"Race Relations," Subject of Essays or Orations

The Commission on Interracial Coporation is offering three prizes of \$100, \$50, and \$25, for the three best orations or essays on some phase of race relations, submitted by students of southern colleges on or before June 15, 1925.

The luncheon clubs, newspapers, medical societies and schools have set aside this week in order that they may learn a few facts about the disease which was once thought to be incurable. The National Medical Society has taken as a slogan for this Curable."


