Unimpressed: Bush says Iraqi leader would 'fool the world one more time' by revealing weapons

UNITED NATIONS — Iraq is providing new information about its weapons and has reported the discovery of two bombs, including one possibly filled with a biological agent — moves that the chief U.N. weapons inspector said Tuesday signal real cooperation.

President Bush, however, predicted Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein would try to "fool the world one more time" by revealing the existence of weapons he has previously denied having. He urged the United National States of the state of the

The United States and Britain, which introduced the new resolution on Monday, maintain they already have UN. authorization to attack Irag. The November resolution gave Iraq a final opportunity to disarm or face "serious consequences".

But British Prime Minister Tony Blair and Spanish Prime Minister Jose Maria Aznar face strong opposition at home to a war without the approval of a new resolution.

## **UK professor gives lecture** on body image, media influence

Unreal ideal: Speaker says altered pictures give people a distorted view of bodies, themselves

Growing up, Susan Bordo was ashamed of her body. As she puts it, she thought her butt was "Jewish, too Jewish." Since then, Bordo, a Jew of Eastern European descent, has adjusted her body image and realized that her self-depreciation was partly due to the global media practice of presenting altered images as reality.

Bordo, a professor of English and women's studies and Ho Oita A. Singletary Chair in Humanities at UK, shared her insights Tuesday as part of National Eating Disorders Week. Her lecture, titled "In the Empire of Images," focused on the role the media play in shaping a society's view of desirable body types. Using slides and anecdotes from her 1993 book Unbearable Weight: Ferninism, Western Culture, and the Body. Bordo Illustrated how the images shown in magazines can be as distorted as the societal mindset they help create. "Virtually every media image circulated today has undergone digital revision," she said.



Tennessee big man and Southeastern Conference Player of the Year candidate Ron Slay said his team is going to try to "discombobulate" UK tonight at Rupp Arena. It is an interesting goal, but one that every opponent UK has faced so far in the SEC has not been able to accomplish.

A win tonight would extend UK's nation's longest winning streak to 17 games and secure a first-round bye in the SEC Tournament next month at the Superdome in New Orleans, La.

If the Cats are victorious tonight they will have to stop Slay, arguably the conference's best player.
Slay, a 6-foot-8 senior who missed last season with a torn anterior-cruciate ligament in his right knee, averages a SEC-best 21.5 points a game and 6.5 rebounds a game.

He has become a versatile forward with a respectable shooting touch from out.



## Irresponsible SG is to blame for deficit

UK administration's decision not to cover Student Government's possible \$10,000 deficit this year was not merely a case of UK — with its own budget concerns — choosing to ignore an ailing student organization in favor of looking out for its own economic interests.

The reason for UK's decision lies not in any selfishness on the part of the university, but rather in the lack of organization and responsibility of SC

SG's deficit problems arose when UK decided

not to issue a student fee increase this semester that would have contributed to SG's revenue. It doesn't appear that UK was—or is in the future—totally unwilling to grant the fee increase on SG's behalf.

But SG did not even present the proposal to its own student senate until October, according to UK Vice President of Student Affairs Patricia

By procrastinating until October, just a few weeks before UK started to mail bills to students for the spring semester, SG did not allow nearly enough time for UK to give reasonable consideration for increasing fees

not guaranteed to it when it created its budget and spent thousands on expensive street parties,

In particular, the scenario leading up to the concert of Montgomery Gentry last semester calls into question whether SG even handled the money it had well enough to warrant itself deserving of additional funds.

Saturday is not only the deadline for Iraq to begin the demolition, it is also the date by which Blix must submit his next written report to the Security Council. Blix is then due before the council on March 7 with U.N. nuclear chief Mohamed ElBaradel.

Blix has said in previous reports that Iraq was cooperating more on the process of inspections than on the substance of its weapons of mass destruction programs.

But he said Tuesday that Iraq had provided inspectors with half a dozen letters con-



Jesus Christ, Superstar follows the last days of Jesus' life — from the arrival in Jerusalem on Palm Sunday to his death by crucifixion.

The first act ends with Jesus' capture at Judas' hands and sets up the second act to be depressing. At many points, the second act is a downer. But there is a bright scene within all of the questioning, beating and death. In the production, "Herod's Song" is a flashy Vegas-style production, complete with Vegas girls, flashing lights and white-suit wearing, skinny cigarette-smoking Herod. It gives the audience a respite from the scariness of the act.

Sebastian Bach as Jesus bows last and therefore claims the leading role, but Carl Anderson as Judas commanded the play from the first scene. His decision to hand Jesus over to the authorities doesn't come without a price to him. He is human, he is conflicted. Anderson's voice is booming, and he hits his notes on mark.

Superstar is a rock opera, and Bach has the rock star voice to pull it off. Jesus is not timid. He can scream and yell, and Bach isn't afraid to stretch his vocal chords in this way.

Mary Magdelaine, a prostitute

and a follower of lesus, is breathtaking in her role of caretaker. Mary doesn't know how to love lesus, and the song she sings about that love is perfect and beautiful. In many ways, the characters are all scared by lesus, even as they love him.

The Pharisees, led by booming bass Caiaphus, exult in their black-loaked characters. They are the antagonists of the play, they pay Judas' "blood money."

The set employs a two-level stage, with a walk high above the stage. This lest the Pharissees watch over the action of the play, while keeping to themselves. It is a colorful, painful, upliffing and heartbreaking play, it's not a play that only christians can enjoy, it doesn't force religion. It's an examination of the last days of a man that launched religion. There are no solutions, there is no resurrection.

### **ED HARCOURT** Here Be Monsters

Ed Harcourt's debut full-length album attempts to replicate Badly Drawn Boy's recipe for success that he found on his debut album, sensitive singer-songwriter writing quirky pop songs while incorporating as many musical styles as possible

Does he succeed? Well, sort of.

Fans of the heaps of British guitar bands that gained popularity in re-cent years (Coldplay, Travis etc.) would probably find something to en-joy in *Here Be Monsters*.

Unlike those bands, however, Harcourt is more recklessly experi-mental. He isn't afraid to take a seemingly normal song and warp it until it veers into completely unexpected ter-ritories.

Some songs seem to attempt weirdness for the sake of weirdness. While some artists can get away with this —most no-tably Beck — Harrount's excussions

Still, there are decent songs here.



In a mix of bustles and corsets, the UK Theatre department will perform Thornton Wilder's *The* Matchmaker next week.

It could be the humor, the Pulitzer prize-winning playwright or the opportunity to act in a British period piece, but whatever the reason, James Rodgers, the play's director, said that there's been a marked amount of response to this play.

"For the first time ever we had 80 people audition for a play — that's very high," Rodgers said.

The play's ensemble includes cast members from all walks of student life, including a Donovan scholar, a graduate student, a senior, a junior, a sophomore and a freshman. The diversity of this play is significant when considering the difficulty of finding a production that requires an "evenly divided" cast, says Rodgers. Another positive aspect for The Matchmaker was the "number of fine women's roles" that it offered theater students.

"I think anyone, no matter what their age, will enjoy this play. Everyone can take something from it. It's a farce comedy, with a lot of fast-paced action. It's very witty and fun, and has many moralizing qualities as well," said Keith Cox, a journalism senior who plays August in the play.

There will be an interesting twist with this production of the play. The sets have to be changed after every act because of the different time periods in which the play takes place. These set changes are time consuming, and Rodgers wanted to

avoid having three intermissions. The answer was the addition of "olio acts," which are short performance acts such as piano playing or a dance number, that occur while changing scenes behind the curtain. Cast members will perform them while people on stage move the sets. This is actually what would happen furing contemporary theatrical perfuring contemporary theatrical per-

formances of *The Matchmaker*, with the intent that people could move and socialize with other play-goers while sets were being changed and actors switched costumes.

Students with a taste for theater might find this play refreshing. French farces, Rodgers said, often focus on sex with lots of physical activity. This play, however, avoids the many innuendoes and sexual scenarios. According to Rodgers it could be called a "gentle farce," in that it's a very wholesome play that makes a precise comedic message about life.

"This play is about having adventure while you're living," Rodgers said.

The play will begin in Yonkers, N.Y., and move to New York City, where it will focus on the lives (particularly the romantic lives) of the story's main characters. Dolly Levi, a central character, plays the "match-maker," and Horace Vandergelder, another central character, is one of her works in progress. The sort of "gentle" comedy that play-goers can expect can be seen through such lines "99 percent of the people in the world are fools, and the rest of us are in danger of contracting it." Said by Horace Vandergelder, one of the play's main characters.

"It's full of comedy and action,

"It's full of comedy and action, and it has a lot of colorful characters in it you will probably remember for a long time. Come on out and see us, and we'll keep you laughing," Cox said





## **UK GRAD PREMIERS FILM ABOUT STEPHEN FOSTER**

Stephen Foster is honored at every UK basketball game, with a play in Bardstown and every time a child learns "Oh Susanna

But while people know Foster's songs, documentary filmmaker and UK graduate Patrick McNeese said that many people didn't know the true facts of Foster's life

"(Foster) was a true original," Mc-

(roster) was a true original, Mc-Neese said.

McNeese, who holds a bachelor of fine arts from UK, will present his docu-mentary Of Myth and Muse: Stephen

Foster and My Old Kentucky Home for the first time this weekend. Foster is a point of interest for Mc-Neese, who has made his life up of music and art activities.

"Nobody had brought together all Nobody had prought together all the strands of music arriving in the ear-ly to mid 1800s and produced a truly American song," McNeese said. "It was the American melting pot presented in popular culture terms.

popular culture terms.

The project, as with most independent film projects, didn't come without hardship. McNeese had to develop the film with a great degree of detail before he was even able to helpe the activities. he was even able to being the actual filming. Afterward, he worked to sell the film idea and then worked to produce the product he envisioned within the constraints of his budget.

You have to get a lot of bang for your dollars and not diminish your ror your dollars and not diminish your project because you cut corners, he said. "It's demanding art form on a lot of different levels, as it is in turn re-warding on a lot of different levels. The final product turned into

something he hopes will be a learning experience

"Documentary filmmaking at its best is a great resource because some-body else does all the research and the audience gets to become smarter for the price of the ticket, which in this case is free," he said.
