

A & M College of Kentucky, Jan. 6th, 1905.

The faculty met in the President's office at 3.30 P.M. those present being Pres. Patterson, Messrs. White, W.K. Patterson, Kastle, Pryor, Anderson, Mathews, Miller, Pence, Brooks, MacKenzie and Norwood.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Prof. J.C. White, of the com. upon college newspapers reported that his com. had endeavored to effect a union of the interests of the two parties desiring to conduct college newspapers, but that this effort had been unsuccessful and the two parties, it was assumed, were intending to conduct separate papers.

Upon motion of Prof. Brooks, seconded by Prof. Miller, it was ordered that the report be accepted and the com. discharged.

Upon inquiry it was learned that the officers of these papers had not complied with the laws requiring submission of all their proof to the professor of English for his approval, and the secretary of the faculty was directed to call the attention of the managers of these papers to this omission, and the necessity of complying with the regulations upon this subject. (this order has been carried out by the secretary.)

A letter to Pres. Patterson from Prof. Hayes of Miami University was read, calling attention to the proposed intercollegiate oratorical contest between State Universities, and urging the cooperation of this institution. After some discussion, it was ordered upon motion of Prof. Kastle, seconded by Prof. Pryor that it be left to the student body to determine whether they will send a representative to the contest this year.

Prof. Anderson reported that Ernest Lyle a former student of his department, who had failed by several studies of completion of the course, now desires to make up these studies "in absentia". Upon motion of Prof. Anderson, seconded by Prof. Kastle, it was ordered that Mr. Lyle be permitted to make up his deficiencies as desired, and that upon its completion, and after passing examinations upon the same, and presenting a satisfactory thesis, he be eligible for receiving the B. E. degree.

Prof. MacKenzie called attention of the need of an early preparation of the catalogue, and upon motion of Prof. Patterson, it was ordered that Prof. Neville be appointed chairman of the com. for this purpose, with power to call upon such members of the faculty as he may desire for assistance.

After some discussion of the merits and demerits of the monthly dances in the gymnasium, the meeting adjourned.
