The thing overlooked, it seems, by the psychologists is that the test, as given, is not a full test of human sleeplessness. Of course, really it is a test of human sleeplessness under certain

conditions.

The Georgia students did not have the stimuli that usually are associated with sleeplessness of ordinary human beings. Ordinary men stay awake for extraordinary periods, it is true, but they usually have reasons other than the mere study of what effect this lack of sleep has upon them.

While the Georgia students stayed awake as the psychologists studied them, their abstinence apparently carry over into the remainder of their usual life routine.

The question that comes to mind is what ould have been the results and reactions if the corgia students, instead of merely not sleepeng, had been fighting forest fires, fighting in attle lines, flying occans, balancing year-end ooks, playing poker, attending proms, or even ing to school regularly.

Progress And The New Need

The STUDENT en Trollment at the University is steadily growing. In a state-ment released yester

ment released yester day afternoon, Leo M. Shamberlain, registra reported an eight per cent increase in registra tion over that of last year at this time. This in crease, according to the registra, is in proportion to that of previous terms. Each succeeding year brings a new expansion to the University roll books.

roll books.

The improvement in the system of registra-tion is obvious. The facility with which the mat-ter was disposed of this week invites commenda-tion. It is a far cry from the old methods, when waiting in line for hours and plowing through classification were the order of the day. Yet, as the evidence of incessant increase in enrollment testifies, the system must be still further devel-oned.

The mechanics of registration are satisfactory. They absorb most of the difficulties and imperfections that were so glaring. But there is a need to be met in the issue of speed, which can be ameliorated by more comprehensive cooperation between faculty, officials, and students.

The Kernel does not advise a haste that will abolish essential deliberation. What it does advocate, however, is all possible dispatch in solving the problems that must inevitably arise during the registration period. At the departments of the business office and the deans of men and somen there was what seemed to be an unnecessary sluggishness in dealing with each student. There seere long, slow-dissolving queuest each of these tables: and occasionally the ame thing was to be found at the desks of the divisors.

A sufficient remedy should be found in the climination of needless details, red tape, and unessential conversation. Most of the contingencies of registration can be administered in a few seconds. If they are treated thus, a great waste of time and effort can be avoided, and the registration method now in force will remain adequate for any normal increase of enrollment.
