

NATION House attempts override WASHINGTON — Scoring a big win for anti-abortion forces, the House voted yesterday to override President Clinton's veto of a bill that bans a form of late-term abortion.

The apparent lack of sufficient support in the Senate makes it unlikely that the attempt to overturn the veto of the so-called partial-birth abortion bill will succeed. However, the House vote sent a message that the issue will not be ignored in the presidential cammaian.


When Clinton vetoed the bill in April, surrounded by five women who had undergone the procedure, he criticized the legislation by saying it "does not allow women to protect themselves from serious threats to their health."

The 285-137 vote was four more than the two-thirds needed for an override in the House.

Seventy Democrats joined 215 Republicans to support revival of the bill, which would ban a procedure — generally performed in the third trimester — in which the fetus is partly delivered through the birth canal before being killed.



"All of my life I have loved art."
This is a comment that many artists make. However, Bob Levy is not the ordinary artist. For Levy, art has been one of his interests for most of his life, but photography hasn't.
Levy's love for art began as a child, when his aunt took him to the Art Institute in Chicago. Years passed before this interest inspired his art career.
The monumental beginning came seven years ago when Levy's wife passed away. At that point, he made a serious commitment to his art and photography.

Levy's photographs are not flat, ordinary pictures that you see in magazines and books. His photos seem to jump out and catch the eye's attention.

"To me, almost anyone can take a good photograph. I take mine a step further," Levy said. Levy stretches reality with the manipulations of the pictures he takes. He began his current exhibit, "My Circle of Friends," by taking pictures of a tree knot and pictures of some of his closest friends.

After this was completed, he mounted both onto boards, cut them into three-quarter inch sections, and began to alternate from tree to person, person to tree. This technique stretches the picture and makes it look more circular.

"When people ask me what I do, I say I do weird photography," Levy said.

Levy is a UK Donovan Scholar. His contact with the art department has further inspired Levy's work. He attributes much of his inspiration to one of his instructors, Arturo Sandoval. (Sandoval is even featured in Levy's current exhibit)

The Cincinnati-based band the Spookfloaters are kicking off their new CD, Floatation, tomorrow night with a CD release party at Lynagh's.

The Spookfloaters have been playing together for eight years. Previously a much larger group including horns and all, the band has slimmed to a basic quartet consisting of Dan Hamilton on lead guitar and vocals, Mike Holmes on rhythm guitar and vocals, Scott Carnder on bass and Matt Jones on drums.

However, fans will still be able to hear the big-band sound on the CD, which includes a supporting pianist and horn players on several of the tracks.

Having already gained popularity as one of the top cover bands in the area, the four-man ensemble brings to Lexington its own unique blend of rock, jazz and bluegrass—resulting in a sound all too often compared to that of the Grateful Dead and Phish.

But when asked about their constant comparison to the cult-like hippie group, the band insists that they aren't consciously mimicking the Dead's sound.

"We haven't been influenced by the Dead anymore than we have by John Coltrane or Charlie Parker," Hamilton said.

But Hamilton does admit that the connection between the two groups isn't completely undeserved.

"We've saked for it in a way just by playing their tunes. But that's all right," Hamilton said. "The Dead breeds their own crowd that is willing to listen to improvisational stuff which we can spread. They've opened people to us."

Their show, as well as their new CD, offers audiences a look at what the Spookfloaters themselves are all about by exposing people to the bands so riginal material.

"Some people come to the show expecting to see and hear the Dead, but we're trying to concentrate more on the originals," said Hamilton.

Formerly known as the River Runt Spook Floaters, the band has since changed its name to the less cumbersome and more readily retained, shortened version: Spookfloaters, or Wee changed the name to reestablish ourselves — to get away from the connection to the Dead," Hamilton said.

The name Spookfloaters, derived from a brand of fishing bobbers, apparently had no deep philosophical meaning for the band at its conception. Ironically, the name has become duite appropriate.

Although the sound of the Spookfloaters is hard to pinpoint, their unique blend of horns, guitar solos and improvisations make for an interesting combination which keeps you wanting to hear more, maybe just to see what they might come up with next.

Once coined "the Goods of the Neo-Hippies" by a North Carolina journalist, the band offers a show for the open-minded individual, full of spontaneity, with the goal of making new music every night. For those more concerned with pushing down musical boundaries—which is what Hamilton claims his band tries to do—than with a bunch of big guys pushing each other down over the Battle of the Bourbon Barrel at tomorrow's Kentucky-Indiana game, the Spookfloater's show at Lynagh's promises to be an interesting evening.

These flute/voice duets come from Irish folk songs composed by Corigliano.


As Copland put it, these folk songs are "goosebumpish," Weeks, will be the first faculty received about the solo pieces by the composer Schulhoff that she will be performing.


