We flew back here from Geneva today and Mummy was greatly comforted to get your messages, she will write you in a day or so herself but it is not easy to concentrate on letter writing in these sad hours.

We went to Ruislyon after New Year and Mummy saw Grandpa that day, he was not

too well but there was no indication of his serious condition. On Monday night, Edwin spoke to us in Lucerne and said Grandpa was sinking fast, we tried to get home but did not arrive in time, he passed away peacefully.

On your letter morning  
The funeral is tomorrow (Friday) and we will go to London for the day and return here for a rest. It is peaceful here and

maybe in a few days we will adjust ourselves. Grandpa was nearly 80 years old and of course was lonely since Grandma passed away. It was heart breaking to see him in the Ward but he laughed and quipped almost to the end. He was a grand old man and very learned and wise.
