ave you ever wanted to go somewhere during Spring Break but just couldn't afford it? Or maybe work kept you from taking the week off. Here are a few activities that are local and less expensive for Breakers on a budget.

Mammoth Cave National Park

ammoth Cave is the longest cave in the world, with over 350 miles of surveyed passageways, right here in Kentucky. There are many different tours available ranging from an hour and 15 minutes to three

The Historic Tour allows you to see many of the caves' greatest features and lasts around two hours.

The Violet City Lantern Tour is only lit by the lanterns you're given to carry and lasts around three hours.

Besides going on tours, the park also offers hiking, canoeing and horseback riding.

It is recommended that you make reservations for a tour at least one day in advance.

Harvey, CEO of Schools Tours of America.

If it students intend to drink alcohol, it is especially important to plan your lodging in a safe, patrolled hotel zone with safe access to the central party zone.

Remember the proverb, "you get what you pay for." Students who are traveling unfamiliar locations, especially outside the country, should spend the extra money while booking their trip to place themselves in a stable and well-known hotel chain. Many resorts offer an all-inclusive meal and drink plan.

Harvey said he typically tells his clients to bring enough money for three meals a day, admissions, cab fares and any extra nighttime entertainment.

"Obviously the cost fluctuates if alcohol is involved," he said. Students must also remember to bring extra money in case of unanticipated necessities or emergencies.
Of course, upon arrival, students should take account of the various activities the area offers and devise a budget on the first night of the trip. Ideally, students should research the location on the Internet to get a general ballpark figure on the various costs before arriving.

Spring Breakers may be seen as easy targets for crime or scams and have a tendency to become inebriated during their trip, so travelers should always try to place safety first and prepare for the worst case sce-

Harvey said there are four important items that a spring breaker should not leave home without:

• Travelers checks instead of a lot cash;
• photo copies of your ID and passport to keep it in a separate location from other

to keep it in a separate location from other valuables;

As a credit card and/or and ATM card to pay for those unforeseen emergencies and Apone range can be unpredictable, especially with a little bit or planning and research, students should be able to have a great Spring Break.

Although it might take extra time, planning and packing to make sure you have a safe trip will make it all worthwhile after hitting warm sand and wild waves.
