Trading tickets for cars 'common'

Investigation: Newly appointed committee to review fairness of 20-year-old practice

The practice of swapping game tickets for the use of a car by athletics officials at UK is being reviewed by a committee. President Lee Todd told the Lexington Herald-Leader that the longstanding practice is something that "doesn't feel right," Todd said.

More than 40 current athletics-program employees have each traded a pair of football season tickets and a pair of basketball season tickets to local dealerships for the use of a car, according to UK records. "When I look at compensation across an institution, when one department has perks that

another doesn't, it doesn't feel right," Todd said. "I want people on this campus to be treated the same as people in the Athletics Department." The committee looking at the issue, headed by law professor Robert Lawson, was appointed by Todd in the wake of an NCAA investigation of the school's football program. The tickets are provided without charge to Athletics Department employees as part of their compensation, athletics spokesman Brooks Downing

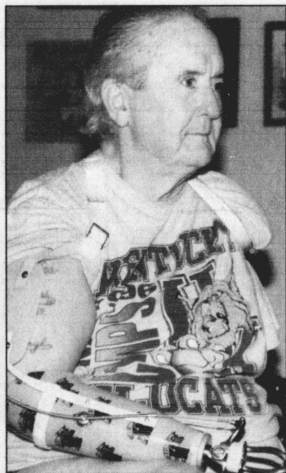
said. Not all the employees are allowed to trade tickets for cars. The list of eligible workers is approved annually by Athletics Director Larry Ivy, Downing said. "I don't know if there's actual criteria that exist," said Downing, who is on the list and receives a car. Among those participating in the deals are Ivy, every head coach and compliance director Sandy Bell. The Athletics Department does not govern what type of

cars the employees receive or the length of the agreements. Many workers change vehicles three to four times a year, and many don't have formal leases, according to the person in charge of the program, Associate Athletics Director John Cropp. He said he doesn't call any of the dealerships involved to monitor the terms of the transactions. "I don't know why I would do that," Cropp said. Cropp added that the employees are

responsible for taxes and insurance. Cropp doesn't know how long athletics officials have been getting cars for tickets, but he said that some dealers told him they've done it for at least 20 years. While Ivy did not comment personally, he released a statement through Downing pointing out that tickets-for-cars programs are par for the course at Division I schools. "It is a common practice," Ivy said.

Go Big Blue: Lexington man says prosthetic arm doesn't begin to show his adoration for UK teams

J.C. Christie's life evolves around three things: God, family and UK basketball. In fact, Christie is such a die-hard fan that he's made his allegiance permanent — he has UK logos printed on his prosthetic arm. He hails from Florida, but moved to Lexington eight years ago. He said the design on his arm, made last Thursday at Hightech Artificial Limbs, shows just a fraction of his adoration for UK basketball. Christie has many opinions about the program. "I hope we can keep Coach Tubby Smith around for a while," he said. "And I'd like to see a series with Transylvania. I love cross-town rivalries. You can tell them the number one UK fan said that." It was in Lexington where Christie met his wife of six years, Margie. He refers to her as the "second biggest UK fan in the house." Margie has their home decorated with UK dolls, candles and other decorations. In fact, when her grandson was born, it was Margie who said his name should be Kyle, after UK basketball great Kyle Macy. "She's a good Christian woman," he said. "I wish everybody could know how good of a woman she is." Christie is a regular attendant of

the Pentecostal Church of Jesus Christ in Lexington. "God is my mainstay. He gave me my life, my family and everything I have." He said he's a sports fan in general. He loves to eat Chinese food while watching UK sports or Winston Cup racing. "I am a Jeff Gordon freak," he said. One of his favorite memories relating to UK is when he ran into basketball players Keith Bogans and Cliff Hawkins. "I talked to them and got them to sign a napkin," he said. "Now my wife won't let those autographs out of her sight." Christie said he's never been to see a basketball game at Rupp Arena, because his fixed income simply doesn't leave him enough money. He said he doesn't let his illness keep him from enjoying life. "Being in a wheelchair does not keep me from enjoying sports," he said, proudly adding that he still drives his own car. Basketball isn't the only UK sport Christie follows. He said he wished the women's team would had more success this year. As far as predicting the outcome of the men's basketball team, Christie said he's trying to keep a realistic view. "I think we're a solid sweet 16 team," he said. "But you always stick with your Cats."

Timetable set to hold Staff Senate elections

Making it happen: Task force chooses officers from various campus departments

The Staff Senate Development Task Force made another step toward the formation of UK's first-ever Staff Senate last Thursday, when they elected five officers and established a tentative timeframe for staff elections. Ninety people out of UK's more than 10,000 employees will serve as senators, said Russ Williams, a staff representative on the Board of Trustees and the individual who originally presented the idea of the Staff Senate to the Board. This makes the job of the task force, charged with conducting the elections of the senate, a rather difficult one, he said. "It's no small feat (to develop this election process)," Williams said. The task force is composed of 21 people, but Williams said he expects it to expand to 40 within the next couple weeks. Jenie Caldwell, who was elected chairwoman of the task force, said the group will meet every other week until the senate's first scheduled meeting on July 11. Caldwell, who has been an employee for 14 years and is

the director for the AKAdvancement program in Human Resource Development, said she is excited about the senate finally coming into being. "It will be a wonderful day," Caldwell said. In addition to Caldwell, other officers elected include: Treasurer, Suzanne Scheff, College of Engineering Secretary, Dave Vantreese, College of Education Election Officer, Ann Livingstone, Office of International Affairs Parliamentarian, Sean Scott, Employee Benefits Department.

- The task force created a timeframe to help elect 90 senators:
- April 1-2, nominations of senators accepted
- April 27-May 17, conduction of multiple elections of senators available
- May 24, final election results available
- June 17, orientation program for new staff senators
- July 11, first Staff Senate meeting.

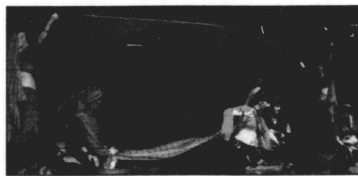
Students hope to travel to Suriname to dance

Going south: Doctoral student must raise \$9,000 to take group to South America

A UK dance instructor hopes to give her students what she calls the opportunity of a lifetime this summer. Aminata Baruti, a doctoral student in anthropology, received a grant from the Kentucky Foundation for Women in Suriname, South America. And she would like for the eight members of Sabi Diri, her dance company, to go to Suriname for the experience. To do this, Baruti will need to raise at least \$9,000, which would cover the cost of the trip for each student. To raise the money, the group, which practices various forms of African and other ethnic dances, will be accepting donations. They are also planning to hold a benefit show at the Lexington Children's The-

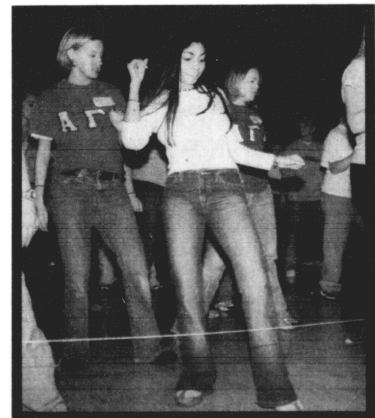
ater to collect money. The performance, which will feature Sabi Diri and several guest performers, will be March 30. Baruti said the experience would broaden the students' understanding of other cultures. "It will be a unique opportunity of cultural exchange," she said. While in Suriname, Baruti and the company members would learn more about dancing. They would also be teaching, running workshops and participating in dance concerts and a cultural arts festival. The festival is run by members of Baruti's family, who are from Suriname. "The Suriname dance is my roots, basically," Baruti said. "And I'd like to add it to my repertoire." Baruti has studied several North and South American dances, including Caribbean,

Haitian and Cuban forms. She said all of these are African-based, although each has its own specific style. In addition to learning new dance styles, members of the dance company are looking forward to the trip. Jason Thompson, a theatre junior and Sabi Diri member, said he is excited about experiencing a new culture as well as getting some serious dance training. He said he views it as a life-altering experience.

"I think my personality will be different when I get back," he said. If they can raise the money, Sabi Diri members will meet up with Baruti after her first week in Suriname and then stay for three weeks. Teresa Brown, an arts administration senior, said this trip is another big step in the evolution of the group. "I want to see the company go to the next level," Brown said.

Former president accepts responsibility

Former President Charles Wethington accepted responsibility for the football program's problems Friday during a taped television interview. The interview, on WKYT-TV in Lexington, aired Saturday morning. Wethington tried to stay apprised on what was going on in the Athletics Department. As part of a weekly directors' meeting every Thursday, then-Athletics Director C.M. Newton presented him with a report on what was going on. Wethington said, "There was never any question that they reported to me and I was ultimately responsible for the UK football program," he said. Wethington also explained that Athletics Director Larry Ivy's one-year contract extension and 10 percent pay increase was not done in secret. The Board of Trustees approved it as part of the operating budget in June 2001, Wethington said.

Task force co-chair speaks at meeting

Members of the President's Commission on Women met Friday, where they heard a report from Phyllis Nash, co-chair of the Top-20 Task Force. Members of the commission asked that the task force include as one of its measures of diversity the percentage of women in executive managerial positions. They also continued their discussion of identifying gender-related problems and possible solutions.

Top-20 Task Force to conduct forums

The task force charged by President Lee Todd to identify measures by which UK will use to judge its effort to attain Top-20 status by the year 2020 will conduct two open forums for faculty and staff members. The forums are scheduled for noon to 1 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 12 in the Center Theater of the Student Center and from noon to 1 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 13 in the Hospital Auditorium.

Speaker to discuss Copyright Act

Jonathan Waterson, activist and musician, will be coming to UK to speak about the Digital Millennium Copyright Act. The DMCA was passed by Congress in 1998 and has effects relating to copyrighted works, from personal use to academic research, and the circumvention of copyright protection systems. Waterson's speech will be at 6 p.m. Monday, Feb. 11 in the Student Center Room 211. A question and answer session will follow Waterson's presentation. The event is free and open to the public.

The 35-year-old singer, who released the hit album *The Velvet Rope* in 1997, is nearing the end of a long tour in support of her latest album, *All for You*.

Office won't disband Auburn fraternity

AUBURN, Ala. — A fraternity's national office has decided not to disband its Auburn University chapter in the fallout from a Halloween party in which several members dressed in blackface and afro wigs. Stephen Becker, administrative secretary for the Beta Theta Pi General Fraternity, said the organization's Board of Trustees has decided to suspend the chapter rather than close it down, as originally announced. The university, which has withdrawn its recognition of the fraternity, will have the final say on reinstatement. The issue must go before the Committee on Fraternities and Sororities. The general fraternity disbanded the chapter in November because of racially offensive costumes worn at the fraternity's Halloween Ball.

Execution of retarded inmates banned

RICHMOND, Va. — The Virginia Senate has approved a ban on executions of retarded inmates, but further action is stalled pending a U.S. Supreme Court ruling on a case involving a man currently on death row. The measure passed without debate Friday on a vote of 49-0. Eighteen states already have such a prohibition, said state Del. James F. Almand, sponsor of the House version of the legislation.

INTERNATIONAL NEWS

Two Palestinian gunmen shot dead

BEERSHEBA, Israel — Two Palestinian gunmen sprang from a car and sprayed automatic gunfire at Israelis outside a military base in this southern desert city Sunday, killing two soldiers and seriously wounding five people before the attackers were shot dead by troops. In apparent retaliation, Israeli warplanes dropped three bombs on the main Palestinian security installation near the Mediterranean coast in Gaza City. Security officials evacuated the building before the attack, but more than a dozen people were taken to the hospital, most suffering from shock and from cuts caused by broken glass, hospital officials said.

Calling police now a difficult choice

Decisions, decisions: Students weigh options for dealing with noisy neighbors

To call the cops, or not to call the cops.

Thanks to the Lexington Area Party Plan, this is now the proverbial question on many students' minds who want to sleep through the night in peace, but often suffer while "Be My Lover" pulsates through the walls until 5 a.m.

Complaining about loud neighbors has never been limited to older residents of local neighborhoods, but that call to the cops at 3:25 a.m. comes with a higher price.

Now that the plan has been in effect for two months, being a good neighbor is a condition that students living off campus must face.

"Parties have completely destroyed my relationship with my neighbors," said Andrea Menendez, a theatre junior.

Menendez said her neighbors have parties once or twice a week.

"We called the cops twice on them in one night," Menendez said. "They still continued to be loud."

But one more thing Menendez and other students must worry about in addition to the plan is retaliation by the offending group.

"They threw puke on the side of our house to get back at us," Menendez said.

Some students try to find other ways to deal with the problem.

Adam Lipschutz, a finance junior who lives at Royal Lexington, said, "I would never snitch on a neighbor, or anyone, for that matter. If your neighbors are just trying to have a good time and they're

being loud, just go talk to them."

But when it comes to reporting violators, neighbors, especially students, don't have many options.

"I feel like the only thing I can do is either talk to my neighbors, or call the police," said Darby Schulman, a psychology sophomore.

Schulman says her neighbors play loud music while driving into the parking lot, run up and down their stairs and talk loudly on their patio during late hours.

Schulman said she has tried everything to prevent her neighbors from being reported.

"I have gone next door about six times and asked them to be quiet," she said.

Schulman said she has discussed the problem with her landlord but it didn't work.

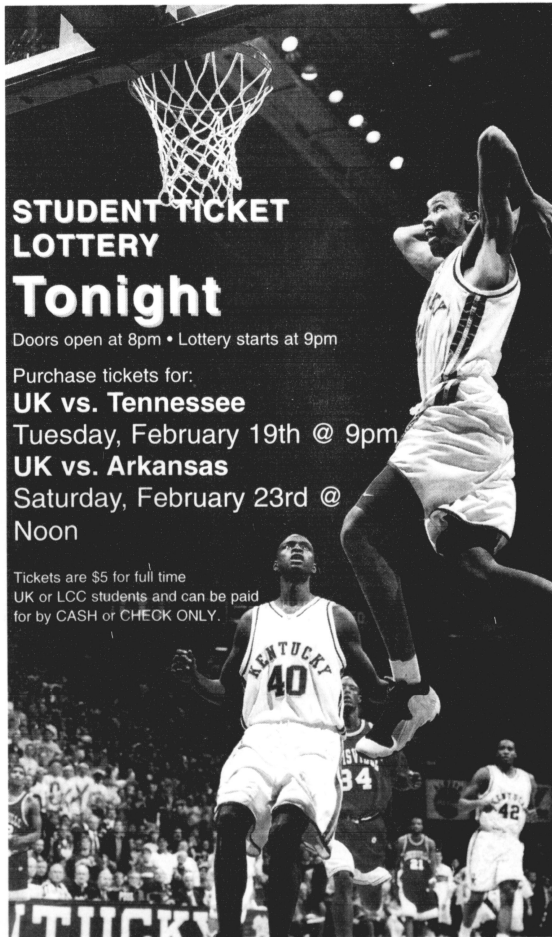
Schulman said that landlords should help students out so they don't have to report their neighbors to the police.

But Kige Kiger, who is a landlord at Wassamer Properties, said landlords are not responsible for dealing with unruly neighbors—that is a job for the police.

One way to avoid "snitching" on offending neighbors is to establish relationships beforehand, said David Cooper, vice president of the Neighborhood Association on Elizabeth Street.

"If you're going to have a party, tell your neighbors beforehand. They will appreciate it and be less likely to hassle you," Cooper said.

"Consideration and tolerance are two things that both neighbors must have in order to get along and have peace with each other," he said.

Hannah Kunz, a hospitality management senior, said that chastity is keeping yourself pure until marriage.

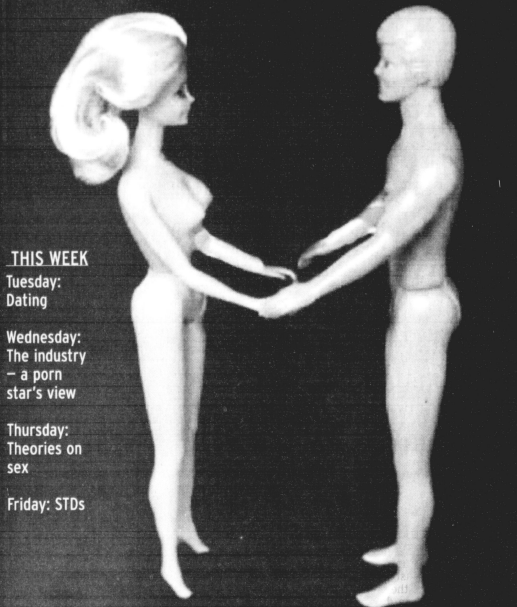

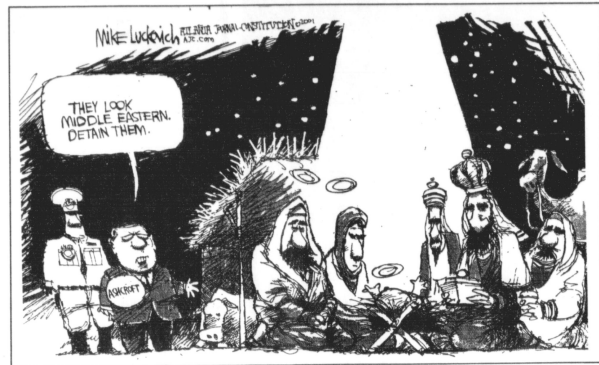

Ticket surcharge should go to Rupp

Long lottery lines, bad seats, expensive tickets — all problems that many students deal with just to get to the basketball game.

And the situation may get worse. With the possibility of up to a 5 percent ticket surcharge, students as well as other fans may have to pay some extra money for their coveted basketball tickets.

Representatives Bob Heleringer, R-Louisville, and Tim Feeley, R-Crestwood, proposed the ticket surcharge bill.

While the bill could benefit Rupp Arena, it also proposed the idea of bringing an NBA team to Louisville.

Rupp could indeed benefit from this surcharge because \$15 million is needed to complete renovations on the arena. A skimpy 2002 state budget led to the halt of Rupp's construction, and by the looks of it the construction will stay as is — lots of mud, unused cranes and fenced-off sidewalks.

Undoubtedly, the construction needs to be finished. It's causing quite an eyesore for downtown as well as problems for the businesses affected by the construction — the extra money would be beneficial for just this purpose.

But why should Lexingtonians be held responsible for gathering money to lure an NBA team to Louisville, especially when the chances of getting an NBA team aren't guaranteed?

And why should the funding come from ticket sales of other sporting events? It's silly to impose a surcharge for tickets that will primarily serve to benefit the building of an arena in another city, especially when Rupp needs so much work.

If the state can't budget a third installment of \$15 million for repairs in progress, how can it expect to budget a whole new arena?

It seems unfair to only charge sport-goers for this purpose. Theoretically, an NBA team would benefit everyone — hotels, businesses and people looking for entertainment, but if the state really wants to pursue an NBA team, everyone benefitting should pitch in, not just those who have a love for sports.

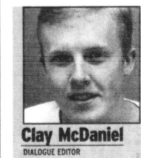

I am a minority, therefore I am persecuted

Judging from everything I have read and seen this month, I suppose I must keep my comments about race within the confines of Black History Month (the month formerly known as February). In the past few weeks there has been an outpouring of appreciation and education from every corner, from McDonald's to newspapers to college campuses to President Bush himself. These are all good things, of course, but they rarely delve into the important issues facing America today.

Unless your head has been buried somewhere for the last decade, you have taken notice of the attempt by many "enlightened" people to make a victim out of every person in America. If you are not a white male, or you are but have some sort of handicap, or you are but prefer the company of other males, then you are the subject of persecution and your rights deserve special protection by the federal government.

Somewhat unrelated, I had the good fortune to attend a lecture last week by Mildred Bailey from the Department of Minority Affairs entitled "Why We Celebrate Black History Month." I enjoyed Bailey very much, and her ample evidence as to how severely blacks have been persecuted throughout American history. She is absolutely right, for race relations will long remain a stain upon our national fabric.

Where I found fault in her argument was when she implied that blacks face the same unabashed racism today that they faced during the Civil War.

She spoke of a wretched, spine-tingling speech given by a state senator from Virginia circa 1860, but then followed up by saying that this is what blacks are up against today. But it seems to me, being a straight white male of European descent, that anyone who argues that America today has the same attitude toward race that it did more than 100 years ago or even 50 years ago, is either plain ignorant or else is playing dirty politics.

This is not to suggest that racism has been eliminated within our borders. But one makes a big mistake when speaking only of black problems, and relating the root cause of each of those to racism and slavery.

The unspoken truth behind the problems of every victim group seeking protection under law is that they are not just problems of that particular group. Inner-city crime and poverty is an American problem, not just a black problem.

Visual trash, it's not at all — I want my MTV

When MTV launched on Aug. 1, 1981 with its first music video, the Buggles, aptly titled "Video Killed the Radio Star," it marked the birth of an exciting new medium that caused controversy across the board.

Almost immediately realizing that appearance would now count for half of their success, many artists debated the new focus on music videos as a primary marketing tool for their singles. While some considered it a revolutionary way to connect with fans who might otherwise never see them, others resented the fact that they now had to look good as well. They claimed the emphasis was no longer on music but on style.

On the other side of the boob tube, parents worried that this MusicTelevision frenzy could negatively impact their children. Now responsible for stimulating the eyes as well as the ears, artists often turned to rebellious looks and sexual performances as stock methods of creating a good video, and in turn, cranking out a hit.

While parents, musicians and media critics simultaneously referred to music videos as visual trash or art nouveau, for teenagers, there was no controversy. Their collective shout could be heard around the country, and later around the world: I want my MTV!

Although I was only a year old when this new station hit the airwaves, my childhood memory is peppered with images of MTV. A bold move that set the tone for a cable channel that had no idea what lay ahead, the launch signified a new medium without precedent or boundaries, which meant that no one knew how MTV would impact artists' careers or just how big it would become.

Pat Benatar was one of the first artists to benefit from this new rock channel. MTV made her a recognizable personality, along with other artists and bands such as John Mellencamp and U2 who were beginning to gain popularity.

Almost immediately, MTV realized just how well it filled a huge market niche and began to capitalize on its unique position in the music and entertainment industries. The station also brought a variety of artists and bands into the mainstream, often catapulting them into stardom.

Over the years, many of my clearest memories revolve around MTV. I will never forget the world premiere of Michael Jackson's groundbreaking "Thriller" video and the combination of terror and titillation it brought to my 4-year-old mind.

I will never forget watching a young Madonna proudly proclaim on "American Bandstand" that her only goal was to one day rule the world.

And I will never forget the grief I felt when MTV broke into their programming to announce that Pedro Zamora, one of the most popular cast members of "The Real World 3," had just lost his painful and hard-fought battle with AIDS.

From the big hair of the 80s heavy metal bands to the big pants of the 90s alternative grunge rockers, MTV has evolved and changed with the face of pop music, often setting the trends in fashion, music and TV.

One of the few constant staples in the lives of Generations X and Y, MTV has shaped our world, our ideals and our musical tastes.

In 2002, the year this remarkable station turns 21, I am still proud to say it — I want my MTV.

Men's tennis serves top teams two losses

Moving: Cats fall to UCLA, defeat two top 10 squads

The UK men's tennis team put itself in position to move up in the rankings with upsets of two top 10 teams at theUSTA/ITA National Indoor Championships at the Louisville Tennis Club this weekend.

After a 4-2 loss to No. 3 UCLA Thursday, the No. 23 Cats came back Friday to defeat No. 8 Southern Methodist 4-1. Then, UK completed the tournament by beating arch-rival No. 4 Tennessee, 4-2, in stylish fashion.

UK Coach Dennis Emery said he could not have been happier with the way his team persevered after two heartbreaking losses to the Bruins this week. The Cats lost their first match of the season, 4-3, to the Bruins Tuesday prior to the rematch on Thursday.

"One thing we learned after we were in that position is you can't hope that someone gives it to you," Emery said. "You have to step up there and take it."

The Cats confidence is as high as ever now, and it is attributed to playing at the same level as the top teams in the country. Emery said a couple points that went awry against UCLA are the difference in UK being ranked ahead of the teams it played this weekend.

"We're 7-2 and actually are two points away from being 9-0, and having three wins in the top five," Emery said.

"We had match points on UCLA the first day and match points the second day. We potentially could be No. 1 in the country right now had we won both of

those matches."
Freshman Jesse Witten's consistent play and the surprise performance of sophomore Rahim Esmail lead the way for the Cats.

Both players went 3-0 in singles action with Witten beating three players ranked in the top 15, but Esmail's performance led to high praise by teammate Evan Austin.

"Rahim stepped up and was a huge surprise for us," Austin said. "He's going to be huge for us the rest of the year."

Esmail said Emery deserves credit for the team's performance.

"Coach has been really good with the team and really patient with us," Esmail said. "I think he knows our potential, and is learning how to deal with a really good job right now."

The Cats hope Esmail keeps playing consistently because they do not expect the competition to get any easier.

After a dual match against Florida Gulf Coast the Cats head into Southeastern Conference play against No. 1 Georgia and aforementioned Tennessee.

Emery said this weekend's performance is a confidence builder going into SEC play.

"We know what you're up against when you're playing the No. 4 and No. 1 ranked teams in the country on the road," Emery said this weekend.

"We know what a challenge that is going to be, and hopefully we keep stepping up to the challenge."

If this weekend is any indication as to how well the Cats can play then Austin feels good about their chances.

"It ended up being a great week for us," Austin said. "We've definitely gained a ton of confidence and realized we can compete for a championship."

USC 74, UK 73

Cats' upset bid fails in the end

No. 9 South Carolina eludes Cats, extends UK losing streak to nine

The UK women's basketball team showed more confidence and effort than in its last meeting with the No. 9 South Carolina Lady Gamecocks, but still found a way to lose, 74-73, Sunday at Memorial Coliseum.

"We didn't defend when we were down in South Carolina," UK Coach Benadette Mattox said of her team's 29-point loss to the Lady Gamecocks on Jan. 20. "This was the first time the whole team came out fearless."

USC Coach Susan Walvius recognized a greater intensity by UK on defense, but was more impressed with a UK offense that shot nearly 49 percent from the field after managing only 49 points in Columbia, S.C. last month.

"You really have to give Kentucky a lot of credit," Walvius said. "They were a little more poised offensively. There was a two-minute lapse in each half when we were able to get out and make a run, and that was all the difference in the world."

After closing the first half on a 12-2 run USC led 46-36 at the half. But UK began the second half with a 19-4 run and led 55-50 with 11:41 to play. USC reclaimed the lead at 56-55 after two lines Ajanovic baskets with 9:56 remaining.

The teams traded leads, but USC led 74-70 with 1:18 remaining. Three 3-point attempts by sophomore SeSe Helm, freshman Sara Potts and freshman Danyelle Payne failed, but Potts finally connected with one of her three 3s with four seconds to play.

UK fouled USC's Shaunzinski Gortman who missed the front end of a one-and-one. But UK could not get off a shot in the final 3.8 seconds and lost its ninth straight.

"They played with a little more confidence than when we played them at our place," said USC's Jocelyn Penn who scored 21 points.

Potts scored a career-high 21 and Helm added 24 points to keep the Cats close.

"It pumps us up because we just got done playing the ninth-ranked team and lost by one point," Helm said.

Despite the heartbreak of a close loss, Potts said the experience of playing a top ranked team closely helps a team desperate for a win heading into a stretch of games against No. 14 Florida, No. 6 Vanderbilt and No. 3 Tennessee.

"It also shows us that we do have what it takes to win these games."
