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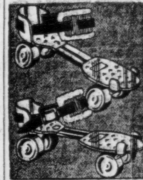

**Calling 'Em Wild**

**A** GAIN, for the second successive week, sport faithfuls are offered an appetizing week-end athletic menu, with four varsity teams parading their wares for home approval. Added to this galaxy of events is the Intramural Department track and field meet finals to be settled after a postponement of three weeks.

Glancing through available schedules, the following lineup emerges:  
Friday—Baseball team vs Kentucky Wesleyan, Stoll field. Intramural track and field finals, Stoll field. Tennis team vs Wayne University, Rose Street courts.

Saturday—Tennis team vs Vanderbilt. Track team vs Berea. The golf team ripped out with the University of Louisville yesterday afternoon over the Ashland Country Club fair-ways in the Cat divot-diggers' fourth contest of the season.

With the Koeneland temptation removed and with the sun pouring down enticement, a new high is expected for all the contests.

Another Comeback  
After being extinct from the local athletic roster since 1934, baseball will present its first home attraction this afternoon when the Kentucky Wesleyan Panthers drag their spikes, mitts and bats onto Stoll field for an intra-feline tussle with our potent Wildcats.

Last Friday in the Methodist's Winchester back yard, Kentucky, in a seven-inning fray trimmed the Panthers' claws with a 17-1 win. The game was played after the 'Cats had undergone but three days of baseball conditioning.

The story of University baseball is a series of ups and downs, in and out of grace with Athletic Council moguls. At one time the sport ranked on a par with football and basketball as a drawing card. Then came the time when strained finances caused by a series of losing teams, inclement weather and other factors, forced the national pastime to be expelled from the roll call. That was in 1931.

**Popped Back**  
After hibernating for two years, pressure was brought to bear on the Council from a group headed by Smith Broadbent, the movement ending with baseball being returned conditionally to the sport roster in 1933. One of the most disastrous campaigns ever experienced by a Kentucky horse-hide and hickory crew was suffered by this team, the squad staggering to climax the year with a record of one victory in 12 engagements. The sole mark inscribed on the right side of the ledger was the fruit of a 15-4 conquest of Eastern State Teachers College in the second attempt of the year.

Broadbent was the captain of the team and the ace pitcher, but two of his mates, John "Frenchy" Demoisey and Sammy Sternberg, were better known members of the team. Demoisey, who also filled a vacancy on Coach Rupp's basketball team in capable fashion, is now a member of the pitching staff of the Louisville Colonels of the American Association, while Sternberg, over a period of the past few years, has operated with several Kitty League clubs.

Again proving to be a financial detriment rather than an asset, the sport was once more culled from the spring round-up.

**After the Storm**  
Passed then many moons, teams came and passed into the past, many momentous things happened, ending with a new athletic deal riding to the campus on the crest of the largest reconstruction wave ever to
