They Remember Kelly at Clemson

Down at Clemson, South Carolina, Suh, they still remember Sherman's march to the sea, and with the same feeling they also recall the devastation wrought by a Kentuckian—John Sims "Shipwreck" Kelly.

Back in 1929 it was, when Jovial Josh Cody was coaching the Clemson Tigers, a game was arranged between Clemson and the Kentucky Wildcats, to be played on Stoll Field. Josh is now line coach at Vanderbilt, where he is tipped to be head coach next year.

Clemson, back in 1929, had a fine team and a fine coach. They started off n a blaze of glory that year and whipped five Southern Conference teams in September and October before coming to the land of race horses and mint juleps. They were pretty confident of whipping Kentucky that day.

The Kentucky fans held their breath when that fine looking Clemson Tiger team trotted out on Stoll Field. The linemen looked like seven giants and the backs had all the appearances of fine ball carriers.

Kentuckians in the stadium were apprehensive when the Wildcats kicked off to Clemson. They were still apprehensive when Clemson, unable to gain on two line plays, punted and it was Kentucky's ball on Clemson's 47-yard-line.

There was a tall Irish sophomore on Kentucky's team that year and his name was Kelly. John Sims, it was, called the "Shipwreck." To this gangling youth from Springfield was afforded the honor of carrying the ball the first time for Kentucky that day.

Kelly found himself with the ball in his hands and he decided to take it places. Like a flash he was off toward the goal and he ran 47 yards for Kentucky's touchdown. It was, to quote Josh Cody, "a perfect play." Not a hand was laid on Kelly when he made that mighty run. Every Clemson Tiger was on the ground, knocked there by a Kentucky Wildcat.

The Kentucky fans went wild when Kelly made that run and they went wild many a time since when this same Kelly brought them to their feet with spectacular touchdown dashes.

But Kelly was not through after making that first great run against Clemson in 1929. A few minutes later Kentucky again had the ball on Clemson's 47-yard-line and again Kelly was given the ball. Again Kelly set sail and again he ran, on the same play, for a touchdown.

This also, according to Josh Cody, was a perfect play, but Shipwreck Kelly contends that it was hardly that. Half way to the goal line, a Clemson Tiger stuck his claws in the back of Kelly's jersey. Kelly couldn't advance and the Tiger refused to let go. Finally something had to give way. It was Kelly's jersey. He ran off and left the rear section of his shirt in the hands of that Tiger. "I guess," Kelly said after the game, "that the wind blew the back out of my jersey."

Kelly's name will be remembered a long time by Clemson, for the Irishman led the 'Cats to a 40 to 6 win over the South Carolinians in 1929. But Kelly's name will be remembered by Kentuckians for generations.

The Shipwreck now is president and star halfback of the professional Brooklyn Dodgers. Kentucky owes a lot to Kelly. Lets keep his memory green even though he no longer wears the blue.



CHESTER A. WYNNE HEAD COACH AND ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

A gentleman and a scholar, former member of the Nebraska State Legislature, one-time star full-back at Notre Dame University, lawyer by profession and football coach by choice—that is Chester Allen Wynne, "The Chetter."

A Kansan by birth, Chet Wynne received his higher education at Notre Dame, where he was a star pupil of the immortal Knute Rockne, absorbing not only a profound knowledge of the game and

how to play it, but also a deep seated ability to pass on to others the knowledge which he has gained.

Coach Wynne was called to the University of Kentucky last spring to take supreme command of athletics after a disastrous football season had all but destroyed interest in the gridiron game here.


He was selected by the Athletic Council after his record as a player and as a coach had been studied carefully, and after a series of personal interviews had convinced the Council that if anyone could place Kentucky on a high football plane, that man was Chet Wynne.

The Council decided that Kentucky needed an experienced football coach who had already won success at other institutions. Chet Wynne met that requirement. He already had led Creighton to a Missouri Valley Conference championship, and then he took a down-trodden Auburn team which had not won a conference game in several years, piloting the Plainsmen to a championship of the newly-formed Southeastern Conference.

Now Chet Wynne is at Kentucky. He is that quiet mannered gentleman on the bench in civilian clothes. He has a big job on his hands here. Kentucky never has won a conference championship in football. Victories over high class football teams have been few, despite the fact that a gradual improvement has been made in recent years.

It is up to Wynne to build up Kentucky still more, but in order to make a success, he must have the cooperation of students, players, alumni and those lovers of the game who are eager for Kentucky to win. Let's everybody pull together for Wynne and the Wildcats.

Ladies and gentlemen, we give you Chet Wynne.



DANIEL BOONE

As this is the bi-centennial year of the birth of Daniel Boone, whose name is synonymous with early Kentucky history, it is fitting that the University of Kentucky Athletic Association should honor this great pioneer in the football program.

Trail blazer, colonizer and defender, Boone took a leading part in carying this Commonwealth out of the wilderness, and in so doing, contributed to the establishment of the University of Kentucky. Had there been no Boone there may never have been a Kentucky. Had there been no Kentucky, there certainly would have been no football game here today.

Every Kentuckian is familiar with the heroic exploits of Daniel Boone. What Kentucky boy has not, in his dreams, walked hand in hand with Boone as he crossed the mountains at Cumberland Gap; battled the painted savages with him, sorrowed with him at the death of his son who fell mortally wounded at the Battle of the Blue Licks; exulted with him at the recapture of his daughter who had been carried off by the Indians, and thrilled with him in his numerous narrow escapes from death at the hands of savage beasts and still more savage red men?

Kentucky claims Daniel Boone as her own, although he was born in Pennsylvania and spent his last years in Missouri. Not only did he lead the way for the first settlers, pointing out to them the richest lands, and buildnig forts for their defense, but he also remained to help make their laws and to lead their military forces in the Revolutionary War.

RULE CHANGES FOR 1934

The rule changes for 1934 are minor in nature in so far as the spectators are concerned. The principal changes are in the dimensions of the ball, in the forward pass regulations covering an incomplete pass on, above or behind the opponents' goal lines, and some changes in definitions and penalties.

- 1. The circumference of the ball, short axis, is changed to "not less than 21 1-4 inches." This is a smaller ball than formerly used.
- 2. "The first forward pass in any series of downs (except on fourth down) which becomes incomplete by striking the ground, a second originally eligible player of the passer's team or any obstruction on, above or behind the opponents' goal line shall be penalized as though it became incomplete in the field of play. Any other forward pass which becomes incomplete in any of these ways on, or above or behind the opponents' goal line, is a touchback."

"Any forward pass which becomes incomplete by striking an ineligible player inside the opponents' 10-yard line may be a touchback if the opponents so elect."

Formerly a forward pass into end zone became a touchback on any down.

This year there is no penalty for an incomplete forward pass, except the loss of a down.







Kentucky's Basketball Squad

Kentucky can well afford to be proud of the Wildcats in basketball, especially since genial Adolph Rupp, the carefree Kansan, came to the Blue Grass as commander of the Wildcat basketeers.

Since Coach Rupp came to Kentucky his basketball teams have won 67 games and lost but nine, probably the greatest record held by any university in the country. Most of the games lost were by one or two points.

Kentucky now is recognized as the leader in southern basketball. For three consecutive years the Wildcats have ended the regular playing season at the top of the Southeastern Conference, while for the past two years they have been undefeated in the conference during the regular season, although losing their initial game in the post-season tournament last spring.

Kentucky holds the world's record for consecutive basketball games won by a major university, having won 24 games in a row, beginning in the latter part of the 1932-33 season and ending with the tournament of 1934. The Wildcats won 17 straight games last year and ended the season undefeated, but there had to be an end to the chain and so they lost to Florida in the first game of last spring's tourney. There was no reason for losing but they lost and no Kentucky supporter voiced any disappointment. Most Kentuckians considered the Wildcats as conference champions at the end of the regular season and saw no reason why they should be called on to risk their title in a tournament which finally was won by Alabama, a team which Kentucky whipped twice during the season.

Kentucky won the tournament in 1933.

Out of 20 all-conference players selected in the past four years, 11 of them have been Wildcats, while the All-American teams of 1932 and of 1933 each contained a Kentuckian. Forest "Aggie" Sale, Kentucky's great center, was selected as forward on the All-American team twice, an honor never before conferred on a Kentuckian.

The Wildcats who have been selected on all-conference teams in the past four years were Sale, twice; DeMoisey, twice; Johnson, twice; Yates, Spicer, "Little" McGinnis, Bronston and Davis. Of these great stars only one, Bill Davis, still is a Wildcat.

Now a word about Coach Rupp. A star basketeer at the University of Kansas, Adolph lives and breathes basketball, and he is recognized throughout the country as an authority on the game. He never had coached a college team before coming to Lexington, but had won success coaching the high school team at Freeport, Ill. He not only knows basketball but he also knows boys and how to handle them. The Wildcat basketball players fight for Rupp as they do for Kentucky.

The 1934 edition of Coach Bernie Shively's track team completed a very successful season by downing the strong Vanderbilt tracksters by a decisive score, running roughshod over the Berea and Hanover College teams, and then making a very creditable showing against a galaxy of track and field stars from Georgia Tech and University of Tennessee. Although the Tennessee meet was not decided until the last two events, Georgia wno by approximately 20 points. Captain Douglas "Red" Parrish, Wildcat ace speeder, could not match strides with the young giant, Perrin Walker, a sophomore at the engineering school, who is destined to be on the 1936 Olympic team.

Captain Parrish carried off high scoring honors for the season. He was closely pressed by Ralph Kercheval, mainstay of the Wildcat football team during the past three years, who went undefeated in the javelin throw. Kercheval also proved to be very versatile by running the 440, one lap of the mile relay, and winning several first places in the broad jump.

Such other stars as Gilmer, sprints; Jackson, pole vault, and Fields, miler, were also developed during the '34 season by Coach Shively and they added much to the personnel of the team.

Tom Cassiday, veteran of three years, completed a very successful season and won several firsts in the quarter mile.

Several sophomores proved their merit and promise to become real stars before their graduation cuts their athletic career short. Jimmy Long and Charley Olney won varsity berths as members of the mile relay team.

Ben Willis, a freshman from Cincinnati, was the shining light of the 1934 freshmen and is the Wildcat's choice to replace the veteran Parrish. Willis is a speedy dash man and is also a star hurdler.

Fifteen letters were awarded at the close of the season. Besides the forementioned men, others who were awarded varsity awards were: Cameron Coffman, hurdlers; Gene Filler, high jumper; Joe Rupert, weights; Langan Hay, pole vaulter; Holmes Ellis, half miler; Walter Hocker, miler and two miler; and Frank Adams, student manager.




