Sour Cream Coffee Cake

Lillian Mesner (Mrs. William)

3 tbs butter
3/4 cup brown sugar,
packed
3/4 cup chopped nuts
1 1/2 tsp cinnamon
1/2 cup shortening
3/4 cup sugar

1 tsp vanilla
3 eggs
1 cup sour cream
2 cups flour
1 tsp baking powder
1 tsp soda

Combine butter, brown sugar, nuts, and cinnamon to make a crumbly mixture. Set aside. Cream together shortening, sugar and vanilla. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Add sour cream and whisk until smooth. Sift together the dry ingredients and add in two or three parts, mixing well each time. Layer batter and crumbly mixture in pan, ending with crumbles as topping. Bake as directed, but test with toothpick or cake tester before removing from oven.

Education Library

The Education Library, located in Room 205 of Dickey Hall, houses over 61,000 volumes of monographs and journals and has over 346 journal titles. These holdings are greatly augmented by a collection of over 300,000 pieces of microfiche that is part of the Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) database.

The Education Library is also known for its excellent collection of children's literature and its K-12 textbook collection.

In October 1983, the Education Library began offering automated searching services with full access to all online databases such as ERIC, PSYCHOLOGICAL ABSTRACTS, SOCIOLOGICAL ABSTRACTS, and DISSERTATION ABSTRACTS.

While the Educational Collection is a specialized one, it does have a good collection in generic subject areas such as administration, psychology, sociology and philosophy.
