At 1:30 there will be a working session including discussion of cooperative cataloging or State Library cataloging of state documents and the establishment of a depository system for state documents. MIDWEST ACADEMIC LIBRARY CONFERENCE

The Midwest Academic Library Conference will be held May 28 and 29, 1981, at the Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. The theme of this year's program is "Great Expectations: the Best of Times... the Worst of Times." Speakers will include Herbert S. White, Dean, School of Library and Information Science, Indiana University; Dr. John D. 


