Board for the last four years. It has given me a lot of satisfaction to see our progress over the last four years. PRIDE WRAP UP

The Royal Sovereign Court of All Kentucky once again kicked off Pride Month with a wonderfully sparkling Coronation. AIDS Medication Fund, and the YMCA Spouse Abuse Center.

ACTOR'S GUILD

If you missed Actor's Guild's incredible production of *Angels in America* (part one), don't think you can't see, *Angels in America: Perestroika* (part two). It will be running from July 10th through July 27th and is likely to be another outstanding production. Even though part two is a continuation of the story, it also stands on its own as a fascinating look at the politics, emotions, and spirituality surrounding the AIDS crisis in the Reagan-Bush years

These plays, written by Tony Kushner, have won every award for which they were eligible, including the Tony Award and the Pulitzer Prize. The acting in this Lexington production was impressive. Billy Breed stars as Prior, a gay man afflicted with AIDS, who learns at the end of part one, that he is to become the prophet of a new age in America.

Joe Gatton stars as Roy Cohn, a "character" and also a historical figure. who was a powerful, conservative, Jewish, homophobic, Washington lawyer...and closeted gay man (Do we want to claim him?) who died of AIDS. Gatton does a powerful job in portraying this "larger than life" figure. There are other fine performances by Kwana Smith, Tom Phillips and Laurie Genet.

I wondered how the small stage at Actor's Guild would "hold" this play. Not only does it hold it, the set, designed by Tom Burch, is wonderfully innovative and adds to the complex emotional flow of the play.

Vic Chaney, the artistic manager of Actor's Guild, directs both part 1 and part 2 and deserves congratulations for being willing to take on such an ambitious production and for doing such an outstanding job.

FAIRNESS RALLY IT'S ALL ABOUT FAMILY

Mark your calenders for August 19th. On this Tuesday, at 1:00 P.M. the Lexington Fairness Campaign is planning to rally in Frankfort to focus on the bill introduced by Senator Tim Philpot

Senator Philpot has declared August as "Family Values Month" at the state capitol. He is also the co-chair of the Senate Judiciary Committee which will be meeting on August 19, at 1:00 P.M. It seems only fitting that our family should pay him a visit.

Philpot has been working against the LBGT Community since his election to the Ky. Congress. He has recently introduced a bill excluding gays and lesbians from coverage under the domestic violence laws. If his bill becomes law, gays and lesbians could not get a restraining order against an abusive partner. Philpot says it would be unfair to **us** to allow us to get restraining orders because "aberrant forms of violent behavior...seem to be more accepted in the homosexual community."

Philpot also said he was open to hearing from the gay community. Let's go express our opinion! Please join the Lexington Fairness Campaign, your local chapter of the Ky. Dear Gertie Mae Noe,

I am forwarding to you, along with this letter, a copy of an article from the WALL STREET JOURNAL which discusses how, since AIDS treatments have improved, people around the country feel that the battle is won, and that they may no longer need to give to AIDS charities. Can you help spread the word that there is no CURE for AIDS and the money and support given in the past is needed as much NOW, IF NOT MORE than ever before.

Dear Worried,

I read that article, and it is truly sad to think that people are cutting down on their contributions to AIDS Charities. The article points out that AIDS is STILL the LEADING CAUSE OF DEATH in the United States for people between the ages of 25 to 44---EVEN WITH THE IMPROVED TREATMENTS. Even with these improved treatments, it is my very firm belief that MORE money is needed: NOT LESS! Our community efforts to raise money need to doubled and RE-doubled, and the spending of those funds needs to be made more efficient. AIDS has produced a large bureaucracy with not enough controls.

But, let's think about the need for more money for just a moment. With the new drugs and improved therapies, some people(the new drugs and therapies do NOT work with everyone who has AIDS) are living longer and better quality lives. So, logic tells us that with more people living longer lives, the need is proportionate to the number of people living with AIDS---not dying from it.

And, just as important, we need to remember that these new drugs and therapies are TREMENDOUSLY EXPENSIVE. Not all states are helping to pay for them and our state is only helping with the funds to supply the drugs to a very limited number of people with AIDS. I am sure there are people out there living with AIDS right here in our fair city who cannot get the help they need.

This IS a hint folks... It would be so nice if we could have enough money in the *Health Dept AIDS Medication Fund* to pay for any and every one who needs help...wouldn't it? That's just my pipe dream now, but Gertie hopes and prays that some day in the future ALL NEEDS WILL BE MET. Got a few extra dollars or some time to spare? CALL AVOL. *TOGETHER WE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE!* Remember----Gertie Mae loves you...ALL.Hugs and Kisses!

Family Camping

CAMP CAMP

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There is a new contender for your vacation dollar; *Camp Camp* is described by director Bill Cole as "a getaway for gays and lesbians to relax and have fun." Opening this summer in Kezar Falls, Maine, the nation's first organized camping experience for gay and lesbian folk is offering two week long sessions from Aug 24-30 and Aug 31-Sept. 6.

A mixture of individual and group activities will be offered including aerobics, canoeing, dancing, hiking, biking, music, painting, sailing, tennis, swimming, theater, yoga, meditation, discussion groups, and more. The camp, a scenic secluded property featuring rustic cabins is located 45 minutes northwest of Portland, Maine. Nestled between two lakes, the camp has over 4,500 feet of shore front with two sand beaches.

Home cooked meals will be served and accommodations can be made for special dietary requirements. Wine and beer will be available at some meals. Other alcohol and non-prescription drugs are forbidden. With the exception of one designated spot, the camp is a non-smoking facility.

Singles, partners, or groups are invited to stay in clusters of cabins, each containing bunk beds and bathrooms, shared by groups of eight to twelve men or six to eight women.

The fee for each week long session is \$800 and includes lodging, meals, and activities. A \$150 deposit is due with registration; with the balance due August 15. For someone use to a lesbian camping experience, this definitely sounds upscale.

CAMP DYKE

Every August since 1976, thousands of womyn, gay and straight, from all around the world gather in the woods of Michigan to experience and celebrate lesbian culture. The *Michigan Woman's Music Festival* draws many of us back year after year to an experience like no other.

The Land is a 650 acre of woodland, forest and meadows, owned by the producers and used only for this festival once a year. We camp in personal tents, RV;s, or large community tents. There is always outstanding music with three stages that run consecutively from noon until midnight.

This year we will be entertained by Chris Williamson and Tret Fure Holly Near and Ronnie Gilbert, Three of Hearts (Liz Story, Barbara Higbie, and Margie Adam), Ulali. Swagi Taiko, Toshi Reagon, Lea DeLaria's Jazz and our own Reel World String Band...

There is also dance (as in lessons, performances, and parties), theater, and comedy, as well as shopping (Can you imagine a lesbian mall?), over a hundred workshops, film, and sports activities. I am particularly looking forward to two dance performances this year by Dance Brigade and the Mercy Sidbury Dances. Theater this year is The Five Lesbian Brothers in "Brides of the Moon."

Michigan is an experiment in cooperative living as well as a performing arts festival. It is a temporary city with medical facilities, emotional support, sober support, childcare, an after hours cafe, spiritual networking, and more. Each participant is asked to do two four hour work shifts (unless you come only for the weekend and then you do one). This enables the producers to keep the price lower than most festivals and is a great way to feel a part of the cooperative effort that makes Michigan special.

There is networking space for Young Womyn, Over-40's, Jewish Womyn, Deaf and HOH Womyn, Womyn from Other Countries, and Womyn of Color.. Three vegetarian meals are prepared each day and there are places to buy hot coffee, ice cream, and snacks. Many people take some food of their own..

Disabled womyn's resources are organized through DART. There is special camping, vans, and Helping Hands for those womyn who need assistance due to temporary or permanent disability or age. Sign language interpretation is available at all performances and at workshops, if requested.

Some people are wary of *Michigan* but for me it is like going home. It is not without its controversial aspects, but lesbian culture should always have an edge to it.. Two of the policies I personally protest is the exclusion of post operative transsexuals and the requirement that boys over age three stay at Brother Sun Camp which is close to the RV section. With the number of lesbians having boy children, this age limit may soon change.

The cost of 6 days at *Michigan* is sliding scale \$250-\$290 in advance, that is before July 19th. Prices are decreased each day. It costs more at the gate. If not this year, some time in your life you owe it to yourself to experience *Michigan*. It is an adventure, an awakening to new possibilities, a celebration of lesbian life. I have taken my daughter and in the future I hope to take daughters-in-law and granddaughters. Come on along-experience Camp Dyke!






