A committee consisting of the SGA president, senators and past election board members should make changes in the system to ensure that this problem won't recur.

Possible ways of revising the voting system include the establishment of specified voting areas. These could be by year, college or last name.

The argument has been made that changes that make it a little more difficult to vote would decrease an already low turnout.

SGA must take a stand to eradicate a flaw in the system. If they do not, the legitimacy of all future elections will be questioned.

### Philippines in turmoil over killing

MANILA, Philippines — Crowds gathered at bus stops in Manila early this morning, uncertain whether public transportation would operate because of a call for a daylong general strike to protest the killing of a labor leader.

The Ministry of Education suspended classes in the area for the day.

Organizers had predicted at least 2.1 million people would join the strike in Manila and outlying areas.

Meanwhile, a private Manila radio station, DZRH, said police had detained a possible suspect in the killing of labor leader Rolando Olalia, 52.

Olalia's mutilated body was found Thursday off a highway on the edge of Manila. He was leader of the Peoples' Party and the May 1st Movement, the country's largest and most militant labor movement.

### Bomb explodes in West German IBM

HEIDELBERG, West Germany — A bomb explosion heavily damaged an International Business Machines Corp. research center on yesterday, but caused no casualties, police said. Leftis terrorists claimed responsibility.

The bomb erupted at about 4 a.m. and damaged the facade of the four-story building and equipment inside, officials said. West German televison said the homemade device was placed on a second-floor balcony.

### Israeli iets attack guerrilla base

SIDON, Lebanon — A squadron of Israeli warplanes attacked Palestinian guerrilla bases near south Lebanon's port city of Sidon on yesterday, destroying a command post and wounding at least three people, police reported. Ambulances and fire engines raced to the village of Darb el-Sim on Sidon's southern outskirts, police said. The jets made four bombing and rocketing runs against a naval base for Palestine Liberation Organization chairman Yasser Arafat's Fatah guerrilla group at 4:35 p.m., destroying a three-story command post, according to police.

### North Korean president reported dead

TOKYO - North Korean President Kim Il Sung has died, Japan's Kyodo News Service said this morning, quot-

ing the South Korean Defense Ministry in Seoul.

Kyodo's report said that North Korean guards were broadcasting over loudspeakers across the demilitarized zone that Kim perished in a "shoot out."

It did not give other details or say when the death oc-

Japan Broadcasting Corp. also reported Kim was dead, saying he was "shot to death." It also attributed its report to the Defense Ministry in Seoul, the capital of South

The reports followed a spate of rumors in recent days that the North Korean leader, who officially was listed as 74 years old, had died.


