Report: faculty salaries rose nationwide

Income: Survey shows a 3.8 percent gain last year; outlook for future not so rosy

In pay hext year.

The American Association
of University Professors surveyed more than 1,400 public
and private, two- and four-year

salary rose.

Average faculty pay at private institutions to calculate average pay for full-time faculty. They included lecturers to full professors.

The report found that among schools surveyed, faculty salaries rose an average of 3.8 percent this school year over the 2000-01 academic year.

Adjusted for inflation, the half was the fifth year in the roveyed, the lowest average pay for full professors was \$84,800 at 100 to 1

Southern Adventist University in Collegedale, Tenn. The high rest average was \$144,700 for full professors at Harvard. Looking only at public universities, which employ about 70 percent of U.S. full-time faculty, the lowest average salary for a full professor was \$41,800 at Mayville State University in North Dakoto.

Best paid were full professors at the University of California, Berkeley, earning \$115,900 on average, the survey found.

The results largely reflect Southern Adventist University in Collegedale Tenn. The higher is average was \$144,700 for full professors at Harvard.

WaSHINGTON — The Internal Revenue
Service mistakenly paid out more than \$30 million to tax filers seeking nonexistent slavery tax
credits in 2000 and 2001. according to a Treasury
Department investigation. A growing number of
black taxpayers are being misled by scams falselly claiming that, for a fee, they can get tax redtis or refunds as reparations for slavery. The
scams are given credence when some taxpayers
actually get money. The IRS received more than
7,000 tax returns last year claiming \$2.7 billion
in reparations, up from 13,000 the year before.

UK health center officials resign following review

Ultimatum: Dean of College of Medicine said committee's review found deficiencies

HAZARD, Ky. — The top two officials of a University of Kentucky health center resigned after a review of the nationally recognized center

recognized center.

Loyd Kepferle, who had been head of UK's Center for Rural Health since 1988, resigned effective immediately, as did his deputy director, Karen Main.

"Id rather not discuss it," Kepferle said Friday when asked about his sudden departure.

The center, based in Hazard, was established in 1990 to improve health care in rural parts of the state. The center has developed grassroots health care programs that have been modeled across the nation.

Main who has worked at the center since 1991, said she was

across the nation.

Main, who has worked at the center since 1991, said she was surprised when she and her boss were told to resign or be fired.

"All of our programs, everybody admits, are just spectacular," Main said.

Dr. Emery Wilson, dean of the UK College of Medicine, said the review, done by a committee of university staff and faculty, found some deficiencies with communications and an inconsistent outlook.

The review committee recommended that the center seek federal grants to help fund the residency program.

Wilson said the center already has launched a nationwide search for the next director. Meanwhile, Judy Jones, director of the Kentucky State Office of Rural Health, will serve as interim director.

"In general, I would say the review shows that the programs at the Center for Rural Health have been excellent." Wilson said.

"We have had a number of programs that established a national presence and became models for rural health care nationally. I would fully expect all of the current programs to continue, and we want to build on them."

The National Rural Health Association recognized the center last year as the best in the nation and as a health care initiative that uses lay health workers.







Building over lots hinders commuters

UK is tentatively discussing proposals to move the Colleges of Business and Economics and Law "closer to downtown"—more specifically, to the parking lots currently hosting resident parking for North Campus behind Memorial Coliseum. The reasons given for this move include a need for increased space (B&E is the second fastest-growing college at UK) as well as the increased collaboration among the university, downtown businesses and law firms to all be at the center of Lexington.

The need for space cannot be argued — it's a fairly common theme that most departments across campus are singing. But will a move a block up and half a block over actually be more attractive to downtown professionals?

Administrators said that the decrease in driving distance would prove nigh-irresistible to lawyers considering collaboration with the College of Law. But, is it that much harder to drive down Limestone opposed to Maxwell Street? Somehow this seems doubtful.

There's another issue at stake here as well. And it's one that touches most students


