Council wants guns kept out of Rupp

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council are trying to keep guns out of public buildings and Rupp Arena after the concealed weapons law goes into effect this fall.

Council member Jack Hillard yesterday brought the proposal to the council, which sent it to the city law department to write a city ordinance. Hillard said the council tentatively passed the proposed ordinance.

The move comes in the wake of Kentucky's new concealed-weapons law and Hillard said it represents a direct act of opposition against the state-wide concealed-carry law that will take effect Oct. 1.

The law allows Kentuckians over 21, the opportunity to carry a concealed handgun if they take a gunsatety course and pass a test. Hillard said in January the council sent a resolution to state lawmakers asking them to oppose the concealed-carry bill.

"Fortunately they did allow local governments some options," Hillard said.

Under the proposal, all facilities owned by the Urban County Government would not permit guns to be carried inside. Hillard said Rupp Arena, the Kentucky Theatre and Lexington Public Library are some of the buildings the ordinance would effect.

"Members of the council whole-heartedly support this proposal," said Bobby Iymn, a council member from District 8. "We do not believe that individuals should be able to carry concealed weapons in Rupp Arena or in any public place."

WORLD Israeli helicopters rocket large refugee camp

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Israeli helicopter gun-ships rocketed Lebanon's largest Palestinian refugee camp Tuesday, expanding the scope of a six-day-old war against Shire Muslim militants. Police said three Cobra gunships fired six rock-ests into the Ein el-Hilwhe camp on the outskirts of the southern port city of Sidon before dawn, hit-ting the house of a dissident Palestinian guerrilla leader.

AWARE group may change **UK curriculum**

About 90 students, faculty and administrators congregated in the Student Center last night for an AWARE meeting to discuss what has been done since the two recent attacks on campus and the elevated racial tensions on campus. Elisabeth Zinser, chancellor for the Lexington Campus, handed out a list of ideas and proposals that were spawned from an AWARE meeting in March.

"I do not present this with the point of view that this is complete or is everything but simply a reflection of what could be responded to immediately," Zinser said.

In the proposal, Zinser outlined four goals:

To further improve the campus climate for all

▼To further enrich the learning community for and about multicultural diversity

▼To further our ideals and practices of social

To further our ideals and practices of social
justice

To further the sense of community and student centeredness of the campus

Among a list of 10 new initiatives for UK, the
most controversial issue was a plan concerning possible changes in the curriculum.

One of the possibilities that audience members
asked for was a required racism and diversity course.

However, a few in the crowd believed by requiring additional courses, it would increase the difficulty to finish the University Studies requirements.

overall college experience.

"College is life, not preparation for life," Dean of
Students David Stockham said. "We don't only deal
with textbooks but with all the issues affecting campus."

Instead, Swift said that by this fall the committee wants to ask all departments to begin looking at ways they can introduce multicultural ideas into their department's curriculum might be a better idea.

Swift also invited everyone to attend the committee meetings to have a voice in what is going on

Alliance Working to Achieve Racial Equality leaders Kelly Meget and Jude McPherson used the forum to give people a chance to express their feelings, but more importantly, on how to ease the racial tensions on campus with various events.

Dawn Crutcher, a member of the Black Student Union, spoke about the silent protest that has been going on for the past couple of weeks.

90-year-old UK graduate reminisces of different time, different campus

Alumni make almost annual trips back to UK to visit and see how much the campus has changed. Most see significant changes in how the campus looks when they do come back.

When H.B. Alderdice came back to Lexington to visit last week, he said the changes could be described as major, to say the least. Alderdice graduated from UK in 1929, back when campus consisted only of a few buildings on North Campus.

Since that time, the University has expanded far and wide, now incorporating 673 acres of land. This expansion did not go unnoticed by Alderdice.

"It's changed so much that I don't know where I am," he said. "I don't recognize anything around here."

Another change he recognized was the Chandler Medical Center. He said when he was growing up, he used to plow that land himself.
"I broke that ground with a plow and three horses," he said.
One thing that wasn't different was the curriculum. Alderdice, a 90-year-old native of Smithland, Ky., had to

take his share of sciences because of his degree in vocational agriculture, including sciences such as chemistry and physics, as well as sciences related to his field of study. While attending school, Alderdice also played for the Wildcats' football team. He played both offensive and defensive tackle under coach Harry Gammage, the UK coach from 1927-33.

Football was different back then. In those days, the Cats didn't have the plethora of scholarships they have today to enable players who wanted to attend UK to play football. That was also before UK played its home football games at Commonwealth Stadium. Instead the games were played at Stoll Field, next to where the Student Center is located now.

Another difference between UK then and now was in basketball. Adderdice graduated two years before Adolph Rupp took over the Wildcat program.



Campus groups looking for bone marrow donors

Two student organizations are teaming up today to search for bone marrow donors for two Lexington children.

Circle of Imani and Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity will hold a donor drive today. Through the drive, the groups hope to find transplant matches for six-year-old P.J. Trumbo, a leukemia patient, and Anthony Gartin, 7,

who has aplastic anemia. Both boys need a transplant to survive, said Renata Hambrick, Circle of Imani president.

Hambrick said her organization decided to become involved with Central Kentucky Blood Center to find donors as one of its community service projects.

"We're focusing on finding African-American donors because of their low amount on the donor registry nationwide and on trying to educate people

on bone marrow transplants,"
Hambrick said.
"Your chance of finding a match are higher within your race."
Hambrick said of the more than I million people listed on the national marrow registry, only? percent are black, showing a need for more donors from the race to increase patients' chances for locating a match.
To be tested and placed on the registry, those coming to the drive will have blood taken.
From the blood, lab tests will determine bone marrow type. Names and types will then be listed on the national registry.

PHOENIX — A hot air balloon carrying tourists attending a car dealers meeting crashed and burned in the desert yesterday, killing one woman and injuring seven other people.

Nine passengers and the balloon pilot were aboard when the craft went down while trying to land near busy Interstate 17.

"It was attempting to land in the open desert when for unknown reasons it began to roll as it struck the ground," said Detective Mike McCullough, a police spokesman. A propane tank aboard the gondola caught fire, he said.

The balloon tipped over when it was caught in a sudden wind shift while landing, said Mark Taylor, president and owner of the balloon company, Get Carried Away Hot Air Balloon Co. of Scottsale.

State health conference coming to Lexington

conference include creating effective campaigns, improving talks between patients and doctors, and using new technology to help communication.

The conference is broken up into a series of presentations by researchers from institutions across the nation.

Representatives from various universities, among them Cincinnati, New Mexico and Florida, will present their findings.

Not only will the conference focus on medical research, but it will also take a different perspective by incorporating information from communication and journal ism researchers.

When Kentucky native Phillip Sharp won the Nobel Prize in medicine, his accomplishment did not escape the notice of the Unabomber, who sent Sharp a threatening letter.

Sharp, who was in Lexington yesterday giving a scientific lecture at UK, said a sense of relief came with the arrest earlier this month of bombing suspect Theodore Kaczynski.

"I think it's over now," Sharp said. "I think they've got the guy."

Kaczynski, a reclusive one-time math professor, was arrested by federal agents in Montana. A search of Kaczynski's crude plywood shack apparently yielded bomb-making materials and other evidence.

Sharp, who heads the biology

Sharp, who heads the biology department at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, shared the 1993 Nobel Prize with British-born researcher Richard Roberts. The two independently confirmed that the genetic material in DNA occurs in spliced segments, not continuous strings,


