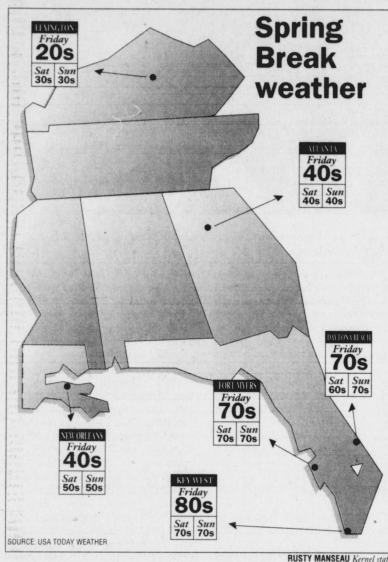
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Break travel bothered by storms

As UK students leave for Spring Break today, the weather outside is more winter than spring.

The snow and violent storms that hit the South over the past two days may make travel difficult for students trying to get away.

For students leaving from Bluegrass Airport yesterday there were only slight delays, said John Case, chief of Public Safety at the airport.

"A few flights were delayed for icing," Case said. But by last night most of the delays had been cleared up, Case said.

For students driving to their Spring Break destinations, Kentucky State Police reported road conditions to be wet and slick, and urged the use of caution. AAA reported that I-75 and I-64 had ice spots and I-68 was ice covered last night.

Cold descended on the region yesterday, raising threats of another round of the severe storms that left miles of destruction and killed eight people in Alabama and Georgia.

Destructive weather extended all along the East Coast and into the Appalachians. Many schools were closed in Kentucky and West Virginia.

The ice and snow developed as cold air was spreading southward across the state, the National Weather Service reported.

Snow accumulations ranged from 1-2 inches across the north and central parts of Kentucky to 2-4 inches in the southeast mountains, forecasters said.

Strong northerly winds combined with temperatures in the 20s to lower 30s, pro-

ducing very cold wind chill readings.

Temperatures dropped into the 30s yesterday in northern Alabama after days of balmy weather. Rain continued, and forecasters said more severe storms were possible.

Gov. Fob James declared a state of emergency Wednesday after an earlier storm left a 10-mile swath of ruin in west-central Alabama, snapping trees, curling billboards, knocking out power to about 20,000 homes, and picking up two-by-fours and jamming them into a cow pasture like a pin cushion.

The destructive weather, caused by the convergence of a cold front and warm air from the Gulf of Mexico, also caused flooding in Georgia with 3 to 3 1/2 inches of rain.

The cold air that caused the turbulent weather isn't expected to leave the South for several days.

Students who followed the Cats to the Southeastern Conference Tournament may have been planning on warm weather, but the outlook for New Orleans isn't much better.

The high in New Orleans is expected to be around 40 and by Sunday when the last game is played the highest temperature will have reached is only expected to be about 50, the National Weather Service reported yesterday.

Students who are staying in Lexington over the break are also in for a cold week.

The National Weather Service predicted a high around 25 today. The service expects the temperature to rise over the weekend. By Monday the high should reach 55.

NATION Clinton urges renewed war on drugs

GREENBELT, Md. — In remarks that were part lecture and part emotional appeal, President Clinton urged young people nationwide yesterday to avoid or abandon drugs.

"If you're in doubt, don't do it; if you're in trouble, get help," Clinton said. "We've got to make drug use the exception, not the rule. ... Choose wise, and we'll be all right."

Slapping the lectern in the auditorium of Eleanor Roosevelt High School, Clinton made the appeal personal and emotional, saying that drug abuse had nearly destroyed his generation and "nearly cost my brother his life."

Addressing a politically popular theme in this reelection year, the president announced that 15 pharmaceutical companies have amassed a \$33 million pool to distribute material on drug use detection and treatment to millions of parents through the offices of 400,000 doctors coast to coast.

But while Clinton said that drug use is down among all Americans except those 18 and younger, a report by the Republican-dominated House Government Reform and Oversight Committee claimed drug use is up across the board and accused Clinton of neglecting the drug issue until now.

"Drug use of all types and among all ages, including juveniles, has risen sharply and alarmingly every year during this administration," said Rep. William F. Clinger Jr., (R-Pa.), the committee chairman.

Clinger said that early in the administration, Clinton cut the staff of his administration's office of drug-control policy by 80 percent and only this month promised to fully staff the office.

"If the president chooses to move drugs to the front burner because it's an election year, fine; no time is too soon," Clinger said.

Bailey spends first day in jail

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — F. Lee Bailey spent the first day of a six-month sentence in jail yesterday in a clash of wills with the government over \$25 million in stock from a drug-dealer client.

Bailey's attorney said he was trying to get the famed lawyer released, although no new hearings were set by the judge who jailed Bailey for contempt Wednesday after he failed to turn over the disputed stock.

"We're hopeful he'll be out shortly," his attorney, Roger Zuckerman, said Wednesday. Zuckerman didn't return phone calls Thursday.

Bailey, 62, was housed in an individual cell for a screening period all inmates go through to determine if they pose a threat to — or are in danger from — other inmates, prison spokesman Tony Kelly said.

After that period, which can last several days, he will be moved to one of the facility's regular two-man cells, Kelly said.

Kelly wouldn't comment yesterday on what meetings or calls Bailey had during his first full day behind bars.

House votes to avoid another shutdown

WASHINGTON — In a fresh round of budget brinkmanship, the House narrowly approved a bill yesterday aimed at avoiding a new federal shutdown but billions shy of what President Clinton wants for domestic programs.

Congress moved on another front to head off an unprecedented and politically explosive federal default by voting to temporarily give the Treasury Department extra borrowing authority. But even with that issue solved for now, a yawning gap exists between the two sides over how to keep the government running.

Five months into fiscal 1996, the House voted 209-206 for a Republican-written measure financing dozens of government departments and agencies for the rest of the year. Temporary authority for these programs expires March 15, and without new funds there would be a third partial government shutdown since November — an unlikely outcome that neither party wants.

With moderate Republicans upset with low spending levels for some programs and abortion restrictions, GOP leaders lobbied hard all day to ensure the measure's passage. They argued that the bill will be changed in upcoming negotiations with the administration and the Senate, which debates it next week. A defeat would have left the impression that Republicans cannot govern effectively and complicated the path to a deal with the White House, the leaders said.

LOS ANGELES — Arnold Schwarzenegger may muscle his way into the next "Batman" film, playing villain Mr. Freeze.

The star of the "Terminator" movies was quoted by Daily Variety yesterday as saying he would try to fit the role in around his commitment to another new film, "Wings of Eagles."

If that's not possible, Bruce Willis is waiting in the wings, the trade newspaper said.

The sequel, titled "Batman and Robin" is scheduled to begin filming this summer, but has had casting difficulties.

Val Kilmer, who succeeded Michael Keaton as the caped crusader in "Batman Forever," reportedly disliked the latest script and was replaced with "ER" TV hunk George Clooney.

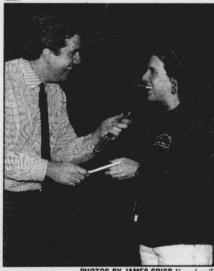
Chris O'Donnell will play the sidekick Robin.

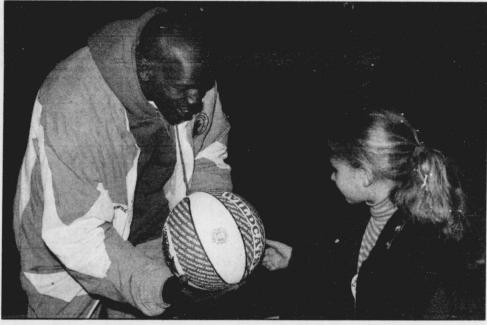

UK committee formed to improve retention

To combat UK's low satisfaction and retention rate, a student satisfaction committee has been formed. The Student Satisfaction Committee was created to learn more about the source and nature of student satisfaction and dissatisfaction with undergraduate instruction and non-instructional services.

"We want to understand better what students are and are not satisfied with so that we can make directions to improve," said Connie Christian, associate director for effectiveness.

The committee was formed in January on a suggestion from UK President Charles Werthington, for the purposes of looking into the statistics that point out UK students' dissatisfaction with the University.

One suggestion the committee may implement is the formation

of a focus group, composed of incoming freshman recruited during summer orientation, to answer questions about common expectations of the college experience.

"The one thing we have decided is that we need to know more about our students' expectations when they come here. We can't increase satisfaction if we don't know what their expectations are," Christian said.

To analyze the statistics, the group must look into the background influences, which may affect the way a person votes. One example of this is gender differences.

One study showed that women rated their professors higher than their male counterparts. Other influences include ethnic group, socio-economic class, employment status and the usefulness a student sees in taking a particular subject.

Another suggestion was to add more members to the committee,

so that other organizations and departments could be involved.

"We have to keep very close contact with the people who we hope are going to fix these problems," said Louis Swift, dean of undergraduate studies.

Jack Blanton, vice chancellor of administration, disagreed.

"Our responsibility is to present back to the president things we have learned and things we have suggested to implement," he said. "Then you get a group that comes together to decide how and they are going to implement the programs and in what way."

Though the group has only met only three times, Melanie Cruz, student committee member, thought the committee was off to a good start.

"We are starting to finalize our goals and find ways to achieve them," Cruz said. "My job as a student committee member is to make sure students have a voice in this."

Cruz, who is also associate director for the Student Government Association, added that "with the information I get from this I can see what SGA can do to increase the retention and satisfaction of students on campus."

Future of digital libraries subject of speaker series

Converting paper and microfilm into bits and bytes — and the pros and cons of the new technologies available to libraries for preserving documents — was the focus of a speaker series at UK.

The speaker series was part of the Northeast Document Conservation Center's three-day Workshop on Preservation Microfilming that was hosted by UK.

The speaker series featured two experts in this field.

They were Paul Conway, head of the preservation department of Yale University's Sterling Memorial Library, and Christina Craig, coordinator of the Preservation Microfilm Service of SOLINET, the Southeastern Library Network.

The speaker series was intended for anyone interested in digital libraries, imaging projects or document preservation principles in general," said Becky Ryder, UK preservation librarian.

UK Libraries' Microfilm Center recently changed its name to Reprographics to reflect its increasing use of digital technologies in addition to established microfilming techniques.

Photographs of UK's Reprographics facilities are part of a new book, "Preservation Microfilming: A Guide for Librarians and Archivists," by Lisa Fox, preservation consultant.

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Rust is a little short of heavy metal

Editor's note: Rust will be playing on March 11 with Collective Soul at the Otis A. Singletary Center for the Arts. In a telephone interview with lead singer John Brinton, assistant arts editor Julie Anderson spoke to Brinton about Rust, music and movies.

Q: How did Rust get started?
 John Brinton: I moved back to San Diego in 1990, when the San Diego music scene was really starting to pick up. During that time all my friends were playing in bands and they seemed to be having a great time. I became a little envious. I was feeling artistically agitated, so I decided to get a band together, which took about a year. This band didn't really start up until 1992.

Q: Were you in school at the time?
 J.B.: No, I was just working some crummy jobs that paid good money.

Q: The CD says that all songs were a collaborative effort. Is this true?

J.B.: The majority of the material on the record is initiated by Tim and myself. Between us we share about 80 percent of the original songs, but each of us contributes to the songs in various ways. The way we wrote this was very much as a group of individuals. We each have four track recorders and acoustic guitars. First we wrote songs and melodies. Then we brought them to the band room and began playing them electrically. From there some of the songs would change a little bit, or they would take on a new dimension with the addition of drums and other instruments. We decided that everybody contributes equally in the long run.

Q: How does working collaboratively help your music?

J.B.: The songs are better thought out and reflect a completed idea rather than a group of fragmented ideas. For instance, we use to riff out in the jam room and then we would take the riffs and write lyrics over it. Now, we are much more likely to write a

song based on a melody in our head.

Q: So you always begin with the instrumental half?

J.B.: It's really empowering to take away the drums and electric guitar and break it down to an acoustic guitar, piano or voice.

Q: Do you ever perform acoustically?

J.B.: On this tour we've had a bunch of radio stations invite us to come play acoustically in the studio, which brings a whole new dimension to the band. We play these songs as they were originally written, which is really melo-

Q: How long have you been on the road?

J.B.: We went out for about a week and a half before we started this tour — up the West Coast to Vancouver and back. Then we started up on the east coast about a week ago. So, we've been on the road about two and one-half weeks. And we will be out for about another three and one-half weeks with this tour. Hopefully, we will continue to stay on the road.

Q: Do you like touring?

J.B.: Yeah, I love it.

Q: I think it would be draining. Do you get to look around many of the places you tour?

J.B.: We've had two days off in a two and one-half week period. Today, our second day off, we went to the Salvador Dali museum. It is the most comprehensive

collection of Dali's work. The other day that we had off we went and saw a movie.

Q: What movie did you see?

J.B.: We went and saw "Dead Man Walking" by Sean Penn.

Q: Did you like it?

J.B.: I had some reservations about it, though certainly not about the performances of any of the actors. Specifically, I liked Sean Penn a lot. I think that Susan Sarandon might have been a little bit miscast, not that she isn't a fine actress.

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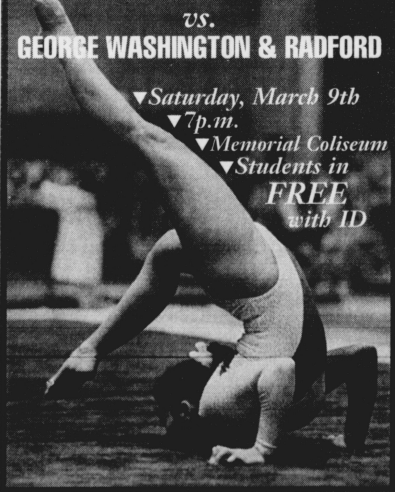
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Guided by Voices and Amps play good show

UK going for fifth straight

The UK basketball team will go for its fifth straight title at the UK Invitational, or Southeastern Conference Tournament, this afternoon at 1 at the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans.

They will be facing off against Florida, a 75-62 winner over Ole Miss yesterday. The Cats (26-1 overall, 16-0 SEC) haven't lost a game in the tourney since Rick Pitino first began piloting the Wildcat program in 1989.

This dates back to the 1992 tournament, UK's first year off probation. That Wildcat squad featured a young sophomore by the name of Jamal Mashburn, and maybe one of the most memorable senior classes in UK's storied history, the "Unforgettables" — John Pelphrey, Richie Farmer, Sean Woods and Deron Feldhaus.

That team got some much-needed help from Tennessee. The Vols played LSU in the quarterfinals, and during the game, Shaquille O'Neal was ejected for fighting, which warrants a one-game sus-

pension. The Cats faced the Shaq-less Tigers in the semifinals and defeated them to advance to the title game, where they beat Alabama for the SEC title.

After that year, it seemed like every year it got easier and easier for UK to win the SEC Tourney.

In 1993, Rupp Arena was the host of the tournament, and the home-court advantage must have motivated UK as they annihilated Tennessee 101-40 to advance to face Arkansas. The Cats handled the Hogs, then dispatched LSU 82-65 for the title.

The Pyramid in Memphis was the site for the Cats' next walk in the proverbial park in 1994. UK dismantled Mississippi State, followed by wins over a pair of Final Four teams in Arkansas and Florida to take its third straight crown.

Last year at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta, UK breezed past Auburn and Florida with relative ease. Looming on the horizon for the Cats, however, was bitter nemesis, Arkansas.

In what turned out to be one of the best games played during the 1994-95 season, UK battled back from double-digit deficits in the first and second halves to send the game into overtime.

In the overtime period, the Cats again faced a large deficit, this time one of nine points. But when Anthony Epps sank two free throws and the Hogs' Scotty Thurman missed a three attempt, UK stretched its SEC Tournament winning streak to 12 games and four titles.

This year, when people talk about the "Big Easy," they might not be talking about New Orleans. Instead, they could be talking about what appears to be Pitino and his Cats' easiest run through the tournament yet.

But Pitino disagrees with this attitude, reminding people that it only takes one bad game for a team to lose in the tournament.

"In a tournament, you've seen some great (North Carolina teams go into the ACC Tournament)," Pitino said, "or some other strong favorites go into a tournament and get beat."

He also said that there are large numbers of SEC teams battling for a berth in the "Big Dance," the NCAA Tournament. Currently, there are four teams who are considered "locks" no matter what happens in the SEC Tournament. They are UK (obviously), Mississippi State, Georgia and Alabama.

The ones who need a strong showing in the tourney are South Carolina, Arkansas, Auburn and Vanderbilt.

"There's a lot at stake for a lot of people in this tournament," Pitino said. "We're very motivated to win. It's not to say we can't get beat, we certainly can. On any given night, any team can beat any other team."

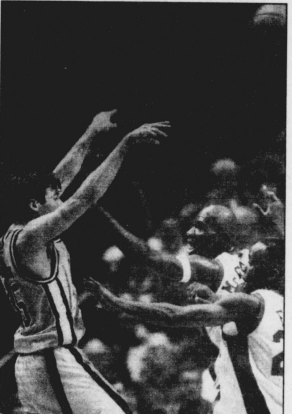
Pitino was philosophical in his view of a loss.

"Losing can only hurt," Pitino said, "winning can only help."

None of the current Wildcats have ever lost a game in the SEC Tournament, but one of the players who has experienced the winning streak the longest is senior Tony Delk.

Delk was one of only two Cats who were on the last UK team to go down to the Bayou, in the 1993 Final Four. Jared Prickett was the other.

"I think we're just focused, the guys are not concerned with who's getting the playing time," Delk said.

Cats to face Florida in SEC Tourney

NEW ORLEANS — Florida has seen this before.

Twice this season, the Gators (12-15 overall, 7-10 Southeastern Conference) have played UK. Twice the Wildcat juggernaut has reduced UF to Gator mush, cruising by an average of 22.5 points.

Now, after defeating Ole Miss 75-62 yesterday afternoon in the first round of the SEC Tournament, Florida stares a matchup with No. 1 UK in the eye.

"I don't think any of our players are ready to go home yet," said Florida guard Greg Williams, who led the Gators with 22 points against the Rebels.

The Gators will head home, unless they can slow UK's high-powered basketball machine. Florida has already met the Wildcat buzzsaw twice in February, which included a 31-point trashing in Gainesville.

"We've just got to step up and beat the pressure (against UK)," Florida center Dametri Hill said. "Playing against Kentucky, you've got to play your best, and that's what I've done (in the past)."

Hill has been a mountain of a man when UK comes yodeling. The 6-foot-7 Hill has averaged 26.5 points and 10 rebounds against the Cats.

After Hill, the Gators have had little firepower —

a necessity when playing UK. Against Ole Miss, however, there were signs of that trend subsiding. UF had four players in double figures, and forward Brian Thompson led the team with 10 rebounds.

"I was really proud of the way my teammates stepped up," Hill said.

The times Hill has had considerable help have been few and far between this season. Of Florida's 27 games, Hill has either led or tied for high scoring honors 19 times.

Gator coach Lon Kruger's team, unlike a few others in the tournament, aren't bubbling (close to an NCAA Tournament bid). Florida must win the SEC Tourney for an NCAA spot.

That means defeating UK today, which the Gators haven't managed to do since 1993.

"Their intensity and awareness is as good as any team in the country," Kruger said. "That's what makes them so tough."

Tough may be an understatement. The Cats have won 25 straight games — one more will break a UK single-season record for consecutive victories.

The Gators, Kruger said, are an improved team from the start of the season. Now, UF shoots thinking every ball will swish.

"Confidence is such a factor," said Kruger, whose team hit 54.3 percent from the field yesterday.

"Hopefully that will continue for us."

A loss today would likely hurt UK's NCAA Tournament seeding. A win all but wraps up a No. 1 seed.

Wildcat track stars heading for NCAA Championships

UK senior and four-time All-American Raina Turner took a few wrong turns early in her track and field career before deciding on the high jump.

"I started with the heptathlon, but I couldn't get the javelin to stick in the ground," Turner said.

During the past four years, she has also competed in the hurdles and the 4x400 meter relay before deciding to focus on the high jump.

Turner and some of her UK teammates are participating in the NCAA Championships this weekend.

Others who are competing include Tim Harden and Chris Jackson in the 55 meter, Nathan Plager in the pole vault, Arnold

Payne in the 400m and the men's mile relay team. On the women's team, Passion Richardson and LaTanza Stephens are running the 55m, in addition to Turner's high jump.

"I think we have some kids who have the opportunities," said UK sprint coach Darryl Anderson. "We'd like to compete as well as we can and come out with as many All-Americans as we can."

A junior, Richardson is returning to the national championships this year after missing last year's competition due to an injury. She earned a trip to the tournament her freshman year, and she's excited that she's returning to the competition this year.

Olympic hopeful Harden is the United States record holder in the 100m and won the USA Mobil Indoor Championships last year

with the fastest 60m time in the country. Is this weekend a chance to break another record and push him into the Olympics?

"There's always a chance (to break the record)," Harden said, "but there are a couple of guys besides myself who are there every year, and they're always competing hard. I've got my guns, they've got their guns... Let's get it on."

Another promising runner who is heading into the Championships is Payne, a senior from Zimbabwe.

Payne started out his college career at Eastern Kentucky University, and won three Ohio Valley Conference titles in the 400m.

He transferred to UK for this season. Payne holds the Zimbabwe national record in the 400m and was also a semifinalist at the 1993 World University Games.

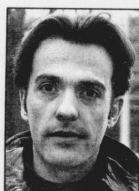

"You're the Terminator!"

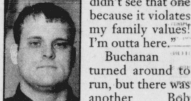
Bob Dole-bot grinned, or at least tried to. It wasn't in his programming, but he'd seen other people do it before.

"Now get out," Clinton said, and he walked away dreaming merry little daydreams about the next four years.

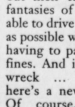

"The fans are already bombarding us with requests for t-shirts and we love it," Borkowski said. "Ours is the largest retail store of any American Hockey League team."

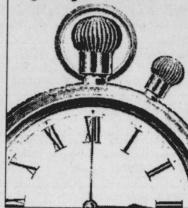

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WHO says U.S. should make contribution

WASHINGTON — Campaigns to eradicate polio by 2000 and to control other major diseases are being slowed by the United States' failure to pay its contribution to the World Health Organization, the U.N. agency said yesterday.

All the Western Hemisphere already is polio-free, but 3,751 cases were reported elsewhere last year.

"Eradication would save the U.S. at least \$230 million in yearly immunization costs," the agency said. And that, it said, is "more than twice its annual contribution to WHO's annual budget."

Three years after the last case is reported, WHO will declare the world polio-free with immunization no longer necessary, just as vaccinations were dropped when smallpox was eradicated.

Making that day occur on schedule is becoming problematic for the agency.

"WHO faces the immediate prospect of steep cutbacks in major programs as a result of continued delay in the payment of assessed contributions by member states, the United States in particular," said Nelle Temple Brown, the organization's external relations officer for the United States.

Since Feb. 29, the United States' unpaid bill to the World Health Organization has totaled \$211 million, or two full years' assessment under a treaty that goes back to 1948.

President Clinton asked Congress for

enough to clear the arrears, then vetoed an appropriation that would have allowed only a reduced payment.

The only U.S. payment this year — about \$13 million — went to cover other past-due accounts. In addition to the annual obligation, the United States makes specific program contributions to WHO of up to \$50 million a year.

Under current legislation, however, funding is unlikely to be possible for anything but child survival programs. Congress provides an overall amount for international organizations, leaving to the administration the decision on each institution's share.

"By not meeting their funding obligations, the U.S. and other delinquent donors are putting years of achievement in jeopardy," the agency said in a press statement.

"If momentum is lost and the world's health deteriorates, the financial costs of returning to current levels will be far greater, and at the cost of increased sickness and death around the globe."

WHO said other countries are paid in full for 1995, and Canada and France already have started paying for this year.

Brown said U.S. contributions are used largely for dispatching experts to combat epidemics and laboratory technicians to countries where polio remains a danger.

"As a result of the U.S. delay, well over a dozen countries have not had this help for over a year," she said.

India had by far the largest number of polio cases last year with 2,176. In addition, Pakistan and Russia reported more than 100 cases each, and Iran, Egypt, Vietnam, China, Cambodia, Bangladesh and Turkey had scores of them.

School prayer bill may die in Senate committee

FRANKFORT, Ky. — School prayer might not have one.

With the 1996 General Assembly ticking away, the Senate Education Committee yesterday had a long debate, but took no vote, on a bill to protect "voluntary, student-initiated" prayer on school grounds.

A separate bill for a "moment of silence" at the beginning of each school day was still in the wings when the committee broke up.

The chairman, Sen. Joe Meyer, D-Covington, said he did not know whether the committee would meet again before next Thursday.

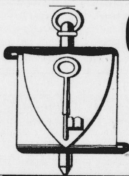
If not, Sen. Elizabeth Tori's student prayer bill would need someone's intercession.

Nine days would remain for bills to pass; the usual minimum is two weeks.

Rep. Jim Maggard's moment-of-silence bill would have a chance because it already has been passed by the House.

Under the bill by Tori, R-Radcliff, school administrators could not prohibit prayers initiated by students at school-related events outside the classroom.

Events would include ball games, baccalaureate services and graduation ceremonies.



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
