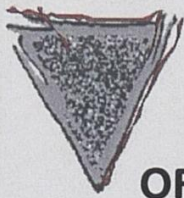

HIV Testing

On Thursday, Nov. 6 there will be free anonymous HIV testing at the Pride Center between 6 pm and 8pm. The oraquick mouth swab technique will be used. This test gives a result in about twenty minutes. If the test is reactive, blood sample will be taken. The results are back in two weeks for the confirmatory blood tests.

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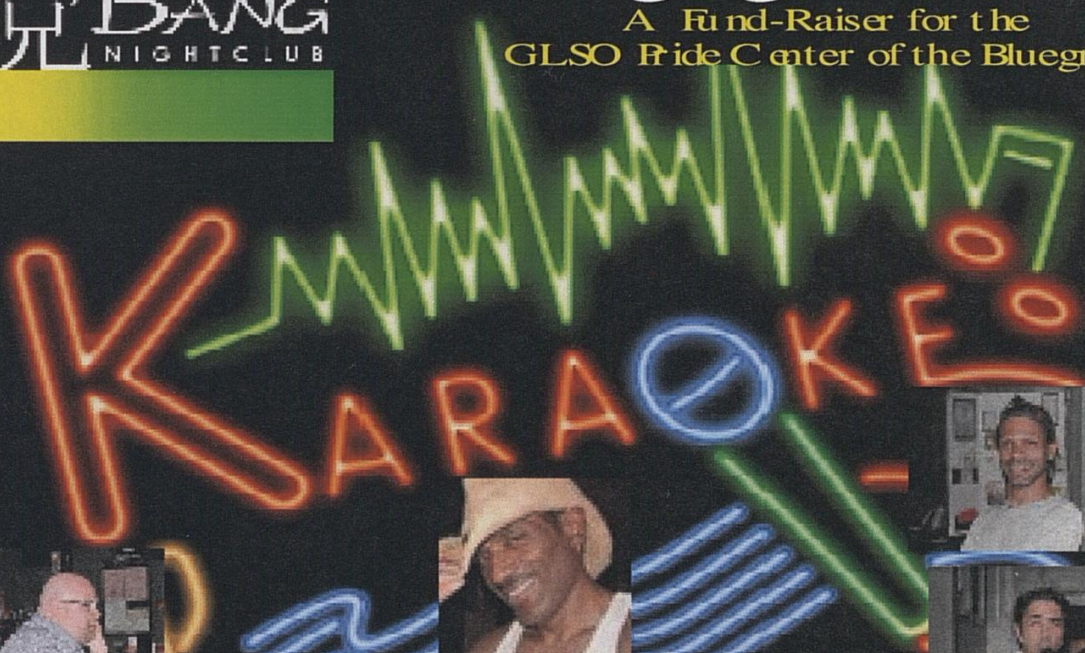

What I found was a room full of ladies smiling and welcoming me. I sang for John, the director, and was placed in a different voice section than I had been in the past. It was a perfect fit for me. My section was a small one, but one that was referred to as "bi-sectional". This meant I would sing second soprano in a three-part piece and alto one in a four-part piece. I was finally myself and found several people in the chorus I knew from the past.

The next year a solo became available for my voice part. I was told in high school that I would never be a soloist. I was never given the chance back then to prove to myself that I could sing a solo.

I sang for the group and made many errors in pitch and rhythm. But with practice, each rehearsal became better. Concert night came. My solo was the first song that we sang. I did it! It wasn't perfect, but I had conquered my fear of rejection. I proved to myself that once you walk through the door you could achieve your

dreams.

SisterSound continues to be a place not only of beautiful music, but one of acceptance and love, not only to the lesbian community, but also for everyone. Not all members of the group are lesbian. But it doesn't matter. We are sisters.

Hate Speech

In September I wrote an article about the murder of two people at the Unitarian Universalist Church in Tennessee. The shooter shouted anti-gay and anti-liberal statements as he opened fire on the congregation. The police found books in his possession that included statements concerning liberals and gays "ruining this country", with inflammatory statements such as "liberals should be shot."

Is there a point where freedom of speech should be limited? Should there be laws about calling people prejudicial/hateful names? There are some social agreements not to use certain words, but, of course, some people ignore such agreements.

I encourage others to write about their perceptions of "hate speech" and the various efforts to limit the use of certain words within our society. In October, a young journalism student contributed an article about several young men who were verbally harassed in a Louisville McDonalds. The article contained a number of the harsh words that were used. A few people have objected to our printing of those words and it is true that most newspapers do not print them. In general, we do not print words that disparage or insult people.

We think it is important, however, for people to know the verbally abusive language that is used against us; just saying they were harassed does not really reflect the seriousness of the verbal assault. So in the future, we will not automatically censor such words but will only print them if we believe they are crucial to the content and impact of the story.

Today I encountered my first real-life hate preacher. I was quivering when I first heard what he was saying. I was walking past and decided to stop to listen, thinking maybe a street performer or something. Little did I know

I am still kind of shaking. I've never encountered one of these people for real. I was so confused when I saw him. I'm pretty okay with being gay, and I usually don't have a fear of standing up to it. But seriously, today I was genuinely hurt. Ironically, yesterday I was called fag, queer and homo more times than I ever have before in a single day (comments on Youtube).

But today, this was just... different. I've never been so insulted by a complete stranger. I don't know whether I was going to just cry right there, or scream at him. I chose to challenge him and when I did, my eyes just glazed over red in complete fury.

I never thought listening to this would hurt so much. It reminds me of The Laramie Project where Fred Phelps is hate-spewing and people dress as angels with giant wings and surround him, making a wall of wings so you can't see Phelps. And like how all the people were crying? That's the emotion I was feeling. I never thought I'd experience that.... He calls himself Brother Rick. He was at the WT Young library walkway right on Rose St.. He had a whole crowd of jock guys listening to him. He wore a mustard-yellow jacket, and had a "Bible" in

his hands. He had an impressive monologue about how he "came out today as a homophobe" and that he was born that way. He's always had these feelings but his mother told him it's okay to express his feelings. And now he's a proud homophobe.

At this point I could've just walked on, but I didn't want others hearing this guys ridiculous hate speeches. So I called the UK Police. They took my complaint and said that they would send someone out there. I told them he was making anti-gay remarks, so I was interested to see if they'd actually respond.

Rick was discussing how fornication is the first step to being a homo. Because when you masturbate, you are having sex with yourself- which is same-sex sex. And that is the first step to being a homo.

He kept going on about how he was a good "Christian" and such. So I challenged him a bit:

"Brother Rick! You say you're a saint, but Leviticus Chapter 3 Verse 17 says that "Any man who makes himself higher than he is will burn in hell forever!" What about that?! And isn't it a sin in God's eyes to run away from the mental institution, and don't they want you back?"

"Well, I never needed therapy like you UK boys do! And you're misquoting the Bible!" He replied.

The UKPD did show up, two squad cars and five officers! They made him move to the Free Speech Zone by the Student Center. (GO UKPD!). I thanked the female officer who made him move and told her that I was the one who called in the complaint.

She told me, "Well, honey, you know you don't have to listen to this stupidity. And that's what it is. It's just stupid."

The older officer told me that guy has been "preaching" on campus for as long as he can remember. But yeah, I don't want anyone to have to listen to

High School Youth Plan Pride Prom

Youth from the Lexington Gay-Straight Alliance are beginning to plan for the third annual Pride Prom that will take place in May or June 2009. The Pride Prom serves as an informal high school dance with a motto of "where you're free to be."

"I think it's a great opportunity for the students to be themselves," said Allen McDaniel, an adult adviser and social chair for the GSA. "A lot of these youth wouldn't feel comfortable

going to their high school prom with a same-sex date or presenting themselves in a non-traditional gender role."

The easygoing atmosphere has drawn positive attention from the high school attendees. Attendance has increased every year. An estimated 80 guests came to the Pride Prom in May 2008. That is 30 more than was estimated the year before. Straight and Gay youth have a great time dancing, talking and laughing together.

The goal of the Pride Prom, as Mr. McDaniel stated, is to provide a

safe and fun dance for everyone. Ticket costs are nominal (two for \$18, one for \$10) and cover the cost of renting the space.

While other high school proms require tuxedos and elaborate dresses, the Pride Prom encourages guests to come however they feel comfortable. The lack of a dress code creates a wide assortment of attire; some wear only jeans and a shirt while others arrive in formal-wear.

Parents, teachers and the GSA adult advisers supervise the prom for the four hour duration. Last year, there were 15 adults present to supervise the youth.

Other entertainment such as DDR, Guitar Hero, and music videos are available in a side room of the Prom.

"It's really a great time for everyone involved," said Mr. McDaniel, who helps supervise the youth.

A volunteer photographer has been onsite both years to capture the event. Pictures are made available to the youth only on the GSA website.

If you are a youth interested in helping to plan the next Pride Prom, come to a GSA meeting held every Tuesday night from 7 until 9. All youth are welcome. If my mom wants to disown me, it will hurt but I can find a family through my friends.

I'm not going to push my homosexuality on (my school) or my mother, but I will not lose this confidence I have found this summer. Thank you for your support and encouragement!

NEED ADVICE? Go to Helena Handbasket.

Q... Dear Helena, I just recently got the LOGO channel on my cable system. I am so happy to finally have programming that I can identify with but my sister is having a fit about it. I went to her house to baby-sit and left her TV on that channel. When she came home, she was offended. I have never come out to my family but I am sure that they know. How should I deal with this? She is really making a big deal out of it.

HH... Bless your little heart. Your sister must be like so many other people who just can't grasp the concept of "live and let live." Does she not have a remote? Can't she go ahead and change it off that channel, or is it stuck there forever? The issue of coming out is up to you. I always tell people to come out at a positive time of their life so that their loved ones won't identify being gay as a sad thing. Do this only when YOU are ready. Don't ever be afraid to be who you are! As far as the LOGO channel, ask her if she watches "Desperate Housewives" or one of the other nighttime dramas. They are usually dealing with situations that are not all that wholesome, but they are usually "straight" situations so that makes it okay. The short and sweet answer, tell her to BUILD A BRIDGE AND GET OVER IT. Get a life, sister.

Q... Dear Helena, With Thanksgiving coming up I have a new challenge that I am facing. This is the first year that my girlfriend and I have been together and I have not yet

come out to my family officially. We always have a big family Thanksgiving and it would be awkward if I didn't go but I really want to spend time with my new lover. If I take her then there will be a lot of questions asked and I don't know if I am ready to deal with that or not. What should I do?

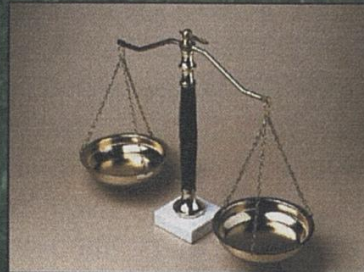
HH... You know you are going to have to deal with this sooner or later if she is going to be a part of your life. However, I do not think that springing it on them during a holiday is the best idea. Have you thought of visiting your parents before the holiday and just telling them? Chances are, they might suspect anyway...parents usually do. Tell them you have someone special in your life and that you want to include her at the family gathering. Give them the choice, but let them know that you are spending the holiday with her regardless. If they want you there, chances are they will warm up to the idea of you bringing her too. On the day of the gathering, don't make her being there a big deal. You don't want her to be uncomfortable. Treat her as your friend. There will be plenty of time later to proclaim your relationship to everyone else. Give the family a chance to get to know her first. Give them a little credit, they raised you to be the respectful person you are. It may take time, but I bet they will accept her into the family before you know it.

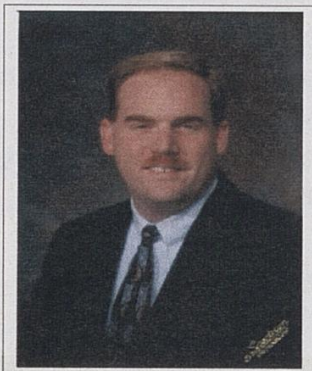
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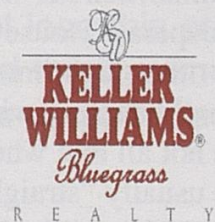
