Combining: Chairman says four departments make structure smaller, simplify bureaucracy

UK's foreign language programs could undergo changes in the coming weeks and months.

Rupert Pickens, chairman of the French Language and Literature Department, said the chairs and deans of UK's four foreign language departments are consid-language departments are considered.

Other students said the change would be immaterial. Phillip Stosberg, a Russian and history junior, said that although he hasn't heard of any proposed changes, he would have no problems with them as long as the programs or majors were unchanged.

that he plans to rule after Christmas on whether
a former Ku Klux Klansman is mentally competent to stand trial for murder in a 1963 church
bombing that killed four black girls. Circuit
Judge James Garrett ruled earlier this year that
Bobby Frank Cherry was incompetent but a state
challenge to the ruling prompted him to revisit
the issue during a two-day hearing, Doctors have
diagnosed Cherry, 72, with vascular dementia,
which is caused by decreased blood flow to the
brain.

### Olympic torch journeying to Winter Games

Olympic torch journeying to Winter Games ATLANTA — Carried by a crew of gold medalists including Muhammad Ali and Peggy Fleming, the Olympic flame began a 46-state, two-month journey Tuesday to the opening ceremony of the Salt Lake City Winter Games. Starting in the last U.S. city to hold the Olympics, the Summer Games in 1996, the relay will involve 11,500 people lugging the 3-pound torches and their symbolic fire more than 13,500 miles before the Feb. 8 ceremony. The relay left the downtown Centennial Olympic Park after Ali, a boxing champion at the 1960 Summer Games in Rome, lighted a torch from a massive cauldron and passed it to Fleming, a figure skating gold medalist at the 1968 Winter Games in Grenoble, France.

Deadly strikes: Warplanes dropped 3 bombs, flattened building in residential neignborhood

RAMALLAH, West Bank — Israel used bombs and missiles Tuesday to pressure Yasser Arafat to move against Palestinian militants, striking just yards from the Palestinian leader's West Bank offices and in the Gaza Strip. Two Palestinians were killed and about 150 were injured in the attacks.

Whether you are looking to jump on the latest Holywood trend or just looking for a way to get healthy, going wegan may be a smart decision.

"At first it was really hard to know what you could and couldn't eat, but after a while you get used to it, and you can automatically pick out from a menu what you can have." Brigg said.

Or as Crystal Shepherd, a Good Foods employee, put it, "anything you want already prepared."

It can be fairly difficult for a vegan who lives on campus. With only a couple of dishes to choose from, eating can get boring.

"I ate stir fry every day," Spry said.
The only other thing she ate was salad. Spry also added that after being vegan, eating foods with lactose, such as Pop Rocks, makes her sick.

All of the effort put forth watching what you eat may be worth it, vegans are reportedly less likely to get cancer and other diseases. This is most likely because of the large amount of fruits and vegetables they eat.





# **UK** has a chance to take a free ride

UK's got a ticket to ride, and maybe it is time to care.

The Lexington Transit Authority and UK are working together to create some kind of alternative offer for UK students. If apto create some kind of alternative offer for UK students. If approved, a three-year, \$6 million federal grant will allow students to use LexTran services for free (the question of why the federal government is paying for this should be explored later). UK will match \$400,000 of the grant. This grant would offer a way to measure how many students use LexTran and what areas may need improvement to provide better service.

The details that determine what kind of passes students will use are still in the planning stages. Student IDs will also need updating with a newly encrypted magnetic strip that will allow students to ride after a quick swipe of their strip. Other ideas for future passes are

after a quick swipe of their strip. Other ideas for future passes are simple — LexTran will pass them out directly.

The application for the proposal must be submitted by the end of December and will be voted on in March. However, students could see free rides as early as next August.

This is a great step in improving the relations between students and LexTran. There are many benefits, both ecological and financial, to the plan—students will be able to save a little gas and money by taking the bus.

And best of all, this should come with no strings attached. For now

at least, there will be no fee charged to students.

"We want to make sure students know there is no cost involved. Their tuition may be raised, but it won't be because of us," said Jenny Williams, director of marketing for LexTran.

This effort might create a better campus atmosphere if students find this plan makes it easier to get to campus. Or, there is always the chance students may never use the service.

But providing the bus use for free should allow students to see

what LexTran's all about — without scraping their already empty coffers for the ticket.

# Students' rights carried too far

Your elementary school teachers undoubtedly had you pass your spelling test to the kid next to you for grading. It's common procedure in grade school. But this could be changing. Six states have outlawed this method of student grading and, depending on the outcome of a Supreme Court case heard last week, it could become illegal nationwide.
