George Bentley is an independent parking own-ref. His 43-space lot is located behind Wildcat Text-books on Prall Street. Paul Shaw has been leasing the property from Bentley for the past 17 years.
Shaw said his lot of-

fers more than just parking.

"We do a little bit of everything." Shaw said.

Located one block away on Montmullin Street, The Inkspot president Donald Ware rents 27 spaces. Ware offers semester parking for \$275, yearly \$600, and summer (\$125)

#### Financial aid scrutinized by Dept. of Education

Financial aid and drug convictions don't mix.
Controversy has been mounting to encourage lawmakers to reform the Higher Education Act.
Under the HEA those convicted of selling or possessing drugs could have a difficult time getting financial aid.

The real controversy is in that not all those with convictions are covered in the current policy.

Students will not usually receive financial aid if they are charged with a drug conviction throughout the year.

maincas atta ir mey are charged with a drug conviction throughout the year.

The Department of Education is not aware of the crime until the next year where the student renews their financial at a spokesman from the U.S. Department of Education.

Some find this law to be unfair in the way it is written and believe it will hinder people from becoming contributing members of society.

"Even if they (those with drug convictions) have messed up in their past they deserve a second chance," said Elizabeth Sysol, an agriculture communications and animal science junior.

According to the U.S. Department of Education an estimated 10 million students across the nation apply for financial aid each semester. Only 8,000 people admit to having been charged with a drug conviction.

## Parking meters removed for construction

The convenience of short-term parking near the Funkhouser Building is now unavailable, hindering those who have quick meetings in the building.

The 14 meters near the building were removed this summer. The meters, which enabled anyone to park for a short time are being stored because of construction in the area.

New walkways are being constructed in the zone the meters occupied, and the construction has yet to be finished. Meanwhile, parking in the area has become a hassle.

Don Witt, university registrar, said that while he hasn't had any complaints yet, many might be filed once school has been in session for a few days.

"Parking is a concern to us and we want to make sure it is as convenient as possible," he said.

The meters will be replaced within a couple of weeks, said Don Thornton of UK Parking and Transportation. "It will be an inconvenience for those that want short-term parking," he said. "Th sure they (the construction cree) will try to get in and out of these areas as soon as possible. They're trying to improve the situation, and it just takes time to do those things."

Thornton said the old meters would be replaced by a multi-space parking meter like those in use near the Singletary Center. The parking spaces will be numbered and the meter will have change slots for each numbered space.

He said the new meter will be more attractive, and will cut down on the maintenance required.

Parking meters have been in demand for students. According to a survey by Parking and Transportation, students who are the primary users of the meters, would like to see an increase in meters around

Funkhouser.

Employees would also like to see more meters in the area so that they can accommodate those wanting to park there. Thornton said.

"I think they'll realize that it's uncontrollable." he said. "Everyone is having to make adjustments during this time."

The meter population on campus, once at 10, has increased to 313 during a 16-year period.

In the meantime, Thornton advises students and others looking for a convenient parking space to check the parking lot behind Funkhouser or the parking structure labeled number five.
"I would recommend that students not look for short-term parking until the construction is done," he said. Parking in the areas without the meters could result in a parking citation, but workers are trying to stop everyone entering and inform them of what is going on.

EDDYVILLE — A man serving 30 years for assault and escape was fatally stabbed Wednesday at the Kentucky State Penitentiary, prison officials said.

Timothy Lumpkins, 35, died from multiple stab wounds at 3:35 pm. CDT yesterday when inmates were being released for the evening meal. Inmate Perry Bell, 35, was also stabbed during the same altercation, officials said. Officials were still investigating the incident but said they believed Bell and Lumpkins were both attacked by another person.

The prison was placed on lockdown status, and all visitation was suspended until further notice, officials said.

#### Storm surprises forecasters

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — Tropical Storm

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — Tropical Storm Dean surprised forecasters yesterday emerging quickly with fierce winds that forced airlines to cancel more than 30 flights in the Caribbean and collapsed a daycare center ceiling. Dean showed up early in the day as nothing more than a tropical wave, a less powerful weath-er system. But by a fetronon, aircraft measured the winds and forecasters upgraded it to a tropi-cal storm.

#### NASA releases Jupiter portrait

PASADENA, Calif. — NASA released new images yesterday of Jupiter's moon Callisto, including a full-color portrait and the closest look ever at the planet-sized body's ancient, cratered surface.

The images, acquired May 25 by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Galileo spacecraft, were taken as close as 86 miles from the moon. The images show objects as small as 10 feet across. The state of the close-up im-ages is unlike anything seen before on Jupiter's moons.

#### Gateway gets error message

SAN DIEGO — Computer maker Gateway Inc. got an error message Wednesday from a major credit rating agency, which downgraded the company's bonds to "junk" status.

Standard & Poor's lowered the No. 4 computer retailer's debr rating to BBB- from BB. The high-yield rating makes it harder for the company to raise money as it struggles to return to profitability in an increasingly harsh personal computer market.

S&P said in a news release that the down grade reflects tough industry conditions, Gateway's declining revenue base and the company's expectation that it will not return to profitability until inscal 2002. The control of the current market and competitive environment, Gateway may be challenged to restore profitability to expected levels in fiscal 2002. The credit rating firm said.

Gateway said its restructuring plan will help the bottom line.

Major source of transportation on campus will not make normal stops in distant future

Routes for UK Campus Area Transportation Shuttles are going to be different this semester, another obstacle students will endure due to campus construction.

CATS, which is a major source of transportation for students, will no longer be students, will no longer be stread, all busse except for the buses destined to Lexington Community College are rerouted around the construction.

According to Lance Broeking of
Parking and Transportation,

this route will be the easiest for students with disabilities because there is less of a slope.

The road has been closed since the Administration Building caught fire late in the spring.

The Virginia Avenue route, which went down Rose Street to the College of Nursing, will instead go down Washington Avenue and stop by Parking Structure No. 3. The stadium routes and the night routes, which run Monday through Thursday, have also been somewhat altered in order to avoid construction.

Brooking said that the Virginia Register of the state of the

Broeking said that the Virginia Avenue route should be back to normal by Oct. 1, when the re-alignment of Rose Street is scheduled to be completed.

The Administration Drive route, however, may not be finished for up to two years.

"The Administration Drive stop is probably the biggest impact," Broeking said. "It may be a small inconvenience, but it's the best we can do with the cards we've been dealt."

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

when the conviction took place and how recent it was.

The older the conviction is the more likely an applicant is to be granted aid.

It also is helpful if the person has been through a drug rehabilitation program, the spokesman said.

He said that for each con-

spokesman said.

He said that for each conviction the applicant has had since 1999 they would have to

wait a year for their monies to be granted.

be granted.

If applicants were convicted in 1999 or later "chances are pretty good they will be denied aid," the spokesman said.

For example if an applicant has had two convictions they will have a two-year wait.

Sometimes applicants will only receive partial aid until they have completed the waiting process

Lynda George of Financial Aid said the process of denying students is automatic and there is a very specific way of doing things.

She said that around 65 per-cent of all UK students receive either partial or complete finan-cial aid.

Whether or not this policy will be changed is not yet known, but some say even if it does not, students can get a second chance.

Center said even those who

Sophomore quarterback Jared Lorenzen and the first-team offense turned in a solid performance during yester-day's 61-play situational scrim-mage that saw the first-string defense continue to make strides.

Lorenzen worked primarily with the first-team offense against the second-team defense, while redshirt freshman quarterback Shane Boyd worked with the second-team offense against the first-team defense.

"I expected us to move the football on that group and we did," coach Guy Morriss said. "I thought the first-team de-

Defensive Coordinator John Goodner echoed Morriss' praise of his unit, but noted that its depth must be improved.

Ends Chris Demaree, a senior, and Dennis Johnson, a junior, were routinely in the backfield, without the aid of sophomore tackle Jeremy Caudill, who sat out the scrim-mage to rest a back injury he sustained while strength train-ing over the season. Junior Der-rick Johnson, Dennis' brother, played in Caudill's place.

The offense was also hindered by injuries. UK's top-three tight ends set out the scrimmage. Junior Derek Smith, a pre-season All-SEC tight end, was sidelined by a concussion he sustained during practice on Aug. 12.



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

# Prohibiting DNA may deny justice

Three letters have so much implication, especially for our changing judicial system. DNA has cleared people on death row and indicted people who would otherwise have never been caught. DNA is changing the study of

cial system. DNA has cleared people on death row and indicted people who would otherwise have never been caught. DNA is changing the study of forensics. It has become a genetic fingerprint, helping to solve cases that might otherwise still be open.

Like all other states, Kentucky requires that DNA samples be obtained from convicted sex offenders. Much like fingerprints, DNA samples must be taken from sex crime scenes. This way, the DNA from the crime scene can be compared against the DNA in the database of convicted criminals. Kentucky began this practice in 1992.

Few would disagree that this is a useful tool in solving sex crimes, especially given the accuracy levels of DNA samples.

Last week the Kentucky Court of Appeals handed down a ruling that may hinder future investigations in sex crime cases. According to an article in the Lexington Herald-Leader, the court unanimously ruled that juveniles do not have to provide DNA samples.

The case centered upon J.D.K. (identified in court opinions only by his initials), a 14-year-old boy who pleaded guilty to the sexual abuse and sodomy of his 9-year-old sister and her 8-year-old friend. The prosecutors asked that J.D.K. provide a DNA sample, and the lower courts agreed the request was valid.

quest was valid.

The appeals court, however, said that J.D.K. was not technically a "convicted" felon because another statute excludes juvenile settlements from the definition of conviction.

We certainly realize that juvenile law is different from regular criminal law. Juvenile offenders should have rights regarding their privacy once they come of age, assuming they have received their punishment and are adequately rehabilitated.

In cases involving sex crimes of this nature, the rate of rehabilitation is Why deny investigators a tool that could aid future

To protect juveniles' privacy, why not seal the sample instead of including it in the database? At least there would be some sort of evidence on file, even if it required a court order to be opened.

To totally deny any sort of sample is to thwart a valuable investigative tool. The police has the technology to solve sex crimes. In cases such as these where a possible suspect has been previously convicted, this technology should be available to the police.





## **Insurance choices limited** for public employees

FRANKFORT — Teachers and thousands of other public employees are seeing big increases in premiums on health insurance for families and dependents.

The increases are as much as 40 percent in some cases, costing employees hundreds of dolars more per month, especially in a dozen counties where there is no competition. An employee's choice is to sign on with the only available carrier or forgo dependent coverage altogether.

able carrier or forgo dependent coverage altogether.

"Probably some of these folks will be paying out more for health insurance than they pay for their housing," said Rep. Tanya Pullin, who represents a one-carrier county — Greenup. "The ones I'm concerned about make just a smidgen too much" to qualify for subsidized insurance for their children.

Personnel Secretary Carol Palmore blamed the General Assembly's decisions to let cities, counties and regional universities withdraw their active employees from the state insurance group but keep their retirees in it.

Since retirees have higher health-care costs on average, they drove up the cost of coverage for everyone else in the group, she said.
Palmore told legislators on Wednesday that forcing the universities back into the state

group would be "the best thing the General Assembly could do"
"If a regional university is going to have its retirees in there, it needs to have its 'activee' in there, too, "Palmore told the interim joint State Government Committee's Senate co-chairman, Republican Albert Robinson of London, said Palmore's suggestion was "the right thing to do, in my opinion" but unlikely, given the universities' influence. "Legislators are just not willing to bite the bullet," Robinson said.
The state covers an employee's premium

The state covers an employee's premium cost, which will be \$320.96 a month in Greenup County, where Anthem Blue Cross-Blue Shield will be the only available carrier. The employee bears the cost of covering a spouse, a child or a whole family.

Anthem's family-plan premium will be \$802.44 per month, meaning an employee would have to pay a difference of \$481.48.

Another carrier, CHA Health, will be offering family coverage for \$217 per month less than Anthem. But CHA has pulled out of several counties, including Greenup.

Other counties in which Anthem is the only carrier: Boyd, Breckinridge, Carter, Daviess, Elliott, Grayson, Hanocok, Henderson, Lawrence, McLean and Union.
