Minutes of the General Association

(Proceedings of the K. N. E. A., April 18-21 1928)

The first general session of the 52nd Annual Session of the Kentucky Negro Educational Association opened at 8:15 P. M. on the above date at Quinn Chapel A. M. E. Church, Louisville, Kentucky. Prof. A. E. Meyzeek, president of the K. N. E. A., presided at this meeting and the following program was rendered:

Music—"Song of the Vikings"—Fanning, Louisville Teachers' Chorus, Miss R L. Carpenter, Directress.

Invocation—Rev. R. C. Henderson, Pastor Quinn Chapel, Louisville, Kentucky.

Music-Girls' Glee Club, Central High School, Louisville, Kentucky. Miss N. G. Board, Directress.

Welcome Address-Mrs. L. B. Sneed, Principal of G. G. Moore School.

Response to Welcome Address-Prof. H. R. Merry, Covington, Kentucky.

Music—Central High School Quartette, Louisville, Kentucky. Introduction of Governor Flem D. Sampson—Dr. James Bond, Louisville, Kentucky.

Address—Governor Flem D. Sampson, Governor of Kentucky. Music—"Hallelujah Chorus"—Louisville Teachers' Chorus. Annual Address—Prof. A. E. Meyzeek, President of K. N. E. A. Music—"I'm So Glad"—(Dett) Louisville Teachers' Chorus. Address—"Land Grant Colleges, Their Mission and Work"—President G. P. Russell, K. S. I. C., Frankfort, Ky. The session closed with announcements and the benediction.

THURSDAY, APRIL 19, 1928.

The session was opened with music by the Glee Club of the Madison Departmental School. A "Report on Teachers' Salaries" was given by Prof. W. H. Fouse, Supervisor of Lexington Schools. It was moved and seconded that a committee of five be appointed to cooperate with the K. E. A. in carrying out the recommendation of Prof. Fouse on Kentucky Salary Inequalities and Results. Music was furnished by the Richmond Quintette followed by an address on "The Junior High School" by Mr. Guy Whitehead, Assistant Superintendent of Louisville Schools. Mrs. N. L. Pike of Adairville, Ky., gave a demonstration of two songs composed by her: (1) "Welcome P.-T. A.', (2) "LoyalTutors." "Greetings from Tennessee" were brought by Prof. M. L. Morrison, President of State Educational Association of Tennessee, followed by an interesting talk on "Health in

Its Relation to Education" by Dr. A. C. McIntyre of Louisville, Kentucky. After the announcements were made the session adjourned.

THURSDAY, APRIL 19, 1928—2:15 P. M.

At the opening of this session, students of the Kentucky Blind School rendered several musical selections directed by Miss Elizabeth Minnis. Prof. J. S. Cotter conducted the Annual Story Telling Contest of which the following were judges: Prof. Bryant Cooper, Prof. R. D. Grant, Mrs. M. G. Egester, Mrs. Sullenger and Mrs. D. H. Anderson. Prizes were awarded in Story Writing Contests by Miss C. B. Jeffries. The Jefferson County Childrens' Home rendered several musical selections, directed by Mrs. Juanita Lonas. Dr. James M. Glass of Florida, gave an interesting address on "The Junior High School and Its Mission." Another interesting address on "The Teaching of Negro History in Our Schools" was delivered by Mr. R. C. Woods, Washington, D. C. This session was closed by an inspiring address by Hon. W. C. Bell, State Superintendent of Education in Kentucky.

THURSDAY, APRIL 19, 1928—8:15 P. M.

The session opened with music furnished by the students of Simmons University, directed by Prof. R. Todd Duncan. Invocation by Dr. C. H. Parrish, President of Simmons University. Mrs. Alice Dunbar-Nelson, Wilmington, Delaware, gave a very inspiring talk on "A Needed Project in Negro Education." Miss Earline Good of Louisville, rendered the selection, Sampson and Delilah, in French. Prof. A. S. Wilson, Secretary of the K. N. E. A. introduced Dr Thomas E. Jones, President of Fisk University, whose address, said by many, was the outstanding address of the 1927 session. Mr. George Hampton rendered a solo. Dr. James Bond, Director of State Inter-Racial Work, made the report of the Legislative Committee.

FRIDAY, APRIL 20, 1928-10:00 A. M.

The State Spelling Contest was given under the auspices of the Elementary School Department of which Prof. L. W. Gee is Chairman. Prof. G. H. Brown directed the contest The. prizes were donated by the Courier-Journal. The following won the three cash prizes offered: (1) Lena Howe of Fayette County; (2) Virginia Miller of Paris, and (3) Irene Azbury of Mt. Sterling.

FRIDAY, APRIL 20, 1928-2:00 P. M.

After the opening ceremonies and music by students of Lincoln Institute, Dean P. W. L. Jones, Frankfort, Kentucky, gave an address on "Athletics and School Spirit." Miss Ernes-

tine Wyatt, the elocutionist, read "Friday Afternoon in a District School." Mrs. M. W. Reed, Home Economics Department at Wilberforce University, Ohio, gave a very instructive talk on "Home Economics." President B. E. Robinson of Lincoln Institute gave an interesting and inspiring address on "Education in China." Led by Prof. J. M. Wood, the Glasgow Normal students rendered a musical selection. The following committee was appointed to cooperate with K. E. A. from K. N. E. A. on Kentucky Salary Inequalities and Results: W. H. Fouse, Chairman, J. H. Ward, A. S. Wilson, H. R. Merry, J. B. Cooper, John Bate and W. S. Blanton. The following committee was appointed on nomination of officers: W. J. Callery, Chairman, Miss M. S. Brown, W. O. Nuckols, Mrs. Blance Elliott and W. L. Bow-Prof. L. N. Taylor, Rural School Agent for Kentucky, spoke on "Current Educational Problems," which was very instructive and helpful. The case of Warley-Cole was presented to the K. N. E. A. A sum of \$18.10 was collected for the case.

The State Declamatory Contest was the next feature of the program. The following served as judges: Mr. J. R. Ray, Louisville; Mr. M. J. Sleet, Owensboro, and Mrs. M W. Walker, Frankfort. Hunter, Hopkinsville, Second District, subject: "The Night Brings Out The Stars." (6) Evelyn M. Shields, Bardstown, Fourth District, subject: "Toussant L'Overture." (7) Roberta Lewis, Greenville, Third District, subject: "The Rift in the Cloud."

Prof. A. E. Meyzeek introduced Mr. W. J. Hale, President of Tennessee State College, Nashville, Tennessee, and President of The National Association of Teachers in Colored Schools. His remarks closed this session.

FRIDAY, APRIL 20, 1928-7:00 P M.

The Eighth Annual K. N. E. A. Exhibition was held at the Jefferson County Armory. The outstanding feature on the program was the "Pageant of the Year", in which all the months of the year were represented. This program was rendered by the

pupils of the Louisville Public Schools. About five thousand attended this spectacular event. The costumes were very beautiful and the directors of the various episodes received much praise for their excellent training of the children.

SATURDAY, APRIL 21, 1928-10:00 A. M.

Prayer was offered by Prof. W. L. Bowman. Mr. A. S. Wilson, Secretary of the K. N. E. A. awarded the prizes for the Literary and Industrial Exhibits which amounted to one hundred eighty-five dollars. It was moved and seconded that the President be given power to appoint a committee of four to work with the Secretary in working out lists of Exhibits for K. N. E. A. The motion was tabled for the time being. The following report was made by the Committee on Nomination of officers: Prof. A. E. Meyzeek, President, Louisville; Prof. W. H. Humphrey, First Vice President, Maysville; Mrs. Fannie H. White, Second Vice President, Lexington; Prof. A. S. Wilson, Secretary and Treasurer, Louisville; Miss L. V. Ranels, Assistant Secretary, Winchester; Prof. W. J. Callery, Historian, Little Rock, Kentucky; Prof. S. L. Barker, Reporter, Owensboro. Two directors to be elected: Prof. W. S. Blanton, Frankfort; Prof. P. Moore, Princeton; and Prof J. B. Cooper, Mayfield.

It was moved and seconded that the report of the Committee on the Nomination of Officers be received; that the rules be suspended and the officers (except the Board of Directors) be elected by acclamation (Carried) Election of Board—Tellers are Prof. Grant, Prof. Caldwell, Prof. Nuckols. The Declaration of Principles were read by Prof. J. Bryant Cooper as sent by Dr. Anderson of Paducah. It was moved and seconded that a committee on the Declaration of Principles be appointed, the substitute motion being that there be no Declaration of Principles at this meeting but that a committee on the Declarations of Principles, of which Dr. Anderson be chairman, be appointed and make a report at the 1929 Session of the K. N. E. A. Tellers on the election of Directors reported as follows: Prof. W. S. Blanton, 73; Prof. P. Moore, 56; Prof. J. Bryant Cooper, 18.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions was adopted as a whole. It was moved and seconded that the Story Telling Contest of the future become State-wide and this motion become a part of the resolutions. The motion was carried.

It was moved and seconded that Prof. Fouse, Prof. Matthews and all others going to the National Association of Teachers in Colored Schools be representatives of the K. N. E. A. and that they notify the Secretary of the K. N. E. A. of their intentions and receive credentials from him for the same (Carried)

It was moved and seconded that all appropriations, inequal-

ities, etc., be referred to the Board of Directors. (Carried)

It was moved and seconded that the P. T. A. have a delegate to the National meeting but the K. N. E. A. would not bear the delegate's expenses. (Carried)

REPORT OF THE STATE P. T. A.

It was moved and seconded that the report of the P. T. A. be referred to the Board of Directors for action until the next session of the K. N. E. A. It was moved and seconded that Mrs. Mack be allowed to complete her report. (Carried)

Report adopted by sections.

It was moved and seconded that a Conference Committee of Parents and Teachers be appointed to work out plans of both the P. T. A. and the K. N. E. A.

KENTUCKY PRINCIPALS' CONFERENCE

The 1927 session of Kentucky Principals was held April 19 and 20 at the Central High School building at 8:30 A. M. Among the subjects discussed were: "The Rating of Teachers in Service," "Extra Curricular Activities," "Pupil Guidance," and the "Classification and Promotion of Pupils."

The following educators took an active part on the program: Professors P. Moore, G. H. Brown, R. L. Dowery, Geo. C. Wakefield, W. O. Nuckols, J. Bryant Cooper, J. T. Green, W. H. Fouse and Rural School Agent, L. N. Taylor.

Prof. R. D. Roman and Mrs. Nora Ross were respectively

elected chairman and secretary of the conference.

High School and College Department.

The central theme in this department at the 1928 session was: "Expertness in Teaching." Among those who made addresses were Prof. Ross W. Rohn of Owensboro, Prof. W. B. Matthews of Louisville, and Hon. Mark Goodman. State High School Supervisor. Several other teachers made contributions to the program. Prof. J. H. Ward, the Chairman of this section, reported that the meetings were better attended and unusually helpful and interesting at the 1928 session.

Music Department.

The 1928 program of the Music Department of the K. N. E. A. was featured by several demonstrations by pupils of the Louisville public schools. An All-City Orchestra was also on the program. At the 1929 session Miss R. L. Carpenter, the chairman of this department, is hoping to have on program an All-State Orchestra. Details of the plan will be announced in one of the K. N. E. A. Bulletins to be published before the April meeting.

Commercial Department,

Mr. Lee L. Brown, the chairman of the Commercial Department of the K. N. E. A., had as the major theme of this section: "Commercial Education as it Applies to Our Business Group." Messrs. W. F. Turner and W. C. Buford were among the outstanding business men who made addresses in this section.

REPORT OF STATE PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION

The State Parent-Teacher Association held a most successful session in Louisville, Kentucky in 1928. The program was carried out as announced and much business was transacted in an enthusiastic way by the representatives at the meeting.

There were 46 delegates to enroll and these represented 1,416 members. Two city leagues and two county councils were also represented.

In this session it was voted that prizes be awarded of the next meeting for the best Kentucky Parent-Teacher song fitted to some familiar tune and also that prizes be awarded for the best motto.

The following resolutions were adopted:

- 1. We recommend that our State Parent-Teacher Association be known as State Branch of National Congress of Colored Parents and Teachers; and that we shall work by and endorse the constitution for such branches as is given out by the National.
- 2. We recommend that as a State Branch we shall retain in our state treasury from per capita tax on each local all money sent by that local and thus the State Branch will be able to carry out work of a Parent-Teacher Association, thereby enabling it to help K. N. E. A. carry on a bigger and better educational program and also keeping our State Body in touch with program of National Parent-Teacher Association body.
- 3. We feel for more time that it would be better to hold our meetings on Tuesday and Wednesday before opening of K. N. E. A.—in same week—having three sessions on Tuesday and

two sessions on Wednesday and closing before opening of the night session.

4. We elected as our Representative to National Congress of Parents and Teachers our State President and we recommend that expenses for same be taken care of by K. N. E. A. from fee of delegates to State Parent-Teacher Association.

As In A Looking Glass

(Article by Mrs. Alice Dunbar-Nelson for A. N. P.)

The Kentucky Negro Educational Association met in Louisville, Kentucky, April 18, 19, 20, 21, to be strictly accurate. The "K. N. E. A." as its members lovingly call it, always meets in Louisville, which is sensible, as Louisville is quite the most capable city in Kentucky, of managing the numbers of teachers who throng to the annual meeting. Three days a year are taken from school, from the arduous duties of pounding Readin', ritin' and responsibility into little Johnnie's and little Mary's heads, and are devoted to intensive study of every possible phase of education. The fourth day, being Saturday, the teachers disport themselves joyously in an election of officers that has all the earmarks of wire-pulling and political manipulation. Perhaps the surface appearance was deceptive. To the outsider, it had a capable air of sophistication.

The program was formidable. There is a Board of Directors, a roster of general officers, thirteen vice-presidents and eleven district organizers. The registration by the second day had reached 1,400 teachers. Prof. A. E. Meyzeek was the 1928 president and chairman ex-officio, and another principal, Prof. A. S. Wilson, was the very efficient secretary.

There were departmental meetings for every hour in the long three days, and on every subject and phase of education. There were public meetings, three a day for the four days. There was entertainment a-plenty—two operettas, musical hours, a monster pageant at the armory, in which more than 1,000 participated, State spelling contest, State oratorical contest, special moving pictures. In such a feast of good things, it is no wonder that the poor dazed mortal grew weary with looking and listening and learning, and crawled into a corner, and weakly begged for rest.

The open public sessions, three a day, were held in Quinn Chapel on Chestnut Street, between Ninth and Tenth. Quinn Chapel is a commodious structure. It looks as if it will seat 1,200 to 1,400. Long before 7 o'clock at night it was packed, every seat taken, the aisles with chairs placed by busy Boy Scouts, the backs and sides jammed with patient mortals who stood unprotestingly for two and a half to three hours during the lengthy programs, and outside, late comers were turned away, two or three hundred a night, so the worried looking officers said.

Louisville weather was cold last week, as cold and bleak and chill and uncompromisingly un-spring-like as Washington or Philadelphia—worse than Washington, for not a cherry tree dared bloom in that drear lack of warmth and sunshine. But the hearts of the people made up for the weather. If you could tear yourself away

from the interesting sessions and conferences and demonstrations, there were always dozens waiting to show you the banks and office buildings which the thrifty colored Louisvillians have built for themselves, the drug stores and halls and places of business and homes and garages. And the proverbial Southern and western hospitality is not so in name only. The most hurried and worried executive officer of the great association was graciously anxious that every guest of the city be assured a pleasant stay.

The "K. N. E. A." was organized in 1877, for "Greater mentality and stronger citizenship among the youth of Kentucky." It has had an uninterrupted existence, so that this was its fifty-second annual session. That is a thought to give us pause—that we have an organization of teachers of Negro youth over a half century old, with its hundreds of members most seriously considering, as they did this year, for their central theme, "The Needs of the Negro Child." Let us rise and doff our hats to Kentucky!

Report of Legislative Committee

REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE OF THE K. N. E. A. April 21, 1928.

We, your committee on legislation, beg leave to make the following report:

Probably never before in the history of the state have the Negroes of the various sections of the state been more closely United than at the present time. And, probably never before have they felt so definitely and keenly the need of unity of thought and action on the great problems that confront them, not as separate groups but as a united whole. And, probably never before in the history of the state has there been manifested so fine a spirit of interracial cooperation between the better class of colored people and white people of the state as at the present time. And, never before perhaps, have our white friends so fully sensed the aspirations and hopes and needs of the colored people as they are doing at the present time. And so it is with great satisfaction in the present and hope for the future that we, your committee, record the progress that has been made during the year that is now closing and especially the items that relate to progress that have found expression in legislative enactments by the recent General Assembly. It is the consensus of opinion of colored men who came in contact with members of the General Assembly, that it was the fairest toward colored people of any General Assembly in the history of the state. As Director of the Interracial Commission and Chairman of your legislative committee, I was deeply and favorably impressed with the fine interracial spirit that pervaded both Houses.

Your committee was on the ground and in active service during most of the sessions of the General Assembly, though fortunately we were not listed as lobbyists and therefore had no part in the recent wholesale indictments returned against lobbyists during the sessions of the General Assembly.

Your committee was consulted by the Governor in regard to the needs of the colored people, educationally and otherwise, and be it said to the honor of the Governor, that every single suggestion submitted by your committee to the Governor in writing was included in his message. And, be it said further to the honor of our great Governor that he backed up every single recommendation he made for colored people with the power of his personal influence and prestige. More than \$600,000 was appropriated to our two state colleges, one at Frankfort and one at Paducah.

The appropriation for the Red Cross Sanitarium in Louisville was enlarged from five to ten thousand dollars. The Kentucky Home Society for colored children appropriation was increased to \$25,000 and provision was made in the budget for our proposed institution for feeble-minded Negro children and, last but by no means least, House Bill 607, requiring Jim Crow arrangement on street cars and bus lines was strangled in the committee to which it was referred and never saw the light of day. Practically all of these measures giving large appropriations for colored institutions were passed by unanimous vote in both branches of the General Assembly.

One of the most gratifying measures from the viewpoint of the Interracial Commission and the K. N. E. A. was the unanimous passage by both houses of a bill increasing the levy of the University of Louisville from 5 to 7 cents on one hundred dollars, thus providing maintenance for the proposed colored department of the University of Louisville for the higher education of Negroes, a project, which the Interracial Commission and the K. N. E. A. have been pushing for the last six years. The plan is well on the way to buy and equip a three-story brick building on Chestnut Street next to the colored high school, now in use as headquarters for the City Board of Education. can be very well done with the \$100,000 set aside from a recent million dollar bond issue for that purpose, and as I have already said, the increase of levy provided for the maintenance. It is exp cted that this new department will be opened in September, 1929.

It has been a long hard fight, especially the struggle for a department for the higher education of Negroes under the control of the University of Louisville and the establishment of an institution for feeble-minded Negro children, and the Interracial Commission and the K. N. E. A. have played a very important part in this successful achievement.

In this fight for a colored department of the University of Louisville for the higher education of Negroes, the legislative committee of the K. N. E. A. and the Interracial Commission have had during the last few years of the struggle, the cooperation of other agencies among which should be mentioned especially, the Urban League of Louisville, of which Mr. J. M. Ragland is the executive.

Your committee secured the veto of a measure passed by both houses of the General Assembly, which in reclassifying certain towns would have taken the colored city schools out from under the city boards and placed them under the county boards, thus reducing the schools from nine to seven months and practically destroying the high school department. In this connection your committee would make public recognition of the assistance it has received from Dr. E. E. Underwood at Frankfort, who at all times cooperated with us in securing the result named above. The committee strongly suggests that one or more members of your legislative committee should reside in Frankfort; the reasons for this are obvious. Your committee cooperated with Mr. L. N. Taylor in defeating the bad bills and in securing enactment of good bills.

Your committee submits the following resolutions:

(1) That the K. N. E. A. use every means within its power to secure the displacement of the double school board system with that of one board system, placing all schools, white and col-

ored, in one given town under one management.

(2) That the K. N. E. A. use its influence to remove the system of one race tax, thus requiring the colored schools to receive all their maintenance and support from taxes from property owned by Negroes and white schools receiving maintenance from taxes from property of white people. For to support white schools from taxes derived from property owned by white people and colored schools from taxes derived from property owned by colored people, is clearly unjust and unconstitutional. Only a few towns in the state follow this antiquated and unjust arrangement.

(3) It is the opinion of your legislative committee that efforts of the K. N. E. A. should in the next few years be concentrated on plans to strengthen our two state colleges, bringing them up to the required standard of institutions of colleges ranking in curriculum, scholarship, financial support, equipment and in teaching efficiency, and in strengthening and stand-

ardizing our high schools.

According to Mr. L. N. Taylor, supervisor of rural schools, there are at present five "A" accredited colored high schools in the state located at Owensboro, Lexington, Paducah, Bowling Green and Louisville. The Central High School, Louisville, is the largest in this group, having a membership of nearly a thousand. There are seven "B" accredited high schools, located at Paris, Danville, Hopkinsville, Winchester, Mayfield, Henderson and Covington. There are thirteen classed as four-year high schools but not accredited, located at Princeton, Frankfort, Flemingsburg, Elizabethtown, Russellville, Richmond, Harrodsburg, Mt. Sterling, Greenville, Bardstown, Georgetown, Providence and Versailles. There are 3 three-year high schools located at Middlesboro, Elkton and Cynthiana; 22 two-year high schools located at Columbia, Lawrenceburg, Glasgow, Pineville, Hardinsburg, Murray, Hickman, Fulton, London, Stanford Lebanon,

Corydon, Eminence, Nicholasville, Maysville, Carlisle, Beaver Dam, New Liberty, West Bend, Shelbyville, Franklin, and Springfield. Latest reports indicate one-year high schools at Harlan and Midway, making a total of 49 colored high schools in Kentucky, 5 of which are "A" accredited high schools; 7 "B" accredited high schools and 12 classed as four-year high schools but not accredited. Is it too much for the K. N. E. A. to set before it for the next few years the making of all these forty-nine high schools "A" accredited? Surely not. More and more of our young people are going out from these places to attend colleges and universities. Unless the whole system of our high schools is revised and revamped and accredited, our young people will be handicapped in their preparation for college and university work, and utterly unprepared to enter upon such college and university courses.

(4) We urge closer cooperation between K. E. A. and the K. N. E. A.

If this is a reasonable and possible goal for the K. N. E. A., we shall need the cooperation of every teacher, of every parent and of all fair-minded white people throughout the state. We must, therefore, make use of all these means at our command, utilizing to its fullest extent, the machinery of the Interracial Commission which is at the service of the teachers and which was established to promote just such plans as are herein outlined and contemplated.

Governor Sampson's Address

GOVERNOR SAMPSON'S ADDRESS (Extracts)

Dr. James Bond, Director of State Inter-Racial Work, introduced Governor Sampson to the members and friends of the K. N. E. A. Governor Sampson's address follows:

"Dr. James Bond and fellow Kentuckians, I am very happy to be here tonight and I want to thank you for inviting me. I have invitations every day and almost every hour in the day, however, I was very anxious to come here. I thought that perhaps I might be able, in some little way, to be of service. That is my whole purpose in life, if I can.

I have known Dr. James Bond every since I was a little boy (because he is a good many years older than I) (laughter) and I am proud of the heights he has attained.

You know I am very proud of you teachers and I am very much pleased with the Welcome Address which we heard here. That address, which she delivered, ought to be in print, and both you and the teachers of the children of my race ought to read it because it would help them. The Response to the address of Welcome was scholarly and to the point. It merely goes to show what may be accomplished, what may be done, under great difficulty.

I am very proud of you as Kentuckians; above all things I like to be a Kentuckian. God gave us everything in Kentucky. He gave us great men and great women. I am proud of you as Kentuckians and as teachers.

I did not come here tonight to make a speech. I drove here just to be with you, who are trying earnestly to do something for your race. To my mind, those who have love and charity like those sitting here tonight—those are the people. It is this race that shows great patience and forebearance. I have been trying the best I know how to do the things I think will be best for all concerned. It is a reflection on my race, rather than on yours that we kept you in bondage.

* * * *

Teach these boys and girls about Kentucky; to avoid the little hates, passions, dissentions and above all teach them to pray and believe in God. Teach them plain honesty. Teach them faithfulness. Hold up before their eyes the ill that comes from dishonesty and falsehoods. Teach them industry so he or she will make his way anywhere. These are the fundamentals. Teach them frugality. In other words, teach them to save every penny they make. That's my prophecy. Save, be frugal, invest your

money, work, and be industrious. These are the plain homely virtues that I hope you teachers will teach throughout Kentucky. These things will make men and women. Let's teach the gospel of peace and love. Let's make Kentucky a great state. Be patient, be industrious. You teachers going back to school, teach this industrial practice.

Don't overlook Kentucky Institutions and their advantages. Make Mammoth Cave a National Park that will bring visitors to Kentucky.

* * * * *

I thank you again for your kind invitation here, but these are the things that you and I must talk about. And I must invite you to teach the holy virtues, you can do it, you should do it, and when you do all Kentucky and the white race will honor and respect you. Perseverance and industry will make a scholar, lawyer, and preacher and will make the one that did it honorable and respectable."
