KY. MOVIE PREMIERE

LOST IN THE PERSHING POINT HOTEL

An Independent film with Kentucky connections is premiering at the Kentucky Theater on Wednesday, August 29. "Lost in the Pershing Point Hotel" has been sweeping film festivals and is scheduled for theatrical release this coming October. Based on early information, the cost will be \$10 with an additional charge for a VIP Reception following the screening at The Bar.

This black comedy adaptation of Leslie Jordan's award-winning, off-Broadway play has been nominated for, and often won, "Best Picture" and "Best Director" in every film festival it has played, including LA Outfest, Seattle International, San Francisco Lesbian & Gay and Chicago Underground.

The film is the quirky and touching story of three mismatched runaways in search of their own identities who ride the razor's edge and misbehave as entertainingly as possible. It is set in the 1970's in Atlanta's Glam-rock underground drug scene.

At the center of the film is "The Storyteller", ...continued on page 2

Coronation XX

Held on July 8 at the Radisson Hotel in downtown Lexington, Coronation 20 was the culmination of a weekend of festivities sponsored by the Imperial Court of Kentucky to celebrate the achievements of Reign 19, and Empress XIX Tracy Taylor and Emperor XIX Donnie EV Royse, and to elect new monarchs

Two Hundred Forty people attended Coronation XX. The festivities started on Friday night with the In-Town show, held at Club 141. Despite being an "early" show, it was well attended.

Saturday evening, the State Dinner was held at the Radisson. Speakers from Lexington and from some of the eleven other Courts in attendance spoke of the important role of the Court in their community. Empress LaTrina Bidet of Seattle spoke of the benefits of visiting other courts, strengthening the court system, building cooperation andcontinued on page 12

a charming, gay, and astonishingly naive young man who leaves his born-again parents in search of bad boys, "who are good-looking, in an inbred sort of way". The author, Leslie Jordan plays this part.

His comrade is "Miss Make Do", a rebellious southern debutante who has run away from the rigid life her aristocratic mother had planned for her, and is an expert in "self-medication". Miss Make Do is played by Versailles native, Erin Chandler, "Happy" Chandler's granddaughter. Ms. Chandler is also one of the producers of this film and will be one of the stars attending this screening.

The third member of the unlikely trio is "Tripper" (Mark Pellegrino), a handsome, brooding, skirtchasin', four-time felon who makes his living on the street selling drugs and boys to the highest bidder. The film also stars Michelle Phillips, John Ritter, Kathy Kinney, Marilu Henner, and Adam Wylie.


Storyteller, Miss Make Do and Tripper are lost, figuratively, and often literally, in the maze of the crumbling Pershing Point Hotel --Atlanta's infamous drug, artist and prostitution mecca of that era. This is not simply a tale of drug use, however. The relationships among the characters deepen and a spiritual quality emerges. It is the films success at moving from comedic to serious tone and back again that has the critics excited.



We need people willing to help prepare the mailing that goes out at the end of the month.


To help us raise money, we need four people to work bingo games once a month; if you can do that just once or twice a year it will help us.

DISCUSSION GROUP





After dinner, the Out of Town Show was held at Club 141 featuring 24 performers. Anticipation of the event that was to follow almost distracted people from the stellar entertainment.

At the close of the first show, the back door to 141 opened and we were treated to the exotic dancers of the 9 Inch Males. The stage was in the space previously occupied by Spectrum, which has been closed for a number of years. This space may soon be part of the Club 141 experience.

Membership is restricted to persons living in the State of Kentucky, but not residing in the area represented by the Barony of Louisville, the counties adjoining Jefferson County. Non-voting associate membership is available for persons not fulfilling the residential requirements.
