The Coronation itself will be held on Sunday at the Holiday Inn North beginning at 6pm for cocktails. Ceremonies start promptly at 7pm.



AIDS 101 To Be Held at U.K.

The first course at the University of Kentucky dedicated to covering the subject of the AIDS epidemic is being offered for the Fall 1993 semester. Arts & Sciences 300 (A&S 300-002) is the course number for AIDS: The Global Challenge and will be taught by Dr. Gary Shannon, author of The Geography of AIDS. Dr. Shannon is an internationally known medical geographer in the UK Dept. of Geography. course will deal with the multiple aspects of the epidemic: diffusion, economics, demographics, reporting, etc. This course is the result of an informal survey of students in introductory geography classes who reported that the vast majority of them had no prior instruction on HIV/AIDS and its impact on the world.

Kentucky's Representatives in DC Doing Badly

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force has just issued their Report Cards for the 102nd Congress, the last completed sessions of Congress prior to the last election (1991-1992). Kentucky's Senators and Representatives largely did very poorly based on 11 separate issues on AIDS/HIV, freedom of expression, domestic partners, the Boy Scouts and civil rights for lesBigays.

The Culture Connection: Male Homosexuality Among the Sambia of New Guinea

We wake up on the third day of our trek into the jaggedly mountainous area of the New Guinea Highlands and stretch, inhaling the thick fog that covers the wet, tropical jungle. "What the hell are we doing here," I think as I reflect back on the journey that brought us here: looking out the airplane window I remember the view of the decrepit, corrugated tin shacks huddled together amidst the somewhat more modern buildings of Port Moresby, the capital of Papua New Guinea. From there we took the short flight to Goroka, the provincial capital of East Highland Province before the final air hop to a grass airstrip at a mountain patrol post. Gathering all our packs and gear, we started the hike into the forbidding jungle with its high mountain ranges (some as high as the Swiss Alps) and swiftly running rivers. After two days of trudging through thick marshes and soggy riverine land, we are still about a day's torturous walk from Nilangu, the nearest Sambia village.

We gather up all our essential equipment (hairspray, Noxema and Depeche Mode tapes) and psyche ourselves up for the day's walk. I look around and see one person shoving a hairdryer in their pack and laugh (I'm glad I forgot mine!). After about six hours of walking, we reach the outer edge of Nilangu where the elders of the village are gathering the young boys together for their initiation. We don our "little red riding hoods" and become invisible (for the sake of this storyline) so as to follow the initiation. This is a secret ritual (not even the village women know what is really happening). The entire cycle of initiation takes 10 to 15 years, so I'll be hitting my Fast Forward




The elders lead the boys out of the village to the jungle where they will build a cult house to be used for the entire cycle. After its completion, all the rites will take place here in six stages. concentrate on the lower stage initiations where the initiates build their own home called a "rat house" because they hunt forest rats to present to elders as food gifts. It is here that homosexual ritual is at its height. The younger boys are forced to perform fellatio on the older boys. First and Second Stage initiates are fellators until they reach the Third Stage (a process taking about 5 to 8 years). At this point,

they switch roles and become those fellated by younger boys. The basis for this practice lies in the understanding of gender development in Sambia

Boys are not considered to have any gender (just as infants are in our own society) and must therefore be inseminated in order to become male according to Sambia tradition. The Sambia believe that boys are not "male" because they have no semen. In order for the boys to become male, they must first ingest the semen of older boys who have already gone through the same ingestion initiation. Semen is not believed to be produced by the human body but passed on generation by generation. It is only by "storing up" semen that male Sambia are thought to be able to ejaculate and produce children. Even when males are married and no longer are allowed toparticipate in this homosexual activity, they ingest a thick, white tree sap to "replenish" their supply of



That's all for now kids. See you in Washington!...or even better, maybe you'll see ME! I just hope I won't have to fight off advances from Morissey yet again...(wink)


Hate State Update: Information on the Boycott of Colorado

It is now calculated that Colorado has lost over \$39 million in lost tourist dollars from canceled conferences alone. Although some Coloradans are asking for an end to the boycott by pointing to certain areas that did not carry the vote for Amendment 2, other groups in Colorado have contacted GLSO News asking for continued support from Kentuckians by boycotting Colorado. The boycott alone is the only thing pushing news coverage and action on this issue by a broad base of opponents in the gay, HIV and business communities. Otherwise, action is limited to slow movement in the court system.

Hate crimes against les Bigays and Amendment 2 opponents wearing "Undo 2" stickers/buttons continues far above average reports of harassment, vandalism and physical attack. Outside of large gatherings of les Bigays such as at Aspen's Gay Ski Week, gay travelers are staying away from many gay resorts. GLSO News received a desperate note from The Bunk House, Box 6, Breckenridge, CO 80424 (303) 453-6475, a gay male-only lodge saying that the boycott was threatening to close their business after 20 years. Perhaps due to politically and safety conscious tourists staying away from reports of rising Hate Crimes, this gay business is experiencing troubling times. As they and boycott supporters point out, 75% of Colorado's tourism is from out-of-state.

There is also increasing evidence of the large help given anti-gay Coloradans for Family Values (CFV) by Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition and their systematic deception during the campaign. Attorneys with the Coalition counseled CFV to not include the words "special rights" in Amendment 2 because of the legal challenges possible by opponents pointing out that being free from discrimination is not a special right. Instead, Amendment 2 denies all civil rights to homo/bisexuals but was promoted to Coloradans by CFV as a campaign against "special rights." Numerous surveys have found that most Americans believe that it is illegal for gays to be fired or thrown out of their homes because of their sexual orientation. Clearly, it is not the case in most of America.

So, as we are all learning to say before it happens here: Undo 2! Also, maybe we should drop a friendly note to Adam and staff at The Bunk House.

The Imperial Court of the Bluegrass Empire (ICBE) is the local chapter of an international service organization. Until last year, many of the ICBE's charity shows revolved around the now closed bar, The Metro. The ICBE's members represent all facets of society with all ranges of gender, race, age, lifestyle, and sexual orientation represented. Over the years, many vibrant leaders of our community have emerged through the training, leadership and self-esteem promoted by ICBE activities and membership. Never Again!

Sunday, April 18, is Holocaust Remembrance Day and commemorates the six million (1/3 again more than the entire population of Kentucky) children, women and men who died in Nazi concentration camps. The majority of these people were Jews but there were also many other groups including political prisoners, Jehovah's Witnesses, Gypsies, anarchists and homosexuals. Thus, April 18 is also a day for every gay man and lesbian to remember that many people died under Nazi Germany for their sexual orientation.

Berlin in the 1930's was one of the leading centers of gay culture. Indeed, the Hirschfeld Institute, sort of the Kinsey Institute of its time, was the leading center of research on homosexuality, and Berlin in 1932 had over 300 gay bars and cafes with a tenth of them targeted at a lesbian clientele. This record of bars has never been matched by any other city in the world.

At that time, Germany outlawed homosex between males but not women: women's sexuality was considered to be defined by men and thus lesbianism was ignored.


But, with Hitler's rise to power, purges against

homosexuals in the Nazis and in the general public began in 1933. Laws were soon passed calling for the sterilization of "deviants" and making it a felony for one man to give another a "lewd glance" or even for having a homosexual fantasy! By 1936, the annihilation of homosexuals was being demanded by the Nazis to retain the purity of the "Aryan" people. Thousands of gay men and a largely undocumented number of lesbians were sent to concentration camps. Exact numbers are difficult to obtain because many gays were sent to early camps where records were not as fastidiously kept. Many gay people also died of starvation, beatings and torture in jails and never made it to the camps. Approximately 41,000 men were convicted of homosexuality between 1936-1941 alone with few surviving.

At liberation in 1945, the surviving gay male and also Gypsy prisoners were listed as "criminals" by the Allies and were the only two groups to not receive restitution from the German and Austrian governments. The Austrian government just this year conceded to pay restitution for homosexual prisoners.

Out of this nightmare came several important elements of our culture. First of all are some of our symbols. In the camps, gay male prisoners were forced to wear a pink triangle while there is some evidence that some known lesbians were identified by

NEWS SHORTS



ALABAMA: The opening session of the Alabama legislature was the scene of a vote supporting the ban on homosexuals in the military. Only the African-American legislators opposed the resolution with some Alabama lawmakers actually debating on the floor whether there were homosexuals in their districts. (State Update, 2/1993)

NEW YORK: 228 people were arrested while protesting the exclusion of gay and lesbian Irish-Americans from NYC's St. Patrick's Day Parade.

RHODE ISLAND: Gov. Bruce Sundlun issued an executive order barring discrimination based on sexual orientation for state employees and state contractors. (State Update, 2/1993)

TEXAS: Openly gay State Rep. Glen Maxey introduced a bill to legalize same-sex marriages to "begin debate in a rational manner." He sees little chance of it passing. (State Update, 2/

NEW MEXICO: The New Mexico Senate passed a bill that aims at prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment, housing, and public accommodations. The vote was 23-18 and the bill is now before the New Mexico House.

CHICAGO: Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund is opening its third office in Chicago under the direction of Patricia Logue. The other two offices are in New York City and Los Angeles. (LLDEF)

washington, DC: The US military has changed the entrance form for ROTC chapters to define homosexuals as "person, regardless of sex, who engages in, desires to engage in, or intends to engage in homosexual acts" and requires candidates to sign this form stating that they may be required to repay any scholarships if kicked out of the military for being lesbian or gay. Due to the Dept. of Defense policy, people who only discover their orientation after enlistment will face more legal problems beginning in the Fall 1993. Also, the policy currently does not distinguish between sexual acts or admission and perceived homosexuality. (The Forward Observer 12/1992)

SAN DIEGO: Conservative US Rep. Duncan Hunter (R-CA) has written Navy Secretary Sean O'Keefe

asking that the Navy and Marines provide facilities to the Boy Scouts of America due to their lease with City of San Diego possibly being severed for breaking the city's human rights ordinance by discriminating against homosexuals. (The Forward Observer 12/1992)

SAN FRANCISCO: Counsel for the Marines have demanded that the San Francisco AIDS Foundation withdrawal a series of safer sex ads in which one ad shows two shirtless males in a passionate embrace. One man has the Marines logo tattooed on his shoulder. The other ads show heterosexual and lesbian couples. The Marine Corps are upset that the ad promotes a view that the Marines helped spread AIDS in San Francisco or condone of homosexuality. The AIDS Foundation are more concerned at preventing the spread of HIV in sexually-active populations and do not see a legal ground for any future Marine legal actions. (The Forward Observer 12/1992)

AUSTIN, TX: The Human Rights Campaign Fund hailed the appointment by Gov. Ann Richards of Robert Krueger to fill now Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen's unexpired Senate position. Krueger is seen as a supporter of fairness for all people including lesBigays.

NEW YORK: Roman Catholic Cardinal Roger Mahony stated in a Feb. 13 interview that open homosexuals should be allowed in the military. He is the first Catholic bishop to support Pres. Clinton's actions.

TAMPA, FL: Hillsborough County commissioners voted 4-3 to retain anti-bias laws for sexual orientation in the areas of real estate and public accommodations after the city of Tampa repealed its sexual orientation clause in November. (G/L News Telegraph 2/1993)

WASHINGTON, DC: Singer Melissa Etheridge publically came out as a lesbian at the Triangle Inaugural Ball on Jan. 20. (Outlines-Chicago 2/1993).

ANCHORAGE, AK: The City Assembly overrode Mayor Tom Fink's veto of an ordinance banning sexual orientation discrimination in employment. The ordinance is now law.

SAN FRANCISCO: The 1st United Lutheran Church faces expulsion by the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America for installing openly gay pastor, Jeff Johnson, as its sole minister.

So, We Guess There Is No Anti-Gay Discrimination Here?

Last year GLSO set up the Discrimination Project to record and monitor incidences of discrimination based on sexual orientation or HIV status. To date, only two reports have been called into the GLSO Gayline. With most anti-gay violence and harassment going unreported to police or other governmental agencies, drives to stop discrimination in employment, housing and services by such movements as the Lexington Fairness Campaign lack statistics and numbers to show politicians the extent of bias in our local society. It is vital that we collect these reports so that we can stop these types of violence and harassment.

Some people have asked to know more about this service. Here are some common questions:

1. What things does the Discrimination Project monitor? Anti-gay incidents ranging from written or verbal threats to being fired from a job are issues that we want to record. If you have been denied promotion as a lesbian, evicted for being a gay couple or harassed by police for being bisexual, we want to know. We also collect the number of local people forced out of the military by the ban on homosexuals and discrimination linked to HIV status regardless of sexual orientation.

- 2. Who can report incidents? You can be a witness or the actual person involved. And, although we would prefer names for future referrals if necessary, you can also give a report anonymously.
- 3. What if the incident occurred years ago? That is fine. We are collecting information that covers past incidents as well as on-going acts of bias.
- 4. What if it occurred outside of Lexington? The Discrimination Project aims at monitoring bias throughout Kentucky. For incidents (other than discharge from the military) outside of the state, we will gladly record them for reference but are primarily interested in incidents in Kentucky.
- 5. How do I report an incident? Simply call the GLSO Gayline at 231-0335 when it is staffed (Wed.-Fri. from 8pm to 11pm and Sundays from 8pm to 11pm) and explain that you want to report an incident. If you are unable to call at these times, you can also call Jeff Jones (listed under GLSO News in the Directory) at 276-5383. Leave a number if he is not at home, and he will return your call in the next few days.
- 6. Why should I report these incidents? a) It helps in lobbying local, state and national politicians for civil

rights for lesBigays and people with AIDS. Our reports are passed along yearly to the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force for national tallies. b) It helps individuals subjected to harassment to vent steam and feel less helpless in the face of few legal rights. c) You may warn of areas or situations that could later save future people from similar experiences. The report of an incident at Stone Mountain in Russellville helped in organizing the statecommunity to combat discrimination there.

a black triangle under the category of asocial and insane women. Both the pink and now the black triangles are becoming international symbols of gay pride and liberation. The controversial Broadway play Bent by Martin Sherman about the gay Holocaust victims was one of the earliest Broadway plays with a gay content. At least three monuments also recall the At the site of the Neuengamme Holocaust. Concentration Camp outside of Hamburg, Germany, is the first monument "Dedicated to the Homosexual Victims of National Socialism [Nazism], 1985" and is made of pink granite. The former Berlin Wall also has a recent pink stone triangle memorializing thesevictims. The Stichting Homo-Monument in Amsterdam was dedicated in 1987 as a giant pink granite triangle with one corner pointing to Anne Frank's house and another to the headquarters of COC, the Dutch gay rights organization. It commemorates not only the Holocaust victims but also all who have been persecuted and oppressed for being a homosexual.

Thus, on April 18, remember the six million who died at the hands of the Nazis and that people just like you and me were among them. And, whether it is the execution of homosexuals in Iran today or the torture/beating death of a gay American sailor by his shipmates in Japan, another type of holocaust




