Dear Miss Smith:

We have had a flu epidemic here in Dallas and since two weeks before Christmas all of our family have been up and down. I was one of the first to get it and it has cut down my efficiency very much. But in a few weeks spring will be here and the warmer weather..

If it isn't too late I want to make a small contribution for the portrait of Professor Bonner.. I am sorry it must be this small.

Perhaps you wonder how things are here at Southern Methodist in war time. Our enrolment is somewhat smaller but a large number of the faculty are in service . Also we are helped a little by a Navy Program. Financially we seem to be in sound condition. The total number of students in Latin and Greek is not down much but they are in fewer courses and sections..

A little over a year ago in the evening I started taking some math courses, mainly because so many of the faculty were doing it and because I was so weak in math that Jimmy's questions were already bothering me. But I made an impression on the head of the math Dept. and one course led to another. Last June I found myself teaching a math course in summer school, and in July and Sept. more math courses. In fact the math Dept and the administration seem well satisfied. I realize that this teaching is harming me as a Greek scholar. It takes an enormous amount of time. But it surely has strengthened my position here and perhaps my prestige also.

I am sorry I have been so late in writing,

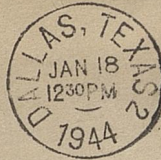

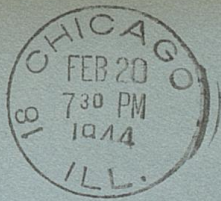
I'm glad to contribute something towards the portrait of Mr. Bonner. It seems to me an excellent idea, & I'm happy to help a little with it.

favorite characters.

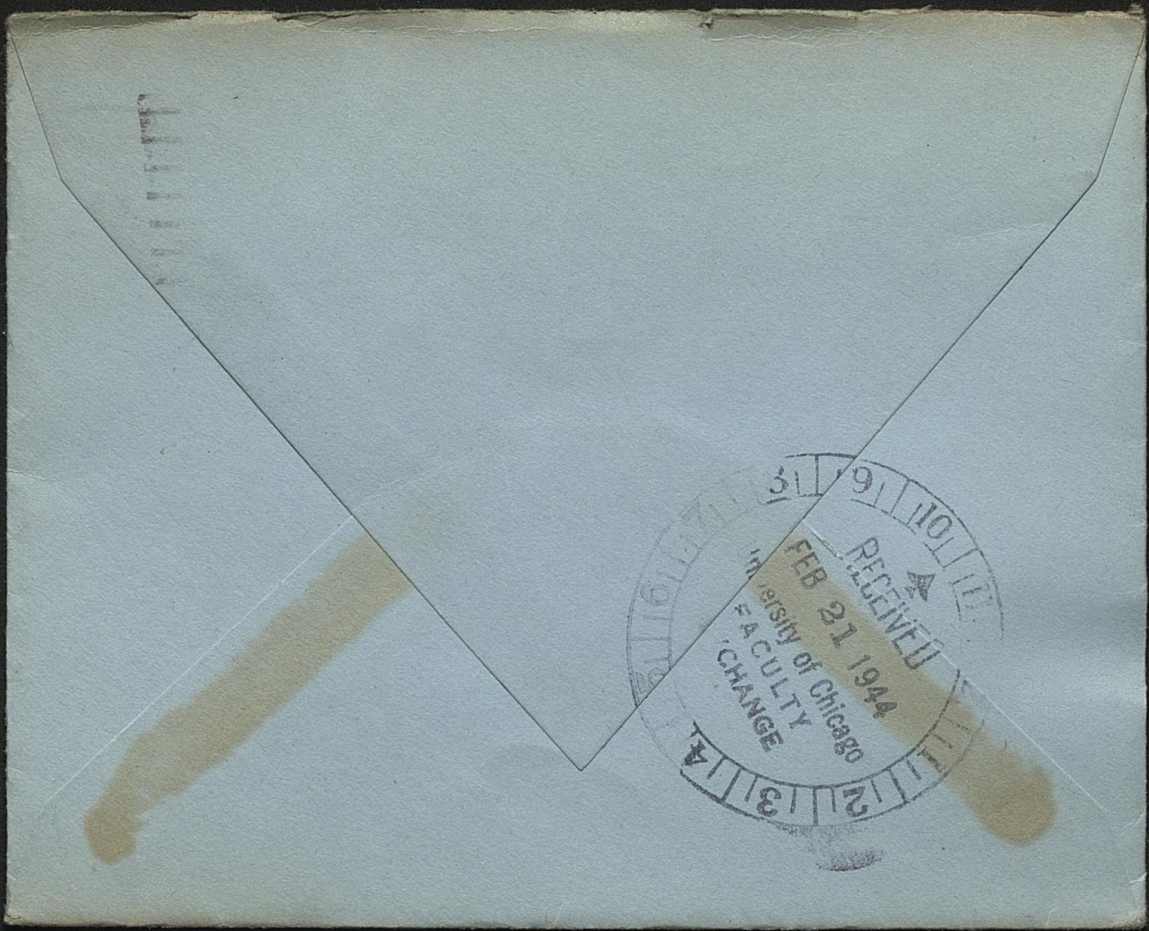
Some day soon I hope

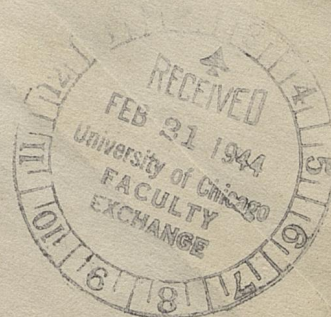

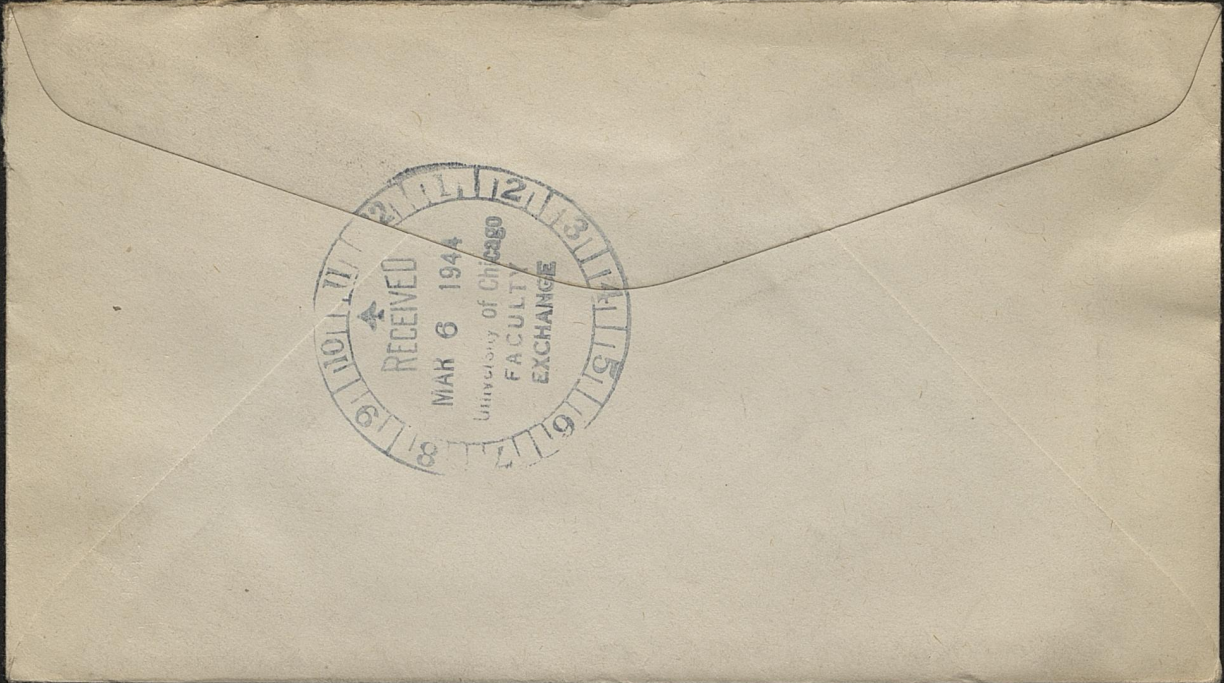

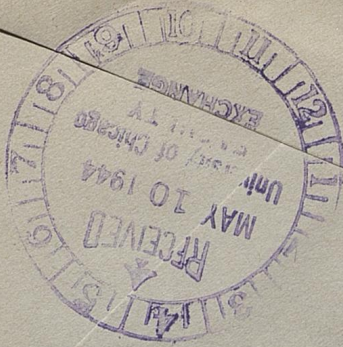

Dear Gertrude, -

This is a shameful time to reply to a letter of round about last Christmastime, but I have been stirred into a sort of activity by the imminence of being sent overseas. Didn't want to leave without taking care of a few things, and an answer to your letter was one of them. My contribution to Dr. Bonner's portrait must be ὀδύροῦ τε φιλῶν τε. I hope it is not too late to accept it. If so, just bar up this very small check. Wish it could be more, but 2nd Lt. S. who don't know definitely what they are going to do after the war have to be extremely careful. By the way, what about Prof. Bonner? Is he still living and well? I do hope so, but have heard nothing either directly or indirectly for a very long time. If you have time, write to me and bring me up to date.

Have been at the Cadet Center in San Antonio since 1942. My last job was teaching Brazilian Cadets English, which was fun, and I learned a little Portuguese on the side. But the battle of San Antonio was becoming a bit boring, so I was glad to get orders shifting me here a few days ago. Am taking a course of training after which there is a strong

likelihood of my being sent overseas. So want to see the other side before it is all over and this seems to be my chance. Sorry I cannot discuss my activities here in detail.

Theoretically, I still have some sort of a job to go back to at Missouri after the war. But practically speaking I rather doubt that I'll ever go back there, or continue in the Teaching Profession. Somehow I am not exactly the type, I suppose, and being restless by nature and somewhat fed up, shall do something else (anything else) after the war. How do you find things at Chicago? Would be delighted to have your news and your views if you can find time to write. I'll be here for several weeks, at least.

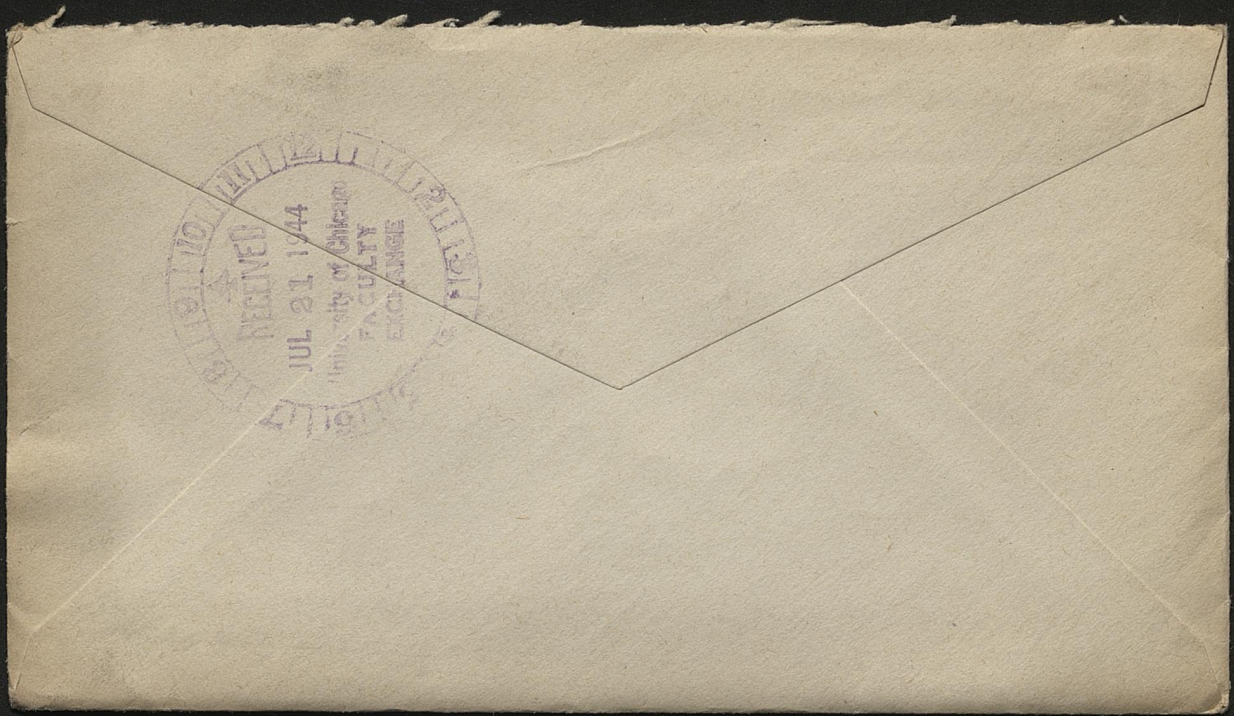
