

### Instilling 'civic virtue' focus of campus group

Going against convention is never easy, but UK faculty and staff are making strides to change the University's traditional approach to scholarship.

Disturbed by what they see in students as an increasing trend toward individualism and a lack of concern for the common good, 13 staff and faculty members formed the Project Civic Committee last year.

"There is a growing feeling of the need for this kind of dimension to undergraduate education, but it's hard to get a handle on," said committee member Louis Swift, dean of Undergraduate Studies. "You can't simply require everyone to take a Undergraduate Studies. "You can't simply require everyone to take a course in it and expect them to be civically responsible. It's an attitude, an outlook. It's an ongoing concern that periodically gives rise to certain activities."

Those involved in the project say instilling a greater and truer sense of citizenship in students will ex-

insuling a greater and truer sense of citizenship in students will extend to the community by providing more effective leadership and informed citizen participation. "Universities are turning out citizens who are so individualistic and materialistic that society is not working together. We can't find solutions to complex problems," said committee member Ann Garrity, an administrative assistant in the Of-

fice of the Chancellor for the Lexington Campus.
"Our goal would be that every student leaving this campus be aware that they are a member of society and of what responsibilities that might entail beyond voting and paying taxes."

During the summer, the committee held meetings and presented a civic virtue and public service leadership program proposal to Chancellor for the Lexington Campus Robert Hemenway.

In February, it organized a multidisciplinary conference at the Carnahan House to generate campuswide interest in the project. A noted scholar and writer on matters of civic responsibility gave the keynote ic responsibility gave the keynote address. About 80 faculty and staff members attended and spent the day exchanging views on civic virtue and how it relates to undergraduate education.

Then in October, several campus offices and organizations sponsored a three-day event featuring lecturer Robert N. Bellah, a professor of sociology at the University of California a Berkeley. Bellah is the author of Habits of the Heart, a book exploring individualism and commitment in American life.
"What Bellah and his associates did when they published that book was to issue a clarion call to revaluate American culture and its basic values," said committee mem-

ber Emest Yanarella, a political science professor. "I see (this) as part of an academic call for us to reform the foundation of the liberal arts education."

Yanarella said UK, as a public university supported by state funds, as a larger responsibility than simply providing professional training. Project Civic is one part of a reform movement that has grown incrementally during the last few years to fulfill that responsibility. Two years ago, the new University Studies Program went into effect. It combines a more extensive liberal arts education with professional training to encourage students to have a broader understanding of the world and of their social responsibility.

For 18 years, the Office of Experiential Education has offered aca-

Almost three years ago, the Division of Student Affairs, through Experiential Education, initiated two institute programs to train potential community leaders.

UK said Friday that ads about the diding process would begin yesterlay in the Louisville and Lexipate wespapers.

The Board of Trustees authorized the solicitation of proposals at its decision was based on concern for the financial future of eastern Kentucky and Perability County in particular.

Mining will be allowed on six tracts of land — at Hurricane Fork, Laurel Fork, Beaver Dam Creek, Laurel Fork, Beaver Dam Creek, Knott and Perry counties. The 3,687 acres contain about 20 million tons of surface-minable coal.

The school uses portions of the 10,000-acre woods for biological research.

The mining of coal in the outlying tracts "would help insure additional years of economic activity in these eastern Kentucky counties," while preserving the main body of the forest for University use, the school said in September.

Companies submitting proposals must include histories of their ming operations, records of their environmental and reclamation efforts, proof of financial stability and assurances of cooperative research with UK in or near the mining sites.

Also, companies must estimate how much coal they plan to recover as well as the amount of royalties that will be paid to UK.

### Vegetarians find help, food on menu

UK Food Services is trying to find a way to accommodate campus vegetarians — something that is not easy to do.

such small groups," he said. Meat-free meals haven't been easy for vegetarians to come by, but changes are being made to solve that problem. There are several types of vegetarians, ranging from those who cut uneat but eat dairy products and eggs to those who do not consume any animal by-products at all. Vegetarians in the last category are known as vegans. At a meeting with several vegetarians students last month, Braun received a petition with about 300 signatures complaining about the absence of vegetarian entrees in Food Services offerings. In response to their requests, Braun has begun to implement new dishes such as vegetarian pizzas and subs.

Also in response to the petition, Food Services is gathering vegetarian recipes to test in the kitchen beginning soon before Christmas, as well as finding suppliers of specialized foods — such as veggie burgers and tempeh — that look and taste like meat but are made from vegetables and grains.

Food Services also is looking for schools that can train its cooks to

fix vegetarian dishes.
Cherie Oliver, a vegetarian, said she thinks more people would become vegetarians if it were easier to find suitable foods. She has been to wegetarian for a year and a half and a vegan for eight months.
Food Services' decision to offer vegetarian pizza is a "big step in the right direction," said Oliver, a clinical psychology and philosophy senior.

ior.

UK seems to be lagging behind other schools in offering vegetaring meals and in understanding students' philosophy about the ethics of eating, Oliver said. While some people at UK think of vegetarians as radical hippies, she said people are beginning to open their minds to what vegetarianism really is.

"I don't hink animals were put on the earth for humans," Oliver said.

People decide to become vegetar-ians for various health reasons, namely to reduce cholesterol levels. Others become vegetarians for ethi-

Others become vegetarians for ethi-cal reasons.

Oliver and other vegetarians want Food Services to offer vegetarian selections not only for their benefit, but also to increase campus aware-ness about vegetarian issues.

"These types of meals are long overdue on campus," said April Ritchie, a graduate student who has been a vegetarian for two years. Ritchie said she usually has to settle for a bag of potato chips for lunch because she cannot find any-thing else suitable and convenient on campus. The only other "safe" alternative to chips are salads — which she calls "rabbit food."



### Let UK off hook

Since the headquarters of the National Collegiate Athletic Association are located in Kansas, it's only natural to assume given recent events — that Dorothy and Toto are in charge The NCAA's inexplicable decision to allow the University of Nevada-Las Vegas to defend its college basketball title this eason instead of sitting out because of coach Jerry Tarkanian's troubles was shocking. It speaks volumes about the governing body's inability to be consistent or fair when it hands down punishments. The NCAA can't hammer down programs with Styrofoam nails. But that's what it did.

The decision opens up a few doors, too, one of which should be Kentucky's. C.M. Newton and Rick Pitton might want to get out the ruby slippers and saft telicking their heels. And ask the NCAA that the school be allowed to compete in the 1991 NCAA Tournament.

As it stands now, of course, UK can't. It is serving its second year of probation for violations that occurred under another coaching regime. When the sanctions were announced in the spring of 1989, they looked legitimate. UNLV — letting the bad guys go — now the sanctions don't. One of UNLV's loudest argu-ments for playing in the NCAA tourney is that the Runnin' Rebels are ranked No. 1 and have a tremendous chance of repeating their title-winning season of a year ago when they smashed Duke 103-73 in the NCAA final.

The Wildcats would be no lock to make the 64-team tour-ney next spring, but they are off to an impressive 3-0 start after rocking Notre Dame 98-90 Sat-urday afternoon in Indianapolis. However, UNLV is no lock et-ther. Sure the Rebels are a powderkeg. But they can be dif-fused.

fassed. Wildcats shouldn't have to stoop like the Rebels did, either, by giving up scholarships and the right to play in the 1991-92 tournament. If you examine the facts closely, the Cats have a case even Night Court's Dan Fielding couldn't lose.

If you remember the 1988-89 season you'll know what I mean. Then-coach Eddie Sutton had it right when he said Kentacky, in the midst of a 15-month investigation for alleged wrongdoing, was already on probation. Intense media coverage uncovered even the timiest mistakes. Under pressure, Sutton snapped at reporters several times during practices.



### Farmer gets taste of fun, confidence

INDIANAPOLIS - In his first INDIANAPOLIS — In his first two seasons as a Wildcat, Richie Farmer's vocabulary did not include the word "fun." Farmer did have his moments,

nailing a game-winning three-pointer against Ole Miss during his freshman season and icing the LSU game last year with six straight free

were isolated moments.
For the most part, Farmer spent a lot of time on the Kentucky bench wondering if he would ever regain the form that made him a McDonald's High School All-American and Kentucky's "Mr. Basketball" at Clay County in 1988.
But Farmer's woes may have been permanently changed for the better following his performance at Saturday's Big Four Classic. The 6-foot junior guard hit seven of 11 shots (including four of seven from the three-point line), soored 19 points, dished out four assists and did not commit a turnover in 23 minutes of play, leading the Cats to a 98-90 victory over Notre Dame.
"Farmer's play was terrific, and he gave us a big lift today," UK coach Rick Pitino said. "He got a little tired in the first half, and I told him."

With UK trailing 38-28 late in the

him."

With UK trailing 38-28 late in the first half, Farmer gave the Cats a tremendous boost. Entering the game in place of Woods with 2:55 left in the half, Farmer scored twice and had a pair of three-point assist to John Pelphrey, storming back to 40-38 at halftime.

The height of Farmer's performance came at the close of the half, hitting a shot to pull the Cats within two of the Irish. With 138 on the clock, Farmer waited to take the last shot. After rolling off a Deron Feldhaus pick, Farmer challenged Notre Dame's Brooks Boyer and 6-9 LaPhonso Ellis and hit a sweet, lefthanded baby hook shot to cap a 10-2 run by UK.

"I guess it was a good shot — a great shot," Farmer said.

The irony of the moment was not that Farmer hit an incredible shot, but that he had the ball in the clutch moment of the first half.

"I like having the ball in that type of situation," he said. "It's something I'm used to doing, and I'm really confident with my game right now.
"This is the first time I can hon-

really contident with my game right now.

"This is the first time I can honestly say I'm having fun at UK. I had a lot of doubts over my first two years, but I talked to coach Pitino and he told me your freshman and sophomore years are the hardest, After that, your junior and senior years are the most fun. I took his advice to go out and just have fun."



### IU controls game, Cards in 72-52 win





### Heath, Hollyday offered solid jazz performance

Jimmy Heath said in a recent in-terview that he has enjoyed life as a professor at Queens College in New York City. Saurday night, Heath held class at UK's Memorial Hall, delivering a brilliant lecture on the state of American jazz — and do-ing it with the saxophone and flute. Heath was the final act of the 13th annual Spotlight Jazz Series, sponsored by the Office of Minority Affairs and Student Activities Board. Saurday night was Heath's sec-ond trip to UK. His other perfor-mance was in 1980, and he prom-ised to return in 2000, "if I'm still around."

around."
After Saturday's show, the Spot-light Jazz Committee may want to consider bringing Heath back in

1991. Heath's quartet, which included a surprise visit from Bob Cranshaw of Sonny Rollins' band on bass (the other players were Greg Hutchinson on drums and Tony Purrone on gui-tar), treated the audience to eight songs that covered a wide range of Heath's musical abilities.

Heath opened the night on tenor saxophone with "Winter Sleaves" and "Grand Canyon Suit", both of which were very well performed. He then played a lovely tribute to the late Sarah Vaughn, "Sassy Samba," which was every bit as sassy as the lady it was written for. Heath showcased his musical diversity on Duke Ellington's "In a Sentimental Mood" in which he played flute before closing with a soprano saxophone. Hutchinson showed why Heath thinks the drummer is one of the most talented young jazz artists, when he played a two-minute solo on "Gingetbread Boy." Purrone also was outstanding on guitar, giving an especially memorable performance on the blues composition "Bluesville." Heath's quarret performed one encore, "Prince Albert," done in classic bebop style. Opening for Heath's quartet was 20-year-old alto saxophonist Christopher Hollyday, whose playing showed the audience that jazz is in the capable hands of an exciting new generation of artists. Hollyday y quartet opened a little roughly, playing "Appointment in Chana," off his 1989 Christopher Hollyday release. But after a few rough notes, Hollyday and his quartet (Ron Savage on drums, John Lockwood on bass and Larry Goldings on piano) settled into the jerky

Jackie McLean composition. The song also showcased Savage's light-ning playing, which rivaled the in-tensity with which Hollyday plays the saxophone.

Altithough he could still pass for a high school senior with his innocent school boy smile and demeanor, his music at times has the maturity of a jazz veteran. Heavily influenced by the sounds of bebop saxophonist Charlie Parker, Hollyday's performance of "Appointment in Chana" was a good example of where he stands musically. While the song was performed very well, it was not as smooth aperformance as some of Hollyday's peers, such as Brandford Marsalis. While speed comes as no problem to the lanky 20-year-old Massachusetts native, he has been cited by some critics for his shortcomings on slower tunes. Saturday night, however, Hollyday showed little trouble when he performed the one ballad in his five-number set, "Twilight Mist."


The performance was a smooth mistryretation that for a few moments sounded as if the Bird himself had been resurrected.

### Layers of 'Cake' add to listener's appetite for more music

Scotland has blessed the world once again. The band's name is the Trash Can Sinatras, and they are causing a stir on the college alternative music charts with their debut album Cake.

As funny as the name sounds, you will not want to chuck this album in the trash. You will, however, want to savor as much Cake as you possibly can.

The obscure name comes from their pre-contract days, when they played mostly cover tunes, including some originally recorded by Frank Sinatra himself. But don't look for anything by 'Ol Blue Eyes on this album. Do look for layer upon sweet layer of the merriest guitar melody, smoothed out with a creamy, rich cello. Cake was definitely the best choice of titles for this wonderful piece of musical confectionary.

The first slice the Sinatras offer from Cake is one of the best. "Obscurity Knocks" sounds like the Smiths, only with a happier tone. Not a hint of bitterness on this creation. Just dreamy music with chord progressions that you can really sink your teeth into. Lead singer John Douglas has the perfect voice for this type of music. His is the voice that makes you feel good. This is a music that is almost ceasing to exist. Douglas laments for the lost melodies. They are resurrected at his command.

The album falls short, for probably its only time, on the second track, "Maybe I Should Drive." It seems that the song's key makes harmony a little too difficult. Right

in the middle of a line you'll hear the harmony grow sour. The backing vocals begin singing the exact same notes as the lead, making them sound like drunken sailors. On other occasions the harmony is just plain terrible.

However, the only real musical flaws on the album can be found here. Just flip ahead to track three on your CD player because track two is the worst song on the album. It's not completely bad. Let's just say that it was foiled with good musical intentions.

Prepare to drown in the sleepy sad sound of "Thrupenny Tears." If just the basic song doesn't have you in tears, you will break down when the violin weaves a compassionate web of musical delight with raindrop guilar chords. Douglas voice is at the very center of the web. The rasult is a beautiful and natural creation. The song is sad but not depressing. The Sinarras really prove their versatility with this piece.

### Caudill was the conscience of Kentucky

Harry M. Caudill was a wonderful writer, a splendid story teller and a gifted teacher. But most important, he never left tucky eastern Ken

Born in Appalachia, Caudill never forgot his roots, returning home after graduating from college to help the mountain peo-ple work toward change. In 1963, Caudill published Night Comes to the Cumberlands, which spurred President Lyndon B. Johnson's famous War on Poverty.

The book was important not only because of the issues it

aised but who raised them.
As political commentator Al Smith remarked Thursday after learning of Caudill's suicide: "Harry Caudill, more than any-one else, put the problems of Appalachia on the conscience of the American people. ... There are many problems in the re-gion, and I attribute the awareness of these problems to the pio neering work done by Caudill; he was brilliantly informed

about the plight of Appalachia."

Since Night was published, many people have come to Appalachia trying to "fix" the region. Few of them make any progress because they fail to understand the region in the same way that Caudill did in his lifetime.

If college students can learn anything from Caudill's 68 years in this world, it is the importance of place and remembering one's home. Caudill could have been successful, had he moved out of Appalachia. But he chose to return to the region where he was born in order to help his people. If true change is to come to Appalachia, the region will need more people like Caudill who are willing to return home after college and beome its leaders

Whether or not people agree with Caudill's causes, they should admire him for raising questions that needed answers.

Many of those questions still have not been answered, and the people of Appalachia still face many of the same problems they did when Night was published. But at least the state's and nation's leaders recognize that something needs to be done to help the region, and Caudill can be credited for th



### U.S. attempt to get tough with Iraq may backfire

merica's testosterone levels seem to be declining these seem to be declining these seem to be declining the seem to be some five-day glory war, but instead could become another Vienna.

Americans are renowned for the control vienna.

Americans are renowned for the set with the Middle East vigil is not surprising.

But President George Bush apparently overestimated how long-the wave of American support would last, and now he is finding out how fickle we can be — especially when faced with rising gasoline prices.

So in an apparent goodwill gesture, Bush offered to send Secretary of State James A. Baker III to Iraq and hold talks in Washington with Iraqi Foreign Minister Tarriq Aziz.

What a move. Now that Bush have to with the United Nations seal of approval to use the more that 250,000 U.S.

The move seems designed more to appease the increasingly dove-ish American public than to reach any sort of peaceful resolution to the conflict.

In his address to the American people Friday, Bush made it clear

In his address to the American people Friday, Bush made it clear that by offering to swap high-ranking officials in talks, the intention is not to find a peaceful solution. Instead, he wants to use this opportunity to threaten Iraq in person with U.S. military might.

Bush needs to realize that if he sticks with his ultimatum of Iraq's unconditional withdrawal from Kuwait, Saddam Hussein cannot back down and there will be a military

down and there will be a military



By demanding unconditional withdrawal, Bush has Hussein backed in a corner with no way out. The martyr mindset of the Arab world is such that to back down is a disgrace worse than death itself. If Hussein gave the order to pull out from Kuwait with no compromise from the United States, his people would turn on him instantly for what, to them, would be extreme cowardice. He would lose his office and quite possibly his life.

However, Bush is not in a much better position.

better position.

If he pulls U.S. troops out of the Middle East after more than four months of buildup and aggressive talk, allowing Iraq to remain in Kuwait, Americans will turn on him also.

Not with the vehemence of the

Not with the vehemence of the Arab people, but in the next election, and his presidency until then will be a sham.

The only non-military, non-bloodshed answer to all this lies in the talks Bush has offered to understake with the Iraqi government.

But it must be an open talk genuinely directed toward peace, not more threats and ultimatums, as Bush has outlined it to be.

Ultimately, Bush does hold the trump card in this bluffing game. The United States does have superior military force, and we do have in-

ternational support, although some-what grudgingly in places. However, the Iraqi army won't make it easy. After their well-trained army, al-

After their well-trained army, al-most every man in Iraq has signed up to be in the reserves. The news shows us middle-aged, overweight Iraqis from all career fields lined up with guns and bayonets. Never underestimate the power of fanaticism. These are people who would rather die than come home losers.

Chances are, the United States would "win," whatever that means. But many would die — probably too many for Bush to be re-elected.

These talks might avoid that. Iraq has set down that the Israelialestinian conflict be included in e talks — and that could be the an-

the talks — and that could be the answer.

Perhaps Iraq is holding Kuwait hostage for freedom for the Arab land taken from the Arabs in 1967 by the Jews. Perhaps a mediation of that long-standing Arab-Western World dispute could avert this war. But that will only happen if Bush abandons his policy of unconditional withdrawal and quits making threats and issuing ultimatums. Hussein isn't a madman, nor are the Arab people fanatical crazies. They appear as such to our more temperate, Western mindset, but then again, so many wars have started when people fail to acknowledge that another culture is not wrong, but different.


