# UK Police solicit SGA funds to buy rape-prevention items

Student Government Association Senator at Large Misty Weaver spearheaded a debate last night over whether the SGA Senate should allocate \$3,000 for the pur-chase of rape defense equipment.

while Weaver vehemently voiced her concern about the principle of the purchase, the senate decided to approve funds for the purchase anyway.

UK Police Chief W.H. McCo-UK Police Chief W.H. McCo-mas, who brought the proposal to SGA, said the equipment, called the Rape-Aggression Defense Sys-tem, would be used for a rape pre-vention program that the police de-partment will be giving in the near future. He said the program will be offered to all female UK students.

McComas said the equipment consists of a protective body suit, nicknamed the RAD suit, that the

Sophomore Sara Engelhardt said people should be allowed to smoke in certain areas as long as they "respect the rights of those who don't smoke."

# Blacks receive mixed reception when seeking membership in traditionally white greek system

# Russian writer speaks about dismal economy

Inflation without increased wages is one of several factors contributing to dismal conditions in the former Soviet Union, a Russia writer said during a speech at the Student Center Tuesday night.

"The price of products and the will of the people are in contradic-tion," Danill Chkonia said through a translator.

ransator.

About 25 people showed to hear Chkonia speak about economic problems facing Russia since the failed military coup in August of 1901. problems facing Russia since the failed military coup in August of 1991.

Chkonia blamed the Russian prime minister, Yegor Gaidar, for many of the problems.

Eaves wasn't on the guest list but entered with friends who were members of the men's bas-ketball team. He was admitted and his hand was stamped.

He stayed and circulated there even after his friends left and no one said anything to him. Then, "I was standing there talking to this girl, a white girl." Some members of the fraterity then approached him and asked if they could help him. Eaves said he responded. "No, I'm not thirsty."

"One of the guys asked me who I was," Eaves said. He said he was told, "'I don't think you were invited. It's time for you to leave.'"

Sigma Chi President Steve Sta-ples said he had no knowledge of the incident but said, "It could very well be possible."

very well be possible."

He said prejudice exists in every organization but said it might not have been a factor in that inclent. "If you're not on the guest list, you leave, simple as that."

Eaves said the situation didn't seem so clear-cut. If he had been white, he said, no one would have asked him to leave. "They didn't feel threatened by me standing in there," he said. "God forbid, I was holding hands or kissing her."

Similar situations have hap-pened at other fraternities, he said. "Since then, I haven't gone to an-other party that (Phi Sig) didn't have."

Still, he said he doesn't keep a grudge against the fraternities themselves. "Even though it hurt me, I still don't hold it against that organization."

Mills said he rarely encounters overt prejudice as a member of Lambda Chi but it's there.

Once during an intramural basketball game, he said he collided with an opponent who was white. "He was like, 'I'm not scared of you, 'I'm not scared of you,' " Mills said." "Don't think that because you're black you can intimidate me.' "

Within his fraternity, Mills said members "always ask my permis-sion before they tell a black joke."

The junior said, at times, he says he doesn't want to hear it, but "I usually tell them to try their luck."


