

Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees, University of Kentucky, June 3, 1947.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 10:10 a.m., Tuesday, June 3, 1947. Present were: Governor S. S. Willis, Chairman of the Board; Judge Richard C. Stoll, Mrs. Paul G. Blazer, Thomas Cutler, Robert C. Tway, Eldred E. Adams, Harper Gatton, J. C. Everett, H. D. Palmore, R. P. Hobson, Judge Edward C. O'Rear, and Grover Creech. Absent were: John Fred Williams, Superintendent of Public Instruction; Elliott Robertson, Commissioner of Agriculture; and J. N. Smith.

A. Approval of Minutes.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the minutes of the Board of Trustees of April 1, 1947, and the minutes of the Executive Committee of May 22, 1947, were approved as published.

B. Comptroller's Report.

The Comptroller read the following summarized statement and submitted the following detailed report.

Dear President Donovan:

I submit hereto attached the University of Kentucky Financial Report for the period of ten months ended April 30, 1947.

Income realized during the period excluding Restricted Fund transfers amounted to \$5,390,377.11. The amount realized is 93.8% of the corresponding budget estimate of \$5,744,061.93. Income allocated to Plant Funds amounted to \$577,327.50.

The Board examined the report as to income and expenditures, and after due consideration, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, ordered the report received and made a part of the minutes.

C. Award of Contracts on Fine Arts Building.

Mr. Ernst V. Johnson of Brock & Johnson, Architects, and Mr. E. B. Farris, Chief Engineer of the Division of Maintenance and Operations, met with the Board.

President Donovan stated that bids for the general construction heating, air conditioning, plumbing, electrical work, sprinkler system, and elevator had been received by the Division of Purchases and Public Property, had been opened on May 29, and tabulated, and were available for consideration by the Board of Trustees.

He stated that the bids had been studied and analyzed by the architects; that he, the architects, Brock & Johnson; Mr. Farris, Chief Engineer; and Mr. Peterson, Comptroller; had conferred concerning the bids, and that Mr. Ernst V. Johnson, of the firm of Brock and Johnson, Architects, had prepared a recommendation which he desired to have made to the Board at this time.

Mr. Johnson read the following report and recommendation:

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We are submitting additional recommendations on the following contracts:

Contract FA-100 - General Construction

We suggest that additive alternates #2 and 3 for painting of all plaster walls and ceilings in the Main Building and Art Wing for the combined sum of \$12,450.00 be rejected. It is our opinion that this work can be done by the University Maintenance Department at the completion of construction, at a saving to the University.

Contract FA-500 - Electrical Work

We submit the following information on our recommendation that the bid of the Fayette Electric Co., Lexington, Ky., be accepted as the lowest and best.

In totaling the bids on the Main Building and accepting alternates #1, 2 and 3, the bid of Link Electric Co., Louisville, Ky., is \$518.00 lower than the bid of Fayette Electric Co., Lexington, Ky.

However, when the cost of furnishing and installing all light fixtures and clocks is totalled from the unit prices submitted, the bid of Fayette Electric Co. is \$3,442.24 lower than the bid of the Link Electric Co. We feel that the fixture and installation prices quoted by the Fayette Electric Company are very low, and that no saving can be made by deferring action at this time.

Contract FA-600 - Sprinkler System

There were two bids received on the sprinkler system, and neither of the bidders acknowledged Addenda #1. The Rockwood Sprinkler Company, (low bidder) qualified their proposal by stating that they would extend their service line to a point 30 ft. east of the building line.

Addenda #1 covered the extension of the service line to the West curb of Rose Street. A verbal confirmation from the above company, in which they agree to extend their service line to the Rose Street curb as per specifications and Addenda #1, at no additional cost, has been received. This verbal confirmation will be substantiated by a letter to the University of Kentucky.

President Donovan stated that, in his opinion, the bids received at this time for the construction of the Fine Arts Building were as low as could reasonably be expected, that it seemed to be the general opinion of those who should know that construction costs would not be materially reduced within the next year or so, and that he was recommending that the Board authorize contracts for the construction of the Fine Arts Building.

Each member of the Board was furnished the tabulation of the bids received on each separate contract proposal, and after due consideration, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was accepted, and General Construction contract was authorized awarded to the Whittenburg Corporation, Inc., Louisville, Ky., for the Main Building for \$811,420.00, plus Alternate #1, Art Wing, \$180,580.00, total \$992,000.00;

The Heating Contract was authorized awarded to Raymond M. Meyer, Louisville, Ky., for the Main Building, \$53,968.00, plus Alternate #1, Art Wing, \$12,143.00, total \$66,111.00;

The Air Conditioning Contract was authorized awarded to T. J. Conner, Inc., Cincinnati, Ohio, for the Main Building, \$104,439.00, plus Alternate #1, Art Wing, \$2,134.00, total \$106,573.00;

The Plumbing Contract was authorized awarded to Raymond M. Meyer, Louisville, Ky., for the Main Building \$36,904.00, plus Alternate #1, Art Wing, \$19,570.00, total \$56,474.00;

The Electrical Contract was authorized awarded to the Fayette Electric Company, Lexington, Ky., for the Main Building \$106,714.00, plus Alternate No. 1, Art Wing, \$5,898.00, less Alternate #2, Motor-type Switchboard, \$14,593.00, plus Alternate #3, Fixtures for Art Gallery, \$2,550.00; plus Furnishing and Installation of Light Fixtures and Clocks from Unit Prices per specifications, \$37,890.50, total \$138,459.50;

The Sprinkler System Contract was authorized awarded to Rockwood Sprinkler Company, Cincinnati, Ohio, per plans and specifications, \$6,409.00; and

The Elevator Contract was authorized awarded to Murphy Elevator Company, Inc., Louisville, Ky., per plans and specifications, \$10,280.00.

D. Transfer of Funds for the Fine Arts Building Authorized.

President Donovan stated that the Legislature had appropriated to the University for Capital Outlay during the current biennium (1946-48) the sum of \$1,050,000.00. He recalled that \$50,000.00 of Capital Outlay Appropriation during the current biennium had been allocated by authority of the Board of Trustees towards the construction of a Dairy Center, and that there remained of the appropriation for Capital Outlay the sum of \$1,000,000.00. He recommended that this sum be used towards the construction of the Fine Arts Building.

He reported that a settlement had been reached on the loss of the Art Center by fire in February, 1947, and that the sum of \$43,000.00 was granted to the University by the State Fire and Tornado Fund for the replacement of an Art Center. He recommended that this amount of money be used towards the construction of the Fine Arts Building.

He reported that the University Budget for the fiscal year 1947-48 appropriates from the Revolving Fund of the University the sum of \$200,000.00 for the Fine Arts Building.

He further reported that the University has invested in Government Bonds funds received from the Enlisted Specialists' Corps and Army Program the amount of \$137,000.00, which could be used toward construction of the Fine Arts Building.

He recommended that these sums be authorized transferred and used for the construction of the Fine Arts Building.

The Board discussed the recommendation of President Donovan, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, directed that the sum of \$43,000.00, representing insurance money received in settlement of the fire loss of the Art Center; and \$200,000 as evidenced by appropriation in the University Budget for the year 1947-48, be transferred to an account in the Division of Accounts and Control at Frankfort, and appropriated for construction of the Fine Arts Building.

It was further directed that the Comptroller sell a sufficient amount of Government Bonds to transfer from the Enlisted Specialists' Corps and Army Program funds the sum of \$137,000 to the account established in the Division of Accounts and Control at Frankfort, and used for the construction of the Fine Arts Building.

E. Award of Contract for Addition to Pathological Laboratory Building and Barn.

Dean Cooper, Mr. L. K. Frankel, of the firm of Frankel & Curtis, Architects, and Mr. E. B. Farris, Chief Engineer of the Division of Maintenance and Operations, met with the Board.

President Donovan reported that bids were received in the office of the State Director of Purchases and Public Property on May 15, 1947, and were opened and tabulated. The tabulation was furnished members of the Board.

The bid of Hargett Construction Company, Lexington, Ky., was determined to be the lowest and best bid (same being the lowest).

The President stated that he had received from Dean Cooper a statement that the bids had been studied and analyzed by Frankel & Curtis, Architects, and Mr. E. B. Farris, Chief Engineer of the Division of Maintenance and Operations, and that he was recommending that we go ahead with the construction of the Addition to the Pathological Laboratory Building and Barn.

It was stated that it was thought best to accept the lump sum bid and reject Alternates 1, 2, 3 & 4, to omit certain parts of the building and barn from the lump sum bid.

Dean Cooper and Mr. Frankel discussed the recommendation with members of the Board, and after due consideration, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, it was directed that the bid of Hargett Construction Company, Lexington, Ky., in the lump sum of \$199,000.00 for the Addition to the Pathological Laboratory Building and Barn be accepted and contract awarded by the Division of Purchases and Public Property, Frankfort, Ky.

F. Award of Contract for Dairy Center.

President Donovan reported that bids were received on May 15, 1947, for the construction of a Dairy Center, and were opened and tabulated. Dean Cooper reported that the bids had been studied and analyzed by Frankel & Curtis, Architects, and others, and recommended that award of contracts for the construction of the Dairy Center be made.

Mr. Tway asked if the present plans called for the construction of the building out of concrete blocks and stated that he wished it were possible to substitute brick for the concrete blocks. Mr. Frankel said that he thought that brick might be substituted at about the same price as that paid for concrete blocks under present conditions.

After some further discussion, President Donovan recommended the acceptance of the low bid, same having been received from Switzer-Willing Company, Lexington, Ky., at \$132,967.00.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the lump sum bid of Switzer-Willing Company, Lexington, Ky., for the sum of \$132,967.00, for the construction of a Dairy Center, in accordance with plans and specifications, was accepted, and contract authorized. Alternates 1, 2 and 3 were rejected.

President Donovan, Mr. Tway and Dean Cooper were appointed a committee and authorized to negotiate with the contractor for the substitution of brick for concrete blocks, if the prices of both materials are substantially the same.

The Secretary was instructed to notify the State Division of Purchases and Public Property to this effect.

G. Contract for Rewiring Experiment Station.

President Donovan reported that bids were received May 15, 1947, for rewiring the Experiment Station. Bids were opened and tabulated. Copies of tabulation were furnished to members of the Board.

Dean Cooper advised that he desired that the contracts be awarded and that the work be started as soon as possible. President Donovan recommended that Fayette Electric Company, Lexington, Ky., having submitted the low bid of \$29,587.80, be awarded a lump sum contract, and that Alternate #1 be rejected.

The Board members discussed the bids and, after due consideration, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the bid of Fayette Electric Company, Lexington, Ky., in the sum of \$29,587.80, was ordered accepted and contract authorized. The Secretary was directed to notify the State Division of Purchases and Public Property of the action of this Board.

H. Transfer of Funds for Animal Pathology Wing, Dairy Center, and Rewiring of Experiment Station Building.

President Donovan read a letter from Dean Thomas Cooper, making certain recommendations as to allocation of funds required for the construction of the Addition to the Pathological Laboratory Building and Barn, Dairy Center, and Rewiring of Experiment Station.

The necessary funds for the building program recommended to you at an estimated cost, including architects' fees, of \$376,636 are to be procured from the following sources:

Balance of funds set aside by the Board of Trustees for Animal Pathology wing	\$ 52,491
Additional funds set aside by the Board of Trustees for the Animal Pathology wing	45,000
Funds set aside by the Board of Trustees for the Hospital barn	45,000
Funds transferred from Postwar Repair and Equipment fund for rewiring Experiment Station	35,000

funds for construction (Account 7020-A)... \$ 50,000

Total \$227,491.

The remainder, \$149,145, is to be taken from the present balance in the revolving funds of the Experiment Station.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the setting aside of this amount from the balance in the revolving fund of the Experiment Station, for the building program as set forth.

President Donovan reported that the necessary funds to meet recommendation of Dean Cooper were available, and recommended that the request be granted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the following appropriations were ordered made:

The sum of \$52,491.00 from additional funds set aside by the Board of Trustees for Animal Pathology Wing; the sum of \$45,000.00 from additional funds set aside by the Board of Trustees for the Animal Pathology Wing; the sum of \$45,000 from funds set aside by the Board of Trustees for the Hospital Barn; the sum of \$35,000 from the Postwar Adjustment Expenses; \$50,000 from State Capital Outlay Appropriation to the University; and \$14,000 from proceeds received from the sale of the Miller property known as Maxwellton Park. The remainder required was appropriated from the Current Revolving Funds of the Experiment Station, State Account 5010.

I. Adoption of Budget for 1947-48.

President Donovan presented budget of the University for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1948. He read the following statement on the annual internal budget.

for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1948

The proposed University budget prepared under the supervision and direction of the President is a carefully planned financial

program designed to bring about a distribution of the available current income and other funds which will best serve the objectives of the University. The budget document consists of detailed and summary statements of estimated income and expenditures for the fiscal year. The statements also provide for a comparison of the proposed budget with the original budget for the preceding fiscal year and the budget for the preceding year as revised on March 31, 1947. When approved, the budget becomes an authorization to collect the income and to incur the proposed expenditures. Separate budgets are prepared for General and Restricted funds.

The summary statements are supported in detail. The details of estimated income are listed by source and by University fund groups. The proposed expenditures are listed by fund groups, major University divisions, and departments. The departmental listings further classify the proposed expenditures objectively as follows:

1. Personal Services

Personal services include salaries, wages, and professional fees. The budget lists the name of each staff member, the position and the basis of employment. The basis of employment means the probable number of months the staff members are to be employed during the fiscal year. In the event that there is a staff vacancy, the fact is indicated and provision is made for filling the vacancy. Provisions for student wages and professional services are indicated in a lump sum. Some staff members are employed by more than one budget unit. In such cases a cross reference is provided.

2. Non-Personal Services

Non-personal services include expenditures for postage, other communication services, freight, express, printing and binding, and other current expenses. An analysis of this classification is not included in the budget document. However, the details are on file in the office of each budget unit.

3. Materials and Supplies

Consumable supplies are included in this classification. There is no analysis of this item included in the budget document. The details are on file in the office of each budget unit.

4. Capital Outlay

Capital outlay includes expenditures which result in the acquisition of equipment. The details of each proposed expenditure are on file in the Office of the Comptroller.

Income

The estimate of income to be realized amounts to \$6,688,129.93. The source of the income is indicated in the following summary statement.

Included in the estimated income are amounts to be allocated to Plant Funds.

The increase indicated under State Appropriation is the amount the Agricultural Extension Division will receive as a result of the application of the escalator clause incorporated in the 1946 budget bill (House Bill No. 124). The escalator clause reads as follows:

"In the event current revenues (exclusive of fees paid by county officers which are to be repaid to the respective officers or the county) for the fiscal year 1946-47 exceeds the sum of Thirty-nine Million Dollars (\$39,000,000.00) such excess, but not to exceed Two Million Two Hundred Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$2,225,000.00) is hereby appropriated to the following agencies on the following basis for ordinary recurring expenses of operation during the fiscal year 1947-1948:

"(5) To the Agricultural Experiment Station of the University of Kentucky, for Agricultural Extension work, twelve and one-half (12½) per cent of such sum."

Twelve and one-half per cent of \$2,225,000.00 amounts to \$278,125.00.

The increase in other income is due to the advantageous contract entered into with the Veterans Administration and the increased enrollment.

Expenditures

The total estimated general and plant expenditures amounts to \$6,576,197.49, an increase of 26.4% over the original budget adopted for the fiscal year 1946-47, and 10.3% over the 1946-47 budget as revised on March 31, 1947. The unappropriated estimated income amounts to \$111,932.44.

Included in the proposed budget are provisions for financing the purchases of Stores and Work in Progress. Budgets are provided for these units in order that their operations may be more effectively controlled. The estimates also include proposed expenditures of the College of Pharmacy and also reflect changes in the accounts of the College of Engineering and College of Education. The Colleges of Engineering and Education have revised their budget accounts to reflect changes in the internal organization of each college.

The proposed appropriations include unexpended plant fund balances as of June 30, 1947, and the balances of Fire Loss Replacements accounts.

Budgets for Restricted Funds

The Board of Trustees a few years ago authorized the establishment of various funds which were to be classified as Restricted funds. The Board directed that these funds be retained and deposited in a local bank. Many of these funds are budgeted herein. The budgets not included were omitted because sufficient data were not available. In all cases Restricted fund budgets are submitted to the Board for action at the time of the general budget, or are submitted to the Board for action at the time of the receipt of funds. In the latter case, acceptance of the funds by the Board is considered authorization to incur the expenditures in accordance with the terms of acceptance of the funds.

Summary of Estimated Income for 1947-48 and the detailed statement of Estimated Income were studied by the Board. The summary of departmental appropriations and detailed departmental appropriations for 1947-48 were likewise studied in detail by members of the Board. The appropriation for each college and division was examined, together with budgets of all restricted funds.

After due consideration of the budget as submitted, and on recommendation of the President, the Board, upon motion, duly made, seconded and carried, ordered that the budget as submitted be accepted as a basis of maximum expenditures, and that inclusion of the

name of any person in the budget should not be considered as a contract of employment; and the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee was authorized to make such changes in the budget as may from time to time be deemed necessary or advisable. A copy of the budget was ordered filed with the Secretary of the Board.

Budgets for restricted funds submitted for the year 1947-48 were ordered accepted as a basis for expenditures, subject to available balances, and it was ordered that inclusion of any person in any restricted fund budget shall not be considered as a contract of employment. The Board of Trustees or Executive Committee was authorized to make any changes in the Restricted Fund budgets as may from time to time be deemed advisable. Copies of the Restricted Fund budgets were ordered filed with the Secretary of the Board.

J. Recess for Luncheon.

The Board recessed at 12:45 p.m. for luncheon which was served in the Union Building, where, at 1:45 p.m., they again took up the business on the agenda.

K. Budget Increases.

President Donovan stated that it had been necessary during the current fiscal year, from time to time, to request additional appropriations from the unappropriated surplus of the University budget to the various departments and divisions. He stated that he felt it necessary to recommend an increase in the appropriations for Administration and General Expense in amount of \$7,615.84; for the various departments in the College of Arts and Sciences in the amount of \$12,127.64; for the College of Education, in the amount of \$2,623.34; for the Division of Maintenance and Operations in the amount of \$572.50, and for the Plant Fund in the amount of \$2,000.00. He read a detail list of increases, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the increases recommended were authorized and the list filed with the Secretary.

L. Approval of Application for Permission to Use Quonset Huts.

President Donovan read a letter from the Comptroller recommending that two documents be authorized executed. The documents were explained in the following letter:

May 27, 1947

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President
University of Kentucky

My dear President Donovan:

I attach hereto two documents:

1. Authorization to Proceed. Under this authorization, we are permitted to pick up eight Quonset huts, 20' x 56' located at the Veterans Hospital, Lexington, Kentucky. These huts are constructed of galvanized steel and may be used in connection with our veterans' emergency housing program for stores, recreational or housing purposes. The Authorization to Proceed should be acknowledged and returned to the Federal Public Housing Authority, Cleveland.

2. Application for Residential Construction. Under federal regulations, we are required to secure from the Federal Public Housing Authority permit to erect Quonset huts on the campus of the University. Since we do not wish to use these huts for residences, I have requested that the permit be issued for "non-farm" purposes and have stated that they will be used for storage and recreational purposes in connection with the veterans' housing project and for storage at the University. The application should be signed on behalf of the University. When it is approved by the Federal Housing Expediter or an authorized agent, it becomes the University's permit to erect the Quonset huts.

After some discussion concerning various phases of the Federal Housing Program and uses to be made of the Quonset Huts, a motion was made, seconded and carried that the Comptroller be authorized to acknowledge authorization to proceed with dismantling Quonset Huts and to sign application for construction.

M. Report on Filing of Suit on Employment of Dr. L. A. Pardue.

Mr. R. P. Hobson and Judge Edward O'Rear reported that suit had been filed in the Franklin Circuit Court with reference to employment of Dr. L. A. Pardue, professor in the Department of Physics, at a salary of \$5,600.00. Mr. Hobson reported that Judge Charles I. Dawson, Louisville, Ky., had agreed to assist in the prosecution of the suit and to argue the case before the Court of Appeals.

N. Authorization for Repairs to Driveways at Western Kentucky Substation.

President Donovan read the following letter from Dean Cooper, with reference to repairs to driveways at Western Kentucky Substation.

Dear President Donovan:

The driveways at the Western Kentucky Substation are badly in need of repair. An estimate has been obtained from the Department of Highways as to the cost of repair, which is \$931.33. Letter and estimate from the District Engineer, Mr. Robert Garland, Paducah, is enclosed. I wish to request that authorization be given for this road work, payment to be from funds of the Western Kentucky Experiment Substation.

On May 16, we submitted to the Frankfort Office an estimate on the blacktopping of certain driveways as sketched recently by one of our representatives. This estimate was based on blacktopping the center entrance from the Highway, the east entrance of 10-foot width, and west entrance of 12-foot width. Also installing 42 feet of pipe; removing and relaying of 42 feet of pipe. We are enclosing copy of this estimate.

I am quoting you part of Bulletin No. 1589, on Maintenance Procedure of Roads or Streets on grounds of State Institutions.

"It is expected that a request for such repairs will be made by the head of the institution, the Director of Parks, or other authorized official, to the District Engineer. After receiving such request, the District Engineer or his representative will view the work to be done and prepare a detailed estimate of the cost. A copy of this estimate should then be submitted to the institution or to the Division of Parks for approval. The institution or the Division of Parks must then submit to the District Engineer a letter or other document stating that the necessary funds have been encumbered, and giving the name of the department, division or institution, the account number, the encumbrance number, and the amount of the encumbrance. This information will be necessary in order for the Division of Records to make the proper inter-account billings."

If you will submit to this office a letter and other documents as outlined in this Bulletin we will forward it on to the Frankfort Office.

After some discussion of the recommendation, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, repairs to driveways of Western Kentucky Substation were authorized approved, and the Comptroller was directed to take the matter up with the State Highway Department and to complete necessary arrangements for the work to be done at a cost approximating \$931.33.

O. Endorsement of Check to Kentucky Association of Future Farmers of America.

President Donovan read the following letter from Comptroller Peterson:

I attach hereto check from the Kentucky Wool Growers Co-Operative Association payable to the University of Kentucky in the amount of \$100.00. Professor W. R. Tabb of the Department of Agricultural Education states that this check represents an award by the Association to the Kentucky Association of Future Farmers of America for their efforts in the State Future Farmers Sheep Shearing Contest. He requests that the check be endorsed payable to the Kentucky Association of Future Farmers of America. I request authority from the Board of Trustees to so endorse the check.

The President recommended that the request be granted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Comptroller was authorized to endorse the check of the Kentucky Wool Growers Co-Operative Association, payable to the University of Kentucky, in the sum of \$100.00, to the Kentucky Association of Future Farmers of America.

P. Agreement with Magnaflux Corporation.

President Donovan read a letter from the Comptroller detailing the provisions of a proposed agreement and license between Magnaflux Corporation of the State of Delaware and the University of Kentucky.

May 31, 1947

My dear President Donovan:

I attach hereto Magnaflux Service Agreement and License between the Magnaflux Corporation and the University of Kentucky. The University has a Magnaflux machine in the Aeronautical Research Laboratory, and it is desired by Professor A. J. Meyer, Director of the Aeronautical Research Laboratory that we enter into an agreement with the Magnaflux Corporation for certain services.

The agreement provides:

1. That the Magnaflux Corporation will furnish to the University instruction data and advisory services.
2. The Magnaflux Corporation, subject to conditions and limits, grants to the University a non-exclusive, non-assignable right and license to use certain processes and methods during the term of the agreement.
3. The University agrees not to use certain processes and methods for the inspection and testing of gas and liquefied gas transportation containers; and blades assembled on the spindles and in the rotors of turbines when inspected or tested by the methods or apparatus covered by certain patents. The University agrees to use the process and methods only in shops and laboratories located at Lexington, Kentucky, for instruction of University students in use of magnetic particle inspection and for inspection and testing of materials used by the University in non-profit research, development and educational work.
4. The University agrees to pay to the Magnaflux Corporation a consideration of one dollar for the services, instruction and data and the rights and license granted.
5. If the University should use the magnetic particle inspection under certain conditions contained in the agreement, the University will notify the Magnaflux Corporation and the University will then be required to enter into an additional service agreement.
6. The term "magnetic particle inspection" as used in the agreement shall include and be restricted to all inspection and testing processes and methods in which materials are magnetized, etc.
7. It is the intention of the parties to the agreement that high standards and accuracy and reliability shall be maintained at all times for magnetic particle inspection, and the University may, to that end, make use of the special materials and services of Magnaflux.
8. The parties to the agreement recognize the advantage of the exchange of knowledge, and the Magnaflux Corporation agrees that from time to time during the term of the agreement to disclose new information to the University Aeronautical Research Laboratory. The University agrees to disclose to Magnaflux any inventions or improvements made or required by the relaying to Magnaflux Corporation results of magnetic particle

inspection during the term of this agreement, and shall give Magnaflux first opportunity to acquire rights to such inventions or improvement.

9. Magnaflux will furnish to the University one day's personal instruction at Lexington, and the University shall reimburse Magnaflux for the expenses of a representative in traveling to and from Lexington. If, during the term of the agreement, additional personal services and instruction at Lexington are desired by the University, Magnaflux Corporation will be paid at the rate of \$75.00 per day plus the expenses of the representative.

10. The agreement is made with the University on the basis that it will make use of magnetic particle inspection for instructional, educational, developmental and research work done on a non-profit basis, and that magnetic particle inspection equipment owned by the University or controlled by the University will be used only by University students and staff members in connection with instructional, educational, developmental and research work done on a non-profit basis. Should any of the terms and conditions of the agreement be violated, the agreement may be cancelled by giving fifteen days written notice to the University.

I see nothing in the agreement to obligate the University for any amount in excess of \$1.00 annually, which is the fee for the license. Any additional expense to the University can not be incurred except upon the request of the University for the service of the staff members of the Magnaflux Corporation, which can be controlled by the governing authorities. Professor Meyer feels that the agreement will be very valuable to the Laboratory. I recommend that the agreement be approved.

After due consideration of the recommendation of the President, the University Faculty concurring, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the President of the University was authorized and directed to confer upon each of the candidates named above the degree indicated.

R. Patent Policy for the University of Kentucky.

President Donovan stated that, about two years ago, he appointed a Committee on Graduate Work and Staff Research to develop a patent policy for the University of Kentucky. He stated that the Committee had had many meetings and given much time to developing a patent policy that would be fair to the research staff of the University and to the University. He read a letter from E. N. Fergus, Chairman of the Committee, transmitting the proposed patent policy.

Dear Dr. Donovan:

It is my privilege to submit herewith a Statement on Patent Policy for the University of Kentucky, prepared and recommended by the Committee on Graduate Work and Staff Research.

I find much satisfaction in the fact that this statement has the unanimous approval of the Committee. Professor Ross, likewise, would have approved it, I am sure, because he had indicated agreement with its basic provisions.

The eighteen months in which the Committee has been preparing this statement is longer than I thought would be necessary when the task was assigned, but the Committee found the problems so complicated that it could resolve all of the issues only by extensive consideration after much study by subcommittees. I am sure that any statement completed much earlier would have been less wisely formulated.

The statement, essentially in its final form, was submitted recently for criticism to Dr. Archie Palmer, Director of Patent Policy Survey for the National Research Council. He replied in part, "I think your Committee has done a fine job."

Perhaps the Policy Statement is so brief that it requires no summarizing. I would, therefore, merely point out that it states first the case for a patent policy for the University of Kentucky. This is followed by the recommended policy presented under four heads:

- I General policy in regard to patents resulting from research
- II Policy on relation between the University and a sponsor in regard to patents resulting from research
- III Policy on relation between the University and a member of its staff in regard to patents resulting from research
- IV Policy on use of patent rights owned by the University.

The Committee directed that I include the following statements in this letter of transmissal:

1. The Committee believes that the administration of the Patent Policy adopted by the University will be facilitated by the preparation and distribution of a standard contract form as is done by many of the other universities.
2. But for the expressed exclusion, the Committee would have attempted to work out a parallel policy with respect to copyrights.

The second statement refers, as you doubtless recognize, to the directions you gave the Committee in assigning it the task of recommending a patent policy.

Finally, the Committee directed me to say that the Committee feels that with the completion of the work on Patent Policy the Committee has completed the task for which it was created and should be discharged.

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PATENT POLICY FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

WHEREAS, the University of Kentucky, a state supported institution for higher education, has a responsibility and interest in the advancement of scientific knowledge and in the advancement of the economic interest and welfare of the people, particularly the people of the State of Kentucky, and

WHEREAS, this responsibility and interest can be advanced by engaging in research, the result of which may have commercial applications that are patentable and should be patented in the interest of the public, and the income from which may be used for the promotion of further scientific research, and

WHEREAS, such research is, in some instances, done in cooperation with outside persons, institutions and organizations,

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky adopts the following policies in regard to patents resulting from research:

I. GENERAL POLICY IN REGARD TO PATENTS RESULTING FROM RESEARCH.

1. As a general policy, patent rights resulting from research using staff, materials, equipment and facilities of the University shall be owned and controlled by the University.

II. POLICY ON RELATION BETWEEN THE UNIVERSITY AND A SPONSOR IN REGARD TO PATENTS RESULTING FROM RESEARCH.

1. Except as hereinafter specified, patent rights resulting from sponsored research shall be owned and controlled by the University. However, a non-exclusive license (shop right) may be granted without charge to the person, institution or organization which has cooperated in the research.
2. Where the research or development work undertaken by the University is a continuation of research previously initiated by the cooperating person, institution or organization, or where the research done at the University requires further development for commercial application, or where for other reasons the public interest will be better served thereby, an exclusive license for a reasonable time may be granted to the person, institution or organization cooperating in the research, upon terms agreed to by the parties to the contract and the further assurance that the benefit of the discovery will become available to the public.
3. In special cases patent rights may be assigned, wholly or in part, to the cooperating person, institution or organization which has paid all the cost of the research plus an additional sum which shall not be less than ten per cent of the total cost of the work done. The assignment shall provide that in the event the discovery or invention has not been developed or reasonably used within a stated time, which shall be reasonable under the circumstances, the assigned rights shall revert to the University.
4. The University favors the publication of research. However, it will agree to use its best efforts to prevent disclosure of facts or data furnished by the sponsors of research or the premature publication of the results of research; but nothing in such agreements shall prevent the publication of research findings after application for a patent based on them has been made, or after a reasonable time following the completion of the research.

5. Contracts with sponsors shall preclude any reference to the University in advertising or other publicity without prior authorization in writing.
6. Where the research is done in cooperation with a public agency or institution, the agreement may provide for a total or partial assignment of all patent rights resulting from the research without any provision in regard to the development or use of the discovery or invention.

III. POLICY ON RELATION BETWEEN THE UNIVERSITY AND A MEMBER OF ITS STAFF IN REGARD TO PATENTS RESULTING FROM RESEARCH.

1. The policy of the University in relation to a member of its staff having an interest in a patentable discovery requires that the staff member shall assign his patent rights to the University but shall have an interest in the patent and share in the returns.
2. The interests of the University and a member or members of its staff shall be determined by a standing Committee on Patents appointed by the President of the University. The staff member shall be present or represented in the deliberations on his case, but the decision of the Committee shall be final and shall determine the interests of the parties in accordance with the following general principles:
 - a. If the Committee finds that the research leading to the discovery made by a member of the staff was not related to his employment and was not the result of the use of University materials, equipment, facilities, or time, the University shall have no interest in the discovery or patent.
 - b. If the Committee finds that one or more of these conditions is not true, the University shall have an interest in the discovery and the staff member will assign his patent rights to the University, but he shall have an interest in the patent and share in the returns as determined by the Committee.
 - c. In determining the interest of the parties, the Committee shall consider whether the University paid or did not pay for the time spent in the research which led to the

patentable discovery. It shall consider the extent to which University materials, equipment, and facilities were used in the work; the extent to which discovery was due to advice and assistance of other members of the staff and students of the University; and the relation between the discovery and regular duties and work of the staff member.

3. Every member of the University staff is under obligation to report to the Committee on Patents any idea or discovery which he believes to be of patentable value, and the Committee shall make recommendations to the President of the University. The staff member is not obligated to apply for a patent thereon unless the expense is borne by the University or its assignee, but he agrees to cooperate in facilitating such application and to assign his patent rights to the University, or as it may designate, but he shall have an interest in the patent and share in the returns as the Committee on Patents may determine. Nothing herein shall be construed as obligating the University to incur any expense in regard to any patent or application therefor.
4. In the event that the University does not, in a reasonable time, act upon a staff member's report of a "patentable" discovery, he is free to apply for this patent himself, and shall own all rights pertaining to it.
5. In case of sponsored research, the contract between the University and the sponsor shall be binding on the responsible members of the staff working on the project the same as if each were a party to that agreement. The respective interests of the University and staff members shall be adjusted on the basis of the right which the University has in any patentable discovery so that each staff member's interest shall be an equitable portion of the University's interest and not of the entire patent right.
6. In entering into an agreement on sponsored research the University will be careful that staff members selected for work on sponsored research are willing to accept the assignment and agree to carry out the obligations assumed under the contract between the University and the sponsor.

7. No member of the University staff shall devote more than one-fourth of his time to sponsored research for which he receives remuneration directly or indirectly from the sponsor unless his employment and compensation by the University be proportionately decreased. The fact that any member of the staff has received, or is receiving, compensation for approved sponsored research will not be considered as limiting or affecting future increases in salary or as being in any way detrimental to his employment status.

IV. POLICY ON USE OF PATENT RIGHTS OWNED BY THE UNIVERSITY

1. The University will transfer and assign any rights which it may have in any discovery or patent to the Kentucky Research Foundation as its agent operating in conformity with the above policies, for the purpose of having any proceeds or profits from use of a patent used for the furtherance of research at the University of Kentucky.

President Donovan recalled that he had previously submitted copy of the proposed patent policy to each member of the Board for study. After due consideration, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the following resolution concerning the patent policy for the University of Kentucky was adopted:

WHEREAS, the University of Kentucky, a state supported institution for higher education, has a responsibility and interest in the advancement of scientific knowledge and in the advancement of the economic interest and welfare of the people, particularly the people of the State of Kentucky, and

WHEREAS, this responsibility and interest can be advanced by engaging in research, the result of which may have commercial applications that are patentable and should be patented in the interest of the public, and the income from which may be used for the promotion

of further scientific research, and

WHEREAS, such research is, in some instances, done in cooperation with outside persons, institutions and organizations,

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky adopts the following policies in regard to patents resulting from research:

I. GENERAL POLICY IN REGARD TO PATENTS RESULTING FROM RESEARCH.

1. As a general policy, patent rights resulting from research using staff, materials, equipment and facilities of the University shall be owned and controlled by the University.

II. POLICY ON RELATION BETWEEN THE UNIVERSITY AND A SPONSOR IN REGARD TO PATENTS RESULTING FROM RESEARCH.

1. Except as hereinafter specified, patent rights resulting from sponsored research shall be owned and controlled by the University. However a non-exclusive license (shop right) may be granted without charge to the person, institution or organization which has cooperated in the research.
2. Where the research or development work undertaken by the University is a continuation of research previously initiated by the cooperating person, institution or organization, or where the research done at the University requires further development for commercial application, or where for other reasons the public interest will be better served thereby, an exclusive license for a reasonable time may be granted to the person, institution or organization cooperating in the research, upon terms agreed to by the parties to the contract and the further assurance that the benefit of the discovery will become available to the public.
3. In special cases patent rights may be assigned, wholly or in part, to the cooperating person, institution or organization which has paid all the cost of the research plus an additional sum which shall not be less than ten per cent of the total cost of the work done. The assignment shall provide that in the event the discovery or invention has not been developed or reasonably used within a stated time, which shall be reasonable under the circumstances, the assigned rights shall revert to the University.
4. The University favors the publication of research. However, it will agree to use its best efforts to prevent disclosure of facts or data furnished by the sponsors of research or the premature publication of the results of research; but nothing in such agreements shall prevent the publication of research findings after application for a patent based on them has been made, or after a reasonable time following the completion of the research.

5. Contracts with sponsors shall preclude any reference to the University in advertising or other publicity without prior authorization in writing.
6. Where the research is done in cooperation with a public agency or institution, the agreement may provide for a total or partial assignment of all patent rights resulting from the research without any provision in regard to the development or use of the discovery or invention.

III. POLICY ON RELATION BETWEEN THE UNIVERSITY AND A MEMBER OF ITS STAFF IN REGARD TO PATENTS RESULTING FROM RESEARCH.

1. The policy of the University in relation to a member of its staff having an interest in a patentable discovery requires that the staff member shall assign his patent rights to the University but shall have an interest in the patent and share in the returns.
2. The interests of the University and a member or members of its staff shall be determined by a standing Committee on Patents appointed by the President of the University. The staff member shall be present or represented in the deliberations on his case, but the decision of the Committee shall be final and shall determine the interests of the parties in accordance with the following general principles:
 - a. If the Committee finds that the research leading to the discovery made by a member of the staff was not related to his employment and was not the result of the use of University materials, equipment, facilities, or time, the University shall have no interest in the discovery or patent.
 - b. If the Committee finds that one or more of these conditions is not true, the University shall have an interest in the discovery and the staff member will assign his patent rights to the University, but he shall have an interest in the patent and share in the returns as determined by the Committee.
 - c. In determining the interest of the parties, the Committee shall consider whether the University paid or did not pay for the time spent in the research which led to the patentable discovery. It shall consider the extent to which University materials, equipment, and facilities were used in the work; the extent to which discovery was due to advice and assistance of other members of the staff and students of the University; and the relation between the discovery and the regular duties and work of the staff member.

3. Every member of the University staff is under obligation to report to the Committee on Patents any idea or discovery which he believes to be of patentable value, and the Committee shall make recommendations to the President of the University. The staff member is not obligated to apply for a patent thereon unless the expense is borne by the University or its assignee, but he agrees to cooperate in facilitating such application and to assign his patent rights to the University, or as it may designate, but he shall have an interest in the patent and share in the returns as the Committee on Patents may determine. Nothing herein shall be construed as obligating the University to incur any expense in regard to any patent or application therefor.

6. In entering into an agreement on sponsored research the University will be careful that staff members selected for work on sponsored research are willing to accept the assignment and agree to carry out the obligations assumed under the contract between the University and the sponsor.
7. No member of the University staff shall devote more than one-fourth of his time to sponsored research for which he receives remuneration directly or indirectly from the sponsor unless his employment and compensation by the University be proportionately decreased. The fact that any member of the staff has received, or is receiving, compensation for approved sponsored research will not be considered as limiting or affecting future increases in salary or as being in any way detrimental to his employment status.

IV. POLICY ON USE OF PATENT RIGHTS OWNED BY THE UNIVERSITY

1. The University will transfer and assign any rights which it may have in any discovery or patent to the Kentucky Research Foundation as its agent operating in conformity with the above policies, for the purpose of having any proceeds or profits from use of a patent used for the furtherance of research at the University of Kentucky.

S. Interpretation of Change-of-Work Policy with Respect to Leaves of Absence.

President Donovan asked the Board for an interpretation of a change-of-work policy for the members of the faculty and staff who become eligible for change of work. He stated that many members of the faculty and staff have been on leaves of absence without pay from one to five years, some of them in the military service and others with government, industry and other colleges and universities.

After very thorough discussion of the change-of-work policy, the Board interpreted its policy to mean that only time spent in the employment of the University shall count in determining number of years in the service of the University.

T. Gifts.

From American Society of Refrigerating Engineers.

President Donovan reported a gift of \$500 from the American Society of Refrigerating Engineers as a grant in aid for a research project in the Department of Mechanical Engineering known as "Performance Characteristics of Commercial Coils."

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift was accepted, and President Donovan was requested to write a letter of appreciation to the donor, on behalf of the University.

From International Minerals and Chemical Corporation.

President Donovan reported a gift of \$1,200.00 to the Experiment Station from the International Minerals and Chemical Corporation, Chicago, Illinois, to be held as a trust fund for the study of the nutrition of burley tobacco.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift was accepted and President Donovan was requested to write a letter of appreciation to the donor, on behalf of the University.

From Chilean Nitrate Educational Bureau, Inc.

President Donovan reported a gift of \$5,500.00 from the Chilean Nitrate Educational Bureau, Inc., to the Experiment Station, to be used for a study of the iodine content of important fertilizer materials.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$5,500.00 was accepted, and the President was requested to write a letter of appreciation to the donor, on behalf of the University.

From Anonymous Donor.

President Donovan reported an anonymous gift of \$100, given for the purpose of providing needed equipment for the Department of Physics. Members of the Board joined President Donovan in expressing their appreciation of this gift, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, directed that it be accepted.

U. Contract with Proctor-Ingels, Engineers Associated.

President Donovan asked Mr. Peterson to explain the proposed contract with the Engineers for services in connection with construction of certain additions and extensions to the present steam distribution system of the University.

Mr. Peterson read the proposed contract and explained various provisions contained therein.

ENGINEERS' CONTRACT

University of Kentucky

This agreement, entered into this day of , 1947, by and between the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the use and benefit of the University of Kentucky, a corporation hereinafter referred to as the Owner, and Proctor-Ingels, Engineers Associated, of Lexington, Kentucky, hereinafter referred to as the Engineers:

WHEREAS, the Owner intends to construct certain additions and extensions to the present steam distribution systems of the University of Kentucky, Lexington, Kentucky, at an estimated cost of \$34,740.00.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Owner and the Engineers for the considerations hereinafter named, agree as follows:

Section I. The Engineers agree to perform all professional engineering services as may be required and directed by the Owner in writing pertaining to the above named work hereinafter set forth.

Section II. It is agreed and understood that the estimated cost of \$34,740.00 is used to base the Engineers' fee for the purpose of partial payments only and it is further provided that, before final payment hereon is made, the estimated cost shall be adjusted to correspond to the actual cost of the work, as determined by the aggregate amount of all contracts and University of Kentucky Job Orders pertaining to the work, and all payments made prior to said adjustment shall be entered as credit on this contract in arriving at the balance due the Engineers at the time of adjustment,

which adjustment is to be made prior to final payment. The estimated cost as herein established shall not include the Engineers' fee nor the cost of unattached furnishings, equipment, or supplies. In no event shall the agreed estimated cost, as used for determining the Engineers' fee, exceed the actual contract cost to the Owner of the work not including the cost of the exceptions enumerated above. The Owner agrees to pay to the Engineers for the services rendered as herein stated a fee of three per cent (3%) of the actual cost for the designs, plans and specifications of the work as herein set forth, and two per cent (2%) of the actual cost for the supervision of the work if required in writing by the Owner.

Section III. The parties hereto further agree to the following considerations:

1. Professional Services. The Engineers' professional services shall consist of the necessary conferences, the making of necessary investigations, and the drafting of documents incident to construction; if the work is done by contract the Engineer shall issue certificates of payments, keep accounts and carry on the general administration of the work; and, if required by the Owner, supervision of the construction by a person or persons satisfactory to the Owner.

2. Payment. Payment to the Engineers on account of the fee set forth in Section II shall be made as follows:

(a) Payment of 90% of the Engineers' fee shall be made at the time of delivery and acceptance of plans and specifications.

(b) Payment of 10% of the Engineers' fee shall be made upon completion of construction.

(c) Payment for supervision, if required, shall be made as the work progresses on a monthly basis in proportion to the value of the completed work.

3. Drawings and Specifications. The Engineers shall furnish to the Owner drawings made on tracing cloth with India ink, ten sets of blue prints and ten sets of specifications and the duplication stencils for the work. All drawings and specifications, as instruments of service, are the property of the Owner whether the work for which they are made be executed or not.

4. Assignments. Neither the Owner nor the Engineers shall delegate, assign, sublet or transfer their rights or duties in this agreement without the written consent of the other.

5. Arbitration. All questions in dispute under this agreement shall be submitted to a board of arbitration of which one member shall be named by the Owner, one member shall be named by the Engineers, and one member shall be selected by the two members above named.

6. Liquidated Damages. No parts of any liquidated damages that may be collected from the contractor or contractors by the Owner shall be payable to the Engineers for additional services.

7. Owner's Representatives. The President of the University of Kentucky, or persons named by him shall act as official representative of the Owner.

8. Selection of Materials, Design and Equipment. Design, selection of materials and type of construction and equipment shall be at the option and direction of the Owner, and the engineering calculations shall be subject to review and approval of the Owner.

9. Scope of Work. The agreement contemplates the furnishing of plans and specifications necessary to the completion of the work as directed by the Owner and includes electrical, mechanical, architectural and other incidental work necessary to the complete operation of the steam distribution systems. No additional expense incurred by the Engineers in having such plans prepared shall be borne by the Owner. All construction details shall be submitted to and approved by the Owner.

10. Expedition of Work. This contract contemplates immediate attention to the designing of the work. The plans and specifications shall be completed within a period of not more than thirty (30) days from the date of this agreement unless this period shall be extended upon written consent of the Owner.

Section IV. It is agreed by and between the parties hereto that the Engineers will observe the rules of the State Government and will not solicit or employ State employees in conjunction with their work under this Contract without the approval of the department head of any department from which employees are sought to be obtained.

Section V. The Owner may at any time after the execution of this Contract, abandon either entirely or for an indefinite time the construction of the work or any part thereof. The Engineers shall be notified in writing by the Owner of any partial or complete abandonment of the work, and thereupon this Contract shall be partially or wholly terminated as the case may be. The Engineers shall be entitled to an equitable compensation for any work satisfactorily performed prior to such abandonment.

Section VI. Should the Owner require any additional construction other than that shown on the approved plans and specifications, then the Engineers shall be compensated for such additional work at the same proportion as the above fee bears to the original contract.

Upon the recommendation of President Donovan, motion was made, seconded and carried that the Engineers' contract between the firm of Proctor and Ingels, Engineers Associated, and the University of Kentucky be approved and executed, and that the work be started immediately.

V. Order of Board of April 2, 1946, Approving Contract with Fayette County Board of Education Amended.

The Comptroller read a letter explaining difficulty that had arisen among the Federal Public Housing Administration, the Fayette County Board of Education, and the University of Kentucky. He read the following letter:

June 3, 1947

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President
University of Kentucky

My dear President:

The Board of Trustees, at its meeting April 2, 1946, entered into a contract with the Fayette County Board of Education appointing Frank D. Peterson as agent of the Fayette County Board of Education to manage the housing units allocated to the Fayette County Board of Education. The agreement transfers to the University of Kentucky the twenty-four family dwelling units allocated by the Federal Public Housing Authority to the Fayette County Board of Education and provides that the Fayette County Board of Education shall make no further reimbursement to the University for any and all work incident to activating the project. This, we thought, was done with the approval and consent of the Federal Public Housing Authority.

We are now advised that the Federal Public Housing Authority can not reimburse the University for activating costs of the twenty-four units; that if the contract is voided, they will reimburse the Fayette County Board of Education for such expenditures as are covered by the original agreement, and that the Fayette County Board of Education may then in turn reimburse the University.

It occurs to me that we might void the transfer of title as provided in the above contract, so notify the Federal Public Housing Authority, and request that an audit be made immediately and the amount to be reimbursed ascertained. After the audit has been made and the reimbursement received, the University of Kentucky and the Fayette County Board of Education may then enter into agreements for the operation of the project.

Some discussion concerning the advantage of rescinding the order of April 2 ensued, and after due consideration, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract entered into by and between Fayette County Board of Education and the University, as authorized at its meeting of April 2, 1946, transferring title to 24 family dwelling units assigned by the Federal Public Housing Administration to the Lafayette Training School, same being an institution under the management and control of the Fayette County Board of Education, to the University of Kentucky, is hereby amended by deleting from the aforementioned contract all of that language in the body of the

instrument immediately following the first semicolon, reading as follows:

"and to reserve six (6) family units of the houses allotted to the County Board for the benefit of 'ineligible tenants' designated by said Board, provided, however, that these may be used by the University any time the Board does not name an eligible tenant within thirty (30) days after the house becomes vacant; and to assume, without further reimbursement from the Fayette County Board of Education, all the rights, privileges, and obligations of the Fayette County Board of Education in Contract for Bailment said Board executed with the United States of America through Federal Public Housing Authority, dated December 18, 1945, and FPHA-AP-1481-2 Contract of Bailment for Reimbursement entered into between the Fayette County Board of Education and the United States of America, Federal Public Housing Authority, executed March 20, 1946."
