GLSO's ActOut production of Terrence McNally's Tony Award winning plllllll;lkhay Love! Valour! Compassion!, directed by Homer Tracy, opened June 22 at the Lexington Public Library Theater at 140 East Main Street and continues Saturday June 30 at 8 PM and Sunday July 1 at 2 PM.

Originally produced in 1994, Love! Valour! Compassion! is a touching portrayal of eight gay men spending their holidays together in the country. There's Perry, played by Jim Moreton, and Arthur, played by Tom Brown, a professional couple of long standing whose relationship always seems to settle into the loving routine of a couple grown too familiar with one another, but happily so.

Gregory (Rodney Featherson), is an aging choreographer who dotes on his younger lover, Bobby (Troy Johnson), who is blind. Their relationship seems solid until an irresistible dancer, Ramon (Stephen Thornton), callously flaunts his sex appeal and seduces Bobby on the first night.

rankles everyone around him. The truth about his ire becomes clear when he has to take care of his twin brother, James. Unlike John, James inspires nothing but affection in those around him. Their relationship is the source of the play's revelations about the related questions of gay identity and self esteem.

Finally, There's Buzz (Darrell Mains), a maniacal lover of the musical theater. Like James, Buzz suffers from AIDS, and he has resigned himself to a life of humorous anecdotes and comforting trivia. Against all odds, Buzz finds himself falling in love for what might be one last summer.

The Broadway production received five Tony Award nominations and wins for McNally (Best New Play) and John Glover (Best Actor) for his portrayal of twins, John and James. A film version was released in 1997 starring Jason Alexander who replaced Nathan Lane in the stage version.

Tickets are \$8 and may be reserved by calling 253-3233 or can be purchased at the door. Proceeds benefit the Pride Center.



Leading up to Coronation, there will be several events. Friday July 6, is the In Town Show held at Club 141 starting promptly at 8:30. Sat. July 7 there are three events: the State Dinner at the Radisson at 5:30, the Out of Town Show featuring performers from across the USA and Canada at Club 141 at 8 pm, and the 9" Males Exotic Review in back of Club 141 at 10:30. Separate admission, in addition to normal cover, is required.

The morning after Coronation the "Victory Brunch", a casual buffet, will be held at the Radisson where the newly elected monarchs great their subjects, and Donnie and Tracy will say their farewells.

Imperial Court of Ky


We have had a grand time during June. On the weekend of June 2,

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METEOR, MAYBE By Reinette F. Jones

This time last year there was a meteor shower containing homogeneous particles. It occurred during Pride Month, but you probably did not hear about it. News of the event was covered in the alternative media and it wasn't considered a danger to national security or to civilization, and it was thought that most of the particles would disintegrate long before they reached the surface of earth. There is already quite a few Martian Meteorites in Antarctica.

But there was something odd about this particular meteor shower. Individuals, who keep watch for other life forms, noted that within the stream of particles were two parallel particles. The distance between the objects was filled with pinpoints of black twinkling lights. The lights were thought to be trapped de-luminance that had collected as the shower traveled through space.

Or, the lights may have been a connector of some kind, like the corpus callosum found between the two hemispheres of the human brain. For humans, the right hemisphere controls the left side of the body and the left hemisphere controls the right side of the body; the parallel objects may have been side by side because each some how controlled the other via the lights between the two. The particles were so similar in structure that they were referred to as being homogeneous. (Which, by they way, has nothing to do with the lesbian couple who both have the name Jean.)

The particles were noted during the month of June, which is also Pride Month. The possible connection between the meteor shower and the month was down played for fear that it would be thought that

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a celestial body from beyond had intentionally sent forth a gay pride greeting. And who is to say that was not the case. Like many meteors before them, the particles entered earth's atmosphere and ignited, lightning up the sky with a streak of brilliant light, then disintegrated into a fine dust that settled upon the earth. An observer was quoted as saying, "That was the best darn drag show that I had ever seen."

Why did the earth pass through that particular belt of particles? No one knows. The shower was not a periodic shower, which means that it will not appear at the same time each year. It may never appear again. Videos of the event were available on-line last year, but due to lack of interest, the site has been removed.

All meteor showers provide information about the distribution of matter in the solar system and they have been recorded for more than 3000 years. At one point, anything that fell from the sky was called a meteor: rain, snow, hail, and lightning. Later observers thought the meteor showers were magical events. With the development of science, it was later learned that they originate in space beyond the earth's atmosphere.

Maybe, just maybe, something out there was trying to get our attention by throwing two hot rocks toward earth. Or, perhaps there really was a Pride Month greeting in the whole magical mix. It could always be just a plain meteor shower. But that would be too common, and those parallel particles with the fancy lights had to have been anything but common.
