Ashland Garden Security

I started out by contacting two security firms, ADT and Sonitrol, to see what suggestions they might offer in the way of security for Ashland Garden.

I told each of them that I had three main goals:

1/ First and foremost, to stop the vandalism.

2/ To catch the perpetrators.

3/ To convict them if possible and have their parents (assuming they are kids) pay for the damages.

ADT suggested we put 8 cameras w/ outdoor minidomes on 10-12' poles w/ cages on them (to protect them from vandalism). They gave me a verbal estimate of \$12,000 - \$18,000 for the cameras plus \$4000 for a hard drive system plus the cost of conduit to the cottage which would house the hard drive system. We then could look at an archived video after an event. As well, they suggested we seriously consider lighting.

While waiting for Sonitrol to come with a plan and an estimate, I contacted a friend that works for the FBI and told him about the various incidents and damage we had had and asked him for suggestions. He felt, as everyone seems to, that lighting would be a first step toward deterring activity. He also suggested we distribute flyers to all the surrounding houses in the neighborhood, telling them of the vandalism and asking them to notify a contact person that we would specify or notify the police if there was any unusual activity. He suggested we check with the neighbors one a week for awhile to see if anyone had seen or heard anything. Also, he said we could hire a private security guard for \$8 - \$10 / hr or \$40 - \$50 per night for a period of time.

Meanwhile, I decided to contact Hillenmeyer's to see if they had a landscape lighting specialist and Steve Hillenmeyer sent Wendy McAlister to meet with me. Wendy came up with two options originally. The first option included 10 10' poles, 2 pier mount posts, 12 decorative light fixtures and 12 metal halide lights. The estimate for option #1 was \$20, 479 including labor trenching and materials. The lights would stay on all night and would have good coverage throughout the garden.

Option #2 included 6 motion lights with two lights per unit, plus 12 bulbs. These would be installed in the trees just outside of the garden but directed into the garden, providing the Board at Ashland approves of the plan. There was some concern that these may be turning on and off all the time due to the high sensitivity needed to detect motion in the garden. This option would cost \$7347.

Since then, Sonitrol has sent a proposal I think we should seriously consider. A copy is attached for your consideration. They are proposing two motion detectors aimed at the center of the garden be placed on opposite corners of the garden – the left hand

corner as you enter through the main gate and the far right corner from the same vantage point –. These would be mounted on 4 x 4" steel posts that could be painted (green) to blend in. They could be anywhere from 6' to 12' high. The higher they are, the less likely they are to be vandalized.

When someone enters the garden and sets off the motion detector, a recorded message will inform them that they are on private property and that they are being monitored. The system also may be set so strobe lights flash when it is tripped. Sonitrol's central station know when the system is tripped and could notify someone who is willing to go to the garden to check on it. They would not dispatch the police but we could even employ a security guard for a short time so any intruders would *think* that security could show up anytime they enter the garden after dark.

The recorded message <u>volume</u> is programmable, as is the <u>sensitivity</u> of the motion detectors. Sonitrol will be able to provide us with documentation of how often the motion sensors are tripped and what time of night so we could eventually target security if necessary.

The system would require that we be able to put a Base Panel somewhere in the Cottage Office Building where it would be protected from extreme heat or cold. The system would be programmed to automatically turn on and off at a specified time of day or night. When we have a special event such as the Friends of the Garden Party, we would simply call Sonitrol and ask them to reprogram the system for a later starting time on that date.

We can either buy the system for \$4,694 and pay a monthly monitoring/service fee of \$70 (\$840/Yr) or we can lease the equipment for an initial investment of \$374 plus a lease payment of \$187 for 60 months (\$374 + \$11,220 over 5 years). This option does include the monthly monitoring/service fee.

As well, we would need to pay to run $\frac{3}{4}$ " PVC conduit from the Cottage to the garden. I have gotten a verbal guestimate based on 60-100" of conduit = \$700 - \$1200 (@\$10/ft. plus \$100 - \$200).

Sonitrol also recommended we consider lighting in addition to their proposal.

Meanwhile, Mary Warren mentioned to Kathy Dalton and I that there are at least three electrical outlets spaced out along the taxus hedge in close proximity to the trees we were targeting for some of the light fixtures.

After I received Sonitrols estimate and recommendations, I contacted Wendy McAlister from Hillenmeyer's again. We met at the garden with her electrician and I asked for a new estimate for three sets of two lights in each of three different trees at a height of approximately 20' high. They would be in the trees just outside of the garden behind the taxus hedge, coming off of the electrical outlets that are in the taxus hedge.

The new estimate came in at \$2867 for materials and labor. It will not provide complete coverage for the garden but should illuminate it enough that intruders will not want to stay for long since they could more easily be seen.

I also had checked into fake security cameras which Radio Shack sells for \$30 each. It might be worth investing in a couple and have the electrician install them at the same time he installs the lights.

Also, Elise Boyd's husband, Jim, made the generous offer of installing a video camera that could provide photos (or footage?) of intruders. It is my understanding that as long as we have a written notice or verbal warning message stating that they might be photographed, we don't have to get a search warrant first.

All of the above is contingent on the Director and Board at Ashland agreeing to the following:

- A). That we are allowed to put a 2' x 2' x 4" Base Panel in the Cottage Office Building.
- B). That Sonitrol be allowed to access to a phone line (it does <u>not</u> have to be a dedicated line).
- C). That we are allowed to put light fixtures in 3 trees outside the garden to shine into the garden.

The Board at Ashland will be meeting and discussing these issues on Wednesday, October 15^{th.}

I know the Garden Club Board will give these proposals serious consideration. I feel confident that we have a workable solution given the difficulty of the situation. I sincerely hope that we can move forward with it in the near future.

Mrs. Cordray,

I apologize for the delay in providing you with a system design. I have recently had the opportunity to provide a similar design that has been implemented and has been effective.

Please find the system design enclosed. I have placed two outdoor motion detectors on opposite corners of the garden. These motions will be mounted on posts and aimed in to the middle of the garden so as to provide the maximum coverage possible in the garden. This will not cover 100% of the interior of the garden, but it will greatly reduce the amount of time an intruder may spend undetected within the perimeter. The Base panel will be connected to our central station via a telephone line provided in the closest building to the garden and will turn the system on and off with a time schedule after hours. If the motion detectors are "tripped" we will annunciate a pre recorded message to notify trespassers that they are on private property and that they are being monitored. My central station will not dispatch police on these alarms, but may contact a "key holder" if one would like to be contacted on "excessive" activations. This should serve to keep "scare" people out of the garden. The system could later be connected to turn lights on and off or to actually record video to a recording unit.

Ashland Garden would need to provide a phoneline and a power outlet at the closest building possible for the control equipment. Ashland Garden would also need to provide a conduit run of 3/4" PVC conduit from the closest building into the garden. Sonitrol will be responsible for all connections and conduit once inside the garden and at the control equipment located in the building.

Please call me with any questions you may have on system design. I will be able to make revisions on this design now that we have the initial design in place.



Joint Committee Proposes Slashing Conservation Incentives FACT SHEET

A recent report by Congress's Joint Committee on Taxation¹ recommends dismantling tax deductions for landowners who volunteer to conserve their land and historic buildings—a program that has been essential to private and public conservation efforts.

Those tax incentives, in place for more than 25 years, have led to voluntary conservation of more than 34 million acres of working agricultural lands, working forests, wildlife habitats, historic landscapes, parklands, and historic buildings and their grounds.

Currently, landowners who care about conservation and are willing to protect important resources on their property have several options:

They can donate a conservation easement, which protects these resources forever, but allows
families to continue to live on and farm the land, and pass the property on to their heirs.
 Now, they receive a tax deduction for the value of the development rights they give up.

The Joint Committee proposes: (1) forbidding <u>any</u> deduction for donating an easement if the landowner continues to live on the land; and (2) in all other cases, allowing the donor to deduct only <u>1/3</u> the value of their donation. This would effectively eliminate the tax incentives for donations of conservation easements.

• They can also choose to donate their land, or sell it for less than its value. Landowners who do so qualify for a tax deduction.

The Joint Committee would slash this incentive, by limiting deductions to the price the landowner originally paid for the property (their "basis"). This would make it extremely difficult for farmers, ranchers, and other residents who have owned their lands for decades to be able to afford to donate.

At a time when development and sprawl threaten much of what makes our communities livable—clean air and water, open space, parks, and wildlife habitat—private landowners have a critical role to play in conservation. With state and federal budget deficits limiting government purchase of conservation land, one of the best ways to conserve America's natural and historic legacy is through incentives to private landowners. This approach is working because it encourages voluntary charitable gifts, respects private property rights, and keeps land on the tax rolls.

Conservationists support reforms targeted to prevent abuse of the existing laws. The proposals of the Joint Tax Committee don't do that – instead, they punish all donors, fail to identify abusers, and wreak havoc with private, voluntary conservation, at a time when it is needed more than ever.

I am gravely concerned that the Joint Committee on Taxation (JCT) staff has recently suggested major changes in the treatment of landowners who donate land or conservation easements. One of these changes would drastically reduce incentives for landowners who live on their family farms, and wish to protect working farms and family lands.

I want you to know that easement donations have been very important to our community. These easements benefit all citizens. They help in keeping drinking water clean, protect habitat for endangered plant and animal species, keep land open for farming, support local comprehensive plans, and encourage tourism.

By remaining in private ownership, the land continues in productive use, continues to contribute property taxes to local government, and is managed by private landowners, not public agency personnel. Land under easement reduces the cost to localities of providing infrastructure such as schools and emergency services. The federal government saves money as well. Privately donated conservation easements are a very cost-effective way of preserving land.

The JCT report raises concerns about the potential for abuse of the current tax incentives from inflated appraisals for easements of limited conservation value. To address that concern, I am very supportive of holding easement donations, and done organizations to high standards. One way to address these concerns is to encourage every land trust to adopt the Land Trust Alliance Standards and Practices. I would support changes in the law, in regulations, and in enforcement, that would ensure that high standards are met.

The changes suggested by the Joint Committee on Taxation (JCT) would result in landowners, who are fully committed to achieving public goals through donation of conservation easements, receiving little, if any, tax benefit for making extremely valuable donations of development rights. These donations serve important public purposes. This is a short-sighted and ineffective way to reduce the budget deficit. It ignores the costs that would ensue from the loss of donations of conservation easements.

While supporting appropriate standards for donee organizations' acceptance of easement donations, I ask you to vote <u>against</u> any attempt to draft legislation based on the JCT suggestion that the tax benefits of easements be cut.

Suggested Topics for Congressional Visits Washington Legislative Meeting, 2005

Background: The Reality Check

Virtually all legislation this year must be viewed against the very serious backdrop of fiscal realities. The Congressional Budget Office (CBO) has just released new estimates showing that the budget deficit grew to \$422 billion in Fiscal Year 2004, and will be \$46 billion higher in 2005. Furthermore, outside the surplus in the Social Security Trust Fund, CBO estimates the 2004 deficit at \$571 billion. Looking out ten years farther, CBO says that reralistic assumptions indicate that deficits will total \$4.4 TRILLION by 2014.

Another concern of the CBO is the fact that the deficit is rising when it should be falling, because of the economic recovery we are experiencing.

To put it mildly, this spells difficulties for many of the programs we care about, most of which must depend on federal government appropriations.

A few examples from the President's **proposed** budget, released earlier this week:

- A reduction of 5.6%, or \$452 million, in funding for the Environmental Protection Agency.
- The Land and Water Conservation Fund Stateside program, from which many of our towns and cities have benefited, has been zeroed out! Zero. Federal LWCF has been significantly decreased. This is in spite of the fact that the fund receives money from offshore gas and oil drilling fees, which have already been collected. The money for this fund is not paid by the taxpayer.
- The federal government provides grants to states to help with the financial burdens of fire fighting this year they are reduced by 26%.
- The State Revolving Fund is a loan fund which helps states rebuild and repair their deteriorating wastewater infrastructures. The estimated cost of this infrastructure repair nationwide is estimated at \$390 billion nationwide over 20 years. In last year's budget, dollars for this LOAN fund were cut by 19%; this year they are cut by an additional 33%, or \$361 million.
- Funding for development of renewable energy sources is cut by 4%.
- The budget includes anticipated revenues from drilling in the Arctic National Wilderness Area, though Congress has traditionally rejected drilling there. In any event, it will take up to a decade before any revenues would be realized.

Another concern is that with reduced expenditures on the part of the federal government, more and more responsibilities will fall upon the states, most of which have financial problems of their own. Examples would include enforcement of the Clean Air Act and the Clean Water Act.

Air Quality and Energy:

The Energy Conference Report from the 108th Conference will be reconsidered in the 109th, and possibly when we are in Washington. Objections to the report include:

- It weakened the provisions of the Clean Air Act.
- It allowed more pollution than the current Clean Air Act permits.
- It encourages oil and gas exploration in ecologically sensitive areas and national public lands.
- It doesn't require electricity producers to increase their use of renewable fuels.
- It contains no requirement for auto manufacturers to improve auto mileage (CAFÉ) standards.

Expected legislation:

The Administration's Clear Skies proposals will be countered by a bill offered by Senator Jeffords, which would require reductions in four emissions: mercury, sulfur dioxide, nitrous oxide, and carbon dioxide.

Senators McCain and Lieberman have introduced their Climate Stewardship Act, which also proposed to regulate carbon dioxide, and to allow a system of trading caps for CO2 as well.

The costs of air pollution include respiratory diseases such as asthma, premature mortality from particulate pollution, smog, acid rain and degradation of coastal waters. Health costs measure in thousands of lives and billions of dollars each year: 150,000 emergency room visits, 53,000 annual hospital stays, and 6.000,000 asthma attacks annually.

Agriculture:

The convergence of forces – budget deficits, trade disputes, discontent with our farm policy at home and abroad – has created a unique opportunity for farm policy reform. Subsidy payments for commodities have not proved an effective rural development policy. Capping subsidies, which is suggested in the President's proposed budget, and decoupling support from production levels, would get support from fiscal conservatives and allow world Trade organization issues to be addressed, and also allow reallocation of some resources to address legitimate environmental, marketing and rural development needs.

This is not going to be easy, and there are many entrenched special interests.

Meanwhile, it is critical to remind our legislators of the importance of appropriations for Title II of the Farm Bill, the Conservation Title, which need to be addressed every year.

Conservation programs include:

- Conservation Reserve Program, which pays farmers for putting some of their highly erodible or environmentally sensitive land in "reserve" for a ten year period. Farmers receive annual rental payments.
- Environmental Quality Incentives Program, which provides financial incentives to participate in conservation efforts.
- Wetlands Protection Programs
- Conservation Security Program, which pays farmers who continue to farm. This is an
 important program because it keeps current land in production, and is more likely to help
 rural communities than if land is simply taken out of production instead of being sold for
 development.

Endangered Species/Native Plants

GCA POSITION ON THE ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT:

(Based on our position paper entitled GCA Supports Native Plants)

- We support strong legislation re-authorizing the Endangered Species Act
- We support appropriate incentives to preserve endangered species on private lands.
- We support increased funding for the Fish and Wildlife Service to implement the ESA and to have sufficient staff to provide ESA expertise to other federal agencies.
- We support greater protection and funding for threatened and endangered plant species. (Seventy percent of threatened and endangered plants live outside federal lands.)

From Legislative Update 37: Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR)

The Issue: Language opening The Arctic National Wildlife Refuge to energy development/drilling on the refuge's Alaskan coastal plain will be part of **imminent** legislation. If it is attached to the Senate Budget reconciliation legislation, it may very well pass because filibustering is not allowed on budget legislation.

Relevant Position Papers: Public Lands, National Parks, Clean Water, Native Plants, and Clean Air.

Background: The opening of ANWR to drilling was part of the energy bill in the 108th Congress. The House has previously passed energy legislation opening ANWR to energy development and can be expected to again very soon in this Congress. The Senate, through threat of filibuster, has been able to hold off a vote on ANWR. It takes 60 votes in the Senate to close a filibuster. In the Senate at least 51 Senators are expected to vote for drilling in ANWR, but not 60. So if a filibuster to prevent a vote on ANWR began, there would not be the necessary 60 members in favor of drilling to close the filibuster and force a vote. Because of this, Senator Pete Domenici (R-NM) is proposing to include ANWR in the budget reconciliation bill by counting *projected* revenues from the sale of oil and gas leases in the budget. It is important to note that this revenue would not be realized for almost a decade. Budget legislation cannot be filibustered.

The following quote from Senator Ed Markey (D-MA) describes the concern for ANWR, an area made a wildlife refuge during the Eisenhower Administration: "The coastal plain of the Refuge is the biological heart of the ecosystem and is critical to the survival of caribou, polar bears, and over 160 species of birds. A Department of the Interior study suggests that oil development would contribute to a 20-40 percent decline in the Refuge's caribou population, and similar declines in wolverine and musk oxen populations. When you drill in the heart, every other part of the biological system suffers.

"The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service calls the coastal plain the "center for wildlife activity" in the Refuge. If the drillers get their way, a refuge for wildlife will become something else – a place for caribou, grizzlies, polar bears and wolves to practice their social skills with oil riggers, pipelines, roads, pumping stations, bulldozers, helicopters, airstrips, and everything else necessary for a state-of-the-art "environmentally-conscious" oil field. Like their counterparts in the zoo, the wildlife will be required to adapt to living in an oil field, and they will be "wildlife" no more. A place that has been "forever wild" will be gone – gone forever – never to be retrieved."

It should also be noted that many of the environmentally-conscious techniques for Arctic drilling depend on doing work in the winter when the ground is frozen. Recently, winters in the Arctic have been warmer and the ground is often not frozen. Tundra and other arctic plant material are at risk when subjected to industrial activity.

<u>Suggested Action:</u> Regardless of which legislation calls for the opening of ANWAR, the message for every Congressperson and Senator is: **Please, no drilling in The Arctic National Wildlife Refuge!!!**

Transportation:

- The cost of the transportation reauthorization bill (TEA-21) is approximately \$200 billion! The funding comes from federal gasoline taxes and other excise taxes, and dollars are sent to individual states for their projects.
- Our concerns are that during the appropriations process, funding for transportation enhancements must be preserved. Examples include the National Scenic Byways programs, which gives communities effective ways to promote and protect their special scenic, historical, natural, cultural and recreational resources. Additionally, programs provide funding for landscaping, historic preservation, environmental mitigation to address water pollution due to highway runoff, and maintaining habitat connectivity.
- The final bill must not weaken standards set forth in the Clean Air Act.
- Considering the enormous environmental implications of any bill of this magnitude, it
 is critical to keep in place the National Environmental Policy Act, and the opportunity
 for public imput about how highway construction impacts air, water, wetlands and
 endangered species.
- We can protect our nation's watersheds by setting aside 2% of the total cost of this bill for storm water improvements and encouraging natural napproaches to managing storm water runoff.

National Parks:

- Please see letter to attendees in your folders, which outlines many suggestions for improvement of our national parks.
- The campaign promise of \$5 billion for our national parks has been substantially reduced in the President's proposed budget the amount now is \$1 billion.

The real issue here is appropriations for our national parks, which continue to deal with increased expenses and decreased budgets. We need to pay attention when the Department of Interior budget is considered by appropriations committees. We hope all attendees have carefully reviewed our new Position Paper on National Parks.

Water/Wetlands:

Message to elected officials re CWA in general:

- The CWA of 1972 has been critical in helping to restore the health of our nation's waters. But the job is not finished. Do not permit the CWA to be compromised.
- Provide EPA with adequate resources and staff to do its job.
- Insist that the principals of EPA and its sister agencies do not accede to the demands of interest groups by lowering standards, extending deadlines, ignoring violations.
- Ensure that all legislation conforms to requirements of the Clean Water Act. For example, in the new Transportation Bill, support inclusion of the recognition that runoff pollution from highways contaminates downstream waters with oil, grease, lead and other dangerous pollutants and provide adequate funding for mitigation of this pollution in highway construction projects.

Message to our elected officials re wetlands:

- Wetlands are vitally important, not just for flora and fauna and we are losing them.
- Demand stronger implementation of the existing wetlands regulatory program.
- Ensure that the EPA and its sister agencies are adequately funded and staffed.
- Support legislation that specifically includes 'isolated waters and wetlands' under CWA protection.
- Support funding for wetland conservation programs in the Farm Bill.

Message to elected officials re blending:

- The EPA estimates that the sewage and clean water infrastructure nationwide will need almost \$400 billion over the next 15 years. Local governments simply cannot afford the upgrades without federal assistance.
- Support adequate funding in the form of loans (State Revolving Funds) to local communities.
- Do not allow blending as a compromise. 'Dilution is not the solution to pollution
