Students who are waiting for the day when they will be able to pay for pizza with their PLUS accounts might be waiting for a long time.

In another development of the sagurrounding UK's decision to award the exclusive PLUS account pizza contract to Papa John's, Domino's submitted a formal appeal to George DeBin, UK's vice president for Fiscal Affairs.

The appeal states that, "It has been the contention of Domino's Pizza from the onset of the PLUS account discussions that the best value for the University is to allow students to purchase food

IRAs safe way to invest



How many of you want to become millionaires? What if I said you could stick away \$5 a day, less than you spend on lunch, and be rich by the age of 60. Well it's true and here's how to do it.

According to the Wall Street Journal, the United States ranks at the bottom of countries where citizens are subject to saving money.

The global marketplace thrives on Americans to purchase any product we deem a necessity. But, with constant economic uncertainty in the air and the common knowledge of a future scarcity among that scapegoat called "social security." the time to save is now.

Young adults should be the first to step to the plate and put aside some cash for their future. But they're not.

Originally called The American Dream IRA, this savings device allows a person to invest, grow and receive their money completely tax-free. Although your initial investments are not tax deductible, when your money matures you can take it out completely tax-free, as long as you followed the guidelines. Let's look at an example:

Joe Investor, age 20, begins his Roth IRA by investing \$5 a day, or \$2,000 a year (the maximum amount you can invest). He continues this religiously for 20 years. At the age of 40, Joe wants to know how much he's saved. To calculate, we'll use a modest rate of 10 percent. In Joe's Roth IRA, he currently has \$114,550, Joe decides to keep investing and waits until he's 60 (The minimum age without a penalty'ly to retrieve his money. At 60, Joe has earned \$855,180 completely tax-free!

Widespread illnesses hit 11 states

NASHVILLE — Hundreds of people living near or working at nuclear weapons plants and research installations in 11 states are suffering from an array of unexplained illnesses. The Tennessean reported Tuesday.

The newspaper interviewed 410 people whose ailments included tremors, memory loss, fatigue and a variety of breathing, muscular and reproductive problems. Their doctors cannot explain why they are sick.

No direct link has been established between the illnesses and the Energy Department sites. The 410 people are not a scientific sampling and represent only a tiny percentage of the millions of people who live near or work at the plants. Nor is it clear whether the people at or near the content of the properties of the properties. Still, doctors, scientists and lawmakers said the number of sick people is large enough to warrant a comprehensive study to try to find the cause.

"Four hundred people is a lot of people," said George W. Lucier, director of the environmental toxicology program at the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences. "It's not just two or three. It is something widespread. At least the wheels should be set in motion in which a team of physicians can go in and look at things more systematically."

China to sign human rights bill

China to sign human rights bill

WASHINGTON — China's top diplomat said
Tuesday his government will sign a key human
rights declaration next week.
Making his diplomatic debut in Washington,
Foreign Minister Tang Jiaxuan, also urged the
United States to proceed in a "very calm and
very prudent manner" in dealing with its concerns over North Korea.

Tang informed President Clinton that China
will sign the International Covenant on Civil and
Political Rights in New York on Oct. 5.
China had committed itself to signing the declaration months ago but had not specified a
date. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright made
the disclosure to reporters with Tang at her side
and said she was happy about the development.
If China abides by the covenant, it could mean
a considerable loosening up of Chinese society because it calls on signatories to allow freedom of expression, the press, religion and association.

Some Chinese dissidents are demanding the
elimination of laws that conflict with the convenant.

NEW YORK — Oprah Winfrey was offered the first Monica Lewinsky interview but turned it down after the former White House intern began making demands over videotape and international broadcast rights for the interview. That's according to TV Guide.

Winfrey tells the magazine, "I didn't get burned, it just got to be too complicated."

The queen of TV talk says she wanted to interview President Clinton's paramout because she can relate to her predicament.

"I think Monica's gotten a really bad rap, I've been 21 and know what it's like to be 21. And an intern. In a situation where the president of the company acts like he likes you," she said.

First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton is scheduled to appear on Oprah in November to promote a book Dear Socks, Dear Buddy, a collection of letters sent to the First Pets. But Winfrey said the show's focus will have to change "under the circumstances."

WASHINGTON — Clothing maker Tommy Hillinger said Tuesday it would alter an advertis-ing campaign after the White House complained about the depiction of an alluring young woman sitting on what appeared to be President Clin-ton's desk in the Oval Office.





Rollins speaks out in 'Tank'

Henry Rollins speaks of experience in his latest spoken-word album 'Think Tank'

Whether they admit it or not, the career of an artist can be poisoned or perfumed by the simplistic world of media criticism—just like the one you're reading right now. Most credible talents, besieged by hype machines, have two choices: Either cater to the everclasping hands of these appointed judges or use the negativity as a gimmick. Henry Rollins does neither.

Henry Rollins does neither.
The former leader of '80s punk-rock band Black Flag is impossible to corner, because his art has no essence and no precedent. Besides, it really doesn't seem like he cares.
In his latest spokenword effort, Think Tank, Rollins paws at comedy and cynical rants only to underscore his more projund ideology.

His discursive mantra pokes at everything from the stupidity of racism and homophobia to the general unintelligible nature of people.

His thick raspy voice

His thick, raspy voice
and tough-as-nails prose
present a persistent, if not
slightly disturbing, verbal
candor.

Rollins began writing while on the road with Black Flag, because he wanted to chronicle his life on the road.



Mobster coming to talk gambling

Collegiate athletes, with recent events nationally, are still being tempted with the money and consequences of gambling

A former New York mobster is coming to UK to share his insight on collegiate sports gambling.

Michael Franzese, a major organized crime figure in the 1970s and '80s, will speak of his experiences with gambling in the mob to create an awareness of the potential problem with gambling at UK.

He will be speaking at 7.30 p.m. on Thursday in the Concert Hall of the Singletary Center.

UK Athletics Director C.M. Newton citing recent college campus sorandals that have validated his fears of a growing rend of college campus sports betting, is particularly interested in educating UK student athletes to prevent scandals from happening here.

"I'm concerned about it at UK," Newton said. "What I'm trying to do is create an awareness among all of our students of the potential problem and certainly through the education and monitoring of our own

The last incident of sports gambling at UK occurred in a 1951 basketball season point-shaving scandal. The result was a suspension of the UK basketball team in the 1952-53 season.

"It's a societal issue, not just a college campus issue," Newton said. "But to think that it's not going on across college campuses is naive."

Franzese is going to help Newton in his endeavors of educating students against the temptation of sports betting.

His speech will cover college bookmaking operations and their connection to organized crime and why professional and collegiate athletes are potential targets of this activity. The lecture is mandatory for sports betting, which is illegal, is just fun and games, but it's an activity that is widespread on campuses," Newton said. "Franzese) is an interesting guy, and one that I think will bring an element of awareness to this whole issue of sports betting that people don't realize."

Making it safe: Water Watch Program gets LCC, UK students involved in stream testing

If you are an environmentally conscious student, this workshop is for you.

In cooperation with the main competition of the Division of Water, Lexington Community College is holding a free workshop to train volunteers on how to determine water and habitat quality of local streams.

The workshop takes place from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on Saturday at LCC in the Oswald Building.

"This workshop is good for any students, or anyone wanting to help monitor our streams

in Kentucky," said Jean Watts, a coordinator for the water quality workshop. "There are so many small streams in Kentucky and not enough government funds to properly test them all."

Many students help out over the summer by testing local streams for any toxins, Watts said.

erates in three phases.

First, volunteers visit the streams and collect scientific and photographic information about the stream.

Next, this information is shared with local leaders, such as the mayor or the city council. Then the Water Watch team, made up of full-time division employees, as well as volunteers, works with the local leaders to find a consensus solution to the problems.

Cooke said the program offers valuable field experience for students majoring in fields related to biology and natural resource management.

"College students usually help us with some of the intensive surveys before mid-terms," he said. "Hopefully, students can allow from professors for the work they do here, of course

Boston U. student paper loses \$163,000 in lawsuit

BOSTON — A Suffolk County Superior Court Jury yesterday ordered The Daily Free Press to pay a former employee nearly \$163,000, saying the paper was discriminatory when firing her in 1994.

After deliberating for about six hours, jurors ruled that part of the reason office manager Karen Miranda was fired was because she had cervical cancer.

Miranda hugged her lawyer after hearing the verdict, saying, "Thank you for everything."

Miranda was awarded \$53,900 in wage compensation and \$105,000 for emotional distress. If the jury finds the Free Press' actions "outrageous," it could punish the paper further by awarding Miranda more damages today.

The Free Press will not stop printing as a result of the judgement, said editor Gene Johnson, a College of Communications senior.

Depending on Miranda's final award, the Free Press may have to consider declaring bankruptcy. The company has about \$140,000 in cash.

The Free Press is owned by Back Bay Publishing Company, a nonprofit corporation run by Boston University students.

Free Press attorney Mike Field said \$100,000 for emotional damages is excessive and that he will ask the judge to lower the award.

"We think the emotional damages are not justified by the evidence," he said.

few tips on how to admit your illness and take steps towards curing "procrastinitis" and obtaining stress-free nights.

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
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
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
