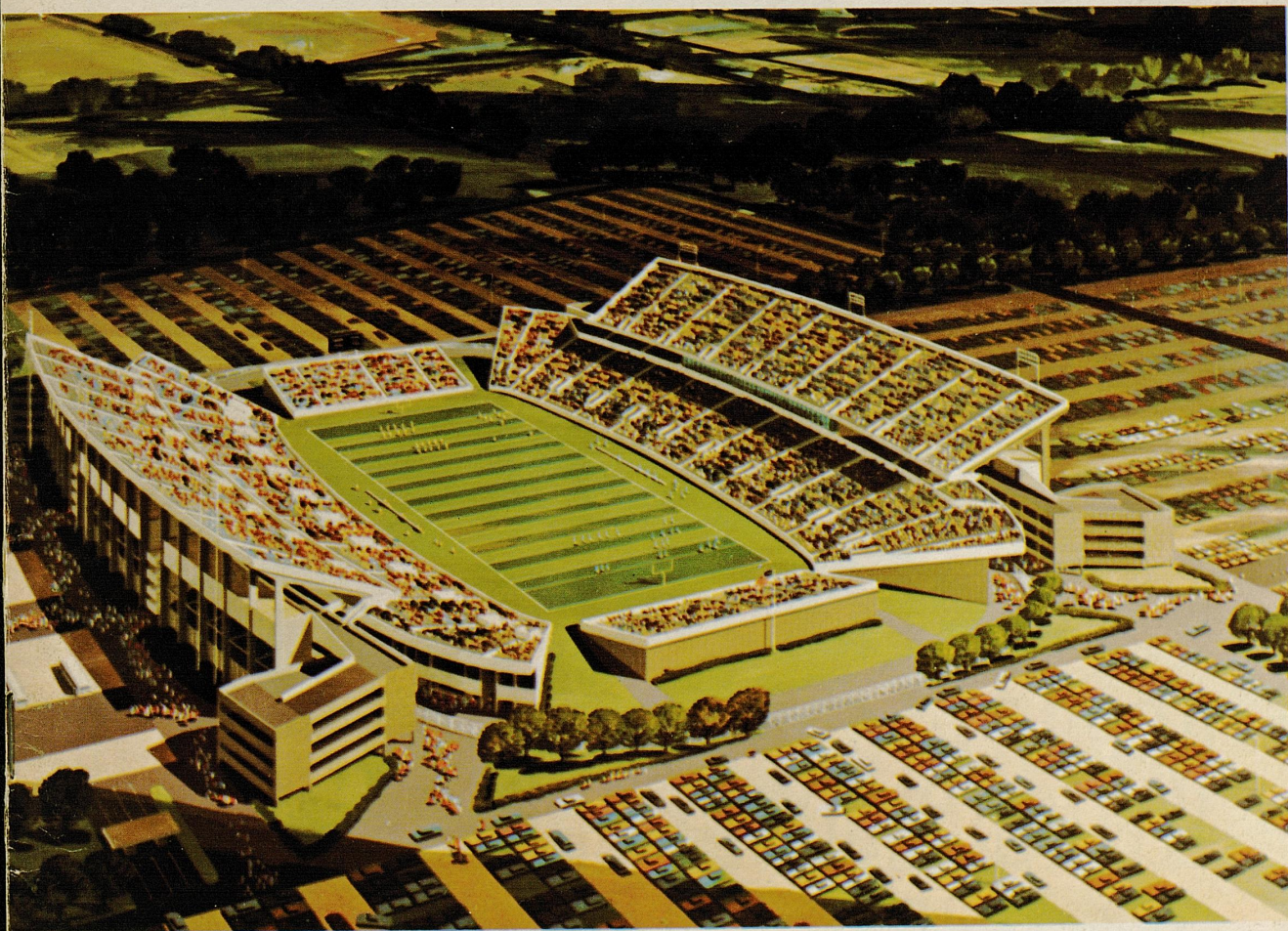
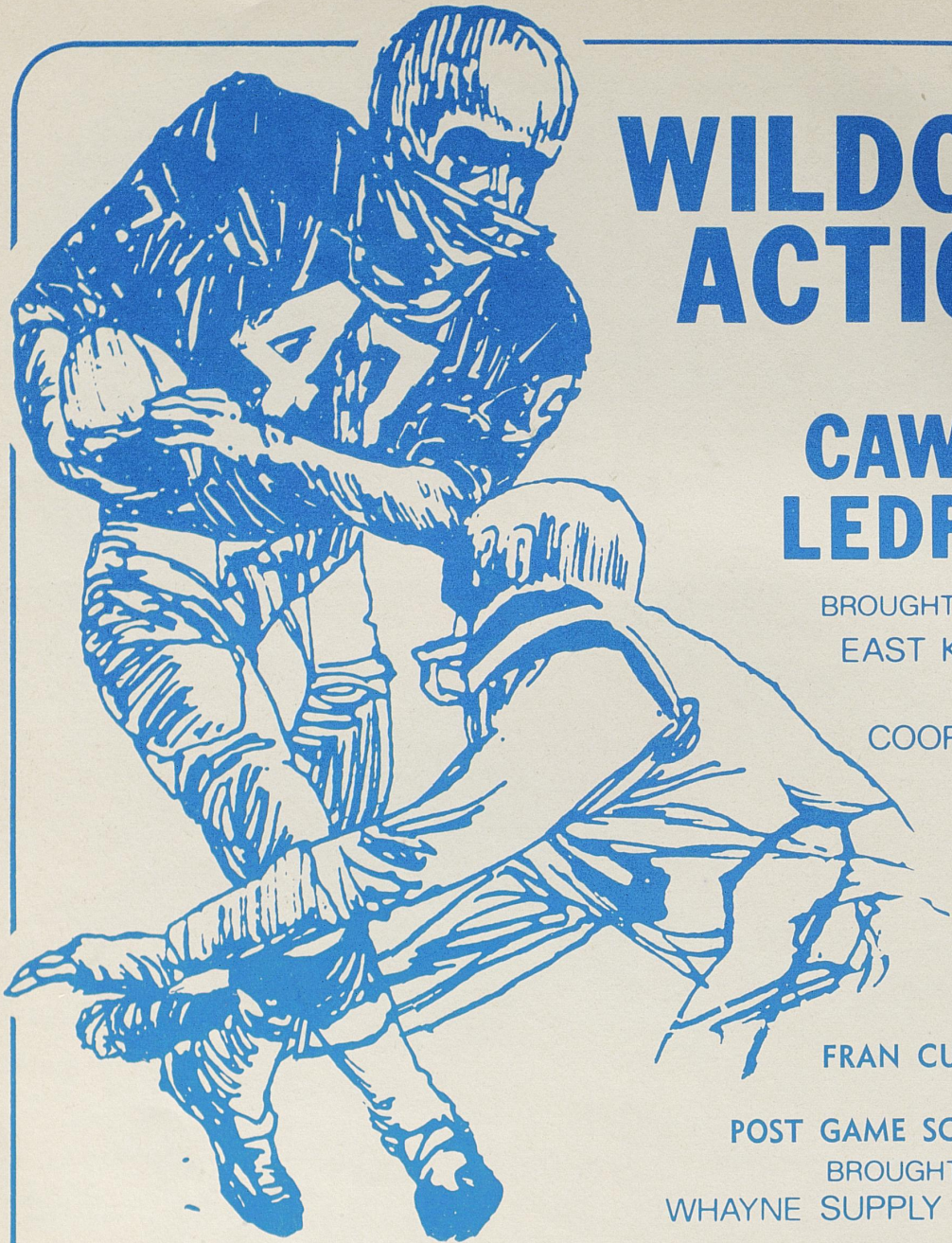

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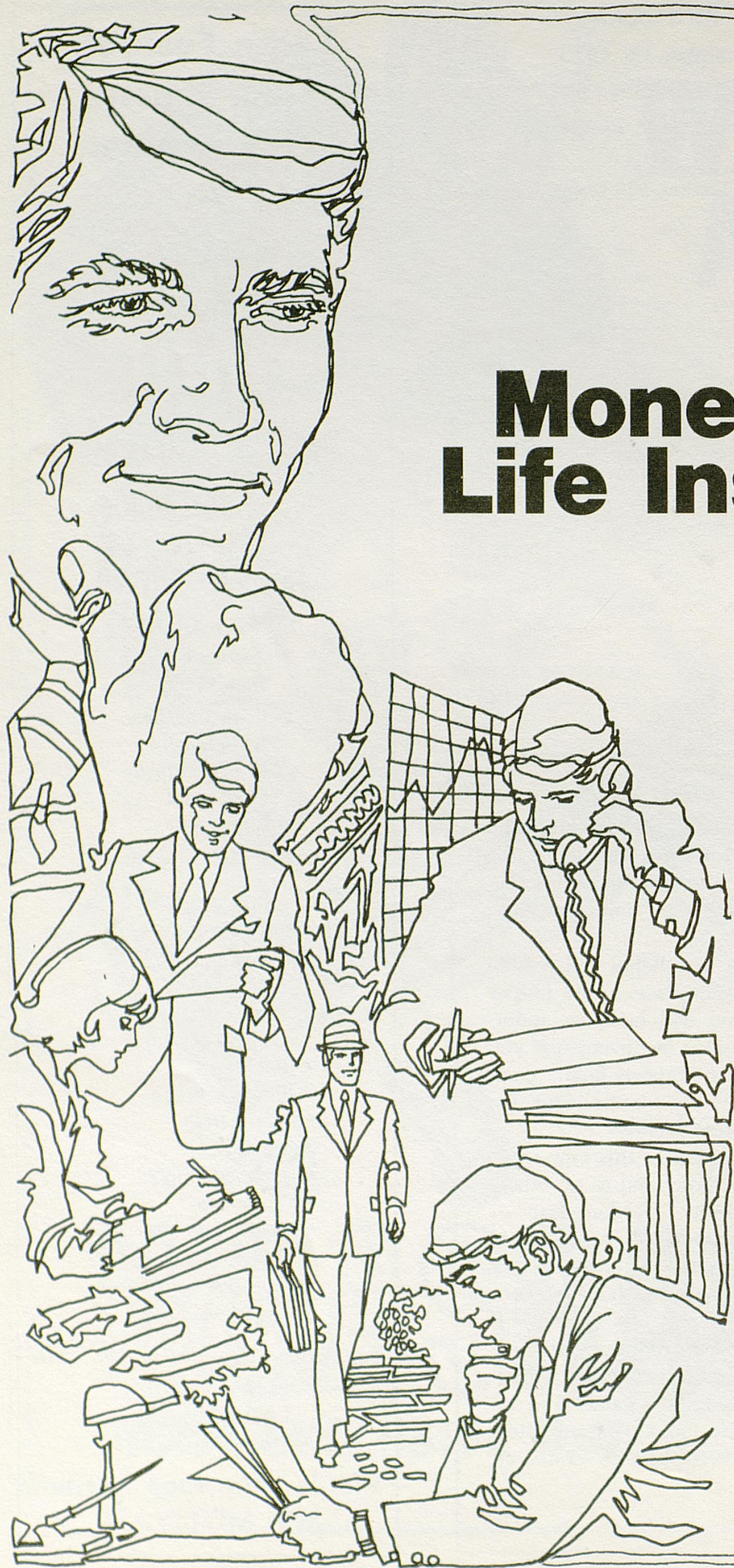
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WENDELL H. FORD
Governor of Kentucky

Kentucky's 57th governor was a prime mover, as lieutenant governor and a member of the State Property and Buildings Commission last year, of the drive to provide a new football stadium for the University of Kentucky. A native of Owensboro, he is a veteran of World War II and attended the University of Kentucky before graduating from the Maryland School of Insurance. He has been a member of the President's Council on Youth Fitness, National Council for Religion in American Life, Kentucky Council of Education and the Second Army Advisory Committee. An active Jaycee in his earlier years, he was director, vice president and president of the Owensboro Jaycees and vice president and president of the National Jaycees and vice president of the North American Jaycees. He has represented the Eighth District in the Kentucky Senate and was chief assistant to Gov. Bert Combs in 1959-61.

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Scouting Report

Game One

VIRGINIA TECH

At Lexington, September 15, 1973, 1:30 p.m.

VIRGINIA TECH—Blacksburg, Va. Gobblers. Orange and Maroon. Campus enrollment: 14,500. President T. Marshall Hahn. Athletic Director Frank Moseley. Coach Charlie Coffey. Publicity Director Wendell Weisend (703) 951-6726.

THE GOBBLERS—With the nation's leading passer—Don Strock—and five of his seven top receivers gone, Charlie Coffey definitely is in a rebuilding phase of a Gobbler offense that ranked No. 1 nationally last year. Wide receiver Ricky Scales, figured to rate in the super category, got off to a fine start with a 65-yard TD reception against William & Mary last week. James Barber, a senior, ran 19 times for 134 yards, scored on a one-yard run and caught a nine-yard pass for a TD while sophomore Phil Rogers ran 17 times for 85 yards, caught four passes for 11 yards and unloaded the 65-yard scoring pass to Scales.

THE SERIES—The Wildcats hold a 5-3-2 edge in a series which began Oct. 30, 1926, with a 13-13 standoff between Coach Fred Murphy's charges and the visiting Virginians. Another meeting the following season, in the heyday of storied Wildcat John (Shipwreck) Kelly, saw the Wildcats emerge on the long end of a 20-6 score. Tech got its first win over UK, 7-0, at Blacksburg in 1932. The series was resumed in the war years of 1941 and 1942, with the Wildcats winning 37-14 at Louisville and then settling for a 21-21 tie at Roanoke. After another intermission—21 years this time—the series resumed with UK winning, 33-14, at Lexington.

Coach Jerry Claiborne, a UK alumnus now the head coach at Maryland, brought his Gobbler team back to Lexington three years later and beat the Wildcats of his old UK teammate Charlie Bradshaw, 7-0. Tech won, 24-14, the following year in Lexington to tie the series, and UK went ahead with a 7-6 victory at Blacksburg in 1969. The Wildcats won, 33-27, two years ago in Lexington.

TODAY'S GAME—Fran Curci's Wildcats are an unknown factor as they open with a complete new coaching staff and a new stadium. However, there will be many familiar names in the lineup, including 1973 team leaders Sonny Collins, rushing; Jack Alvarez, receiving; John Tatterson, punting; Steve Campassi, kickoff returns, and Darryl Bishop, interceptions and tackles.

As a freshman, Collins gained 502 yards in 128 attempts in 10 games for a 3.9 average per carry and three TDs, with a long run of 33 yards to set up a TD against Indiana. He has lost approximately 15 pounds and will be at just over 200.

Running with Collins will be senior Doug Kotar, who was third leading rusher last season and has yet to live up to his potential as a runner. The back-up men are sophomore Steve Campassi and freshman Greg Woods.

Ernie Lewis, a junior who started the Tennessee game and went all the way against the Vols last season, gets the starting nod at quarterback, ahead of junior Mike Fanuzzi, with freshman Mike Kypriss in the background.

Alvarez currently is backed by freshman Fred Bishop and sophomore Keith Bryant. Ray Barga, No. 2 receiver, and Eugene Ganuchau, a solid tight end, both return.

The offensive line has a fair amount of experience with guards Wally Pesuit and Harvey Sword and tackles Rich Allen and Dave Margavage returning from last year. Rick Nuzum, a junior switched from offensive guard, could be an outstanding center of the future.

On defense, big "Bubba" McCollum is potentially outstanding as "nose" guard in a five man front that includes ends Tom Ehlers and Jim Hovey and tackles Fred Hamberg and Pat Donley, all of whom saw action last year.

Curci feels defensive captain Frank LeMaster could be outstanding at linebacker. Ned Lidvall has edged Tom Ranieri for an LB spot while Mike Cassity is the "monster" linebacker.

Darryl Bishop, in his third year, should make a strong bid for All-American and All-SEC honors at safety while Ben Thomas and Jeff Woodcock complete an experienced secondary.

While Wildcat fans don't know exactly what to expect, Tech boosters were shocked by a 31-24 upset loss to William & Mary last Saturday at Blacksburg. Although they outgained the Indians 438 yards to 296, the Gobblers coughed up the ball four times on fumbles in the first half, with one setting up a W&M TD and the two others—on the Indians' 10 and 19—possibly denying Tech two scores. In the second half, Tech handed the Indians a TD on a 33-yard pass interference penalty and drew two major infractions.

It is safe to assume that Coach Coffey has worked hard on correcting those mistakes during the past week and that the Gobblers come to Lexington with fire in their eyes.

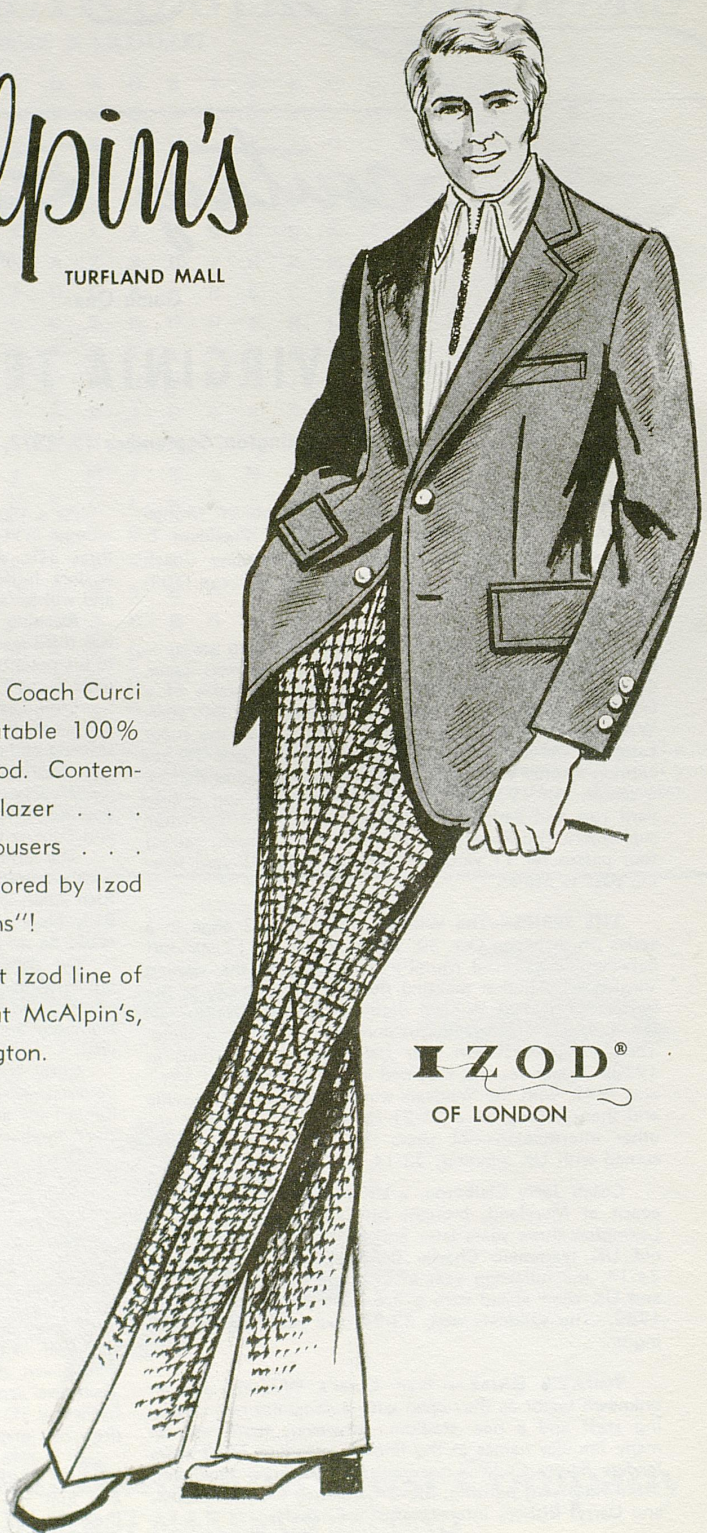

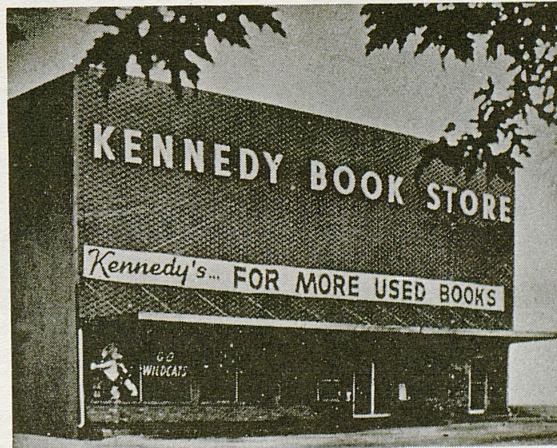

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Commonwealth Stadium, the University of Kentucky's new football facility, is located on an 86-acre tract on the Kentucky Experimental Station Farm grounds south of the main campus and east of Nicholasville Road. A concrete and steel structure with two cantilevered decks along each sideline, it replaces Stoll Field, where Wildcat football teams have played since 1924.

Constructed by Huber, Hunt & Nichols, Inc., the new facility has a capacity of 50,000 sideline seats, with end zone bleachers swelling the total to 58,000. The lower stands are so constructed that the seating can be increased to 68,000 later when needed.

Bids for the stadium were opened in mid-July 1972 and construction began a short while later.

The pressbox, located between the two levels on the south side of the playing field, is serviced by two elevators and contains a main working area, radio booths, food service areas, private booths and a camera deck extending along the entire front of the box.

Thirty-four concession areas and 30 restrooms are located conveniently throughout the facility. Four first aid stations with emergency health equipment also are provided. There are four major pedestrian ramps at each corner of the stadium and 40 ramp exits to seats.

The area immediately surrounding the stadium contains 6,000 parking spaces, with half of those paved and the other half in grass with gravel driveways. Another 8,500 parking spaces are located within a mile, all north, of the stadium. Five exits, all leading to four-lane highways, serve the facility.

The playing surface was sodded in Kentucky bluegrass in July. A fairly new scoreboard was moved from Stoll Field and installed with a similar scoreboard at the new stadium.

Due to almost daily rainfall during the spring and early summer months, construction was behind schedule on some parts of the stadium. First priority was given to seating, pressbox and elevators, concessions, toilets and other conveniences, with offices and other improvements to be completed later.

The new stadium does away with the seeming duplication of titles—Stoll Field and McLean Stadium—that caused much confusion among the general public and sports-writing fraternity.

By action of the University Board of Trustees, the general area encompassing the old Wildcat playing field, located first on what is now an intramural field, was dedicated Oct. 14, 1916, as Stoll Field in honor of the late Judge Richard C. Stoll.



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DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY

University President

President of the University since 1969 has been Dr. Otis A. Singletary, who came from the University of Texas, Austin, where he was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs. He earlier had been director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity, and chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

He is the eighth president of the University. Unique recognition of his service to the institution came recently from the UK Alumni Association, which presented him its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

HARRY C. LANCASTER

Director of Athletics

Named athletic director in 1968, Harry C. Lancaster has been connected with UK athletics since 1942, when he was a full-time instructor in physical education and part-time basketball coach. A native of Paris, Ky., he lettered in football, basketball and baseball at Paris High. He was an All-Conference halfback three years and captain two years at Georgetown College. He also won three All-Conference nominations and was twice captain of Tiger basketball teams.

He served as an assistant football and basketball coach at Georgetown College (1932-33) and Paris High (1933-34); head basketball coach at Bagdad High (1934-36) and principal and coach at Gleneyrie High (1936-42). He was assistant basketball coach at U.K. 22 years and baseball coach 16 years.



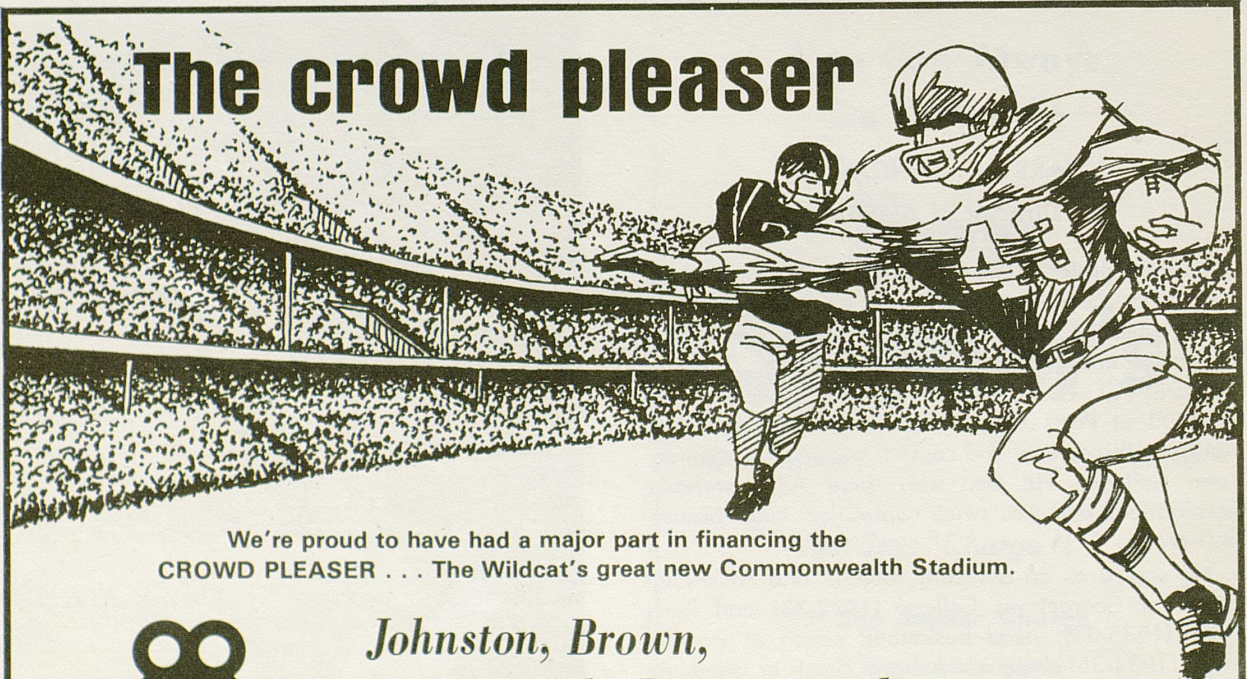
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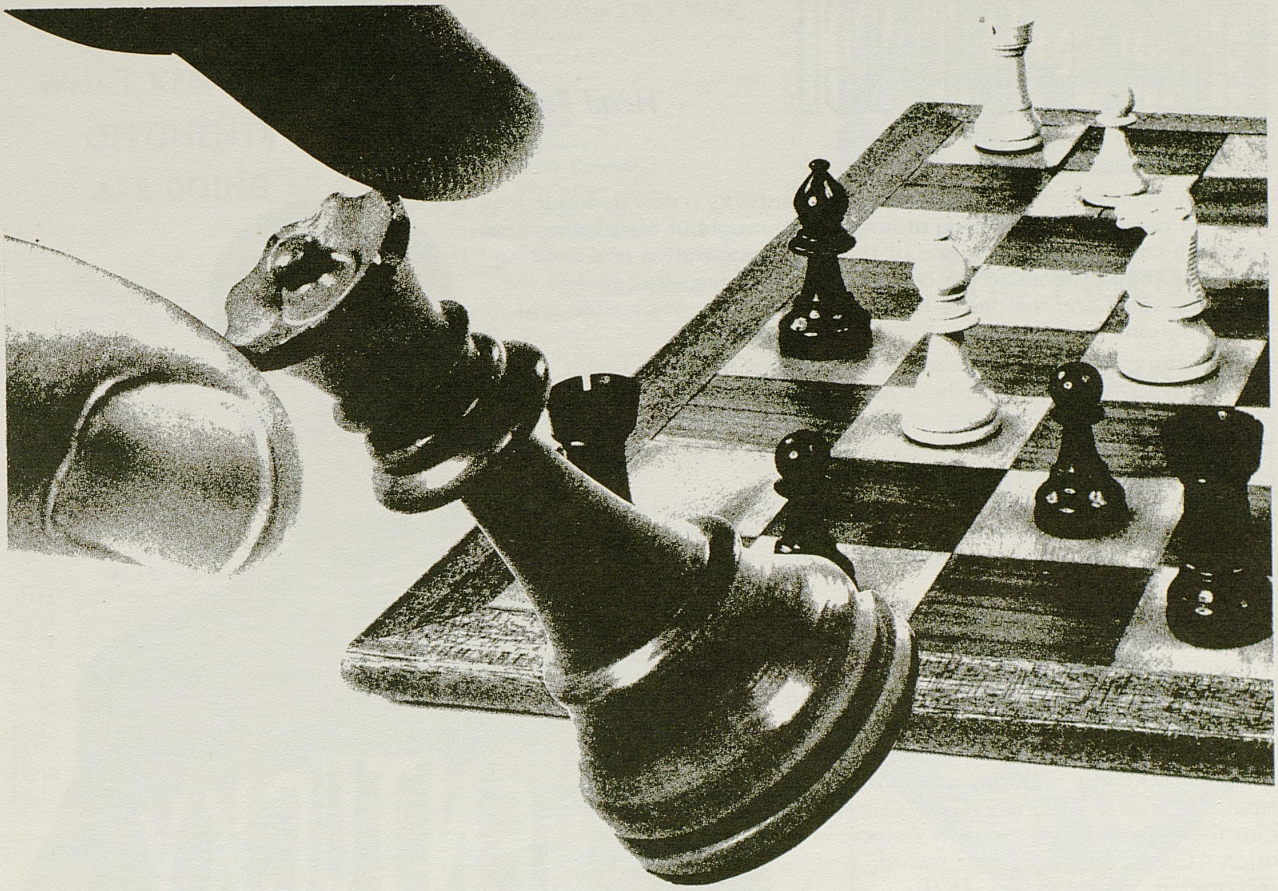


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FRAN CURCI

Head Football Coach

Fran Curci brings to the University of Kentucky a new dynamic look that has resulted in a winning atmosphere throughout his playing and coaching career. Known as one of the most imaginative and exciting young football coaches in the country, he has proved that he has the tools, the spirit and the desire to conquer seemingly impossible grid-iron situations.

He came to U.K. in December 1972 from his alma mater, the University of Miami, Fla., where he was head coach two years. He started his career as freshman coach there in 1962 after making All-America and playing as a 5-foot-9, 153 lb. quarterback for the old Dallas Texans of the AFL.

In four years, his Hurricane freshman teams won 12 and lost two games. He then served as a varsity assistant two years (1966-1967), and the Hurricanes participated in bowl games both those years.

Curci was tapped by the University of Tampa in 1968 to see what he could do about a faltering football program; in three campaigns, he wrote one of the most amazing success stories in college football.

In his first year, he put together a 7-3 season, including victories over Mississippi State and Tulane. That earned him the Florida Sports Writers Association "Coach of the Year" award, a recognition repeated in 1970.

His 10-1 record in 1970 also included a 31-14 triumph over Miami and brought the Tampans the nation's No. 1 College Division ranking as well as bringing Curci College Division "Coach of the Year" runner-up honors.

Curci has been selected four times to coach in all-star games. He assisted Bear Bryant with the South team in Tampa's first annual American Bowl game three years ago, then served as South head coach the next year. He helped Charley McClendon of LSU and Alex Agase of Northwestern direct the East in the Coaches All-America football game at Lubbock, Texas, two summers ago and was co-South coach with Bill Battle of Tennessee in Miami's Shrine North-South game last year.

Curci took over as Miami grid boss Dec. 19, 1970, and left the program there in good shape for his successor, Pete Elliott.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Curci played his high school ball in Miami, where he lettered three years as a quarterback at Archbishop Curley High and was All-City, All-Conference, Catholic All-State and his team's Most Valuable Player.

At the University of Miami, he was known as the "Mite-y Magician." Playing at 152 pounds, he par-



played intelligence and desire to become All-America as a senior in 1959 after receiving honorable mention All-America and winning acclaim as one of the foremost sophomore football stars in the country in 1957.

His record-shattering feats at Miami included breaking of seasonal and career marks for total offense, most passes thrown, most passes completed and most yards gained on passing. He also was co-holder of the record for most TD passes thrown.

He rolled up 2,767 yards rushing and passing during his varsity career, breaking a total offense record that had stood for more than two decades.

As a senior, he captained Miami and climaxed his career by engineering a stunning upset (18-23) over Big Ten champion Michigan State.

After graduation in 1960 with a degree in marketing, he played one year with the Dallas Texans and then served as a lieutenant in the Army, coaching and playing football for the Fort Eustis team, which won the National Service championship in the Missile Bowl.

He is married to the former Miss Patricia Ann Taylor of Louisville. They have four children, Angela 12, Frankie 10, Mary Teresa 9 and Jimmie 7.

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LEAVES FROM THE PAST

The game of football in Kentucky apparently dates back to the 1878-1879 school year, when C. L. Thurgood enrolled at Kentucky University (now Transylvania University) and told classmate Miles Dawson about having played on a team in his native Australia.

Like most college boys of the time, Dawson had read "Tom Jones at Rugby" and was much interested in Thurgood's account. They sent for balls and rules, organized practice games and finally set up a match game with Centre College April 19, 1880.

That was the first intercollegiate football game ever played in the South, and probably was the first to take place west of the Alleghenies. It was played in Lexington's City Park. The match, won 13 $\frac{3}{4}$ -0, by Kentucky University, was said to resemble a combination of soccer and rugby. It followed by six years the introduction of football to the United States.

"A large crowd of ladies and gentlemen, estimated at 500, witnessed the game," The Lexington Transcript reported. "The ladies seemed to take especial interest in the fun, and it was pronounced that football had decidedly the advantage of baseball as a means of amusement to spectators.

"The collisions between players at various times were almost equal to the coming together of two Spanish bulls, and provoked much laughter."

One year later, the University of Kentucky (then known as A&M College and later State College), accepted a challenge for a match game with Kentucky University and defeated the cross-town rivals, 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ to 1, on the same field. Kentucky University won two ensuing games that year by scores of 2-1 and 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ -2 $\frac{1}{4}$.

Since numerical scoring had not been introduced in Rugby football, one must surmise that persons in charge of the game obviously had arrived at some sort of agreement assigning numerical values to the various scoring plays.

Football as we know it today got its beginning in the state in 1891—there is no record of any games played at A&M from 1882-1890—when W. Durant Berry, one of Amos Alonzo Stagg's "Christian Workers" squad members from the University of Chicago, was employed at Centre College and taught the students there to play the game. They promptly challenged State College. Old gray uniforms, cut off at the knee and stuffed with hay, together with stockings borrowed from sisters and others constituted a part of the paraphernalia of battle. Centre won, 10-0.

The following year, State College, Kentucky University and Central all put teams on the field and played each other twice. Prof. A. M. Miller was chosen as State coach because he had learned the game from sideline experience while a student at Princeton. His only previous coaching experience was at a girls' school.

During those embryo years, the best teams in the state were

turned out by Centre College and Central University (in Richmond), which were consolidated in 1901. The old Central University defeated the State College team seven times and was defeated twice by it before the consolidation. Teams of the consolidated school were not as successful as had been teams of the separate schools.

Kentucky University was the best college team in the state from 1901 until 1904, when the star of State College began to rise and she defeated all the teams in the state and won nine of 10 games, losing only to Cincinnati, which was represented by a team which had been imported to some extent from the East in accordance with the customs in vogue in those days.

In the first decade of regular Rugby football in Kentucky, most anything would go. There were no rules of eligibility and often as many outsiders played on a team as did students. Coaches usually played and players roved year after year and from one school to another. Spectators stood on the field of play around the teams and often took a hand in the proceedings. Many of the games ended in fights and squabbles. The ambulance was often summoned for players and spectators alike. There were only a few persons heroic enough to officiate and bodyguards were sometimes required to enable them to retire from the scenes of their labors.

Some of the best football teams developed in the nation at that time were in Kentucky: the Centre College, Central University, Kentucky University and State College squads were capable of holding their own with anyone. Although none of them met any of the great teams of the East, it was felt that there were organizations in Kentucky that would have entertained Harvard or Yale at their best. Years later, Centre pulled a monumental upset of Harvard.

The University of Kentucky's only undefeated, untied team—the "Immortals of '98"—was produced in that era. Holding their opponents scoreless in seven games, they defeated Kentucky University, Georgetown, Co. H of the 8th Massachusetts, Louisville Athletic Club, Centre, a picked team from two divisions of soldiers, and the Newcastle Athletic Club.

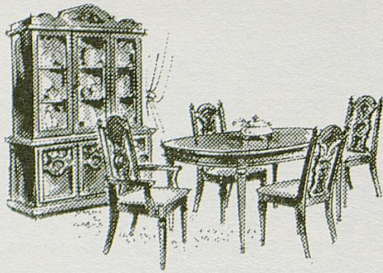
The Centre game was called off after 15 minutes of play because a cloudburst practically washed the field away and the spectators went home. With no one to cheer them on, the two teams decided to call it quits and the "Immortals" were declared the winner.

The hardest game was with the team of picked soldiers. That was during the Spanish-American War, when there were approximately 20,000 soldiers stationed in Lexington. Most were betting that the Army would score, not that it would win. State win, 17-0.

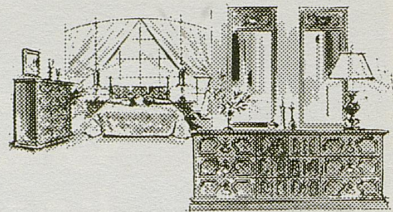
Although the '98 team had the best record, on paper, of any U.K. team, its real strength hardly could compare with one or two other teams of that era. During that war year, football was at a low ebb and State did not meet any teams outside of Kentucky, all of the games being played with Kentucky teams. In other words, the schedule was conducive to an undefeated season.



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
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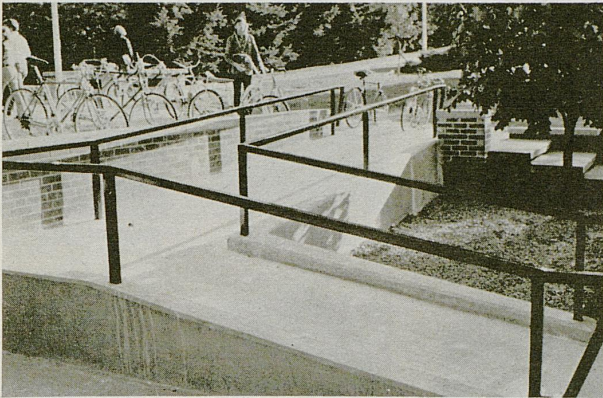

The closest parking spaces around Commonwealth Stadium, and special wide seats scattered in good locations around the arena, were reserved today for the people who need them most.

They are UK's handicapped students—who by wheelchair, crutches, canes or other aid—arrived today, like thousands of their fellow students, to enjoy an afternoon of football.

Planning for the handicapped began two years ago when the stadium was a mere gleam in an architect's—or coach's—eye. Jakes Karnes made certain of that.

Buildings Made Accessible

For three years now this determined young man, who is director of Handicapped Student Services, has been consulting with University people to make all new buildings and many old ones accessible to the student in a wheelchair or led by a seeing-eye dog or limited by a heart condition, or otherwise physically limited.

Now there are ramps, braille markings, wide doors, low water fountains, modified rest rooms and special parking spaces over much of the campus.

There is a wheelchair lift in Alumni Coliseum Pool, and Karnes is pushing for a modified shuttle bus to help transport wheelchair students from one section of the campus to another.

With Kentucky Volunteers for the Blind and the UK Women's Club, Karnes has books recorded for blind students, and orders others already recorded.

His aide in this and all enterprises benefitting blind UK students is Mike Bell, a blind UK graduate, with an M.A. in rehabilitation counseling.

Planning Begins Early

Karnes work begins long before classes open.

After pre-registration in the spring, when he learns which handicapped students have signed up for what courses, he juggles the logistics and helps determine if it is physically possible to get from one classroom to another in the prescribed time, if the building where each class meets is accessible, if the class is manageable (for example, he discourages the blind from such visually-oriented courses as astronomy and physics).

In the summer, Karnes does pre-admission counseling, working with entering students to determine their academic, physical and financial needs, much as admissions counselors at UK do for all other students. For Karnes, however, flights of steps, and buildings with ponderous metal doors, curbs and clocks and distances, complicate already complex arrangements. But Karnes has become expert at plotting courses for his charges, and has persuaded professors to move classes from inaccessible to accessible buildings, or to permit a few minutes' tardiness to a student whose between-class route is arduous.

Numbers Increased

The number of handicapped students at UK has increased dramatically in the last five years. And Karnes gets more inquiries each year from parents of disabled youngsters.

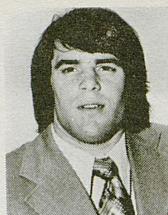
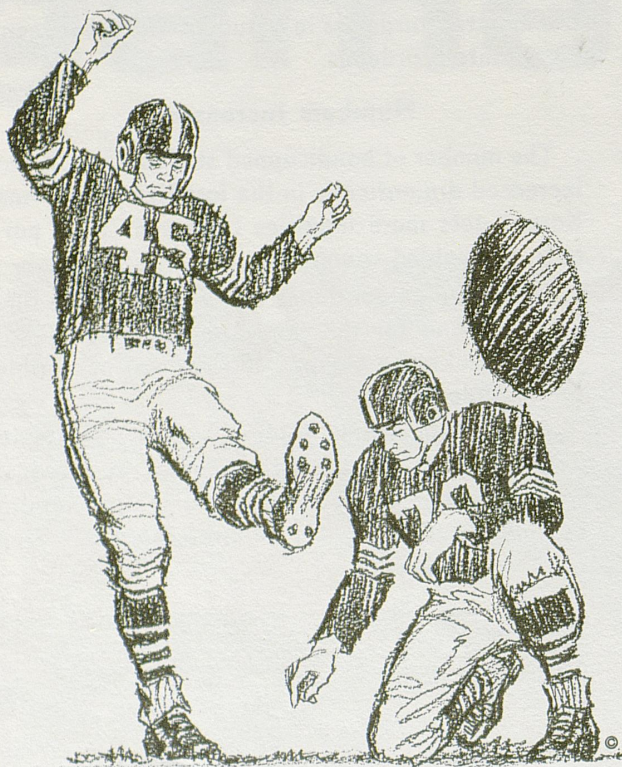
Meantime he continues to push for ramps and elevators and for the renovation of older buildings to make the campus 100 percent accessible to all students.

As one wheelchair student, a senior, puts it, "There's been tremendous progress in the last few years, but we need more momentum toward our older buildings. The progress here is a step in the right direction."

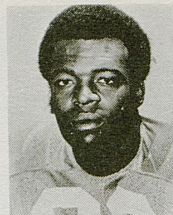


UK President Otis A. Singletary greets a group of blind students, some of the 25 now attending the University.

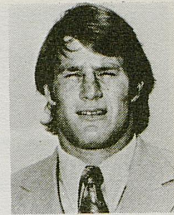

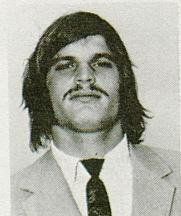
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College Football "Plays It Again" Sunday

As it is popularly conceived, the instant replay is a split-screened, isolated, slo-mo, stop-action piece of art which lets you see the play you didn't see a few seconds earlier.

But popular conceptions are far too confining. An instant replay—in every sense of the term—takes place every Sunday morning on most ABC stations. It even has a name—ABC College Football Highlights Show.

Putting the Sunday morning highlights show together is a game in itself; and when you consider that the "working day" in Chicago for the show is 11 p.m. Saturday until 11 a.m. Sunday, you can bet it's the only game in town.

For at least three members of the Highlights Show team, it's an away game. Dick Snider, director of NCAA Films and executive producer of the show, checks into Chicago Saturday night from his home in Wichita, Kan. Kemper Peacock, the producer-director, journeys from New York; and Bill Flemming, the host, comes from his assignment on ABC's college football telecast of the week.

Snider minimizes his role in the production, but the five-year reign of the show is to his credit. "You know, the whole thing's impossible," he confesses. "The good thing is that we never have time to stop and think about that when we are putting the show together."

Snider's involvement with the show really begins the Monday before. That's when he huddles with ABC executives to determine what games will be featured.

"We'll film on the average of 12 games a weekend, and then pick the five or six top games. Those games are determined on the importance of the contest, logistics or even if one of the teams has a player everybody would like to see.

"The most important thing about the show," Snider continued, "is getting the film into Chicago. When I get there Saturday night, I contact the cameramen and find out what fights the film's going to be on. Then I make sure that our messengers—who race to O'Hare and Midway airports on motorcycles—get out there and get the film.

Important Motorcycles

"Kemper Peacock has been all over the world and has to be one of the best in the business, Bill Flemming has covered every major sporting event in the world, and I've been around a little, too; but we all are helpless if one of those guys in a helmet and leather jacket can't get his bike started."

In the five years the show has been on the air, only one shipment of film has been lost in transit. "I know the plane schedules into Chicago better than the airlines," says Snider, "but sometimes things go wrong. We had an important game coming in from the South on Piedmont Airlines. It arrived on time, but the messenger didn't, and Piedmont closed down its baggage counter. We had to call Piedmont's home office, get the manager's name

in Chicago, get him out of bed and down to O'Hare."

Kemper Peacock is the head of a production company by the same name. "I know I'm good with deadlines but this is ridiculous," Peacock said as he sat at a desk surrounded by some of his own photography. "It's tough, but we get it done. I work with three editors in Chicago on the show. I'll edit the main game—the one we spotlight—and the rest of the work is parceled out to the others. We have roughly four hours to do the work . . . and we do it. That's all."

Each cameraman provides a play-by-play account of the game with the film. It's up to Peacock to edit the footage into an exciting, five-minute piece.

"At 4:30 a.m. we transfer the material from film to video-tape and have our first run through. Bill Flemming arrives on the scene between 5:30 and 6 a.m.; and we must have the show completed by 10 a.m. We have roughly three hours to get everything right. We have the edited film and any other features that I might have worked on in New York that we have to get into the show. But, Bill's got to get his narration in; and we have late scores to include. You know, it just might be impossible."

WLS, the ABC affiliate in Chicago, has to have the show by 10 a.m. to insure at least one run through. But, the station has been persuaded to take the show later.

Show Must Go On

"Our record is 10:57," Peacock admitted. "WLS had 'Water Skiing from Cypress Garden' all racked up, ready to run. But, we made it. We've made every show."

The "interior linemen" of the show are the writers. Jeff Elliott, who doubles as the assistant director of the Big Ten Service Bureau, and Kay Schultz, Chicago journalist, spend their time looking over shoulders and getting people out of bed.

"I just try to compile as much information as possible," Elliott explains, "and when you work through the night, that means disturbing some people."

Flemming is the man up front. According to Snider, "He is super. He's one of the few sportscasters who could do this show. He knows the game, and you can't shake him up."

Flemming smiled at this comment and said, "They do call me 'one-shot Flemming.' Let's face it, that's my strength. I can get the thing done in one take. And fifty per cent of the time, that's all we have time for."

Flemming is on the college football scene every Saturday afternoon working a game for ABC. After the game he hops into his own plane and heads for Chicago.

"Flying my own plane is the only way to do it," says Flemming. "Even so, sometimes I have to leave at half-time, or before, to make it. It's amazing, but I've never been weathered out. I've had some bumpy flights, but Chicago has always been open for me."

Upon arrival in Chicago, Flemming reads the first edition of the Tribune to get a bead on some of the games. Preparation is his hallmark. He compiles information throughout the week on the games which will probably be used then adlibs this information during the taping of the show.

After getting a wake-up call at 4:30 a.m., Flemming heads over to begin the taping. He gets the script outline then the cameras roll. Often the narration is material Flemming is seeing for the first time.

"I think this is an advantage," he says. "I put everything into the present tense. It's like I'm announcing the game for the first time. To us, the game isn't in the past."

Flemming Cares

Flemming is a perfectionist. "With Bill you have to be prepared," says Elliott. "If he sees a name he's never seen before, he wants to know how to pronounce it. His standard line is 'Are you sure?' I'd hate to tell you how many times we've run to a phone at 6 a.m. to check out a pronunciation, a statistic, a record or even a home town."

Peacock rolls the cameras at 6 a.m., and Flemming begins reading. If he makes a mistake, the film is still rolled because the important item is to get all the film onto video-tape. After that is accomplished, then the backtracking is done. When Flemming is happy with the script and is sure that everything is correct, he proceeds in his one-shot fashion.

The result is an exciting football show, which provides information—an entertaining news show.

"The show is good," Flemming claims, "and I can tell you why. We have a great team, and we all 'dig' college football."

The 12-hour period which spawns the Sunday Morning College Football Highlights Show is summed up by Flemming: "Physically exhausting."

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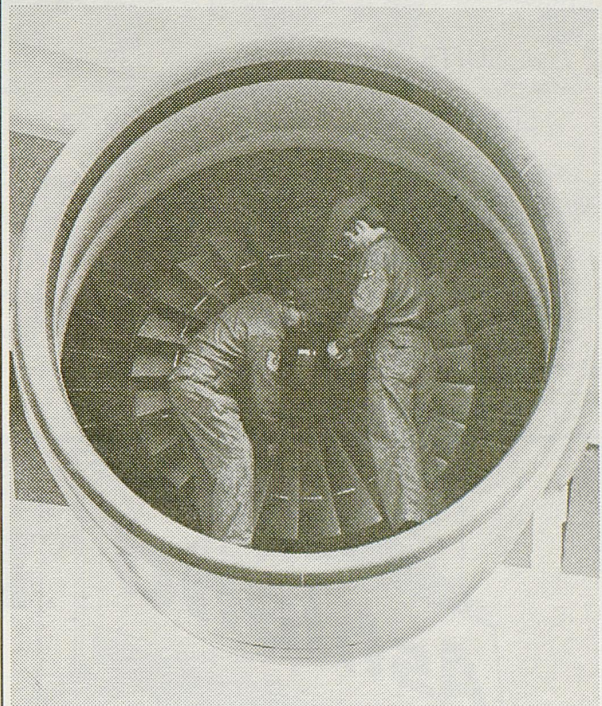
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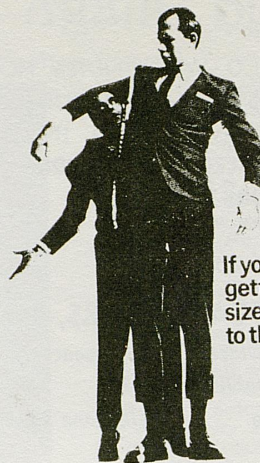
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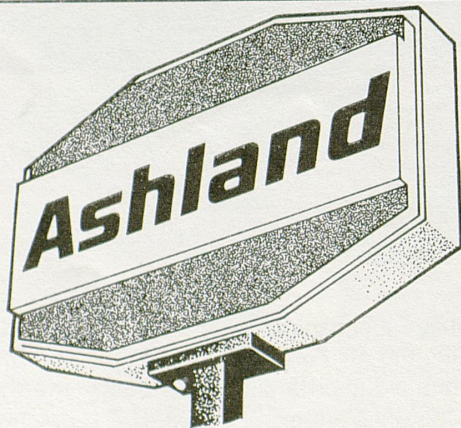
