Confusion causes SGA to postpone spring elections

Members of UK's Student Gov-ernment Association are in conflict.

ermment Association are in conflict. Again.
Because of a misinterpretation of SGA's constitution and by-laws, elections — which usually are held eight days after spring break — will be postponed for almost a month, Elections Board chairman Brian Shrensker said.
The decision was made by the Committee on Committees, a group that oversees the general operation of the Senate's committees. Senator at Large Heather Hennel said the elections are being postponed because the SGA constitution states that elections must be held eight weeks after poll times and places are presented on the floor of the Senate.
The poll times were not presented until last week.
The decision conflicts with SGA

bylaws, which state that elections must be held eight days after spring break, but the conflict is unavoidable, Hennel said.
"We have to stick to the constitution and can't change it (simply) because the Senate made a mistake," she said.

Shrensker said there was no way.

take," she said.

Shrensker said there was no way he could present the poll times and he could present the poll times and locations to the Senate any sooner than last week.

"I was not approved for the job until two weeks ago, so I had no idea what needed to be done or what the constitution had to do with the elections," he said.

Businessmen will buy property on Columbia, sell it to University

One obstacle remained in UK's attempt to buy land for the proposed Central and Life Sciences Library: 410 Columbia Ave.

Now, thanks to help from two Lexington businessmen, that obsacle will be removed.

UK Board of Trustees member William Sturgill announced at the board's finance committee meeting yesterday that Arnold Kirkpairick and Jack Graham, owners of the Kirkpatrick and Cocal estate firm, intend to buy the property for the University.

The house and lot at 410 Columbia Ave. is owned by Ruth and Emery Gordon. UK and the Gordons have been trying to work out a deal on the property for two years, but were unable to agree on a price. UK said the appraised value agree on a price. UK said the appraised value was state regulations forbid the University from paying more a property than its appraised value.

UK had filed a suit against the Gordons to have the courts decide how much the property is

worth and to try and force the Gordons to sell.

Kirkpatrick said the Gordons agreed to take
\$90,000 for their house and the accompanying
tot. He and Graham plan to buy the property for
that price, then sell it to UK for \$80,000.

The two real estate agents said they read about the situation in the newspapers and decided to help out.

"It doesn't make sense for \$10,000 to hold up an \$80 million project," Kirkpatrick said.

Both men have ties to the University, Graham is a UK graduate and a UK fellow, and Kirkpatrick donated of a collection of works to UK's Margaret I. King Library.

"I donated a thoroughbred library about four years ago, and I wanted to see it somewhere other than a basement," Kirkpatrick said.

Emory Gordon said he was satisfied with the agreement even though he will get less for his property than he initially was seeking.

"I guess we are happy and satisfied with it." he said yesterday. "We thought we should have had more, but we just got tirred of fooling with it."

The UK Board of Trustees also has reached a agreement with the Cyprus Southern Realty

Co. about the ownership and coal royalties of a 15-acre piece of land in UK's Robinson Forest. In June 1992, UK executed a coal lease with Arch Mineral Corp. on a portion of the forest known as Harbert Knob. However, Cyprus Amax Coal Co., which owns Cyprus Southern Realty Co., also claimed title to the land and has a lease with Arch. Under the agreement, UK and Cyprus each will execute a Wildlife Management Area agreement with the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

LIK and Cyprus will then execute a settlement.

UK and Cyprus will then execute a settlement agreement where all royalties from the coal, which so far totals about \$280,000, will be transferred to the department.

The two groups will divide ownership of the

Cyprus is expected to execute a quitclaim deed to UK for a portion of the land owned by Cyprus on the currently unmined portion of the Bear Branch watershed.

Then, the University will execute a quitclaim deed to Cyprus for the the portion of Harbert Knob claimed by the University that has been mined by Arch.

UK dentistry to send different type of aid to post-war Kuwait

UK is sending relief to Kuwait in a form the war-ravaged country has not seen: comprehensive dental care.

care.

The College of Dentistry and the Kuwait Ministry of Health have signed a five-year, \$10 million contact to establish a preventative and comprehensive dental health plan in Kuwait. Aside from generating a considerable amount of revenue for the University, officials say the opportunity will allow UK to enhance dental reputation.

"This gives us an opportunity to

dental reputation.
"This gives us an opportunity to disseminate information and continue to broaden the international aspect (of UK)," said Dr. David Hardison said, an associate professor of dentistry and one of the project's di-

rectors.

UK has established similar pro-

grams in the Pacific Islands, Russia and Saudi Arabia.

and Saudi Arabia.

The new program, which will operate in 37 primary schools and 35 kindergartens, will be coordinated in Ruwait by project officer Dr. George Gillespie.

Gillespie, past director Pan American Health Organization, approached the Kuwaiti government with the idea of establishing the program, said project administrator Dr. Eric Spohn, a UK dentistry professor.

After the Kuwaitis approved the concept, Gillespie asked UK for its assistance, Spohn said.

Hardison and Spohn say the UK effort offers a unique opportunity because the district in which the program will operate has never had a comprehensive dental care provid-

Bosnia steps toward peace

Muslims, Croats agree to plans for federation

WASHINGTON — Bosnian Muslims and Croats agreed yesterday on the framework for establishment of a federation that could move Bosnia a significant step closer to peace. step closer to peace.

Brokered by the United States, the agreement would bring together two of the three parties in a bloody two-year ethnic conflict that has cost the lives of more than 200,000 people.

Signing of the agreement was lanned at the State Department

Missing from the equation are the Bosnian Serbs who have



gained military control of 70 percent of the former Yugoslav republic. However, in another promising step, Serb leader Radovan Karadzic announced in Mostore Radovan Karadzic announced in Mostore Could be Russian. The Serbs are under threat of NATO air strikes if they refuse to allow opening of the airport by next Monday. The agreement in Washington was reached after four days of intensive negotiations by Muslim and Croatian leaders. Croatian Foreign Minister Mate Granic said earlier in the day the talks were in their final stages. The details were not immediately available.

At the White House, Clinic Minister John Major, and the two leaders told a brief news conference that

Major said the United States and Britain would send a "joint civil planning mission" to Saraje-vo, presumably to help put the city back together now that "the cease-fire there is holding."

cease-fire there is holding."

The delegation will include seven or eight Americans and 10 to 12 British who are specialist in sanitation, disease control, public utilities and fuels. The group will go to Sarajevo early next week and spend up to four weeks there. Their recommendations will be presented to the World Bank, International Monetary Fund and other agencies that might finance reconstruction projects.

At the start of a meeting with Vice President Al Gore, Granic commented on the Muslim-Croat negotiations and said a prelimi-nary agreement could be signed

Officials discuss Korean nuclear threat

The United States is in "great shape" if e country's largest security concern is the treat of nuclear proliferation in North Ko-a, nuclear research expert Peter Hayes

said last night.
"It won't make much difference at all if North Korea gets the bomb," Hayes said during a symposium on Korean issues held at the Student Center.
Considering the size of the U.S. arsenal, he said, America could handle Korea with "one — no, both hands behind it's back." Hayes' address, sittled "The Korean Nuclear Dilemma: Real or Contrived?" focused on what Hayes said were myths involving U.S.- Korean relations — particularly those concerning nuclear proliferation.

liferation.

One myth is the idea that the crisis in North Korea began last February, he said.

The "whole issue has a history," he said, and the hostility has existed for at least four

decades.

In his list of 32 myths, he also questioned the notion assumed by the media that North Korea's foremost goal is the acquisition of nuclear weapons.

"The whole country is a prison," he said. "Their target is to overcome the embargo they are being hit with everyday that was imposed in 1953 by the U.S."

in the symposium's introductory remarks,
said relations between North and South Korea would open up as soon as the North Korean nuclear threat is "resolved."
But Hayes disagreed.

"I don't think North or South Korea want meaningful talks at this time." he said. "They have much more fundamental tiems to deal with in terms of their relationships." He called forthcoming talks, to which the two governments committed yesterday. "perfunctory" and said the only answer to the strained relations would be the adoption of a "multilateral vision" by the internation-at community.

Haves said America should send a "firm

message" that it will provide economic aid to the communist government in exchange for its compliance with international nuclear inspection programs.

"North Korea cannot be bludgeoned into submission. They know what stomach America has for war. They are less frightened of war than America."

He said although no evidence exists to verify North Korea's possesion of nuclear devices, he is certain that they are exploring nuclear possibilities.

Due to the geographic proximity of the two countries, Lee said South Korea is "al-ways prepared to counter any aggressive at-tacks."

Lee stressed the importance of global interest in Korean politics and praised the efforts of those involved in last night's UK symposium on Korea.

"These issues are important to the U.S. and the rest of the world," he said.
"For South Korea the mere outbreak of

and the rest of the world," he said.
"For South Korea, the mere outbreak of incident could cause a damaging blow to the economy, and that type of blow would be felt outside of Korea."

He agrees with South Korean President Kim young Sam about the need to defer aggressive international action against North Korea unless the communist country becomes hostile.

Graduate School Senator Erica McDonald agreed with Edelen

"This extra time changes everything for the candidates. It adds hige amount of pressure when they have to continue campaignin for a prolonged amount of time."

Senator at Large Misty Weaver, a member of the Committee on Committees — which, along with SGA President Lance Dowdy and Vice-President Amber Leigh, made the decision to postpone elections — said she didn't know where the blame lies.

"I don't really know whose fault it is that the conflict with the onstitution was not noticed before," she said.

Weaver said Dowdy did not select an Election Board earlier "be-ause he assumed that there would be people returning from the

previous election, but that just did not happen."

Dowdy said he had only read the by-laws concerning the elec-ons and did not know the times had to be in eight weeks early. "They redid the constitution, and that was one of the changes," lowdy said.

Dowdy said.

Weaver, who plans to run for SGA president but has not yet announced her candidacy publicly, denied rumors that she, along with senators Shea Chaney and Heather Hennel (both of whom are members of the Committee on Committees and Weaver's campaign) want the elections postponed so they will have more time to plan a strategy.

"That is Indicrous," she said. "It will give everyone more time to campaign, not just me."

Hennel also challenged the rumors.

in Kuwait, Hardison said, but a 1993 survey showed that those efforts had done nothing to change the poor dental hygiene of Kuwaitis.

Many of these current programs focus on patching up current problems rather than emphasizing prevention

"We want to intervene today and prevent the prob-lems of tomorrow," Hardison said.

To that end, the UK program will include heavy dos es of education, teaching children the importance o brushing and flossing. Children also will be given fluo ride tablets, since Kuwait does not have fluoridated wa ter, and new oral sealants that prevent tooth decay.

The joint venture between the University and Kuwait also will provide research opportunities: "We will be able to see directly if what we do (in Kuwait) works,"

Hardison and Spohn said some of the what they learn in Kuwait could end up being used in Kentucky.

nother contribution of the research is the opportuni will afford UK dental students, who will have ac to the data generated in the project, Hardison said.

He added that there would be some opportunities for aculty members to participate in the project directly.

Because there is no formal dental training in Kuwait, the staff that will be working in the program will be composed mostly of non-Kuwaiti dentists.

Most Kuwaitis who earn dental degrees abroad don't eturn home to practice, Hardison said.

Even as Granic was predicting an agreement, a senior administration official cautioned that issues remained to be resolved.
Granic did not discuss the details of the possible accord other than to say it would lead to a federation between the two parties who would then have close ties with Croatia.

Late last week, the Clinton administration unveiled a proposal for uniting Bosnian Muslims and Croats into an entity. The next step would be an attempt to link that federation with a Serbian entity and form a country comprising two republics.

The Muslim-Croat entity also would establish close economic ties and open borders with Croa-

U.S. officials said the idea for the federation

came from the Bosnian Muslim government.

Official says students in dark on health care

He warns, however, that they should.

He warns, however, that they should. In an interview yesterday, Dr. H. Spencer Turner said Clinton's plan "is neglecting many aspects and facts about University Sudent Health Services" and is built upon false assumptions.

For example, Turner said one of the proposal's primary assumptions is that the average college student is between the ages of 18 and 24 and has health coverage through a parent.

Because of shifting social patterns, however, the average college student now is about 26 years old and is not insured under a parent's

policy, Turner said. Moreover, he said that more than 40 percent of all students are inadequately covered by any insurance policy.

As a result, most students' needs are not addressed in the plan, Turner said.

Turner said the coalition loss group of Kentucky health officials.

are not addressed in the plan, Turner also said college health services, which have a long history of being active in health education and promotion programs, are largely overlooked by the Clinton plan. The plan, which has been introduced into the U.S. House of Representatives as House Bill 250, calls for the development of a "healthy lifestyle program." Turner said the plan should seek a "health promotion programs instead — one that would use facilities, services and programs already in place at college and university health services nationwide.

A coalition of Kentucky college and university health services currently is in the process of contacting state legislators about their com-

Turner said the coalition is a loose group of Kentucky college health officials.


"A lot of what may happen with health reform may be at the state level," Turner said.

"It is our responsibility to worry about the students. We are here for them and are concerned."

The coalition believes that if col-lege students are to continue receiv-ing quality health care, college health services must be included in the planning and implementation of any health reform plan.

"It is important that the legisla-tors; both on national and state lev-els, recognize the existence of col-lege health service programs ... in any health-care reform," Turner said.

"That really is the true issue here."

The player who prided himself on hustle was confined to a life of surgery, crutches, ice packs and physical rehabilitation. It is a fate that befalls many an athlete, after from which many do not return. But calling Brassow resilient is like calling Manute Bol tall. Both Pitino and team trainer John Hauser proclaim his "threshold for pain" higher than any player they have ever seen.

All the while, even in the dark.

have ever seen. even in the darkest, most painful hours of rehab,
Brassow was there for the team. In
Briadelphia, the venue for The
Greatest Game Ever Played, he
hered on his teammates from the
UK student section. He celebrated
in the frenzied chaos that ensued
after Woods hit his miracle shot,
then agonized for his fallen friends
after the cruelest sparadox, Christian
Laettner's shot heard round the college hoops world.

Throughout the following sum-mer, he continued to blaze the comeback trail, strengthening his surgically-repaired knee the best he could. But the early practices of the 1992-93 season proved he simply could not neutralize the pain.







But because the banner flapping in the crisp winter breeze looks like it stole its colors from a box of crayons, don't be fooled. Some of the people inside the Lexington Children's Museum are young chronologically, and some are only kids at heart.

When the City of Lexington established
the museum in the downtown Victorian
Squares shopping center in 1990 with a combination of city and private funds, few people probably imagined that many of the patrons would be adults, unaccompanied by a
mob of eager, bright-eyed kids.

Not that anyone at the museum is com

Admissions Director Betty Jacobs says that the two most prominent groups besides the children are college students and senior citizens, both of whom come for very specif-

"College students come to play, and senior citizens come to watch the kids play," she said.

Said.

UK physical therapy junior Kara Lynch says she does come to play — and often. Lynch has visited the museum many times in her three years at the University, dragging her friends along for the ride, and once volunteering as a clown for a party at the museum.

seum.

"I have a little kid inside me," she explained. "It's something that grown-ups aren't allowed to do."

Like Lynch, Judy Winkler started out as a volunteer, but her occasional venture into volunteer work for the museum turned into a job as a part-time employee.

"I had volunteered here for a year or two when my grandchildren moved away," she said. "I didn't have anything to do, so I work here about 18 hours a week now."

here about 18 hours a week now."

Winkler claims that her job keeps her young, something that is hard to dispute after hearing her tell of her enthusiasm for getting down in the floor with the kids. At the museum, age is relative, and she is living proof. In her sparkly gold shoes which match the twinkle in her eyes, she seems to

"I tell people it's for big kids too," she said.
"They play as much as the children."

As if to prove it, Winkler demonstrates the features of the Bubble Factory, the most popular section of the permanent exhibits. It is obvious she has done the activities a thousand times, but showing them again brings a smile to her face.

to her face.

Her favorite toy in the factory is a tall frame of black metal with a platform in the middle and a long rope dangling from the top. She has patrons get in, and then slowly pulled the rope which lifted a ring up and over their bodies, encasing them in a shimmery bubble.

A full-length mirror to the left reveals them in a fragile prison for an instant before it disappears and droplets of soap rain down around, with Winkler looking on approvingly.

Later, Winkler is in rare form, making bub-bles for three toddlers and their mothers. The kids are mesmerized by Winkler and her spiel: "What's your name? Well, this bubble is for you, Suzy, and only you can pop it."

The three girls are eager to get their hands on the bubble, and everything else in the museum for that matter.

In any other museum, the stuffy curators would fly into a tizzy, but Winkler smiles ap-

The museum encourages learning through all the senses, especially touch, and that is reflected in exhibits like a giant model of a heart and lungs.

heart and lungs.

Upon entering through one of the atriums, your senses are assaulted, the hollow pounding of the heart, flashing lights
in time to the beat and textured walls that
beg to be touched.

Somewher'e in the process of playing
with all of these flashing gadgets, you
learn about the chambers of the heart, almost against your will. It is a sneaky
trick, but it works, and even the "big
kids" like Lynch are charmed.

The positive vibe of the museum is infectious. It is what Betty Jacobs, Judy Winkler and Kara Lynch all claim drew them to the museum, where for a while, they can let loose and pretend they are kids again.

UK professor chronicles trip to Santiago



Pitino protected Wildcat integrity

Bravo, Pitino.

The UK basketball Wildcats have always been winners. But the perception among the the rest of the country was that those wins were tainted by cheating, a perception that unfortunately was sometimes more rue than not.

That's why we applaud UK coach Rick Pitino's decision last sweek to suspend for one game three of his players — Travis Ford, Gimel Martinez and Jared Prickett — for conspiring to send better free-throw shooters to the line against Vanderbilt.

Granted, the penalty may seem kind of harsh at first glance. After all, Temple basketball coach John Chaney also was suspended one game by his university after threatening to kill Massachusetts coach John Calipari in front of a room full of salivating sports reporters.

Comparatively, the UK players did something as evil as 2copying your best friend's math homework in grade school. Free-throw switching is something that goes on at all levels of basketball and always has. And the foul-line hijinks had no effect on the outcome of the Vanderbilt game.

Still, Pitino's actions illustrated that UK will not tolerate cheating of any kind. After reviving a program in the shambles of a disastrous NCAA investigation and subsequent probation, Pitino showed that he is not about to let even the small-est rule-bending slide.

He showed the rest of the nation that maybe this is a different era of UK basketball.

"We've built this program the last five years on what we believe is solid integrity," Pitino said. "We believe in winning and losing the correct way."

So do we. And it's refreshing to have a coach who feels the same way.

Editor's note: The following is the second in a series of columns in observance of Secual Violence Awareness Week.

When I was I I, two events octured that would change my life. My father returned from Victnam alive but so seriously ill that, though only in his late 30s, he was forced to retire. My mother became, in effect, his pratect, 24-hour-a-day nurse in addition to her duties as the mother of six children. the spirit.

On Jan. 20 my father passed away after many years as a disabled invalid, and I was freed from my gift of silence. The urgency and the pressing need for silence had diminished in the passing of the years, but I had steadfastly refused to open old wounds and distress my father, simply to alleviate any lingering trauma I may have had—and which I had tried to forget.

At the funeral services for my father, I came face to face with my rapist or, rather, the man who had raped me when I was a child, As I looked at the now elderly, debilitated man, I felt the anger! I had carried all those years against him melt away. I seems that Karma had caught up with him, and my aching need for justice dissipated. I could afford to forgive him for what he had done.

of six children.

As the only daughter, I knew my duty was to assist my parents as much as possible, so I became acting-assistant mom. I helped raise my three younger brothers, and sometimess my two older brothers. I was a good daughter—as good as I could be.

Then the other event which changed my life occurred — I was raped.

The guy that did it chose his victim well. I didn't press charges, I told no one.

victim well. I didn't press charges, I told no one.

I kept it a secret because I was ashamed of what had happened to me. I knew I was blameless.

And I kept it a secret because I was exeruciatingly shy then, or because I thought no one would believe me. forgive him for what he had done.

I know I'm not unique in having been raped. However, it was so distressing it made my being sexually assaulted when I was 18 a minor unpleasantness.

I think my early experience has had negative repercussions in my life. I think they've influenced my dealings with men, ranging from how to deal with a difficult professor to my regrettable choice of a husband. It may even account for hiding my femininity and my attractiveness, at which some people would say I've been extremely successful.

Sadly, rape, sexual assault and abuse still continue. Fortunately, there are now readily available means of dealing with those experiences.

KERA promotes centralization

Bureaucrats want control of schools

Editor's note: The following is the third in a series of Matt Felice's columns titled "Edusocialism."

For those of you who still doubt the reality of what has legitimately been termed an Orwellian nightmare, there are new revelations to this rapidly unfolding scheme of edusocialism appearing daily in the press.

ing daily in the press.

The Kentucky Kernel recently reported that Education Commissioner Thomas Boysen's overtly stated quest is "the second revolution in education," noting U.S. Education Secretary Richard Reilly's adoption of KERA as a "lighthouse" to national education reform.

Immediately, we must recognize that revolu-tion and change in themselves are not threaten-ing or un-American, but that the centralized, bu-reaucratized enforcement of those most

I have faith that even my liberal adversaries would agree with that, and hence it is left to me to prove that KERA implementation does, indeed, employ centralized, bureaucratic enforcement, despite all KERA's talk of rights, opportunity and decentralization.

That last term is the most self-contradictory of all KERA claims.

What many still do not realize is that official ties between KERA operatives and the federal government have been made since 1990; one example was Reilly's meeting with KERA offi-



cials at a virtually unpublicized convention at Lexington's Marriott Griffin Gate Resort last

But federal ties are not the only concern. In my last column, I referred to the June 1978 Freemen's Digest, which detailed a congres-sional investigation that revealed the actions of tax-exempt foundations, which had subsidized a drive toward a collectivist labor force.

These workers would have been trained un-er the teachings of John Dewey and Karl Marx y "reformed" universities.

During those hearings, a foundation-subsidized social scientist testified that the Carnegie and Rockefeller families had joined forces to back this plan, which he termed "pro-gressive education."

gressive education."

If that doesn't conjure up images of Orwell's Thought Police, perhaps this will, as quoted directly from a social study by The American Council of Learned Societies, titled "Conclusions and Recommendations". "9. Cumulative evidence supports the conclusion that, in the United States and other countries, the age of individualism and laissex faire ... is closing and that a new age of collectivism is emerging."

The study describes the hardships of the free enterprise system and concludes in point 13 that "these tensions ... will continue until some aproximate adjustmen is made between social thought, social practice and economic realities."

Now here's the local connection. In 1991 the Now here's the local connection. In 1991 the Cincinnati Enquirer reported that The Carnegie Corp. of New York had pledged \$250,000 to the Prichard Committee, a large Kentucky lobbyist group originally adopted by KERA to help or-ganize and fund a massive propaganda cam-paign, the fruits of which you may have spotted on grocery bags and oil company commercials. The Carnegie funds, however, were granted to set up "watchdog groups," which the commit-tee director, Robert Sexton, said would monitor the site-based school councils to make sure they were keeping in line with KERA philosophies and report deviations to the State Board of Edu-cation.

The agency set up to enforce this was headed by a retired FBI agent.

by a retured P51 agent.

In simpler terms, the site-based councils — parent/leacher groups set up to decentralize the influence of local school boards — are in reality the purpets of a centralized state bureaucracy. Power was never transferred from localities to citizens; it all went straight to Frankfort, and from there to Washington, D.C.

That \$250,000 Carnegie grant is a mere mari-onette string in a reformation that has already cost Kenucky taxpayers more than \$1 billion. Social adjustment is, indeed, an expensive pro-osition, but as Marx predicted in his evolution-ary alternative to revolution, free enterprise has unwittingly supplied its potential demise.


