## Invisible governor's race poised to heat up

## Rare primary run-off likely

Campaign reform may have made this campaign nearly invisible so far, but Kentucky voters soon will see the 1996 gubernatorial candidates at their best, says a UK state politics expert.

In the 16 days separating the run of the Kentucky Derby and the flip of the poll levers for the May 23 primary, candidates from both parties seem poised to launch the bulk of their offensive.

"We haven't really seen the major (TV) ads yet," said Penny

Miller, a political science profes-sor who has written two books on Kentucky politics.

Voters often don't focus their

Voters often don't focus their attention upon politics until after the turnstiles close at Churchill Downs, which happens this year on May 6, she said.

The candidates campaign chests were tightly restricted this year due to some recent — and controversial — camtroversial — camtroversi

paign

reform laws. After the Derby, Miller said four major candidates will likely throw all the money they can into TV spots, and release some of the more colorful parts of their platforms.

Perhaps most importantly, Miller said, Kentucky voters should prepare for a Democratic primary this year between Lt. Gov. Paul Patton and either Secretary of State Bob Babbage or Senate Majority Leader John "Eck" Rose.

It would be the second primary

It would be the second primary run-off in Kentucky history. The new campaign reforms require a candidate to win at least 40 percent of the vote in the May election.

Brown escaped the Democratic primary in 1979 with just 29 percent or ...e popular vote, she said, and no candidate since has also earned a 40 percent majority.

On the other end of the political spectrum in this race, Republican Larry Forgy's bid in this primary may not be as much of a lock as everyone assumes, Miller said.

His nearest challenger is for-

mer Republican party chairman Bob Gable, a shrewd businessman who may smell an opportunity.

There is wide speculation that Gable, a millionaire, may have dumped a hefry contribution from himself into his campaign on the filing deadline Saturday. He does not have to report the money until the next filing deadline May 9.

If Gable did throw a fortune into his campaign, Miller said he may be throwing a wernch into Forgy's effort.

"Everybody thought (Gable) was running to combat the cam-

Whatever happens, a legitimate run by Gable may be a wish come true for Democratic candidates.

## NATION Sketch released of Okla. bombing suspect

WASHINGTON — The FBI released an enhanced sketch of the mysterious "John Doe No. 2" yesterday and a witness promptly said he remembered him — a man speaking broken English. Investigators worried that "like-minded people" might be helping the bombing suspect elude one of the biggest manhunts in history.

Identifying the suspect from the new FBI Steas it was shown on television, the manager of the Great Western Inn in Junction City, Kan., said John Doe No. 2 checked in about 8:30 p.m. on April 17 driving a Ryder truck. The FBI has said a Ryder truck rented that day in Junction City was used to deliver the bomb to a federal building in Oklahoma City.

"He spoke broken English and he was not 100 percent American," said the hotel manager, who would not give his name and who himself spoke with a heavy accent of the Indian subcontinent.

The new sketch, based on additional interviews with witnesses in Kansas, showed the square-jawed suspect wearing a baseball-style hat. The previous sketch showed a thick-haired man wearing no hat.

## Unabomber may be unraveling

SAN FRANCISCO — The cool and meticulous Unabomber, who has attacked without warning during 17 years of terror, wrote letters this time around that indicate he's unraveling, federal sources early asstratory.

"We anticipated something before the summer," said one source, who spoke on condition of anonymity. "This guy has flipped out."

The latest victim: A lobbyist for the timber industry in California. Gilbert B. Murray, 47, was killed Monday when a mailed package bomb went off in his Sacramento office. Murray, president of the California Forestry Association, was the third person killed in 16 attacks attributed to the Unabomber since 1978. Twenty-three people have been injured.

## Opposition to affirmative action grows

Opposition to affirmative action grows WASHINGTON — Support for a referendum WASHINGTON — Support for a referendum topped 80 percent in a national poll released yesterday, but plunged after respondents were read several hypothetical outcomes.

Women and minority groups say the results prove strong support for affirmative action programs exists across the country despite the current national political debate about whether they should be terminated.

But a proponent of the proposed state referendum countered that the results released by The Feminist Majority Foundation are meaningless, saying broad-based support for ending preferences and quotas clearly exists. The proposed measure doesn't mention affirmative action. It seeks to end discrimination against or preferential treatment for any individual or group in the state's employment, public education or contracting systems.

Smoke covered North Campus yesterday when a blaze engulfed a campus landmark. Bystanders said flames shot out of the roof of China Express at 188 W. Euclid Ave. before fire-fighters extinguished the blaze. First-year graduate students Russ Geboy and Mitch Bernston were eating at Barry T's on South Limestone Street when they heard the fire trucks. "White smoke covered the

"White smoke covered the whole area," Geboy said. "There were flames coming out of the

the fire apparently was started by grease in the cooking area.

The kitchen area of the China Express was destroyed in the fire, but the rest of structure suffered little damage, Mattingly said.

The fire department received a call at 3:31 p.m. and was on the scene at 3:34 p.m., he said.

UK Police blocked traffic at the corner of Euclid and South Limestone as firefighters battled the blaze. The intersection was closed for two to three hours yesterday afternoon, police said.

After a stint at the University of routh Dakota, Zinser was appointed president of Gallaudet University, a hearing-impaired institute. But she resigned after only four days as students demanded that a first-ever deaf president be appointed. The situation was covered by international media.

MIAMI — Baseball returned last night with a big crowd, a few boos and a powerful performance by Raul Mondesi.

Last season's National League rookie of the year homered twice, doubled and drove in four runs to help the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Florida Marlins 8-7, ending the splintered sport's record 257-day layoff.

Although there were a few thousand empty seats on opening night, the crowd of 42,125 was announced as a sellout. The first game since the strike, however, was still surrounded by another labor problem — locked-out umpires picketed outside while replacement umps worked without any arguments.

The Marlins rallied from an 8-2 deficit, scoring four times in the ninth inning before Rudy Seanez struck out rookie Charles Johnson

to end the game.

The fans greeted the players with a mixed reception.

Just prior to the game, both teams lined up along the base paths and tipped their caps toward the stands in a gesture of reconciliation following the longest strike in baseball history.

"Thanks to the loyal, patient and knowledgeable baseball fans of South Florida," the public address announcer said.

The crowd jeered.

Then came the first pitch of pro baseball's 126th season, albeit 23 days and 2 minutes late. At 7:37 p.m. EDT, Florida's John Burkett threw a fastball that was fouled off.

The crowd cheered.

It was baseball's best moment in 8 1/2 months.

The game was the first sports event at Joe Robbie Stadium since the Super Bowl. The Dodgers scored as easily as the 49ers, rapping 13 hits, including five doubles, one triple and a homer.



## Salary system study to be released today

UK's chapter of the American Association of University Profes-sors will release a 50-page study today that gives a comprehensive breakdown of the University's salary system.

The report gained prominence

i ne report gained prominence two years ago when it revealed a contrast between the average salaries of men and women faculty at UK, AAUP chapter President Michael Kennedy said. The study showed men were getting paid much more than their female counterparts.

getting paid much more than their female counterparts. This year the report will follow UK's progress toward meeting goals it set to correct the discrep-ancy, Kennedy said, and will be released in the Margaret I. King North Library's Peale Gallery at 3 n.m.

p.m. In addition, the report lists the average salaries for faculty of all ranks, in all departments and among genders and races.

The report is intended "to give administrators an idea of the salaries for faculty members," Kennedy said. "And to let faculty members

According to a memo from Gene Williams, vice president for Information Systems, the UK community now has more than 30,000 e-mail users. The growth of e-mail over the last several years has caused the Uni-

The current UKCC system could not support the growing number of e-mail users on campus, so the University decided to select a new server.
The UKCC system did not handle e-mail transfers from systems outside of UK well, but the new server will be able to handle e-mail from outside systems better, providing users more efficient service.
An e-mail task force selected the Eudora software as the new standard e-mail program for

cient service.

An e-mail task force selected the Eudora software as the new standard e-mail program for campus. In addition to a new common program, the new server is a Post Office Protocol, or POP mail. The POP server was installed on campus and has been working since the beginning of the semester.

Offic-ampus e-mail users can access the UK account, and the new system can also handle mixed media messes, including graphics and sudio.

## Ivory tower full of researchers, not quality educators

et me tell you about Alan Brinkley. et me tell you about Alan Brinkley.

Harvard University's student guide called him an enthus-astic professor "brings alive one of the most utralient periods in American history with an organization and fluid speaking style that few of his peers can match."

Students reported the 37-year-old scholar took an interest in them, advised them for classes, helped them with tests, etc.

In lectures, Brinkley was nothing less than electrifying — sparking both curiosity and interest.

He won Harvard's Levenson Award for Outstanding Teaching, while his students left the lecture hall "feeling not saturated but fascinated and hungry for more."

In 1985, Harvard fired him.

Author Charles Sykes writes Barkley's story briefly in "ProfS-cam: Professors and the Demise of Higher Education."

After narrowly being recommended for tenure by fellow faculty members in the history department, Barlely's promotion was overturned by Harvard's dean of Arts and Sciences.

Why would a teacher of such high esteem be kicked off campus by such a respectable institution?
The answer is obvious, Harvard, like most of modern higher education, doesn't want good teachers.
It wants researchers.
Researchers, you see, make money. Last year, their collective efforts helped heap more than \$100 million into UK's coffers.
Barkley's story should perhaps ring a bell for those who recall the outrage of College of Architecture students, which led to protest last September.
Despite the spirited protest, former Chancellor for the Lexington Campus Robert Hemenway



Clary was a respected scholar and highly regarded teacher who, his architecture students said, created enthusiasm in his lectures and always was available outside classroom hours.

His department also barely yielded its recommendation for his tenure promotion, but he

Indeed, it is hard to imagine a more privi-leged post than the seat of a tenured professor. Instead of education, they have become freelance salesmen hawk-ing their research to any boring academic journal that will accept them.

Columnist and Harvard economist Thomas Sowell wrote recently that a University of Michigan professor told him candidly, "Every minute I spend in a undergraduate classroom is costing me money and prestige." Administrators and the pompous faculty eitle rationalize professors' flight from the classroom by saying good research makes good teachers.

At the same time, they ignore the glaring contradiction that when professors abandon their real jobs to trace the origins of the African mango or some other worthless enterprise, they leave undergraduates to fend for themselves amid a sea of foreign-tongued teaching assistants and graduate students hardly more qualified than their own students.

This is how we wind up with pesty TAs who articulate their pet

agendas, and why I've been taught the foundation of the Islamic faith in geography class and the basis of the feminist rights movement in telecommunications. Not to forget those foreign teaching students who try hard, but whom no one can understand.

Asked about the problem of the heavy concentrations of foreign TAs in mathematics and science departments, Hemenway would faithfully respond that there aren't enough graduate students who speak English as their primary language in either department to fill the schedule box. Hemenway is at Kansas University now, but let me advise any successor that perhaps the answer to this predicament is making the professors do what they are paid for — teach.
