Russian students uncertain of future

Fate of homeland relies on president's agenda

Boris Yeltsin isn't the only one pondering the fate of his country.

The recent tumult in Moscow be-tween the Russian president and parliament members has four Rus-sian exchange students thinking about the future, too.

arout the future, too.
"The events that occurred showed the world what the Communists can do now and what they will do in the future," said Roman Magarychev, a UK exchange student from the Russian city of Vladimir, located about 120 miles east of Moscow

For this reason, the anti-Yeltsin legislators who took siege of Russia's parliament building "must be punished more harshly" than past conspirators, he said.

The legislators surrendered to Yeltsin forces on Monday, ending a gun and tank assault on them by Russian troops.

A yet undetermined number of people were killed in the fight to regain control of the parliament build-

ing, where hard-liners were holed

But at least 62 people inside the building known as the White House were killed.

It was a number that startled Russian exchange student Milla Barasheva.

sheva.
"I think it's a tragedy that so many people died," said Barasheva, who also is from Vladimir.
She said the situation in Russia now is more tense than in August of 1991 when hard-liners staged a coup against then-President Mikhail Gorbachev.

The takeover attempt failed in large part because of Yeltsin's steadfast opposition to the plotters.

But this time is different, Barasheva said.

"Today, it is more dangerous be-cause there is no power. The situa-tion is out of control."

Barasheva said she plans to remain in the United States to finish her studies in computer science.

Yeltsin keeps up pressure in Moscow

MOSCOW — President Boris Yeltsin consolidated his victory over hard-line enemies yesterday, sacking three officials even as tanks rolled back from Russia's smolder-ing parliament and soldiers searched for more dead.

The city of 9 million struggled back to workaday life after a 13-day crisis led to street battles that claimed more than 100 lives and left hundreds wounded.

Sniper fire from the blackened parliament building, where an armed challenge by Communist holdover lawmakers was crushed Monday, died down during the day.

But Russian television said au-thorities suspected some 10 gunmer remained in the 19-story building, known as the White House.

Officials were considering what charges would be filed against the leaders of the rebellion, former vice

Center helps instructors to improve teaching

UK is interested in teaching both students and instructors.

The Teaching and Learning Cen-ter provides instructors with an op-portunity to improve their teaching skills.

"My job is to help them imple-ment the change they want imple-ment the change they want to do (in

"My joo is to nelp them impie-ment the change they want to do (in the classroom)," said Joe T. Davis, director of the center and a profes-sor of agriculture and economics. Davis said the center is useful be-cause it helps faculty see what they are doing wrong and shows them how to improve.

are doing wrong and shows ment how to improve.

"I think we are able to provide them with some insight with their teaching that they can't do them-selves," he said.
The center, which opened in Au-gust 1991, is involved with training teaching assistants and other facul-ty members.

teaching assistants and other facul-ty members.

UK requires that all TAs attend a weekly arrive on campus. Individual departments also have to continue the process of raining their TAs. Davis said the center assists the departments in developing pro-grams for TAs.

grams for TAs.

The center also works individually with TAs and other faculty on campus. The center's cliemele ranges from new faculty to professors with years of experience.

The center looks at ways that the instructors can improve and change their teaching approaches.

Davis said that in evaluating the teacher, the center learns the objectives of the teacher and collects input from the teacher, and the teacher, and the safery and the positions of the teacher and the safery center and the safery cen

tives of the teacher and collects in-put from the teacher, center and students on how he or she is doing. Then the center videotapes a class, which an instructor later watches with a guideline that helps pinpoint certain aspects in teaching skills. Someone from the center also will visit and observe one of the instructor's classes. the instructor's classes.

The center then provides a survey to the students on how the teacher is doing.

After this process, Davis said, the center will identify the aspects of the instructor's teaching that need to be improved and will provide information on how the improvement can be implemented. can be implemented.

Universal Pictures on Monday said Spielberg's movie about cloned dinosaurs running amok in theme park has grossed \$325.7 mil-lion in North American theaters and \$379 million overseas, for a world-wide total of \$704.7 million. In its 1982 release and 1985 re-release, "E.T." brought in \$701.4 million: \$399.8 million domestical-ly and \$301.6 million international-ly.

When "E.T." came out, however, ticket prices were much lower: \$2.94 on average nationally vs. more than \$5.10 now.



As if two grueling halves of physical play against Miami (Ohio) weren't enough, the UK men's soccer team had to play two 15-minute overtimes yesterday at Cage Field before Miami went home with a hard-fought 2-0 victory.

The loss dropped UK to 3-5-2 on the season, while a strong Miami team improved to 8-2-1 with the win.

Despite the Wildcats' loss, UK head coach Sam Wooten was not displeased with his team's effort.

"We've just got to keep fighting." Wooten said. "I'm happy with the effort, but we've got to finish our opportunities ener the goal. That's what cost us today."

Missed opportunities certainly did cost the Wildcats. UK took 10 shots on goal compared to only six for the Redskins, but the Cats still were held scoreless.

UK had no less than three open shots deflected off the goal, as well as countless efforts that sailed over or just wide of the goal.

The first half saw a totally different UK defense than the one that ad collapsed a weck before against Chicinnati. UK's defensive midfield was strong throughout the contest, and the Cats rarely allowed Miami good shots from their defensive thid.

Aidid says Somalis

must defend selves

No visible tattoos. No tinted or dyed hair. No bracelets. No flat shoes. Oh, and skirts or dresses

For more than half of about 70 high school and university stu-dents who attended the Walt Dis-ney World internship presenta-tion Monday night, the benefits far out-weighed the numerous re-strictions.

strictions.

Although some students were anxious and a little unsure what to expect during the two-hour presentation, many were excited and ready to fly south for the spring semester, even before Dispute the property of the spring semester, even before Dispute the property of the service of ney recruiters began their low-key pitch.

NAIROBI, Kenya — After the bloodiest battle yet for U.N. forces in Mogadishu, fugitive warlord Mohamed Farrah Aidid made a rare radio broacast tell-ing Somalis to "do everything in their power to defend them-selves"

selves."

Italian state television reported that Aidid claimed 300 Somalis were killed and 500 wounded in the latest UN, offensive against his compound in the Somali capital.

The United Nations, meanwhile, sought the safe return of an American belicopter pilot and a Nigerian peacekeeper captured by Somali militiamen and impiored them to treat the captives humanely. Other Americans were also feared captured.

At least 12 U.S. Army soldiers were killed, 78 wounded and six reported missing in Somalia after the latest round of fighting with forces loyal to

Concerns for the safety of the captured U.S. pilot and the six missing Americans were heightened by photos and film that showed the brutal display of the body of a U.S. serviceman in Mogadishu on Monday.

The battles began Sunday with a new U.N. attack on Aidid's military command and have ignited new debate over the U.N. mission in Somalia.

Critics contend the United Nations has lost sight of its humanitarian mission to feed starving Somalis in its determination to hunt down and crush Adid, which it blames for the deaths of 61 peacekeepers since June.

Paul Watson of the Toronto Star newspaper told NBC-TV today that Aidid spoke angrily

"The general feeling is that they have already seen heavy force from the United States and United Nations before," Watson said.

The heavy losses in Somalia on Sunday led Defense Secretary Les Aspin to order about 200 more U.S. troops into the country, along with two aerial gunships and several tanks and fighting vehicles. The current U.N. force is 28,000, including 4,700 Americans.

4,700 Americans. The U.S. serviceman's body was dragged through the streets of the Somali capital at the end of a rope, surrounded by cheer-ing, dancing supporters of Aid-id.

An unidentified Somali ca-merman also filmed the interro-gation of a U.S. Blackhawk heli-copter pilot, Army Chief Warrant Officer Mike Durant.

Durant's face displayed a number of what appeared to be fresh cuts and scratches and he appeared to be somewhat dazed. His legs were covered by a blan-ket and his answers came hesi-routly.

UK library's books decaying at fast pace

October named preservation month

With the changing of the seasons, UK is seeking to preserve its library resources.

October 1993 has been designated as UK's Library Preservation Awareness Month. During this time, the Library Preservation Committee will try to heighten awareness to the plight of an increasing number of UK's library books.

creasing number of UK's library books.

"These books are repositories of our intellectual heritage, and they're crumbling," said Becky, Ryder, UK's preservation librarian. "The main focus of Preservation Awareness Month is to educate both students and faculty."

UK's library books are decaying at an alarming rate. A 1992 survey of Margaret I. King Library showed that 47 percent of books acquired before 1974 are in bess-than-satisfactory condition.

This can be attributed to the paper that the books are printed on, Ryder said. She said books printed before 1980 are printed on acidic paper.

on, kyoer said. She said books printed before 1980 are printed on acidic paper.

More than 80 percent of the King library's books are printed on this type of paper, which guar-antees that they eventually will deteriorate.

In addition, environmental conditions and improper shelving can damage library books.

This situation is not restricted to UK, however. More than 80 percent of Yale University's library books are printed on acidic paper, and the Library of Congress estimated 20 years and that more those

a third of its collection was decaying.





Media coverage of crisis in Russia biased toward President Boris Yeltsin

America is fascinated with the two-dimensional, good-guy/bad-guy aspect of stories.

The people opposed to Russian President Boris Yeltsin are de-cribed as fascists, ultra-nationalists, hard-liners and the everunpopular Communists.

This language is leading at best, painting those opposed to Yeltsin with a very broad brush.

It would be absurd to imply that the forces against Yeltsin have no share of the blame for the escalating violence in Moscow.

However, there is more than one side to every story, and it is likely that the blame needs to be shared.

It is in the United States' best interest for Yeltsin to prevail in this power struggle, but it is not a journalist's job to be a cheer-leader for national interests.

The news media have a responsibility to present a fair and bal-anced picture in these situations, regardless of the opinions of those doing the reporting.

Those opposed to Yeltsin may be as bad as they are portrayed. But it should be up to the viewing and reading public to reach that

Russian parliament responsible for violence

Last year, in my first guest opinion in the Kentucky Kernel, I made
a prediction (which was not very
difficult to make) that my native
country, the former Soviet Union,
would be the main troublemaker in
the world for many years to come.
Well, I did not expect at that
time to what extent this prediction
would be correct.
Last night I, as well as many other
Russians whom I know in Lexington, did not sleep at all, watching what was going on in Moscow.
The history of Russia was created once again in front of our eyes
on live television transmissions
from Moscow. It looked like Hollywood producers set the scene and
decorations in front of the CNN office in Moscow: the parliament
building, tanks, troops, a lot of
shooting, fire and smoke.
There were some moments durine that night when Lodd the west.

building, tanks, troops, a lot of shooting, fire and snoke.

There were some moments during that night when I told myself, this is not action movie, these are not tricks to create impression of real fighting, death and pain.

But everything looked so unreal and unusual.

I am sure there will be a lot of coverage in the media of who is to blame for the deaths and why this all has happened. Many things contributed to the conflict.

Some of the causes go back to 1917, when the "Great October Socialist Revolution" occurred, while others are even more long-standing and reflect all of Russian history.

But now I want to write my first impression about what might have been the last straw: the irresponsibility of the leaders of the former Russian parliament and of the former vice president.

All of them participated on the side of President Boris Veltsin in defeating the August 1991 coup against Mikhail Gorbachev.

Looking back, I understand that at that time everything looked more like a game than like a real fight: the great enthusiasm of people in the streets who were resolved to defend the Russian White House, the indecisiveness of the hard-lines who did not feel support to their actions from the people of the former Soviet Union, and only three violent deaths in the streets of Moscow during three days of the standoff.

and only three violent deaths in the streets of Moscow during three days of the standoff.

All this now looks to me more like a game in which both sides were only pretending that one side was going to shoot and the other side really believed that.

And this game brought extraordinary benefits to the Russian parliamentarians. They became heros, the center of world attention.

And now these people are told: "Enough is enough. Your unconstructive position makes reforms in Russia impossible, prolongs the pain of Russian people in their transition to the market economy, is detrimental to Russian foreign policy and makes getting financial

pain of Russian people in their transition to the market economy, is detrimental to Russian foreign policy and makes getting financial help from abroad impossible."

All the politicians want to prolong their terms in power. It is quite understandable.

But every responsible politician realizes it is unreasonable to continue the game when there is virtually no chance of winning.

But Russian parliamentarians remembering the experience of August 1991 decided to repeat the game.

But the people are not enthusiastic any longer and are tired of the standoff between the president and the parliament. They want to resolve it once and for all.

The Russian army, Western governments and Russian regional leaders support the president. The leaders of the parliament are not popular the way Yelsin is. But in spite of all this, the people in the parliament assumed that the army would not shoot again. It is obvious to me that it is the parliament that bears the main responsibility for what happened.

I am sorry to know about many recent violent deaths in Moscow. I

House. An odor of smoke still hung over parts of Moscow.

"A wave of hatred and death was stopped in Moscow. The bloody re-bellion was suppressed," the Cabi-net said in a statement.

"The seeds of a political split in Russia have been uprooted. Now, creative work is needed."

Yeltsin's "creative work" could include living up to promises to improve the economy, holding elections and convicting the parliament leaders who sought for more than a year to hinder him.

The president, who had sped up his economic reforms even before Monday's clash, was sure to accelerate them now in hopes of reviving Russia's economy, which will be his key to winning the future elections.

Hundreds rallied in St. Petersburg to support a Russian nationalist TV commentator whose program was canceled yesterday.

The violence grew out of Yelt-sin's effort to halt parliamentary in-stransigence by dissolving the body on Sept. 21.

Hard-liners barricaded them-selves inside for nearly two weeks, until their supporters' riots prompt-ed Yeltsin to attack the parliament building.

At least 300 people were killed during two days of fighting at the White House and the national broadcasting complex in Moscow, according to media reports.

Moscow's chief medical administrator confirmed only that 108 people had been killed, but added the figure would rise.

"Moscow has never before seen such bloodshed." said the administrator, Anatoly Solovyov.

Other officials said 526 people were wounded since Sunday, when hard-line supporters rampaged through the capital, overwhelmed

Russian press reports.

Soldiers hunted for snipers and other hard-liners who had fired at troops and firefighters early yesterday while they were trying to put out fires in the building.

A soldier was killed and another wounded overnight in a clash with gumnen in the city center, officials said.

said.

At least 10 tanks that had faced the White House on Monday were pulled out yesterday, although it was unclear whether they were redeployed elsewhere in the city.

Heavily armed troops with armored personnel carriers still stood guard at key government offices and installations to prevent possible attacks.

A state of emergency and over-night curfew remained in effect.

But activity slowly returned to normal around the White House. Cars were allowed to drive past the

building, kicking up pebbles and broken glass as they rattled over asphalt torn up by tank treads on Monday.

"These are troubled times, and nobody knows what will happen, not be not ben't peti-not, not Bill Clinton," said Valen-tin Svechnikov, 61, sitting on a park bench and enjoying a day off because of the unrest.

An estimated 1,500 parliament fighters were arrested. About 140 were being held at the former KGB's Lefortovo Prison, including Khasbulatov, Rutskoi and the men whom the renegade lawmakers had appointed as security, defense and interior ministers.

The parliament rebels may be charged with inciting mass disorder, murder and hostage-taking, said Genrik Resnik, a former defense lawyer in the treason case against leaders of the 1991 Soviet

The murder charges carry a maximum penalty of death, which is usually delivered by a bullet to the back of the head.

"This was the last crisis in Russia," Strizhnev said cautiously. "I hope."
