

A solid majority: LCC students' poll shows Clinton, others on the slide

Sylva New Control Start Wester Country Support the U.S. policy of leading NATO in the bombing campaign against Yugoslavia, according to a poll conducted by Lexington Community College Students.

Forty-eight port of frequent voters surveyed in Fayette and surveyed point for the possible reenactment of the draft.

"It seems that people would rather spend their money to help the military," said firm Cantrell, a political science professor at LCC who has his students conduct the public survey each semester.

Cantrell's poll results supported this statement. In response to his questions about military budget cuts, 56 percent of those surveyed agreed that military spending should be increased.

Those polled were asked 13 questions dealing with their political

views from international to local issues.

With the proposal to increase the Lexington-Fayette Urban-County Council terms from two to four years, the public is undecided with an equal split.

Yugoslavia may OK peace pact

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — Yugoslavia is ready to accept a peace deal calling for a U.N. presence, Deputy Premier Vuk Draskovic said yesterday, Although it was unclear if Draskovic was expressing President Slobodan Milosevic's views, his comments could represent a major step toward meeting conditions set down by NATO for ending the five-week air campaign. In a reflection of the political turmoil in Belgrade, the Yugoslav army later yesterday took over private television station Studio B, which aired Draskovic's initial comments.

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — Nearly a month after Yugoslav forces captured three U.S. soldiers, the Red Cross captured three U.S. soldiers, the Red Cross allowed to see them. Belle sidelined with a hole in system

No race? Spirit of Jefferson to replace Belle in the traditional Great Steamboat Race

LOUISVILLE — A flooded hull didn't sideline the Belle of Louisville from its Derby-week race, but a tiny hole in the boil-er system will.

er system will.

The Belle will remain dock-side for the Great Steamboat Race because of the mechanical flaw, but another riverfront mainstay will take its place Wednesday.

The Spirit of Jefferson will carry the community's banner against the Belle's rival, the Delta Queen, race organizers announced Sunday.

Mark Doty, the Spirit's captain, said he was ready for the challenge.

challenge. "My boat is in tiptop shape," said Doty, who compet-ed in plenty of steamboat races as a former Belle crew member. The Belle will miss the race because of a pinhole unde-

boiler system.

Mike Fitzgerald, the Belle's captain, said the slight flaw probably goes all the way back to when the steel was manufactured years ago.

"This is something that needs to be suitably repaired so it doesn't lead to more problems down the road," he said. "It is repairable, it's just coming up with the right process for repair."

the right process for repair."
Fitzgerald said he was comfortable with the decision to have the Belle sit out this year's race against its paddle-wheeling rival.
"We have a mechanical problem, and every year we've had the steamboat race we've and the steamboat race we've and the steamboat race we've and the steamboat race we've adways put safety first and winning second," he said. 'I feel good that we're doing the right thing that this boat is going to

ne nack out there."
Not even the Belle's partial sinking into the Ohio River in August 1997 had kept it from competing in the race. A former crew member, Brennan Callan, was convicted of causing the sinking and faces up to 20 years in prison.

The ship was repaired in time to win last year's steamboat race, giving it 17 wins to the Delta Queen's 16. Two other boats also have won.

The Delta Queen towers over the Belle and will have an even bigger size advantage against the Spirit of Jefferson. The Spirit is 18 feet long and 32 feet wide; the Belle is 200 feet long and about 46 feet wide, Jewell said.



Not only did the fourth-seeded Tigers beat Georgia for the second straight tyear, they beat them by the same score 43. Despite their win, LSU had to share the conference championship with Georgia

after both schools tied in points accumulated during the regular season and the league tournament. Both UK squads now await the NCAA Tournament, which begins May 8 for the women and May 14 for the men. Both teams are assured of a spot in the dance, as the women finished ranked 20th in the nation with a 15-9 record and the men closed their season ranked 18th in the country with a 15-9 record.

Until then, men's Head Coach Dennis Emery can celebrate being named SEC Coach of the Year just before the tournament started.

This season marked the second time in his 15-year stint at UK that he earned the award. The Cats finished 14 spots higher in the polls than what they started the year, thanks in part to upset wins over No. 11 South Carolina, No. 9 Alabama and No. 2 Illinois.

"This is a great honor," Emery said. "(Assistant Coach) Ford Lankford has done a great job this year, and I consider this an award for both of us."

Memorable performances

Ahoy mates: Pirates of Penzance hits all the right notes to close out the UK Department of Theatre's year of shows

By Jim Scott School State of the Arts Prizes is in theater, and we have an old saying about music majors. Undoubtery, they have a similar one about music majors. Undoubtery, they have a similar one about music majors. Combined, the saying would go something like this. Music majors can't act, and theater majors can't sing.

It's not true, of course, but as generalizations go, it has its points.
You can't expect an excellent carpenter to lay bricks with equal skill. Hairdressers aren't tailors and bartenders aren't chefs.
So when UK's Pirates of Penzance opened, there was no telling what kind of voices would take the stage. Gilbert and Sullivan's Pirates is known as "light" opera, but that doesn't make it any easier to hit the high notes.
Some may only know UK for loser decisions like plus-minus grading, but the College of Fine Arts breaks with University tradition and does something clever. Pirates is cooperative production presented by UK Theatre and UK Opera Theatre. The result is something special.

It is possible, perhaps even likely, that a better musical production has been mounted in the Guigno! Theatre. But I've never seen one.






