

NEWS OF FORMER COLLEAGUE

Susan Csaky, formerly of Government Documents, was invited to record on a one-hour cassette her "How to Use Government Documents in Legal Research," by Condyne/Trans Media. It was advertised in the November 1979 issue of Documents to the People. This is one of five studies in "Audio Research in the Law".

APPLIED ANTHROPOLOGY DOCUMENTATION PROJECT

An initial collection of hard-to-obtain papers, articles, and pamphlets on applied anthropology was deposited in Special Collections last year by Dr. John van Willigen (Anthropology Department). This rapidly expanding collection marks the beginning of the first Applied Anthropology Archives in the country. All the material is being cataloged on-line for

national information. A simple accession number is the only classification necessary since the papers are filed in acid free folders in filing cabinets located in a non-public area. Cards in the public catalog will have (in the call number space) an asterisk and under that: aal, aa2, aa3, etc., etc. The aa stands for Anthropology Archives.
