

Salary: Group will suggest criteria for president's financial bonuses

A new committee will soon create criteria for how President Lee Todd is paid.

The committee was formed following Todd's rejection of a \$100,000 salary bonus offered to him by the University Board of Trustees at its June 11 meeting.

Todd rejected the bonus because of tight budgets at UK and at the state. It has allowed Todd to remain one of the lowest-paid presidents in the Southeastern Conference.

Todd is paid \$285,000 each year.

"I think with the money crunch and with no money from the state, it (the rejection) was the appropriate things to do." said trustee Alice Stevens Sparks.

Currently, there is no criteria for Todd's bonus package.

The commandes es what size bonus he should be receiving.

Todd's salary has not been reviewed before, and the committee hopes to thoroughly understand what kind of pay Todd deserves, Robinson said.

Mary Margaret Colliver, of UK Public Relations, said Todd would defer the decision "until the university budget is in better shape."

The committee plans to iron out the details of the evaluation process by the end of first semester.

Health officials: Blood supply OK
ATLANTA — Public health officials on
Monday sought to assure Americans that
the blood supply was safe despite concerns
that an organ donor who received a transfusion may have transmitted the disease to
four transplant recipients. One of the four
died of brain swelling that can be caused by
the virus, which until now has been blamed
solely on mosquito bites. The three others
were hospitalized with symptoms associated with West Nile, although doctors aren't
sure they have the virus or whether they
got it from a medical procedure. The organ
donor, a Georgia woman, died in a car crash
last month. She may already have been infected or may have gotten West Nile
through blood transfusions in the emergency room after the crash, the CDC said.

7 dead after small plane crashes

7 dead after small plane crashes SWANZEY, N.H. — Seven people, including at least six members of one family, were killed Monday when their small plane crashed in the woods outside a southwest New Hampshire airport, authorities said. Keene Mayor Michael Blastos said the parents, grandparents and two young children had been visiting relatives in nearby Newfane, Vt., and had been staying in Keene. Authorities said the pliot was from Lafayette, La. They did not disclose his name. Blastos did not know if he was a member of the family Identities of the victures were being withheld until relatives were notified. There were no survivors in the crash, said Federal Aviation Administration spokesman Jim Peters. Peters said the plane was apparently attempting to return to the Dillant-Hopkins Airport, about two miles from where the craft went down. Witnesses said there was a large fireball and the plane burned up, Peters said.

Massachusetts candidate flaunts bald head in ads

No combover here: UK professor says politician's honesty about chrome dome could attract votes

BOSTON — These are heady days for Warren Tol-man, the chrome-domed gu-bernatorial candidate whose "Bald is Beautiful" slogan has become a campaign

"Bald is Beautiful" slogan has become a campaign cornerstone.

There's the television ad in which he visits a barber shop, surrounds himself with four similarly smooth-scalped souls, and proclaims, "You don't have to be bald to be on board."

be on board."

In another ad, Tolman's wife, Carolyn, calls her husband "hot," and a smiling Tolman pats his bald bean. "Bald is beautiful," he says.

A campaign Web site fea-tured photos of Tolman and close-cropped movie star Vin Diesel over the caption, "Sep-

arated at Birth."

"He's one of the few candidates who's making any headway." joked John Capps, founder of the Morehead, N.C. based Bald Headed Men of America, who checked out Tolman's Web site. "He'll be one of the few who won't cover anything up."

Though the four Democrats and one Republican running for governor have been airing television ads for weeks ahead of the Sept. 17 primary. Tolman's offbeat ads — following two aggressive ones attacking House Speaker Tom Finneran by name — have created a stit.

Tolman. 42, a former

Tolman, 42, a former state senator and the Democ-ratic nominee for lieutenant governor in 1998, began los-

Now, the job is all but completed.

He devised the idea for the television ads after a half-dozen seniors came up and rubbed his head for luck at a picnic in Worcester.

People on the campaign trail recognize Tolman as the "Bald is Beautiful" "guy, and reporters and columnists have picked up on the theme.

"I've already won. I'm cutting through." Tolman said. "People like to smile."

Susan Michelman, a UK professor and expert on the social meanings of appearance, said Tolman's proudly polished pate could attract voters who appreciate his forthrightness, unlike, say, a candidate who uses a "combower" to hide what they don't

candidate who uses a "comb-over" to hide what they don't have.
"There's a kind of hon-esty about doing that," she

said.
Tolman is the only gubernatorial candidate runing under the state's new
Clean Elections law, which
gives public money to candidates who limit their spending and fund raising.
Tolman says more ads
are planned, but more bald
jokes are unlikely. He seems
to realize "Bald is Beautiful"



China rule eroding Hong Kong's freedom

As the eyes of the world this summer focused on the Middle East, South Asia and Wall Street. Hong Kong quietly marked the fifth anniversary of its status as a Special Administrative Region of China. By most accounts, the first five years after its handover have gone as smoothly as the most optimistic observers had foreseen.

mistic observers had foreseen.

Beijing, not surprisingly, has sought to mollify naysayers and skeptics by generally adhering to the policy of 'one country, two systems.' As a result, 'the rule of law ... the independence of the judiciary... and essential rights and freedoms are being protected," quoting a report from the United Kingdom Foreign Office. But while the city remains one of the most free places in Asia, China is continually chipping away at Hong Kong's democratic policy.

chipping away at Hong Kong's democratic policy. Prior to 1987, a great number of Hong Kong residents had dire expectations for their future. The darkset moment came in 1986, following the Tianamene massacre, when everyone knew that the British lease was running out. Thes of thousands of people lined up to wait in queues for a U.K. pasport, so that, if nothing else, they would have a way of escaping what they feared would come. Their worst fears have not materialized, but the city is changing in subtle ways, and not for the better.

To Chinese central authorities, Hong Kong is an asset in the most literal sense of the word, given

that this territory of barely 7.5 million people boosts the nation's GDP by over 20 percent. The profit motive has always driven their policy, and it always will. China needs the territory for economic reasons above all else, so it has no choice but to protect its most valuable investment.

For this reason, recent breaches of 'one country, two systems' are not serious enough for Hong Kong to lose its appeal to foreign investors but enough for its residents to feel that their liberty is being curtailed.

Consider the following list of ways in which the spirit of the laws is weakening.

Let us start with Chief Executive Tung Cheehwa's revamping of the city's civil service. A pragmatic centralizer, he was dissatisfied with the British-style system of dividing power between career bureaucrasts and elected politicians. He pushed through legislation ensuring that all department with his support of pope who believed a region in 100 to 100 t

If Tung's leadership has been a sort-of tragicomedy, Hong Kong's immigration policy is a genuine tragedy for those directly involved. After a

convoluted series of court rulings, appeals and administrative decisions, the verticit came down to nearly 5,000 manipand Chinese in late spring They do not have the right of abode in the region. The key point here is that at Tung's request, Beijing overruled an earlier court decision favorable to the immigrants, all of whom have families in Hong Kong. The final ruling was technically in accordance with the constitution, but China's desire to control the flow of people into the wealthy region has triumphed over basic humanitant sentiment. The pictures of people being forcibly separated from their relatives and driven to the border in heavily guarded police vans were shocking.

Finally, we come to the issue of free expression. While there have been few violations of this right for residents, it is beyond display are either their controlled to the policy of the policy are either deed out; or persecuted. Case in point Harry Way, the American human rights activist who spent 19 years in Chinese prisons, was recently detained at long Kong's airport and deported back to the United States. No comment from the authorities at the why, but the reason is all too clear. In August, a court found 16 Falum Gong followers guilty of causing a public obstruction because they dared to protest China's human rights record.

Are these the early stages of some nefarious plot to subvert Hong Kong's Western-style liberies? The answer is probably no, but it is becoming increasingly clear that those who unreservedly

trusted China before the handover were deluding themselves. Hong Kong is not as free as it was on June 30, 1987, it may even be less free than it was before Britain granted it limited self-government, and it is certainly less free than Beijing would have us believe the self-grant being would have us believe they's vibrant civil society is rising to conform the unden encroachment on rights and freedoms, but it can never be strong enough to meet the challenge on its own. Hong Kong needs the firm support of international pressure, particularly from the United States and other countries that buy China's products and sell defense technology. The administration of Hong Kong is not a purely domestic issue, since the city's constitutional guarantees were enshrimed in the 1984 Sino-British Joint Declaration, a treaty that China signed in good faith.

The limited restraint demonstrated by Beijing is not due to the Communist Party's noble intentions but rather its pragmatic recognition that there is no alternative if it wants to convince the outside world that 'one country, two systems' is a success. 



A different kind of education waits

Tired of Lexington? Office helps plan, finance and execute trips around the globe

UK is located in Lexington, but some students are getting an education from around the world.

From as close by as Canada or Mexico, to as far away as Japan or Nepal, each year nearly 400 UK students study abroad.

UK's Office of International Affairs is responsible for the Study Abroad program.

There are hundreds of study, work and exchange programs with durations of a summer, a semester or a year. The OIA generally focuses on freshman undergraduate students because the programs require a lot of planning, but they will work with anyone wanting to travel abroad.

Each participating student is required to attend an orientation meeting followed by one-on-one meetings with a Study Abroad adviser.

"We spend a lot of time talking to the students individually," said David Bettez, the assistant director for the Study Abroad and Exchange programs. "[We] discuss the kinds of programs that exist, financing, the student's goals

and objectives and education and personal issues."

The expenses for the programs vary. Some programs cost only UK's tuition, fees and room and board (keep in mind that plane tickets and spending money are additional expenses). Other programs don't use dorms or host families and incur living expenses. But students can apply for scholarships to help pay for the programs.

"I planned for about a year before going to Japan," said Chris Schidle, a finance junior. "Without scholarships, I wouldn't have been able to go."

The OIA encourages students to become familiar with where they are going and counsels students throughout the program.

"It's an experience. When

you first get there it is just fun...but when you get settled in, the biggest frustration is the language," Schidle said. "It's tough when you can't say what you mean."

Study abroad courses often transfer for credit at UK.

Going to a foreign country can be a culture shock, but Bettez said that students are often more shocked when they return to the US.

"Coming back was more shocking than going over there," Schidle said. "The cultures are so different...I miss it already."


on it. It turns out we were just behind Funkhouser, so my reasoning worked. If you don't like that method, go get a map.





Arboretum offers nature, solitude

Let's face it. We've all been at the point where we feel like we're going to explode if we don't get away soon. Papers are due, tests are just around the corner, book chapters are waiting to be read. We just feel like throwing our hands up and screaming.

There's no need to scream. Instead, just take a break and visit the UK Arboretum, located on Alumni Drive across from Commonwealth Stadium and the soccer stadium. The UK Arboretum is 100 acres of preserved greenspace right at UK's back door.

"The Arboretum is a good

place to go to just change your surroundings," said Marcia Farris, Arboretum director. "It's a wonderful place to come and enjoy nature with the many beautiful flowers that grow here."

Farris said that many students visit the Arboretum during the school year, some just to relax and some to study in a quiet environment.

At UK's Arboretum, you'll find a variety of gardens, including a home demonstration garden, vegetable garden, perennial collections, ground cover collections and home fruit and nut gardens. Visitors can see all types of plants growing, each with their own identification card to keep vis-

itors from guessing.


The Arboretum also has a walking trail called "Walk Across Kentucky." The trail is a 1.9 mile path (plus another .5 mile path through woods) where walkers can see simulations of Kentucky's seven regional landscapes, including Bluegrass, Knobs, Appalachian and Cumberland Mountains.

Signs along the paved path point out each landscaped area, detailing the vegetation found in those particular areas. Pamphlets detailing the trail and walking distances are available at the Arboretum entrance.

Special events are also held at the Arboretum throughout the year. Events such as the summer's Lexington Shakespeare Festival, are scheduled throughout the year.

Volunteer opportunities are also available at the Arboretum. Volunteers are need to serve as guides through the Arboretum, help with a children's gardening program and assist with publicizing the Arboretum. A variety of other volunteer opportunities are available as well.

Notice Student Group Health Insurance Fall 2002 Enrollment

University Health Service can assist students in obtaining health insurance coverage. The 2002-2003 annual policy continues with the MEGA Life and Health Insurance Company. University of Kentucky undergraduates and Lexington Community College students who are taking 6 credit hours or more are eligible for enrollment. Graduate students taking 3 hours or more are eligible to enroll. (Certain 0-credit hour graduate students may also qualify.) The following information will assist you in understanding the plan if you are enrolling for the first time. If you have already enrolled, this will serve as a reminder to reenroll for the upcoming year.

All international students on an F or J visa are automatically enrolled in the student insurance plan. Insurance cards can be acquired, and dependent coverage may be purchased at the Office of International Affairs, 203 Bradley Hall. For more information, call the Office of International Affairs, 257-4067 Ext. 238.

All degree seeking students enrolled in the University of Kentucky Graduate School who are full teaching assistants, research assistants, graduate assistants, full institutional fellows, or a combination thereof, are eligible for funded insurance and are automatically enrolled in the insurance plan. Students who do not meet these Eligibility criteria will not have their insurance premiums paid by the University. Dependent coverage may be purchased at the Graduate School Fellowship Office, 365 POT. For more information, call the Graduate School Fellowship Office, 257-3261.

Effective Date: The policy effective date is August 26. If premium payment is received from a student enrolling voluntarily after that date, the date upon which the Company or designated University representative receives your payment becomes the effective date.

How and Where to Pay: Students wishing to voluntarily enroll must complete the enrollment information (available at University Health Service) and send it with payment to Student Insurance, P.O. Box 809026, Dallas, TX, 75380-9884 or enroll at the University Health Service (Student Health), Wing C, Kentucky Clinic.

Not always easy: Football tickets plentiful, but basketball tickets require patience, effort

Tickets for UK sporting events are considered a hot commodity, especially when basketball season begins. As a UK student, you have the opportunity to buy tickets at a fraction of the cost of a general admission ticket. All student tickets are priced at \$5 each. To get the student price, you must present a valid UK student ID. Some sporting events, such as men's and women's home soccer games, are free with valid ID.

There are different ways to purchase tickets for football and

basketball games.

Football tickets can be bought in a season package until August 1. After that, they may be purchased in two-game packages on specified dates, which will be announced before the season begins. The price of the season tickets is five dollars per game for seven home games or \$35.

for seven home games or \$35.

Basketball tickets are a little more difficult to come by. One, because every one of about 25,000 students interested in UK basketball wants a ticket and two, because they can only be purchased in a lottery format. The lottery takes place on a specified night and at each lottery students who are lucky enough to have their number called before the tickets sell out can buy tickets for two upcoming home games. Officials at the UK ticket office have said that the basketball lottery is being reviewed for possible changes, but nothing is official at this time.

So, if you are an avid sports fan or you just want something to do while you're not studying, contact the UK ticket office and inquire about purchasing student tickets for UK's sporting events. The number for the UK ticket office is 257-1818.



UK's job placement services can help students in a variety of ways, from resume-polishing for that first "real" job, to finding a temporary job flipping burgers to make next month's rent, to finding a specific internship tailored to your major. Here's a list of some, but not all, of the places to check out when looking for a job:

• The Student and Temporary Employment Placement Service (STEPS) office. The Student Employment division of STEPS acts as a referral service, connecting students with job opportunities from both UK and community businesses. In May, student employment had helped 605 students find jobs in the previous 10 months.

The jobs available through STEPS vary widely. Many of the jobs available have flexible schedules to accommodate students. Though STEPS does not directly hire students, they interview clients to ensure they are compatible with and qualified for the job to which they are referred.

About 60 jobs are usually available at any given time. None of the jobs provide academic credit. Off-campus jobs often pay \$7-\$8 to start; campus jobs pay \$6.50-\$7.50 to start.

• The Career Center. The Career Center helps students "with every aspect of their career thinking," said Diane Kohler, the center's associate director. For example, the center offers help with individual career counseling, which can include help with resumes and practice interviews. They also give interest assessments, to help underclassmen find a major and career path. The center holds several career fairs between September and April.


The center also houses a library with print and online job-tracking resources.

• Campus Cuisine. Students just looking to make a few quick bucks at a flexible job may want to look into UK's food services. It's one of the biggest campus employers, hiring about 400 students a year. Starting pay is \$6.90 per hour.

Campus Cuisine will usually accommodate student schedules. Students may download an application from their Web site, or visit their nearest food service location to inquire about a job.



Cadets receive a college experience

Drop and give me twenty: Scholarships, career skills among benefits cadets receive

There are hundreds of organizations for students at UK. Each provides its members with benefits, whether it is work, scholarships or fun. UK has both Army and Air Force ROTC, which offers several other benefits that other organizations do not.

Greg Polk, a communications senior, said he wanted to be involved with the military, but have college experience first.

"I wanted to have fun before I had to get a real job,"

Polk said. He said the ROTC program allows him to be a part of the Army while in college and guarantees a job when he graduates.

Upon completion of the program, members will hold a rank as a commissioned officer. A graduated Army ROTC member can work full or part time. A graduated Air Force ROTC member will be full time active duty.

Polk said the ROTC gave him the skills that many employers look for. "It teaches you to deal with all types of people, leadership and problem-solving skills." 2nd Lt. Jason Smedberg said a person is first introduced to the basics, history of military and hands-on work. Each year, they advance the skills they learn. Juniors and seniors run some classes for younger cadets. They also have physical training three times a week to keep them in shape.

With all the teamwork, friendships are made. "I have great friends. I know a lot more people and I am more outgoing," Polk said. Polk said he sometimes goes over to the Buell Armory just to hang out.

ROTC plans a variety of activities for its cadets. Army goes rappelling, shoots guns and flies helicopters. Air Force visits bases, goes rock climbing and has a field day with sports. Many of these activities are done during class time.

When joining ROTC, a cadet is not making a commitment. Grimes said if a cadet is not on scholarship, they are not required to commit for the first two years. "You can take classes without the commitment. It helps your G.P.A. and you get to know a lot of different people on campus," Polk said.

Even if a cadet does not want to commit to the military, ROTC classes still count as electives toward graduation. "The classes are in a good atmosphere, the professors are active-duty officers and there is no pressure," Polk said.

There is a new student organization on campus: the Non-Traditional Student Organization.

The organization wants to help gain "recognition of the problems non-traditional students face," said Jerry Price, 47, the president of the NTSO.

The guidelines for non-traditional students are broad. They include, but are not limited to, students who are over the age of 24, are single parents, have a job or are enrolled as part-time students.

What kinds of problems do non-traditional students face?

"There is no advising for students after hours, parking is difficult when you have time constraints," Price said. "And UK does not offer child care services in the evening."

According to a report released by the U.S. Department of Education earlier this month, nearly 75 percent of undergraduate students are deemed non-traditional. While many non-traditional students choose to attend twoyear colleges, 37 percent of four-year institution's students fall in this category.

At one time, UK offered services, such as evening ad-

vising conferences, math and English refresher courses, evening childcare and a mentoring program, that were dedicated to the recruitment and retention of adult students. But, in 1992 the Office of Academic Support Services was closed. A few of the services provided by the office were incorporated into other programs but most were abandoned all together.

The academic adviser for the NTSO, Cecile McKinney, said students should join the NTSO because "as a unified organization-interest group, they have a better chance of affecting change to benefit all adult students at UK."

McKinney, a non-traditional student, is also the coordinator of UK's Evening and Weekend College. "I was involved in the establishment of the organization as an interested party."

As a new organization, the NTSO membership is still low. There are fewer than 40 members, but the organization plans a membership drive during the fall semester. "Membership is open to all members of the UK community. This includes UK, LCC, staff, faculty and others," Price said.

King also said that each sport gets approximately the same amount of money, usually about \$500 or \$600. Therefore some sports, such as hockey, which has the biggest budget, have to raise a lot of money on their own.


Each sport is also held to the same standards as the varsity sports. The teams travel and each of the students who participate are expected to maintain class attendance and a certain GPA. Each time the team travels, the student is granted an excused absence due to the fact that the competition is a university sponsored

"They are treated just like the varsity teams," King said. "As far as GPA the governing body determines what the minimum requirement is, but they get the same treatment as varsity sports.

King also said that while he doesn't have a lot of hands-on responsibility with each club, he is trying to change that

"I'd like to set something up where I have a meeting with all the club officers present," he said. "I just think it would help if everybody knew each other.'

So if want to be on the water-skiing team or even participate in the martial arts, club sports is the way to go.



Writing Center helps and critiques

Writing woes? From beginning to end, outside advice can make projects better

Whether you're trying to figure out just exactly how to write that six-to-10-page English paper you've been dreading, or you're trying to gather up the nerve to present your in-class project to your History of Journalism class, there's a place on campus that can help.

The Writing Center, located in room B108-C in the basement of the W.T. Young Library, offers assistance to UK students, faculty and staff who need help.

Staffed by English gradu-

ate students, full-time instructors, part-time consultants and undergraduate peer tutors, the center has free individual and group consultations available for the time when you just don't think you can proceed any more on your project. And that includes the time when you haven't even started.

That's right. You don't even have to have started your project to get help from the Writing Center. Just take vour assignment sheet or any information you have about the paper, project or presentation you're working on to the Center, and their staff will help get you going in the right direction. Textbooks and class notes pertaining to the subject are also helpful to bring along. The consultant can even help you make a Power Point presentation to go along with your presentation.

In addition to counseling services, the Writing Center also holds an International Conversation Hour for students trying to improve their conversational English. American and international students are invited to attend this meeting, held 6-9 p.m. on Thursdays in the Martin Luther King Jr. Cultural Center, located in the Student Center. Students can attend the free meetings on a drop-in basis, and do not need to register or attend a certain number of times

Consultants at the writing center don't edit papers for students. Instead, they have students read their papers out loud to the consultant to help figure out what needs work. Again, students don't need to have something already written. They can also help student work through the prewriting process.

Another important point to remember about the Writing Center is that it isn't just for English papers. The service is open for all undergraduate students in all classes that require writing, no matter

what the subject.

Appointments are recommended, and can be made by calling 257-1356.

'A safe place': Independent ombudsman helps students with grade disputes and other matters

Navigating university bureaucracy can be a pain. Sometimes a student who's gotten entangled in the system doesn't know where to turn for help.

Many students also feel helpless when they have a conflict with an instructor over grades or other academic issues. But there's a fallback for answers and advice within the university.

That fallback is UK's Office of Academic Ombudsman Services. Established in 1970, the ombudsman acts as a neutral party to resolve academic conflicts between students and faculty or administration.

Ombudsman Susan Scollay said the position is there to "deal with student's academic rights and academic offenses,"

UK Senate Rules specify that an ombud must practice "fairness, discretion and accuracy" and that the person "be regarded by students as one who is genuinely interested in their welfare and sympathetic to their problems."

Scollay assists students by either advising them on whom to

speak with about their problem, or if necessary, speaking directly with the instructor or relevant party.

"The ombud is independent from decision-making parties," Scollay said. Giving students and anyone concerned about academic issues the opportunity to discuss issues in a safe place is a primary part of Scollay's goal as ombud.

Anyone seeking guidance can visit the ombudsman. Students seek Scollay's assistance on a variety of academic issues, including grade disputes or unfair suspensions, she said. Faculty will also seek her for guidance on relating with students, writing syllabi and dealing with plagiarism.

"This office is open," Scollay said, and said she wants students to know "this is a safe place to come."





Unique shops surround campus

Not the mall: Books, jewelry, drums and music among eclectic items students will find at small, independently owned campus boutiques

Erin Eoherty didn't name her store after a design on a Grateful Dead album for nothing.

The Happy Turtle, just down from Holmes Hall on South Limestone Street, is as laid-back and stylish as the renowned band of the 1970's.

Walk inside, and the scent of wildberry incense breezes by, while the pitter-patter of a man palming the diembe hugged between his knees makes the store seem more

like visiting a friend's apartment than a shopping trip.

"It's very warm and laidback," Eoherty said. "We pretty much get to know all our customers who come in.

The Happy Turtle is one of many mellow, funky, privatelyowned shops that fringe the UK campus.

Owners of the shops say they rely on the college crowd for much of their business. With the start of fall classes, they're expecting a steady flow of students.

Sqecial Media, an eclectic store also on South Limestone. is stocking up on students' favorites: Nag Champa incense, wind-up plastic Jesus dolls, Patchouli oil, paper lanterns from Nepal and used books.

"The most unique thing is all the different types of merchandise we have in one place," said Mary Morgan, the owner of the store, which has been around since 1972. "We have things for people interested in Wicca and Buddhism and piercing and tattooing."

For something a little more personal, The Black Market on East High Street has a wide selection of local and imported jewelry.

Jewels and gems of every color shimmer in the glass cases, while long and thin ropes of silver swing from their hooks.

Melanie Williams took ownership of the store over a year ago and has encapsulated her idea of a perfect jewelry shop.

"I do all the beadwork on the necklaces, then I have another artist that does all the silver work," she said. "Things I have here are so unique I'm pretty positive you won't find them in any other stores.

The owners of each campus area shop say they try to make their selections as affordable as possible. At most stores, students can spend \$20 and walk out with a bag full of goodies.

Sick students can get free help

Somewhere in the bowels of the Kentucky Clinic, beyond the orthopedics' offices and rows of surgery rooms, is a small territory that three quarters of students visit at least once before they graduate.

The University Health Services is a small dot in an enormous medical center, but its services to students make it one of the most popular places for UK and LCC students on campus.

"We're hard to find and hard to see," said Spencer Turner, the director of the clinic. "We're busting our butts to get more space.

Phones are constantly ringing – they get about 300

calls a day for appointments and students flow like water through the waiting rooms and examination rooms.

Word is that the number of student clientele is rising, Turner said.

His reasoning for the in-"It's because we're

There's a long list of services that make seeing a UK physician attractive. To most students, the best reason is that they don't have to pay a dime when the appointment is over

Tuition for full-time students at UK and LCC includes a fee of \$85.75 each semester, which covers the cost of using the clinic. No matter how many times students go or what they get done (unless it's minor surgery), their payment

is covered.

Part-time students can also pay the semester-based fee or can pay a fee during each visit.

In some cases, that means students are saving hundreds of dollars, Turner said. He said a full-time female student who goes to the clinic for a pap smear, counseling on birth control and several STD tests could save up to \$400.

Savings are significant," said Jan Hurley, the assistant director and administrator of UHS. "Even if you were parttime and paid our fee of service rates, they're probably 50 percent lower," than what private doctors charge.

But just because it's inex-

pensive doesn't mean the isn't treatment

"When a student comes here, they can expect the kind of care (they would get) from a private physician," he said.


UHS covers all the bases. including late-night hours, when a physician is available for phone calls. While the physician can't start treatment until the clinic opens, he can tell students what actions to take overnight. Calls range from bat bites to missed birth control pills, Turner said.

Overall, students feel taken care of at the center, Hurley

"Students who got medical care here are very happy and very satisfied," she said.







Expanded Seaton Center opens

Beat the freshmen fifteen: Renovation adds equipment, including a climbing wall

Students that arrive to school next fall will have a new addition to their exercise programs. The Seaton Center is expanding, and has been for quite a while.

The Seaton Center currently includes facilities available for basketball, volleyball, badminton, jogging, conditioning, weight training, aerobics, squash, racquetball, sauna baths and locker and shower facilities. It also includes the Lancaster Aquatic Center.

The new expansion is a total of 87,000 square feet, with many new facilities.

The addition is a two-story structure with four basketball courts, four racquetball courts and a weight room on the first floor

Also included is a climbing wall, which measures 30' x 32' and is a brick red color. They have also added a 12' bouldering wall for students to practice.

"The climbing wall is complete and it looks very nice," said Ron Lee, associate director of Campus Recreation. On the second floor, above the gymnasium, there will be a four-lane suspended walking and running track, including a nearby stretching area.

Students wanting more of a fast-paced workout can enjoy the cardiovascular and weight equipment, named the Johnson Fitness Center.

The cardio equipment will face the windows and looks out on the intramural fields. A total of 180 pieces of fitness equipment are available.

In these rooms, aerobics classes will be offered such as kickboxing and spinning, which is a type of group cycling activity.

Hours for the facility, which are tentative, are from six a.m. to 11 p.m. Monday

through Friday and for about eight to 10 hours per day on Saturday and Sunday.

The project has had a few set backs, with the original completion date being January 7, 2002.

Other plans that have held up completion of the project include the renovation of the outdoor basketball courts and the intramural fields.


Capital Project Manager Jim Conner said, "We plan to open with conjunction of the students coming back in the fall."

The addition cost a total of \$15,350,000.
