## NATION House haggles over legal system bills

WASHINGTON — Marching into the more controversial reaches of the "Contract With America," the Republican-controlled House argued yesterday over business-backed legislation to alter the civil legal system. A high-priced lobbying campaing pitting business interests against trial lawyers played out in the background as the House debated the bills that backers say are designed to discourage frivolous lawsuits.

The measures generally would make it easier to defend product-liability and securities-fraud cases and they pre-empt state laws by creating a federal limit on so-called punitive damages in most lawsuits. They also would provide incentives to settle suits out of court under a modified "loser pays" system that could require even a person who wims a case to bear a portion of the other side's attorney fees and costs.





Another area which most Fraternities want to improve is community ser-Unfortunately the U.K. Volunteer Center, our best resource, was recently removed from campus. IFC is now in the process contacting Volunteer Lexington Center in order to provide Greek men with information about service opportunities in the community.

Some projects, such as Adopt-a-House. and Adopt-a-School are excellent opportunities to reach out to the community.

A constant concern among Fraternities is Risk Management.

Over the last few years, Risk Management has increasingly become important in the Greek community due to the social nature of the Fraternities on campus.

Risk Management provides certain guidelines



that must be followed in order to have a safe social function. These guidelines are there in order to protect both the Fraternity and their guests.

IFC has recently enacted an addition to Risk Management concerning off campus social events that will allow us to better govern ourselves.

The Interfraternity Council has also set some

goals for itself.

One of our main goals is to become a self- governing body.

The Administration continually says that we should be a self governing body, but there are many instances in which the Administration has handled Greek related cases and IFC did not.

Another goal is to establish precedence with-

in I-Board. This will allow Fraternities to better understand the consequences of their actions, and will hopefully lead to better decisions by each chapter.

Overall, IFC wants to serve in the best interest of all Fraternity men. We are looking forward to an outstanding semester.
