Kentucky Fairness Alliance Legal Challenge to Amendment

On Tuesday, Nov. 16, three Kentuckians filed an election challenge to the constitutional amendment voted on November 2nd. Citing the requirement that a constitutional amendment proposal must both be clear and deal with only one subject, the petition filed in Franklin Circuit Court asks the court to rule the election results void.

The Kentucky Fairness Alliance, in supporting this legal challenge to the amendment, objects to the language used by the legislature in presenting this proposal to the voters.

"The legislature did sloppy work" said John Davis, interim executive director of KFA. "The first part of the amendment talks about marriage. However, the second part of the amendment confused people on what exactly was being proposed."

"It appears to ban domestic partnerships, prenuptial agreements and many other contractual arrangements among both gay and straight adults. Many Kentuckians support allowing adults to enter into contractual arrangements as to their property, whether they are gay or straight.

This amendment did not allow voters to vote on the two proposals separately. That violates the constitutional provisions about how amendments are to be put on the ballot. That's why this lawsuit is important."

Charlotte Wood of Lexington, one of the plaintiffs and a board member of the Kentucky Fairness Alliance, met many people during the campaign that had mixed feelings about the amendment.

"In going door to door, it was clear that a sizable number of Kentuckians would have voted for the first part of the amendment but not the other, if given a chance" she said. "People should have had the right to vote on the two proposals separately."

The other plaintiffs are Willie Thomas Boddie, Jr. of Frankfort and Rev. Albert M. Pennybacker of Lexington. Univ. of Louisville Law Professor Sam arcosson believes proponents of the amendment can't have it both ways. They suggested throughout the campaign that marriage is a special and sanctified institution that must be protected.

But if marriage is unique, then laws that relate both to it and to something else must be dealing with different subject matters. This lawsuit reflects a simple, straightforward proposition: the first sentence of the amendment, which deals with marriage, is distinct from the second sentence, which deals with rights arising from non-marital relationships.

The amendment is also vulnerable in another, related way. The first sentence clearly relates only to recognition of same-sex marriages, while the second relates to the legal status of both same-sex and opposite-sex relationships.

These are legally substantial reasons to overturn the Amendment. Stayed tuned.

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

A Word of Thanks

Sometime miracles don t happen. We were praying for a miracle, hoping against hope that a majority of Kentuckians would rise up and smite down the proposed constitutional amendment. That didn t happen and now (for the time being) the constitutional amendment which defines marriage and bans civil unions and domestic partnerships is an ugly ink stain on Kentucky s highest law of the land.

It wasn t for want of trying. During the past six months, the No on the Amendment Campaign pulled together an organization of paid staff and highly dedicated volunteers to fight this proposal. Although it was not successful in defeating the amendment, there were notable achievements that should not be forgotten.

For the first time real people were having real conversations about gay and lesbian issues all across the state via the Voter ID project. For those who participated it was an empowering experience, and based on that experience we know that the majority of Kentuckians are fundamentally decent people who do not want to discriminate.

We have identified thousands of new supporters and volunteers that are willing and able to work with the Fairness Campaign and KFA as we continue to battle by other means the constitutional amendment and who will help us during the upcoming General Assembly session. We raised in six short months more money than has ever been raised before nearly \$350,000 local dollars and another \$100,000 either in kind or in cash from a wide variety of out of state supporters and national organizations.

Through our media campaign, we created a new level of awareness about

issues affecting lesbians and gays. It was a first for Kentucky and not withstanding the ultimate outcome, these ads were highly effective in putting a face on our issues.

The result was that over 40 percent or over of the voters in Louisville, Lexington and Northern Kentucky said they did not want discrimination in the Constitution. This was a significant achievement notwithstanding the total 3-1 tally. It just shows that with the right tools and the right education, informed voters are not in favor of discrimination. This battle is hardly over; it is just one day in the long fight for fairness and equality. Our motto from here on out will be When we say no, we mean NO. (See the related article about the legal action filed in the Franklin Circuit Court).

On the behalf of the No on the Amendment Campaign, KFA extends a grateful thanks to everyone who participated in a voter id walk, who put up a yard, who displayed a bumper sticker, who hosted a house party, and who gave money to help fund this campaign. You know who you are and you can take pride in your efforts. To all of you.

Gay Spirituality Icon #10 By Fr. Ken Waibel

Well, the elections are over, we have cried our tears or shouted out our disgust and we must move on. I hope that most of us weren't too surprised by the outcome of the voting. After all, these are very conservative times we live in and uneducated people are very easily manipulated by words of fear. Prejudice is also very much alive still to this day, especially towards us GLBT persons. The fact that the amendment even made it to the ballot and the reality of its central position in the presidential election should give us hope that we are being noticed and are considered a force to be reckoned with. Last month we spoke about "courage" this month our topic is "purpose".

On the "dark side" of purpose is the real emotion of rage. I know I experienced it during the election: rage at the politicians who were manipulating the voters, rage at the voters who would very publicly state their prejudices, rage at our own GLBT brothers and sisters who refused to vote because it "wouldn't make any difference." Rage is real. Rage is very human. Rage is very powerful and if used correctly can be a great force for change in our society.

The emotion of rage has been the fuel of countless movements in history. The

early Christian community survived its persecution because it was able to turn its rage into purpose. If the emotion is left as raw "rage" it will lead to violence and self destruction. This would have further enraged the persecutors and fractured the small community of believers. Channeling there rage into purpose gave energy to their "cause" and enabled them to continue on through adverse conditions. The early Christians are not the only sample of this in history.

The Jewish peoples of Germany turned their rage at the Nazis into purpose, maintaining their traditions and faith at all costs. The African Americans of not so long ago never gave up their struggle for freedom and eventually won. Women of our country, although still fighting the good fight, have made great leaps in social status because they "fought" with wisdom and patience = rage turned into purpose.

For us GLBT folks rage is very real and possibly at its peak right now. If we leave it unchecked it will become self destructive, violent and may lead to "outing" of our fear-filled sisters and brothers. If we can channel this rage into purpose it will give further energy to our cause – to bring to light the "truth" that GLBT persons should have the same rights as any other person.
