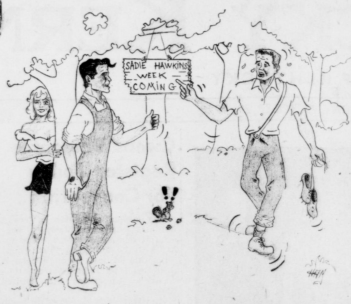

At quarterback Tom O'Malley and Covington's Don McMillan share the signal-calling duties. O'Malley is a fine passer and punter. McMillan excels at handling the ball, is an above-average punter and a good passer.

In the line, Tom Blake, a 215-pound tackle, Lowell Soren, 190-pound guard and Twinkle Dick Kane, a 210-pound sophomore from Newark, Ohio, usually play good games.

The Bearcat forward wall held the strong Mississippi State team scoreless for two quarters. The Maroons used McWilliams in the third period and they managed to tally a TD.

Dopey Phelps Leaves
Wildcat Grid Squad

Donald (Dopey) Phelps, who led the Kentucky football team in scoring in his freshman and sophomore seasons, got the Wildcat squad Monday after he was cut from the traveling team for the Matruquet game last week.

Phelps, a junior halfback, scored seven touchdowns in his first season, for a total of 42 points. Last year, as a sophomore, Phelps took the ball across into paydirt five times for 30 more markers.

This year, the speedster from Danville, Ky., failed to score in his four appearances, but had made 157 yards for an average of 4.1 yards-per-run.

Starred Against UC
Last season, the 24-year-old rider was the decisive factor in Kentucky's victory over the Cincinnati Bearcats. UK won 30-0 in a game played on Still Field.

On the first play of the final quarter, the Danville Demon scooted around right end for 36 yards and another TD. The last marker came shortly thereafter when Phelps, on a reverse, ran around right end

again for the one-yard stripe to score.

Led Nation In 1946
In his freshman year (1946), Phelps led the nation in average yardage on punt returns (19) and kickoff returns (42.3 per try). In rushing, Dopey had an average of 4.7 yards on 57 attempts.

Last season, Phelps carried the platoon 89 times, gaining 416 yards for a 4.7 average. He punted seven times for an average of 44.1 and completed four passes in four losses for a net yardage of 89.

A 97 Man
The speed of Phelps was shown one day in the spring of 1947, when he ran the 100-yard dash for the UK track team in 9.7 seconds in a meet with Berea. That was his best time here at Kentucky.

Army Air Force Vet
During the war, Phelps was a member of the Fifth Air Force in the Pacific area. He flew as an aerial gunner on a B-24 and received a slight wound in combat for which he was awarded the Purple Heart.

While participating in 47 missions, Phelps saw action in New Guinea, the Philippines, Okinawa, and Japan.

In high school, the 5'11", 170-pound athlete won a total of 14 letters. He captained the track

'Write For Children, Not Adults'
Editor Tells Short Story Class

Miss Margaret McElderry, editor of children's books of Harcourt, Brace, and Company, New York publishers, addressed the short story writers' class conducted by A. B. Guthrie Jr., October 22. Her topic was "How to Write Children's Books."

"Writing for children is no different from writing for adults," said Miss McElderry. "It takes just as much planning and work."

Her office receives manuscripts for children's books by the hundreds, but the majority of them are rejected because the author "talks down to the readers." This is an insult to the child. The material must be presented in a straightforward manner with no "cutesness" or condescension. In trying to be childlike, the authors are likely to be childish.

It is important to give the child the right kind of writing to develop a good future adult reader. The small child likes, robust simple language in folk and fairy tales. As they grow older, they demand more action and excitement until in the teen age group they are exploring

the rich store of classics leading up to adult reading.

Effect Of Comic Books
When queried about the effect of comic books on children's reading, Miss McElderry stated that they did not compete with the role of the story book. Comic books are bought like candy, with the few cents they may receive for an allowance or for other reasons. The honing of comic books would create more interest. Comic books do not take up reading time, but as long as they are read along with good books there will be little effect.

Story books need to compete with the comics. Children can not be blamed for disliking the numbingly output they are getting. Action, color, and excitement need to be put in children's books.

Books Are Longlasting
Writing children's books is a practical long-term proposition. The average adult novel may last about two years. Children's books stay on the market for 10, 20, 30 years or longer and provide a steady income.

The old hazard of writing books for children still persists though. Are the children going to like the book, or is it what adults think children will like?
