MINUTES OF THE SENATE OCTOBER 11, 1920

The University Senate met Monday, October 11, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of the Council of September 30 were read and approved.

President McVey read a petition from the students, requesting that the rules governing eligibility for athletics be modified so as to conform to the rules of the Southern Athletic Association. He reported that the Committee on Rules had been requested to make a study of this petition and after a conference with the Athletic Committee, to submit a report for the consideration of the Senate. The report is as follows:

1. Definition of D

D. Condition; no points. This mark does not prevent entrance upon succeeding courses, but becomes a passing mark only when for the period under question and including this mark in the computation the student's standing is 1 or more.

2. Delinquent Students

Change first sentence of second paragraph to read: "Any student whose standing for the preceding two semesters is not 1 or more in at least 24 semester hours is placed on probation for the whole of the next semester."
