"Although ATF will allow continued reference to a distilled spirits brand name, it is prohibiting any such references that lead the consumer to believe that the product is made with or contains specific types or classes of distilled spirits," ATF said.

Crandall said ATF has been receiving more and more complaints that some of the labels were confusing and misleading to consumers.







Civic Center work should avoid delay

Funds for renovation absent from state budget

The downtown area benefited dramatically from the financial rewards of tourism late last month when college basketball fans filled local hotels and restaurants for the NCAA regional tournament.

NCAA regional tournament.

It was in the hopes of drawing more financially beneficial events to Lexington that renovation of the Civic Center was begun. The officials and planners involved sought to renovate the area in order to bring similar sporting events, as well as conventions and concerts to the city. The \$50 million project was to include new convention space, a new look to Rupp Arena, increased lobby space as well as many other minor alter-

Yet, as the Kentucky General Assembly prepares to return to Frankfort to hash out the state budget, there is growing concern that the additional \$15 million needed will

the state budget, there is growing concern that the auditional \$15\$ liminor heeced with not be included.

The failure to finish what was started will be a setback to both the Civic Center as well as the plans to transform downtown into something more than a barren wasteland. A lasting halt on construction would only discourage visitors and tourists, and in a few years, the \$15\$ million price tag will pale in comparison to what would have to be spent

years, the \$15 million price tag will pale in comparison to what would have to be spent to complete the project at a later date.

Some parts of the renovation plan are expendable, like changing the colors of the seats at Rupp Arena. Time to revisit missile defense issue



In the wake of Sept. 11, several national security policies have been pushed to the side. The most important of these issues, national missile defense, still stands as a key policy for protecting the United States from hostile nations. The nature of the Sept. 11 attacks, originating from within our borders rather than a foreign nation, shifted public attention away from the dangers to our homeland remain just as serious as before 9.11 from interest of the United States by Soviet missiles no longer existed.
