## BACK IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Sometimes it takes a while to get used to a new leader. For some Kentucky fans, it's taken six seasons to admit that Tubby Smith shouldn't be run out of town.

Cat fans are a rare breed. Until this year's team solidified itself as a national power, skeptics questioned Smith's ability to coach their beloved Wildcats.

Before the season started, one fan on a local radio show said he would be disappointed even if the Cats won the national title this year out of fear that he would "get stuck with Tubby for at least a few more years."

Clearly there is a fine line between a Cat fan and a fanatic.

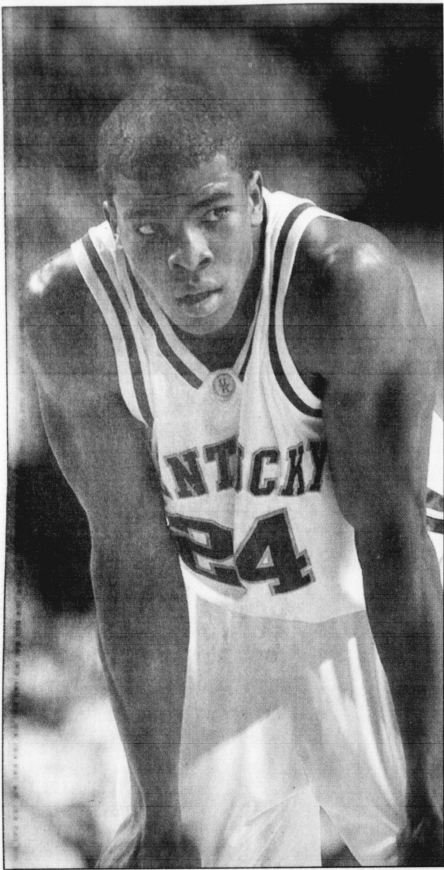
Since the 1999 season, Cats fans have struggled to accept Smith.

Tubby isn't Rick Pitino, his teams don't run the full-court press like Pitino's and they rarely score 90-plus

points.

Fans didn't like the way he coached the players on or off the court. They didn't like the new defensive system he instituted, and they didn't like it when he shook things up the last few years, demanding discipline from his players by any means necessary—even dismissal.

Dick Vitale nailed it when he addressed the crowd at halftime of the Georgia game, saying Lexington had some of the best basketball fans in the country, but "they can be a little overzealous at times." He was referring to all the criticism Smith has received since winning the national championship in his first year.

Dicky V. calls the UK job a pressure cooker, and he is right. All Tubby has done since he has been here is win one national championship and at least 20 games per season. Cat fans act like national titles should come every other year, and Final Fours should come every year.

But Tubby has remained calm and classy.

Not to say their criticism was completely off base. Let's face it, the 1999 and 2000 seasons weren't Smith's best work. He had a short bench and the Cats weren't shooting well.

Even throughout the last few mediocre years, Tubby's teams played consistently good defense. It wasn't the full court press, but they kept the final scores low, even when they lost.

It just took him a few years to produce a team that played noticeably good defense, the kind that sparks 18-game winning streaks.

Many Cat fans criticized Tubby for allowing the mass exodus of players in the off-season, but it was actually fantastic personnel coaching. He's got players that aren't as interested in scor-

ing 20 points per game as they are in winning a national championship, which is what every Cat fan wants.

Tubby doesn't recruit players that rack up enough stats in their first two seasons to leave. He recruits guys who will give him the best chance of winning a national title.

As for the superstar players that Tubby doesn't have, or appear to be bringing in next year—who needs them? I'd take a player like Chuck Hayes, Erik Daniels or Gerald Fitch over a Rashaad Carruth or Jason Parker any day of the week. Tubby's recruits are team players.

But there's a reason why the crowd was chanting "Tubby! Tubby!" in the final minutes against Tennessee Feb. 26.

Tubby is a great defensive coach. He is on pace to earn national coach of the year honors for the second time in six seasons at UK. He has quietly taken four UK teams to at least the Sweet 16.

His career winning percentage is 72 percent, compared to Pitino's 73 percent, and he has won the same number of national championships. Tubby's teams also run a defense that is as dominating, if not more dominating than Pitino's UK teams.

Tubby might just end up being as good a coach as Pitino too, but I doubt it will be at UK. After all, he's been courted by the NBA every year since he has been in Lexington, and there's only so much pressure cooking a person can take.

Which brings me to the 2004 presidential election. I'll give you a hint at whose ticket I'm riding: he's not on the ballot, and his name is Orlando.

There, I said it. Now all you Wildcat fanatics can run me out of town, too.

# SEC'S balance could produce upsets in tourney

## EAST



### KENTUCKY

The Cats dominated the conference this season, finishing undefeated and winning their 42nd SEC Championship. Tabby Smith's team picked itself up after a disappointing loss to Louisiana and began playing with a stronger defense, allowing its offense to fall into place. It will come as no surprise if the Cats, led by senior Keith Bogans, make a deep run in the tournament.

### FLORIDA

Florida was a contender for the eastern division title throughout the season, but late season losses to Georgia and Kentucky put them out of the hunt for good. The tournament should give Billy Donovan and his Gators a chance to redeem themselves. With revenge on their mind, the Gators are a true threat to the SEC's elite.

### GEORGIA

The Bulldogs came into the season strong with leadership from senior Ezra Williams and junior Jarvis Hayes. Despite recent disappointments, Jim Herrick Sr. and Jim Herrick Jr. of rotating NCAA rules, the Dawgs have been able to keep their composure and pulled off an end-of-the-season upset win over No. 3 Florida. ### TENNESSEE

### S. CAROLINA

### OLE MISS

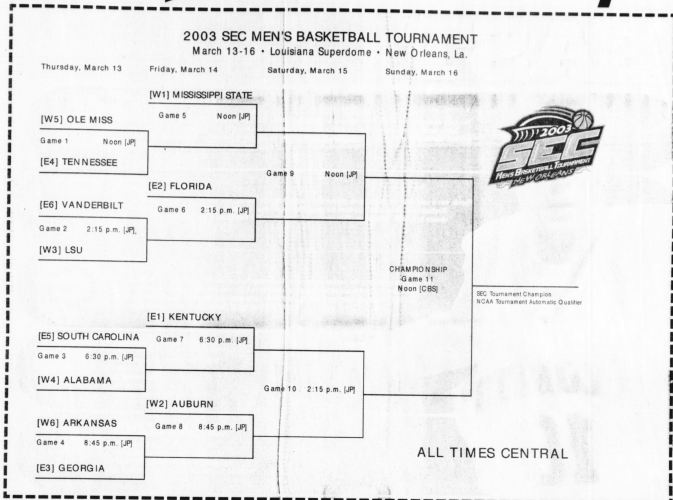

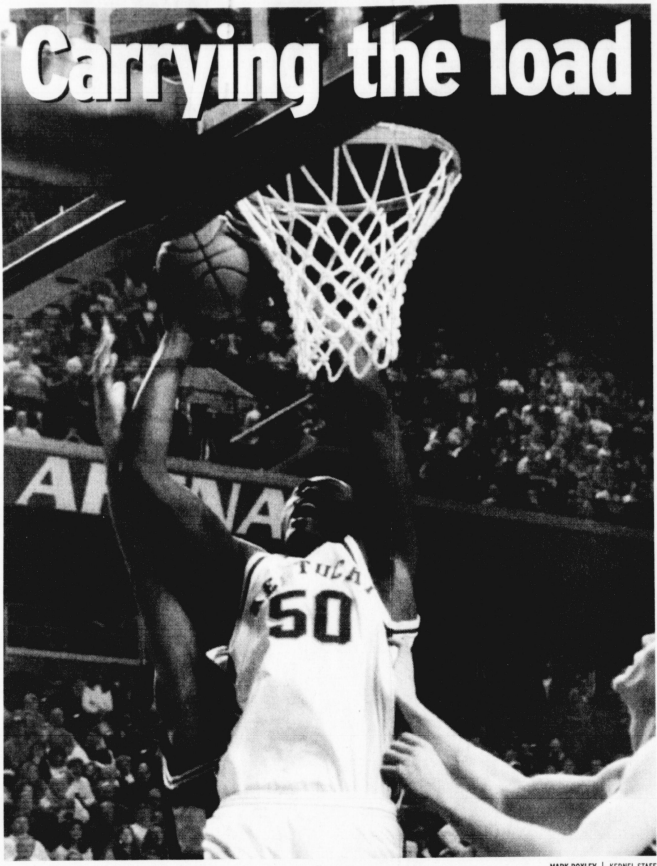

### Homegrown hero

Marquis Estill went almost unnoticed as a college basketball recruit. If not for UK coach Tubby Smith catching one of the center's high school games on television, Estill might have played somewhere else.

Instead, the 6-foot-9 center from Richmond stayed near home to play for the Cats. After leading Madison Central High School to the state title game, Estill arrived at UK as an academic partial qualifier. Because he did not meet NCAA academic requirements for incoming freshmen he had to sit out his freshman season.

Estill's career at UK has never been easy. He became a father more than a year ago and is burdened with the stereotypes of being a partial qualifier.

But Estill is intent on accomplishing more than just playing in the NBA: He wants to lead UK to the Final Four and graduate also.

### Daddy's got game

UK center keeps focus on academics, family, basketball season despite his NBA dreams and the intense pressures of all four

Marquis Estill's strong, broad shoulders are perfect for posting up Southeastern Conference post defenders and carrying his teammates and family on his back.

But as physically imposing and strong-willed as the 6-foot-9 University of Kentucky center is, the pressures to return to school next year get tiresome.

Estill grew up as the man of his mother's house in Richmond, less than 30 minutes from UK's campus. But he prides his childhood. Estill said his mother, Tanya, was always there for him even if his father wasn't, and he and his two siblings had everything they always needed.

Playing basketball in the spotlight that is the University of Kentucky has not made concentrating on his work — both academically and athletically — easy, but it has allowed Estill to stay close to his family. Three years into his UK career, Estill's family grew with the birth of his daughter, Jaylani. With new responsibilities, the pressure also grew.

"It's been kind of tough going through school, having a daughter and taking care of her and being on the road and missing classes," he said. "But I had a pretty good life growing up and I wouldn't change it for the world. Now, I'm looking to give my daughter things that I never had so she can grow up even better than I did."

Trying to graduate on time as an NCAA partial qualifier and preparing for the NBA, while still leading the No. 2 Cats into the NCAA Tournament makes his daily life even more hectic.

Few college athletes have as much to keep them busy as Estill.

### Degree will not guarantee return

When fans aren't talking up the Cats and their 20-game winning streak on the radio call-in shows, they are begging for Estill's answer.

Will he be back next year? It depends, but it doesn't depend on him graduating, says UK coach Tubby Smith.

Smith said Estill will earn his degree regardless of whether or not he gains an extra year of eligibility, but the center's NBA Draft status might delay the date.

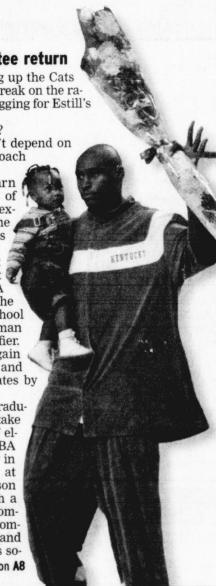
Estill signed to play at UK in the spring of 1999, but without the adequate NCAA entrance requirements the Madison Central High School star had to sit out his freshman season as a partial qualifier. Now a senior, Estill could regain the lost year of eligibility and play next year if he graduates by August.

Smith expects Estill to graduate even if he chooses not to take advantage of a fourth year of eligibility and enter the NBA Draft. Every four-year player in Smith's previous five years at UK has graduated. Smith's son Saul graduated in 2001 with a degree in finance and economics. J.P. Blevins earned his communications degree and Tayshawn Prince earned his so-

**Gaining respect: Former unknown high schooler finds niche with second-ranked Cats**

Erik Daniels wasn't a high school All-American.

He didn't play in front of a dozen college scouts every game.

He didn't even earn a varsity letter until his junior year at Princeton High School in Cincinnati, Ohio.

But all that matters to Daniels is where he is now.

Daniels has won the affection of many Big Blue fans this season with his heady play and throwback "old-school" style on the court.

A little-used reserve as a freshman, Daniels spent last season stuck behind All-American Tayshaun Prince. But this year, the 6-foot-8, 214 pound lefty has found his niche this season in the starting lineup for the Cats.

Daniels' presence in the lineup gave UK a spark offensively and defensively, averaging 10 points and 5.2 rebounds per game.

Daniels' numbers appear modest by many standards. But his flashy, yet efficient, passing and his knack for easy baskets create countless opportunities for himself and his teammates.

"He's turned himself into an all-around player," said his roommate Gerald Fitch. "His passing ability, the way he can get rebounds and score — it's a major factor for us."

Daniels describes himself as a "late bloomer." He flew under the recruiting radar screen for most of his high school career. Only after a nine-inch growth spurt in high school and a good showing at bas-

ketball camps the summer before his senior season did Daniels catch the eye of many coaches.

Daniels admits he never envisioned himself being in the position he is in now.

"I really didn't see myself playing college basketball," he said. "I just played to have fun because all my friends played."

Daniels realized his services were welcomed at the college level when coach Tubby Smith was in attendance at his high school senior night. Also in the gymnasium was legendary Temple coach John Chaney.

Daniels said he chose UK over Clemson, Michigan and Temple because, "It was a better fit for me and my style of basketball. I liked Coach and got along with him really well."

Daniels may not have figured to play college ball because of his family's football lineage. Though Daniels did not play football in high school, he recalls playing quarterback with his family when he was young and listening to his family's football stories.

His father, David, played quarterback at Indiana State and two of his uncles played college football, including his uncle Darryl, who starred at quarterback for Michigan in the Wolverines' 1988 Rose Bowl victory.

Now that Daniels is enjoying his newfound success on the hardwood, he realizes what may not have been. His well-documented arrest with Fitch for using a fake ID at a bar in Lexington did not help his cause last season.

His four-game suspension this season for playing in an unsanctioned summer league in Cincinnati could have spelled more trouble had he not learned from his mistakes.

"I've learned a lot," Daniels said of his mishaps. "You have to live and learn. Sometimes you have to make mistakes to learn from them."

It appears Daniels took that lesson to heart. He knew he had the potential; all it took was an opportunity.

"I was very patient my first couple years here," Daniels said. "I just knew I had an opportunity to come out here and play and show everybody what I can do."

Smith saw something in Daniels that he knew would fit his system.

"He has great basketball IQ," Smith said. "He can see things and create opportunities for people. That's just instinct."

UK fans criticized Smith for recruiting unheralded players like Daniels. But Daniels reciprocated Smith's sentiments for him and hushed the critics.

"It always drives me," Daniels said of being overlooked. "I always want to show people up because some people don't think I should have made it. I just want to prove them wrong."

Daniels' vast improvement can be linked to a bigger opportunity.

"He's really stepped up his game this season and is really working hard," Cliff Hawkins said. "His confidence is sky-high now, and he is really showing what he can do."

Even if he was an afterthought coming out of high school.

cial work degree in 2002. Senior Jules Camara graduated last December with an economics degree, and Smith expects seniors Keith Bogans and Estill to graduate shortly.

"Keith and Marquis are both so close that they will graduate," Smith said. "Even if they don't get done this year, they will come back."

"It's one of the toughest things he's ever had to do, but maybe not as tough as watching his teammates play."

"It was kind of rough for me to sit on the bench and only practice, but I think it was good for me to get my legs healthy and sit out one year," Estill said.

Indeed, when Estill arrived at UK he weighed approximately 300 pounds and his knees suffered from the excess weight. He underwent successful surgery on his left knee before the 1999-2000 season and by October 2000 had dropped about 50 pounds.

The 6-foot-9 236-pound senior did not get his knees completely healthy until last summer when he dedicated himself to conditioning.

All the while, Estill was focused on gaining back his lost year of eligibility by earning his degree in agricultural administration in four years. But not without the dreams of NBA fortune in sight.

Smith said Estill is on schedule to graduate in August, but Estill will still explore all his options before returning to UK.

"He probably will (play in the pre-draft NBA camps)," Smith said. "And I will probably recommend that, given his status. If there is anybody who should do that, it would be Marquis."

NCAA rules allow underclassmen to play in the pre-draft camps to weigh their NBA stock before deciding whether to turn pro or not. Even though Estill is a senior, the same rules apply to him because he can gain an extra year of eligibility.

"I think it would be good for me to keep my options open," Estill said. "But I'm still going to work hard in school to keep the opportunity open to return."

"I don't think I've been under any pressure or anything. I'm not really worried about it. Random people come up to me and congratulate me and tell me I need to come back for one more year. I'm working really hard on (graduating) and it's something I'm trying to do — that I need to do and I'd like to do."

In less than four years, Estill has evolved from a partial qualifier and almost unnoticed

recruit to NBA prospect and soon-to-be graduate.

## Stereotypes and misunderstandings

That's the unfortunate misunderstanding. Fans and critics only see how hard Estill works on the basketball court and don't realize how hard he works in the classroom.

Smith said Estill's partial-qualifier status still sticks with the student-athlete's public image.

"I have the utmost respect for Marquis," he said. "When you come in and you put that stereotype or moniker on somebody, it's always tough to deal with."

"Athletes are publicized enough and to label him negatively because he's had some shortcomings academically — that's something, as the NCAA, that we need to address," said Smith, who is a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

Estill says he doesn't worry about people who fall to get to know him. He admits the daily updates and inquiries regarding his decision to return or not get tiresome.

"Just because you don't qualify on a test, or whatever, doesn't mean you're not smart or you're not capable of doing the course work," said Estill, who did not meet the minimum requirement on his entrance exam. "I've been doing well ever since I've been in college."

Cliff Hawkins knows a little bit about the public's perception of student-athletes. The junior point guard was academically ineligible during the fall semester.

Hawkins admits his ineligibility was his fault for falling behind in the classroom, but he empathizes with his teammate.

"It's different circumstances in every situation," he said, "but to not know his situation and to label him is unfair."

"So I hope he comes back and finishes school to prove to everyone what he's capable of."

## Family matters

The guaranteed money of the NBA would be difficult to pass up for Estill, who has his daughter and his extended family to look out for.

His NBA Draft status is questionable, but he has vocally made it known in the SEC that he has no equal. When the Cats hosted Mississippi State and Bulldog All-American Mario Austin on Feb. 23, Estill said, "I think I'm the best post man in the league. He probably thinks he is."

Estill scored 10 points and grabbed eight rebounds in the match

up. Austin scored 20, but 18 came in the second half with his Bulldogs playing catch up. UK won 70-62. Three days later, UK got the best of Tennessee even if Estill didn't outshine Vol big man Ron Slay. Slay had 22 points and 14 rebounds while Estill had his solid 10 and 9, but the Cats held Slay to seven second-half points and won 80-68.

Don't question Estill's defense, either. "Have you seen my guy score on me?" the confident center asked reporters two weeks ago.

It's not very often that Estill gets beat man-to-man by his opponent, but it's his offensive proficiency that makes him a potential NBA prospect. He is UK's career leader in field-goal percentage at almost 60 percent.

His credentials could warrant a late first round or second round draft pick.

Ultimately, his decision will come down to what's smartest for himself and his family. "(The NBA) is what I think about every day," Estill said. "Hopefully I can make it to the league so my daughter won't have any worries."

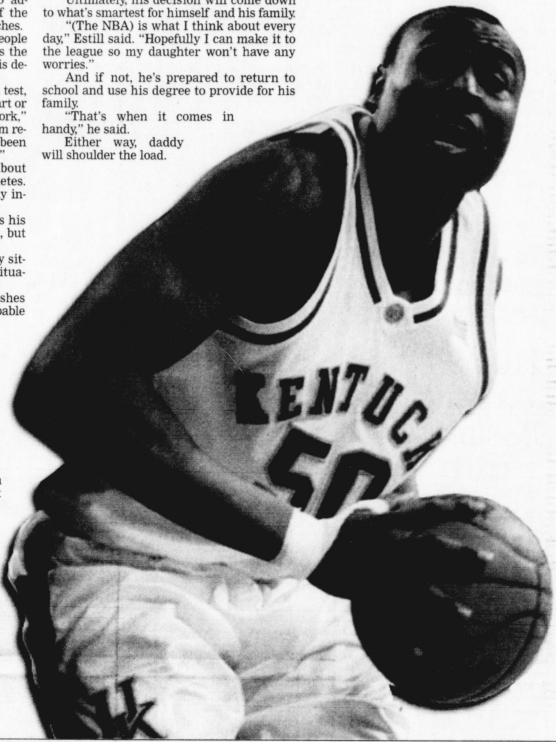
And if not, he's prepared to return to school and use his degree to provide for his family.

"That's when it comes in handy," he said. "Either way, daddy will shoulder the load."

## 'Quis

Marquis Estill has become a low-post force for the Cats in his third season. He dedicated himself to proper conditioning last summer in order to keep his injury-prone knees healthy. Estill hasn't missed a practice all season and hasn't missed many shots in his entire career. At almost 60 percent for his career, Estill will finish his UK career as the school's all-time leader in field goal percentage.

## LCC officials to push for space, funding

**Dollars:** Board members plan to ask UK's president to help finance new building, alleviate overcrowding

LCC officials say they plan to take a more active role in help tackle space and funding issues at the college. At its quarterly meeting Friday, the LCC Advisory Board discussed plans to

seek assistance and promote the school's accomplishments and mission at university, city and state levels. The board has representatives from areas including Central Baptist Hospital, Kentucky State University, Kentucky Educational Television and LCC faculty.

To overcome space and funding limitations, LCC will need to embrace its underdog role when promoting the school, said board member Bill Wilson, the deputy executive director of outreach and education at KET. "We can't be tall, but we can be fast," he said. The board would like to meet with UK President Lee Todd to discuss what LCC needs help with. The board

voted to arrange the meeting with Todd before June 6, the date of the next Advisory Board meeting. LCC has been dealing with a record number of students and a weak budget this year. According to preliminary data, LCC's enrollment rose 7 percent this semester, and enrollment is up 35 percent from five years ago. Because of a lack of funds, no new space has

been added to the Cooper Drive campus. With a cut in state higher education funding likely to come soon, UK will have its own budget concerns, meaning LCC's space woes could continue. LCC is independent from the Kentucky Community and Technical College System, which means it does not receive funds allotted to the 62 schools included in

that program. Instead, it receives much of its funding, especially for construction, from UK. LCC President Jim Kerley said the board members should take a straight-forward approach if they meet with Todd. "We need to be honest about our needs," he said in reference to the need for a

## Thefts raise questions of security

**Case:** Possible meth lab yet to yield arrests

Four days after a professor said he caught a man stealing chemicals from the Chemistry and Physics Building — an action linked to the bust of what police call one of the largest methamphetamine labs in Kentucky — Kentucky State Police and UK Police still haven't arrested a suspect, and security has yet to change in the building.

"Something has to change," said Arthur Cammers, the chemistry professor who said he caught the man in his lab Wednesday. "We can't have people walking in here doing research as well as stealing supplies for their drug labs."

According to Cammers, he was about to leave Chem-Phys Wednesday night but noticed the refrigerator door open in his third-floor laboratory. Upon inspection, he noticed a man behind the door. After a heated discussion, the man exited the building and left his duffel bag, which contained some of Cammers' chemicals as well as notebooks, burglary tools, lab equipment, a UK directory and instructions on the synthesis of ecstasy.

The following night, state and UK police searched a suspect's home and said they found a methamphetamine and ecstasy lab and stolen items from UK.

No arrests have been made. "Usually, the initial investigation (of a case) takes a day," said Sgt. Greg Hall, a UK Police detective. "This one could take weeks or months."

This is the third burglary in the chemistry department since January 2002.

Boyd Haley, head of the chemistry department, said security improvements are needed. "If someone wants to get in, they will," he said. "It's an old building with lots of doors."

Haley said changing the security is not his decision. After the earlier two break-ins, UK detectives met with him about security issues.

Professors and grad students have access to the building at night. A computer security system controls the doors. Chemicals are not usually locked up because they are frequently used. "It would take so much work to always lock them up," Haley said.

Also, the labs aren't confined to one floor; so increased security would mean a re-vamping of the building.

Chem-Phys was constructed in 1962. Haley said balancing security with the flexibility needed for students to use it freely isn't possible with the current building. "It's used as a classroom building as much as a chemistry laboratory," he said. "When that building was built, we didn't have the problems we do today."

## Business feeds grad's fish addiction

Tucked away in a small stone house just south of campus lies an ichthyophile's wet dream: a place for all things aquatic.

Recently opened by a UK biology graduate, Just Fish bills itself as "a place for all fin addicts." But the sign is superfluous to anyone who steps through the front door. A large tank filled with rocks and fish dominates the small front room; a large watercolor of a fish hangs above a stone fireplace; fish plates and fish pillows complete the piscine motif.

The store, which opened in August on Rosemont Garden, is "moving right along," said Tony Roberts, the store's owner. "We haven't done any advertising, it's all just word of mouth. But Lexington was starved for a quality fish store."

The store has about 2,000 gallons of display area, but it's still growing, Roberts said. "Eventually, I want to have 5,000 gallons of display area and 5,000 gallons of breeding area," he said.

Financial constraints, however, have slowed his plans. "It takes a surprisingly large amount

of money to establish a large collection," Roberts said. "This just takes a while to develop."

His collection of fish was threatened during the recent ice storm.

Though he suffered some losses, Roberts said that visitors "wouldn't be able to tell."

"I was in here bubbling pure oxygen into their tanks ... so most of them pulled through," he said. "The temperature only got down to 72 degrees."

Tanks filled with fish of every variety and hue, stacked two or three deep, crowd a large back room; a beagle named Banjo wanders sleepily about. Silver and black angelfish flash and dart through one tank, while large, bubous goldfish drift through another.

The fish here are from all areas of the world," Roberts said. "Africa, Central and South America; all over Southeast Asia, India and China."

Roberts also specializes in rare and newly discovered fish. "My cichlids come from Lake Tanganyika in Africa, the world's seventh largest

## Four students vie for seat on UK board

**Leader:** Candidates have three days to prepare and campaign for election

Four students have filed to run in this week's special election for the student seat on the Board of Trustees.

The candidates are Corey Fannin, a psychology senior; Mary Gaunter, a social work senior; Ben Hayes, a history senior; and Joe Ruschell, a mathematical economics junior.

SG President Mary Katherine Thompson has said the student trustee is crucial because issues that the board will soon discuss include possible student fee and tuition increases. The board's next meeting is March 18.

Elections for the seat, which was left open when Tim Robinson resigned as SG president, will be held online March 12 through March 14. State law requires the trustee to be elected, so Thompson cannot automatically fill the seat. Thompson is not among the candidates.

Fannin said he is running primarily to oppose the student fee and tuition increases. He said he thinks UK should look other places first to cut money from its budget.

Fannin said he considers himself unbiased. "I have no political aspirations outside of this," he said. "I think that I have the best interests of the students in mind."

Gaunter said she's running because she is "very interested in the university and the goings-on" in the administration. She said she is opposed to fee and tuition increases.

Gaunter said that her experience doing community service and helping with decision-making processes on social work committees would help her if she were on the board.

Hayes said he would be opposed to fee and tuition increases, but that tuition may have to go up if the board can't find other ways to raise revenue.

Hayes has other issues he would raise with the board. "I think there should be more oversight of SG," he said.

Ruschell, SG vice president, said he is running because students should have representation on the board "at all times."

Ruschell said that he would oppose a tuition increase, but he hasn't yet considered all the fee increases that will come before the board.

## Robinson fined for voter interference

Former Student Government President Tim Robinson was sentenced in Fayette Circuit Court Friday for interfering with voter registration, a misdemeanor. His penalties are a \$500 fine and a County Clerk's processing fee of about \$60.

Judge Mary Noble gave Robinson, a third-year law student, some advice after issuing his sentence. "I would caution you as a man who is studying the law to know that you have to live closely within it," she said.

Robinson dropped his classes and resigned from SG after pleading guilty Feb. 21. A grand jury indicted Robinson after an investigation by the Fayette Commonwealth's Attor-

ney uncovered 747 overdue voter registration cards in the SG office.

Students filled out the cards during fall of 2001 in an attempt by SG to keep supporters of the Lexington Area Party Plan from being re-elected.

In addition to the fine, Assistant Fayette Commonwealth's Attorney Joe Bouvier recommended 30 days in jail unless Robinson paid the \$60 incurred by the County Clerk's office in processing the voter cards.

Robinson said he will return to UK this summer and graduate in December.

Kent Wicker, Robinson's attorney, said that Robinson wants to put the affair behind him and move on.

"Tim is glad this is all over," he said.

## Visitation group to deliver findings

An advisory committee studying changes to the residence hall visitation policy met for the last time Friday. Randy Gonzalez, chairman of the committee and staff assistant in Student Affairs, said he plans to deliver the final recommendations Monday to Vice President of Student Affairs Patricia Terrell. Terrell will decide any final policy change. A survey conducted by Residence Life found that students living in residence halls support a change from the current policy, which restricts opposite-sex visitation. About 66 percent of residence hall students surveyed said they would prefer to be allowed visitation by the opposite sex at all times. Another 27 percent said they would prefer unrestricted opposite-sex visitation from Friday through Sunday, with no changes during the week.

# For one officer, it was who you know

FRANKFORT — This is the upshot of an investigation into the way a state vehicle-enforcement officer in western Kentucky got a promotion:

Sometimes it really is "who you know," at least in the short term. Officers of the Division of Motor Vehicle Enforcement need better training, since they did not seem to know that tearing up a speeding ticket is against the law. Things get done when the governor makes a call on your behalf.

Those conclusions can be drawn from the report issued last week by Bobby Russell, inspector general of the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, parent agency of the state's vehicle-enforcement police force.

The subject of the investigation was Monty Clark, a vehicle-enforcement officer in Clinton who got promoted to sergeant, then demoted after it was discovered that he had violated the agency's rule against "soliciting personal advancement." That means he asked someone with influence to help him get a promotion.

In Clark's case, the someone was Tina Conner, whom he knew to be a patronage contact for the administration — one of hundreds of people, according to Patton, to whom he looked for advice on local matters.

Whether Clark also knew that Conner was having an affair with the governor, the report does not say. But later, still in pursuit of his promotion, he intervened with fellow officer Richard Wright to fix a speeding ticket Wright had issued to Conner.

Clark emphasized that Conner was a person with connections. Others knew it as well.

Wright's supervisor said he recognized Conner's name as a patronage contact "and was going to suggest that Wright void the citation if he had not already done so."

Clark commented that the practice was not unusual among officers," the report said. The ticket disappeared. Afterward, Conner put in a good word for Clark with the governor.

The governor rang up Col. Kenneth Frost, commander of vehicle enforcement. Frost got the ball rolling to create a sergeant's slot in far western Kentucky and Clark got the job.

Frost "admitted that the call from the governor did affect his decision to create the position," the report said.

new building on the school's main campus. While Kerley said he understands UK has its own building priorities to consider, he said that LCC's problems are UK's problems. "We are a part of the University of Kentucky, too," he said. The board discussed

ways to remind Todd of that UK-LCC connection. The LCC-to-UK transfer rate and number of students with credits from both schools are two points the board may emphasize. According to the most recent statistics, 23 percent of UK graduates in 2000 had earned hours at LCC. That same year, 27 percent of LCC graduates had earned hours from UK. "Keeping that connection going is important for both institutions," said Mike

Nietzel, UK provost. Nietzel said administrators will be open to meeting with the LCC board. "If they have issues they want to discuss, then it's a good idea for the two sides to meet." LCC is also looking into other ways to raise money. It is planning a "Day at the Races," a scholarship fundraising event scheduled at Keeneland. The event will charge \$75 per seat for a luncheon. The board also discussed moving its annual luncheon

with state legislators from December to September so more lawmakers can attend. Kerley said he has already heard from some legislators wondering why LCC does not receive more funds from UK. Whether progress comes from within the school or from Frankfort, the board members agree LCC will face its problems head-on. "These issues just aren't going away," said LCC board member Reginald Thomas, an assistant professor at Kentucky State University.

The store also sells basic fish equipment, such as tanks, filters and gravel, as well as some oddities - pre-soaked natural driftwood and bulk fish food that his friend produces, for example. "I've made my own fish food before," Roberts said. "You mix shrimp, peas, gelatin and a multivitamin and then freeze it."

Roberts' addiction for fish shows when he speaks of his pets. Pointing to a pair of Oscars - large South American fish, gray with bright orange splotches - he says, "People respond to Oscars because they display the same emotions as people - curiosity, anger, calm. They will follow your finger if you put it in the water. They will eat out of your hand, and bite you if you aren't careful. They will get upset if you change things around in their cage." Roberts has kept fish since he was 10, when his father bought him his first aquarium. "It's literally an addiction. But, it's like I tell my wife - there are a lot worse

things a man could be addicted to in this world than raising fish." A long history Roberts enrolled at UK in 1967, where his fish hobby led him to a major in biology. "I was too immature," he said. "It wasn't fish or animal related. I failed miserably." Roberts worked in pet stores and fitfully attended school until '93, when he left to work full time at Best Pets, a Lexington store, where he stayed for six years and eventually became vice president. After a falling out with the owners, he returned to school, completing his biology degree in '98. Soon after, he began the process of opening his own store.

"It's something I've always loved," Roberts said. "You either do what you like and do what you can with it, or get stuck making decent money in something you don't like." Though he says he appreciates all fish, Roberts does have a favorite: cichlids, a fish native to a series of African lakes. "They're my personal addiction," he said. "The lakes they come from are ancient," he said, "and if you do a DNA analysis, they (the cichlids) are 99.9 percent the same - but they are so varied to look at. The world's smallest and largest cichlids come from the same lake. That intrigues me."

Roberts said he sees many people who share his addiction, and that a culture of fish thrives in Lexington and throughout the world. "I know someone who paid \$6,000 for a pair of fish," he said. "I've had people in here break down crying after their fish died." Roberts said national organizations dedicated to fish exist, such as the American Cichlid Association and the National Livebearers Association. Roberts is trying to revive a local fish club that thrived in the '60s before dying out in the '70s. "But we pale in comparison to the European addiction to fish," Roberts said. "Many of the best fish end up there because the French and Germans are willing to pay a higher price for them."

Roberts said hectic lifestyles mean fish make good pets. "Not many animals fit into people's schedules," he said. "But with a good filter and an auto-feeder, you can leave fish unattended for two weeks." Fish also relieve stress, he said. "Fish have been clinically proven to lower blood pressure," he said. "In doctor's offices ... you see a lot of fish tanks." But what becomes apparent after talking with Roberts is not so much his interest in collecting fish or their effect on people, but a love and respect for the animal itself. "In any possible environment, fish will fill the niche. There are blind cavefish and deepwater fields like sonar," Roberts says. "Behind bacteria and insects, fish are the most populous organism on the planet."

# Rolling Stones launch world-wide tour, will play shows in China for first time

The Rolling Stones arrived in Tokyo to kick off a tour of Asia — including their first-ever visit to China.

"It's about time they let us in," guitarist Keith Richards joked at a news conference about next month's concerts in Beijing and Shanghai.

"It's always nice to go to someplace new."

The British band will perform in Shanghai on April 1 and in Beijing on April 4, said Wang Long, an organizer for the Beijing Time New Century Entertainment Co.

When the Rolling Stones first rose to fame in the 1960s, China was on the verge of the radical 1966-76 Cultural Revolution, which reviled Western pop culture as spiritual pollution.

The Stone's music first became available in China only after the start of economic and social reforms in the late 1970s.

In Beijing, the Stones will play the 7,000-seat Workers' Gymnasium.

Cui Jian, China's most famous rocker, will open for the Stones in Beijing.

Cui is hugely popular in China but has rarely been allowed to play big shows in the capital because he performed on Tiananmen Square during the 1989 pro-democracy protests.

Cui, 42, said he taught himself to play the guitar in

the 1980s by learning Rolling Stones and Beatles songs.

"They are my heroes," Cui said. "It's a big honor for me."

A few hundred front-row seats will be available for \$750, Wang said. That's about the same as the average Chinese person's annual income.

The Stones are rounding the world on their "40 Licks" tour — marking their 40th anniversary.

Their arrival in Japan, where they will perform in three cities, marks the halfway point of the 117-concert tour.

The tour marks a bit of a departure from the band's usual selection of the biggest stadiums.

Along with venues such as the 55,000-seat Tokyo Dome, they will also be playing in smaller spaces, including an arena outside Bangkok, which seats about 11,500.

"It's a little different that we're going to play a couple of arena shows, which we've never done here before," lead singer Mick Jagger said of the venues in Japan.

"We've only done very big ones. We're going to play in the Budokan — we've never done that before, so we're very excited about that."

The Budokan is a martial arts hall in downtown Tokyo that has been the site of recorded concerts.

The Stones also will play in Hong Kong, Singapore and India.

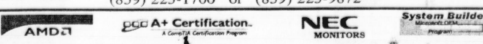

# Florida drops UK to 6-13 on season with 9-3 loss

**Sweeping series: Gators finish Cats off with 9-3 win in UK's Southeastern Conference opener**

Florida completed a three-game sweep of the UK softball team Sunday, but this time UK got ahead early. The Cats (6-13, 0-3 in the Southeastern Conference) led the Gators (22-9, 5-1 SEC) 3-0 after three innings, but a one-run Gator 4th inning led to four-run 5th and 7th innings and a 9-3 win in the third game of UK's Southeastern Conference opening series.

"We had some pretty shoddy defense," UK coach Beth Pruitt said. "I don't

think we put the ball in play as much as we should and we took a lot of pitches I thought we should be swinging at."

The Cats got on the board in the third inning on a three-run bases loaded double by shortstop Rachel Friberg who was 1 for 3 on the day, but committed her fifth error of the series.

Friberg's was one of UK's three errors committed in the game. The Cats totaled seven errors in the three-game series, but Florida didn't need any help scoring runs.

Mylin Prieto got the Gators on the board in the

4th with a solo homer. The next inning Lyndsey Cameron and Prieto had RBI doubles, and Jen Mossadeghi hit her third home run of the year to put Florida ahead 5-3.

They scored four more in the top of the 7th to ice the 9-3 victory.

The Cats also struggled at the plate in the series, averaging just a little more than three hits per game. UK also struck out 14 times against Florida pitcher Jenny Gladding on Saturday. They improved in the next two games, only winning a combined six times.

But the Gators out hit UK 29-11 and outscored the Cats 27-6.

"Our hitting is something we can control," senior second baseman Nikki Jones

said. "That is something that our team could definitely work on. We have always been a good hitting team and we always will be."

Jones had five of UK's 11 hits, going 4 for 9 on the series and extending her hitting streak to nine games. She is leading UK with a .361 batting average.

Gladding picked up the win Sunday, as well as in the first game of Saturday's double-header to improve to 9-6 on the season. UK's Amy Kendall was charged with the loss in all three games, allowing 23 earned runs in 18.1 innings pitched, dropping her record to 4-7 on the season.

The Cats will host Morehead State in a double-header on Wednesday at 4 p.m.

## WEEK IN REVIEW

### TUESDAY

UK will provide a special election to get a student representative on the Board of Trustees, the Kernel reported.

Vice President of Student Affairs Patricia Terrell told SG President Mary Katherine Thompson that the administration will fund an election for a student trustee, Thompson said.

The student trustee dilemma comes at a critical time because the issues on the table for upcoming board meetings include increases in student fees and tuition, Thompson said.

There was doubt last week if the seat would be filled because SG, which is facing a \$10,000 deficit, can't afford to hold a special election.

Terrell said UK would fund the election if the SG senate passed a resolution supporting the election, the senate voted in favor of the election last week.

"I did not want the (SG) senate or the new officers to be penalized by not having the money to pay for the special election," Terrell said.

Some high-ranking members of Student Government are resigning following SG President Tim Robinson's resignation, the Kernel reported.

Justin Rasner, chief of staff, and Edwin Orange, staff associate, have resigned.

Rasner said he resigned because he and new President Mary Katherine Thompson have differences. His replacement, James Riney, an accounting senior, has no SG experience.

"New administration, new people," Thompson said.

Rasner resigned Friday after almost two years with SG.

"Things would have been different if Mary Katherine had the same ideas as she did when she was vice president as she does as president," Rasner said. Rasner would not elaborate on the nature of those differences.

### THURSDAY

Members of the UK community gathered for an anti-war rally in the free speech area outside the Student Center, the Kernel reported.

The protest featured a diverse group of speakers and lasted more than an hour. The speak-out brought together war protesters and supporters as well as many campus and city sponsors, including the UK Leftist Student Union, WRFU, 88.1 and Lexington PEACE.

Similar protests occurred on more than 300 campuses around the nation Wednesday, as well as on several different continents.

The pool of applicants for UK's new chief of police has dwindled from 91 to a short list of five or six, the Kernel reported.

While their names haven't been released, the applicants are superb, said Ben Carr, vice president of auxiliary and campus services.

"It's an excellent pool of people," he said. "They are all very articulate, have great experience and are student oriented."

After UK releases the names in a few weeks, times will be set up to do teleconference interviews.

Four candidates are from out of town and two from UK, said Ken Clevidence, associate vice president of auxiliary and campus services.

### FRIDAY

Lexington residents went head-to-head Thursday night in a public forum concerning a proposal to ban smoking in city restaurants, bars and taverns, the Kernel reported.

Close to 100 people crowded into city council chambers, some bearing signs with slogans and others dressed in red to represent their support of the proposed ban.

Comments came from residents of varying age and background concerned about health, business and freedom of personal choice. Opponents and proponents spoke on all three issues from their particular viewpoints.

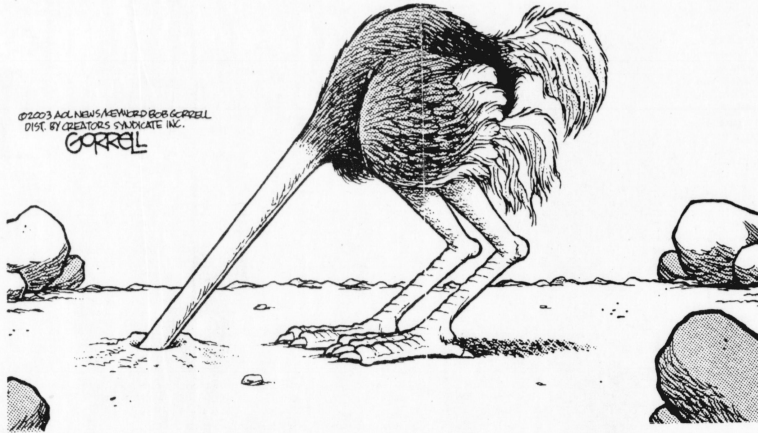
Brian Lanier, a UK fourth-year medical student, said when it comes to public areas, the health concerns are far more important than the issue of the right to smoke.

"We're not asking people not to smoke at all," Lanier said. "We are asking people not to smoke in restaurants and bars where they hurt everyone else around them because of their choice."

Brian Quisenberry, a non-smoker, works at Dudley's Restaurant and said a ban would harm local restaurants and bars.

"We will be hurt financially," Quisenberry said. "There are going to be problems."

## Knee-jerk reactions harm anti-war effort

Opposing the possible war with Iraq is a position that has been embraced by millions of Americans. Massive peaceful anti-war demonstrations around the world prove the cause is gaining momentum.

Yet protesters' tactics during Wednesday's anti-war demonstration at University of California-Berkeley only helped push the mainstream war stance to the fringes of extremist activism.

The Daily Californian Senior Editorial Board has come out in opposition to a war with Iraq and has encouraged activists to demonstrate. We cannot, however, condone the misguided actions of protesters Wednesday.

Anti-war demonstrators resorted to the flawed methods of the pro-Palestinian protesters who occupied Berkeley's Wheeler Hall last April. Protesters marched into classrooms, some shouting, "Join us, stop the war," forcing one professor to cut short his 600-student lecture.

The anti-war protesters could not have resorted to a worse course of action to bring attention to their cause.

Any legitimate demonstration should be directed at raising awareness of the issue. Heads should turn not just to watch a protest, but to gain understanding of what's actually being protested.

Unfortunately, protesters at Thursday's demonstration succeeded not at drawing attention to their cause -- they only drew attention to their knee-jerk actions.

What's now becoming the staple of UC Berkeley protests only serves to numb the outside world to the campus' activism.

Protesters must realize that forcefully disrupting classes and resorting to civil disobedience for civil disobedience's sake will only cripple the legitimacy of future anti-war demonstrations at UC Berkeley.

This is especially important, as the prospect of war in the upcoming months could make Berkeley a hotbed of protests

once again. We hope Thursday's misguided debacle does not indicate the course of action for future protests.

Activists must come up with more creative ways to effectively bring attention to such a crucial issue. Demonstrators at the Feb. 17 San Francisco protest worked with local authorities to ensure a peaceful protest.

As opposed to the San Francisco demonstration, Wednesday's knee-jerk activists alienated a large contingent of the UC Berkeley student body opposed to the war.

Furthermore, they also trampled on the right of some students to their education. We cannot underscore enough the importance of the university to pursue its core mission, even in times of conflict.

Wednesday's protest only brought ridicule and shame to Berkeley's longstanding tradition of activism. If protesters fail to resort to more creative, respectful actions, the anti-war cause at Berkeley will be pushed to the limits of fringe extremism.

## Beginning of war calls for boycott of classes

As President Bush last week addressed the nation, he made his case for the first unprovoked war in American history. Unless you came into his speech (he never bothered to answer the reporters' questions) already convinced of the need to violently disarm Iraq, however, it's likely you were not convinced.

Indeed, for the first time since Sept. 11, it appears that Bush's hard-line support is waning. His call to arms, for all his self-described conviction, rang hollow for many in his audience. He leveled accusations and evidence later described by the International Atomic Energy Agency as fraudulent, and he used them to try to justify the largest military buildup of our generation.

The political atmosphere is tense, to say the least. The American people support the war by a narrow margin, though that support has been steadily declining for the past several weeks. Despite acquiescence

by a number of our allied governments, the people of the international community are unequivocal in their opposition. The Arab world is angered, and with good reason.

Even Cat Stevens, now known by his Muslim name of Yusuf Islam, has come out of his isolation to release anti-war songs.

The reasons for going to war have been reshaped by the media and administration alike so often that the arguments for peace, compelling as they are, are often drowned out.

We should maintain the peace because unilateral aggression sets a bad precedent for international relations, and could one day be used against us.

We should maintain the peace because if Iraq has the weapons we say they do, they've been as good as invisible to the inspectors, who want more time.

We should maintain the peace because blood is more valuable than oil.

The United States has many aims in the Middle East, and only a few aren't directly self-serving. If Saddam is to end his reign, if a Kurdish state is destined to form in Northern Iraq and if Iraq is destined to lose its power and influence in the region,

it is not for the United States to decide.

Despite what Bush and his minions say, might doesn't make right. Just because we can doesn't give us the justification to act aggressively. Our distance from the front makes the war barely palatable to most Americans; if it were our cities and citizens in the line of fire, we would probably think twice.

In perhaps a month, a week or maybe even a few days from now, our nation will likely act murderously to oust a personal enemy of the Bush family.

When they do, I, like many other students across the country and the world, plan to protest and boycott university classes.

It's students who often are forced to serve as the moral conscience of the nation, and if this unfortunate standoff comes to a point, I hope at least a few of the compassionate among you will be joining me.

## Pitching gives Cats win against Purdue

**Pitching:** UK's Seth Stanley gave up only one run on seven hits in sixth inning, holding Purdue 4-3.

The Bat Cats rode a big third inning and a stellar pitching performance by junior Seth Stanley to a 7-1 win in Sunday's rubber match with Purdue at Cliff Hagan Stadium.

Stanley, backed by an excellent defensive effort, shut down Purdue (4-3) over the first six innings, giving up only one run on seven hits. The right-hander improved his record to 1-1 on the season, striking out three batters in the process.

"I was trying to throw ground balls, not concentrate on striking guys out, and let the defense work behind me. I can't win without those guys," Stanley said of the UK defense.

The Bat Cats (7-6) took the game open in a third inning that saw all nine of the team's hitters come to the plate.

With the bases loaded, two outs and the Cats already owning a 2-1 lead, senior rightfielder Brad Pickrell cleared the bases with a three-run double into deep left center field to put UK on top 5-1.

"With a 3-1 count I was looking for a fastball over the middle of the plate and that's exactly what he gave me," Pickrell said. "I just took advantage of his bad pitch."

In the eighth inning the Cats managed two more insurance runs when juniors Casey Gilvin, Jake Kungl and Spencer Graeter took advantage of the Boilermaker pitching staff with three straight doubles.

In a combined three innings of relief, sophomores James Rodriguez and Jeff Archer surrendered only two hits and struck out three Purdue batters.

After coming out on the wrong end of a 16-3 score in Friday's series opener, UK tallied back-to-back wins to take two out of three in their first three-game series of the season.

"I was very pleased with the character this team showed Saturday and Sunday after getting drubbed in that first game," said coach Keith Madison. "Winning the series was the most important thing and we accomplished that."

The players also felt that they had something to prove after the lopsided

loss on Friday and took the field Saturday with the feeling that they had to win the next two games.

"By coming back and getting these two wins, we proved we have a team that can win," Pickrell said.

"We knew we had to win these two games and we came out with an enthusiastic attitude and played hard," Stanley said.

Madison also acknowledged the teams pitching and defensive performances for the win Sunday.

"I thought we looked good today and I was especially pleased with our pitching," he said. "We got a great start from Stanley, and defensively we were

outstanding. At the college level, pitching and defense is where you're going to win ballgames."

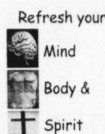
Madison seemed confident with his arsenal of pitchers, pointing to this season's staff as one of the teams' strong points.

"I think pitching is definitely one of our strengths," he said. "We've got some great starters, and our bullpen is really deep with guys we have a lot of confidence in."
