# Convention just a mouse click away

Taking back your government: UK Professor Richard Labunski discusses how the American people can rally on the Internet

Most people think of the Internet as a way to shop or communicate with family or friends.

UK professor Richard Labunski sees it as something more — a way for the American people to take back their government.

Labunski, an associate professor in the School of Journalism and Telecommunications, addresses this issue in his new book, "The Second Constitution: How the American People Can Take Back Their

Government."
Labunski gave a presentation
Thursday at the Lexington Public
Library about the book where he
spoke of his proposed scond conventual proposed scond conthat Congress should comply. He
encourages the American people
to use this clause along with the
mass communication possibilities
of the Internet to come together
and organize a second Constitutional Convention.

The book contains 10 amendments that Labunski proposed be-

cause of problems he sees in the political system, including the repealing of the 2nd Amendment, campaign finance reform and direct election of the president. He said his book could give people an outlet to voice their opinions about the system.

said his book could give people an outlet to voice their opinions about the system. "I wish people would talk about that more and figure out what they can do other than just throw up their hands and be frustrated," Labunski said.

Although Labunski admits the chances of a second Constitutional Convention are not great, he sees his book as an opportunity to

stimulate interest in politics.
"I hope that it would generate some actual dialogue, either through the Internet or through both the mass media or through both the control of the cont

was elected, he said. Labunski said voter apathy is a problem, with college-age voters in particular. "It's a combination of students not having some of life's experiences that make some political issues and decisions more urgent, and parents not creating an environment where they impress upon them how important it is to be well informed."

A UK professor's dedication to teaching has paid off in more ways than one. The American Association of Pharmacutical Sciences will honor Partics. The award includes \$10,000. and Deluca said he plans on donating the money to UK for an endowed professorship in pharmaceutical sciences. The AAPS annual meeting and exposition is the largest gathering of pharmaceutical scientists in the world, with more than 8,000 in attendance. Deluca is the first recipient of the award.

The nominees were evaluated by their professional appointments, awards received related to pharmaceutical technology and their influence as mentors, determined largely by the accomplishments of former students.

Deluca has mentored 25 doctoral graduate students and 35 postdoctoral students from around the world. He is currently editor of PharmSciTech, a new online journal, and is associated with seven UK sought Deluca as one of several leaders in pharmaceutical technology to act as a foundation for a growing College of Pharmacy.

He arrived at the University of Kentucky in 1970. Deluca had previously worked in the pharmaceutical industry developing drugs, but saw an opportunity to have a larger influence when UK contacted him with a job offer.

Deluca said he plans to continue helping the College of Pharmacy maintain its standard of excellence in training pharmacists. The college is currently ranked hird in the nation amongst pharmacy programs.

#### 50-state poll: Gore gaining ground

50-state poll: Gore gaining ground WASHINGTON — Since the political conventions, Al Gore has made the presidential race competitive or has gained an edge over George W. Bush in many battleground states that could decide the election, a 50-state poll project suggests. The polls, taken by the American Research Group of Manchester, N.H., back up earlier polls in many of the battleground states showing a far more competitive landscape than before the convention. In Pennsylvania, a big prize with 23 electoral votes where some recent polls had placed Gore ahead, the two candidates were very close. In several states considered tossups, like Washington and Oregon, Gore had a narrow edge.

WASHINGTON — Department of Veterans
Affairs computers are wide open to hackers and
dishonest agency workers, putting veterans'
medical and financial information as well as VA
funds at risk, department officials said yesterday.
The VA's top technical officials and their internal watchdog office told the House Veterans Affairs' oversight subcommittee that when the department contracted a security company to see
whether their defenses were enough, the hackers
had no trouble breaking in to the system with
simple tools, taking total control of it.

#### Crimes keep many blacks from voting

WASHINGTON — On Election Day, nearly 1.4 million voting-age black men - more than one in eight - will be ineligible to cast ballots because of state laws that strip felons of the right to vote. Here we are, 50 years after the beginning of the civil rights movement, and we actually have an increasing number of African-Americans who are disenfranchised each year," said Marc Mauer of The Sentencing Project, which analyzed 1986 Justice Department statistics along with Human Rights Watch.

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

#### 'Twist of fate': Thompson wins bronze, loses much anticipated individual gold medal

SYDNEY, Australia—How's this for a cruel twist of fate? Jenny Thompson, across three Olympiads, earned more medals than any woman swimmer. She just couldn't win the one she wanted most.

U.S. boxer Dante Craig, knocked out of the Olympics in just his second fight, knows how she feels.

The Thompson saga was the most dramatic tale Thursday at the Aquatic Center, but it wasn't the only one. The United States, led by Lenny Krayzelburg's second Sydney gold, collected eight medals on the sixth night of swimming competition.

Thompson, 27, took a bronze medal in the 100-meter freestyle, giving her a career to-

Inge de Bruijn of the Netherlands won the 100 freestyle for her second gold, a complement to her victory in the 100 butterfly.

Unlike Thompson, nothing escaped Krayelburg.

The Ukrainian immigranturned-U.S. swimmer set an Olympic record in taking the 200 backstroke to complete a Sydney sweep. Krayzelburg's earlier victory in the 100 backstroke made him just the fourth man to win both events in a single Olympic games. Americans Rick Carey (1984) and John Naber (1976) and German Roland Matthes (1966, 1972) were the others.

Krayzelburg's precocious teammate Aaron Pelisol, just 17, won the backstroke silver. # Cats ready to try again in Swamp

Bad run: Win would be UK's first since 1979

Lynyrd Skynyrd won't be performing at Ben Hill Griffin Stadi-um Saturday when UK takes on the Florida Gators. Nevertheles, UK coach Hal Mumme is preparing his team for "Swamp Music." "We'll practice a lot with crowd noise. We can get it cranked up pretty good as some in the neighborhood will tell you," Mumme said.

But Mumme knows fake crowd noise won't fully prepare his young team for Florida's raucous stadium, affectionately referred to by Gator fains as the Swamp.

"We're certainly doing some things to prepare, but it's kind of like the speed of the game. I don't think you ever completely practice what's going to happen to you on Saturday," Mumme said.
Seven of Mumme's 11 offensive starters are freshmen or sophomores and will be making their first trip to the University of Florida.

Florida also blackballed starting defensive end Alex Brown — a junior and first team all-SEC selection —from the media because he wasn't happy with his level of play.

It's safe to say the Gators won't be taking anyone for granted.

"T'm sure they'll give us fits. Ball State gave us fits so we're going to try to get ready to play our best. Kentucky's certainly a lot better than Ball State, 'Spurrier said.

Despite what Spurrier says, the Cats haven't won at Florida since 1979, and Mumme knows the Swamp will be roarring like the guitar solo in "Free Bird."

"We'll keep the game plan as simple as we can," Mumme said. "Communication is a problem because it's like a rock concert."


